The owner or occupant, or person having charge of each house or other building, or lot or lots of ground in the City of New York, shall, within the first four hours after every fall of snow, or hail, or rain, which shall freeze on the sidewalks and in the gutters, cause the same to be removed entirely from off the sidewalks opposite such house, building, lot, or land, under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, occupant, or person having charge, severally and respectively."

"§ 16. In case the ice or snow shall be so congealed that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, the owner, occupant, or person having charge of any building, lot, or land as aforesaid, shall, within the first four hours after every fall thereof, cause the sidewalks opposite his, her, or their premises to be strewn with ashes or sand, under the penalty of one dollar, to be paid by the owner or occupant, or person having charge thereof, severally and respectively."

In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An Act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873; and section 1 of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An Act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An Act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An Act in relation to the Estimates and Apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An Act in relation to the Estimates and Apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874,—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Saturday, February 13, 1875, at 12 o'clock M., for the purpose of considering a communication from the Comptroller, of February 10, 1875, relating to the payment of damages awarded by the Supreme Court, for opening of streets, avenues, etc.

Hon. WM. H. WICKHAM,  
Mayor of the City of New York:

SIR—By authority of chapter 365, Laws of 1865, and amendatory acts, proceedings have been instituted, and the reports of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have been confirmed by the Supreme Court, relative to the following public improvements, having damages awarded in each case, to wit:

1. The opening of Tenth avenue, above One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, damages, . . . . . \$92,026 00
2. The laying out a new street, running parallel to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, in an easterly direction from the Kingsbridge road, across Tenth avenue to the Boulevard, near the Harlem river, damages, . . . . . 34,368 91
3. The laying out, widening, and straightening of Kingsbridge road, between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and the Harlem river, damages, . . . . . 1,276,997 14

Under the provisions of law one-half of the amount of damages awarded in these proceedings, and also of the expenses incurred, is made a charge upon the City of New York, which is to be provided for by the issue of long bonds, and an increase of the permanent debt; while the other portion is to be provided for by the issue of temporary bonds in anticipation of the collection of assessments.

The damages are, I think, excessive, and the portion charged on the City, I think, much more than it should be, and will, if paid, be a very large increase of the debt of the City.

These proceedings have, however, as I am informed, received the sanction of the Supreme



Court, and provision must be made for their payment.

This matter is placed before the Mayor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for such action as he may deem proper.

The Board reassembled at 1 o'clock P. M.

Present—All the members.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered for adoption the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The Comptroller, in a communication dated 10th instant, addressed to the Mayor as Chairman of this Board, has called our attention to the damages awarded in proceedings—

1st. For opening Tenth avenue, above One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street;

2d. For laying out a new street parallel to One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street;

3d. For laying out, widening, and straightening Kingsbridge road, from One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to Harlem river; and

Whereas, The Comptroller has reminded this Board that, of the amount of said damages and of the expenses of the proceedings, one-half is made a charge upon the City, to be provided for by the issue of long bonds; and has, in said communication, suggested to this Board that said damages are excessive, and that the portion charged upon the City is much more than it should be, and that it will, if paid, be a very large increase of the debt of the City; but that the proceedings have, notwithstanding, received the sanction of the Supreme Court, and that provision must now be made for payment of the portion of said damages and expenses chargeable upon the City; and

Whereas, This Board shares the Comptroller's desire not only to prevent the debt of the City from increasing, but to reduce it in every way practicable;

Now, therefore, In order to ascertain and fix the responsibility in this matter upon whomsoever should bear it, and in order to enable this Board to take such steps in the premises as may be advisable, it is

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and hereby is requested to furnish to this Board, at its next meeting—

1st. Whatever evidence he has on which to base the said suggestions made by him in said communication, as to the fact that said damages are excessive;

2d. A statement, in detail, of the measures by the Comptroller taken, or requested or suggested to be taken, to prevent confirmation of the proceedings or allowance of the damages by the Supreme Court;

3d. Of the name or names of the Justice or Justices of the Supreme Court who made or entered the order or orders so suggested to be improvident or unjust; and of—

