Whereas, Upon the occasion of the visit of the Team of Irish Riflemen, to this city last year, they were accompanied by the Lord Mayor of Dublin, and other dignitaries of that city, who upon their arrival were formally received and entertained as the guests of the Corporation of the City of New York; and

Whereas, The courtesies and amenities then interchanged were mutually agreeable and pleasant, and tended to bind in closer ties of friendship the government and people of the two cities, and it seems a public duty not to permit any favorable opportunity to pass without renewing these simple yet sincere manifestations of kindly regard and good will; and

Whereas, The approaching departure for Ireland of a Team of Riflemen, selected to uphold the proverbial proficiency of our people in the use of the rifle—our national weapon—seems a fitting opportunity to add to the existing intimate and cordial relations between the people and governments of the two cities, by the appointment of accredited representatives of this city to accompany the American Rifle Team on their visit to Ireland; therefore

Resolved, That a committee of three members of this Board be appointed by the President to accompany them to the Irish capital with a view of reciprocating the courtesy extended to our people and government by the City of Dublin on the occasion of the visit of the Irish Riflemen to this city last year.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent bears, and other noxious or dangerous animals, from going at large or being led through any streets, avenues, or public places in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Any person who shall permit any bear, or other noxious or dangerous animal, to run at large, or who shall lead any such animal, with a chain or rope or other appliance, whether such animal be muzzled or unmuzzled, in any street, avenue, lane, highway, or public place within the corporate limits of this city, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished pursuant to the provisions of sections 20 and 21, of an act relative to the powers of the Common Council of the City of New York and the Criminal Courts of said City, passed by the Legislature of the State of New York, January 23, 1833, and to the provisions of section 5, of article 4, of an act in relation to the Police Department of the City and County of New York, passed April 13, 1853.

SEC. 2. The Commissioners of Police are hereby required to enforce, rigidly, the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court-house, on Wednesday, June 2, 1875, at 2:10 o'clock P. M.

Present—Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, and John K. Hackett, Recorder.

Absent—E. Delafield Smith, Counsel to the Corporation.

The minutes of meeting of May 21, 1875, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists transmitted by the Board of Assessors with communication dated May 24, 1875, viz.:

1. Thirteenth avenue, sewers, between Gansevoort and Bloomfield streets, with branches in Bloomfield and Bogart streets.

2. One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging, between Fifth and Eighth avenues.

3. Forty-third street (north side), flagging, from First to Second avenue.

4. Eighty-eighth street, paving with stone-blocks, between Third and Fourth avenues.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed, on motion of the Recorder, they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer in Avenue B, between Eighty-sixth and Eighty-seventh streets, with branch in Eighty-seventh street, received from the Board of Assessors with communication of May 24, 1875, and having objections filed to the same by Mr. Joseph Hillenbrand as to the apportionment of the assessment on his property, was also presented to the Board by the Comptroller.

After consideration of the objections, on motion of the Comptroller, the same were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving with stone-blocks Sixty-third street, from Second avenue to the East river, to which objections had been filed, and which was laid over at the meeting of the Board held on the 21st ult., was taken up for consideration.

Mr. Henry R. Beekman, attorney for several of the objectors, was heard in opposition to the confirmation of the assessment list.

On motion of the Comptroller, the assessment list was again laid over.

The assessment list for setting curb and gutter and flagging One Hundred and ninth street, from Third avenue to Harlem river, to which objections had been filed, and which was laid over from the previous meeting was taken up for consideration.

Messrs. Henry P. McGown and Robert C. Embree, who had filed objections to the assessment, were present, and at their request the list was again laid over, on motion of the Recorder.

The assessment lists for grading One Hundred and Fiftieth street (Denman street), One Hundred and Fifty-first street (Gouverneur street), and One Hundred and Fifty-second street (Elton street), from Third to Morris avenue, respectively, concerning which a resolution of inquiry of the Commissioners of Assessments therein, relative to certain exemptions and expenses, was adopted at the last meeting of the Board, were again taken up, a communication in reply having been received from said Commissioners, dated May 27, 1875, and accompanied by a pamphlet copy of certain laws affecting the late town of Morrisania.

On motion of the Comptroller, the said assessment lists, with all papers relating thereto, were referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for examination and report to this Board.

At 2:30 P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

Hon. WM. H. WICKHAM, Mayor:

SIR—The Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction respectfully urge upon your consideration the importance of securing possession of the premises on the corner of White and Centre streets, for the purpose of a Reception Hospital, recently rented by the action of the Board of Aldermen, the lease of which has not been executed.

The approach of summer admonishes this Department of the probable necessity of making suitable arrangements for the reception, care, and treatment of cases of sun-stroke, in addition to the ordinary casualties, the constant recurrence of which have fully demonstrated that a hospital in that section of the city is indispensable to a proper fulfillment of the obligations of municipal charity and humanity.

The number of admissions to the Reception Hospital, Park, during 1871, were 1,902; 1872, 2,200; 1873, 1,071; 1874, 1,206.

Besides the cases of sun-stroke, of which there have been 85 in a single season, the general admissions comprise sufferers from acute diseases, crushed limbs, railway disasters, fractures caused by falls from buildings, shot and stab wounds, burns from explosions, and other accidents—all of which require immediate medical and surgical attention.

III.—That the limits embraced by the assessment aforesaid are as follows, to wit: All those certain lots, pieces or parcels of land situate in the City of New York, bounded by, included and contained within the following limits, that is to say: Beginning at a point on the easterly line of the new Avenue (next westerly from the Boulevard), distant ninety feet and eleven inches north of the northerly line of One Hundred and Tenth street; running thence easterly and parallel with One Hundred and Tenth street to a point distant three hundred and eighty-seven feet and six inches east of the easterly line of Eighth avenue; thence southerly and parallel with Eighth avenue to a point distant ninety feet and eleven inches south of the southerly line of One Hundred and Tenth street as the same is widened; thence westerly and parallel with said southerly line of One Hundred and Tenth street to the easterly line of the new Avenue, "next westerly from the Boulevard;" thence northerly along the easterly line of said new Avenue to the point or place of beginning.

IV.—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held in the New Court-house, at the City Hall, in the City of New York, on the 27th day of July, 1875, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as Counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.

In the matter of the application of the Department of Public Parks and the Department of Public Works, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to acquiring title to certain lands in the City of New York, for a public square, a place, for a Parade Ground, and the streets and avenues bounding the said public square or place, as laid out by the officers composing the Board of the Department of Public Parks in the City of New York, and the Major-General Commanding the First Division of the National Guard of the State of New York.

PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 290 AND CHAPTER 628 OF THE LAWS OF 1871,

chapter 372 of the Laws of 1872, and chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and of all other statutes in such case made and provided, the Department of Public Parks and the Department of Public Works, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, hereby give notice that, in compliance with the act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled, "An act to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