4th. The measures by the Comptroller taken, or requested or suggested to be taken, to appeal from such order or orders, or to cause the same to be reviewed or reconsidered.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Comptroller of the City of New York—1.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered for adoption the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The reports of the Commissioners of Estimates and Assessments, appointed in the matter of the several public improvements referred to in the communication of the Comptroller to the Mayor, dated the 10th inst., have been confirmed by the Supreme Court, and these judicial determinations are conclusive against the City; and

Whereas, It is the duty of this Board to authorize the issuing of such bonds as may be required to meet the obligations of the City in the matters referred; and

Whereas, All the papers relating to such obligations are on file in the Department of Finance;

Resolved, That the communication referred on the 10th inst. to the Mayor be and the same is hereby referred to the Comptroller, who is hereby requested, as financial officer of the City, to prepare and submit to this Board such resolution as, in his judgment, may be necessary to authorize the issuing of such bonds as may be required to provide for and pay the damages and expenses awarded and allowed by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments, and the Supreme Court, in reference to the said several public improvements.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Comptroller of the City of New York—1.

The President of the Board of Aldermen presented the following communications and statement from the Board of Aldermen, in answer to resolution offered by the Comptroller, and adopted by the Board at meeting of February 4, 1875:

SIR—In answer to the resolution offered by the Comptroller at the last meeting of this Board—

1st. As to the number of street improvements that have been authorized by ordinances of the Board of Aldermen, since January 1, 1875, etc., etc.

2d. As to what ordinances have heretofore been passed, which have not yet been put in course of execution, etc.

3d. As to what would be the probable cost of executing the same.

The undersigned respectfully submits the accompanying letter from Francis J. Twomey, Clerk of the Common Council, which gives the information asked for in the first part of the resolution.

A communication is herewith submitted, from the Department of Public Works, in answer to the second part of the resolution which gives a detailed statement of ordinances of the Common Council providing for various street improvements for which contracts have not been made; also, the reasons for the non-execution of the work.

As to the third part of the resolution the Commissioner of Public Works states that, "As these works are all subject to competition at public letting, it is impossible to give an estimate of their probable cost."

DEAR SIR—As requested by you, I have examined the resolutions and ordinances providing for street improvements that have been authorized by the Common Council since January 1, 1875. Also, whether the same were petitioned for in each case by the owners of property, subject to assessment therefor, with the names of the petitioners, etc., etc., and in reply beg leave to submit the following:

1. Resolution and ordinance to fence vacant lots south side of Fifty-fourth street, about two hundred feet west of Ninth avenue, and extending westerly about fifty feet; passed Board of Aldermen, January 14, 1875; approved by the Mayor, January 18, 1875. No petition in writing.

2. Resolution requesting the Board of Street Openings and Improvements to open Fifty-third street, from Tenth avenue to Hudson river, and Fifty-fourth street, from Eleventh avenue to Hudson river; passed Board of Aldermen, January 14, 1875; approved by the Mayor, January 20, 1875. No petitions in writing.

3. Resolution for lighting Eighth avenue, from Fifty-ninth to One Hundred and Tenth street, with gas (no assessment); passed by the Board of Aldermen, January 21, 1875; approved by the Mayor, January 25, 1875. No petitions in writing.

6. Resolution to place and light two lamps on north side of Thirty-fourth street, between First avenue and East river (no assessment); passed by the Board of Aldermen, January 21, 1875; approved by the Mayor, January 26, 1875. No petitions in writing.

7. Resolution to lay a crosswalk across Second avenue, at entrance to Stuyvesant square (no assessment); passed by the Board of Aldermen, January 21, 1875; approved by the Mayor, January 26, 1875. No petitions in writing.

8. Resolution to fence vacant lots on Ninety-second street, two hundred and twenty-five feet west of Third avenue, with an ordinance therefor; passed by the Board of Aldermen, January 21, 1875; approved by the Mayor, January 26, 1875. No petitions in writing.
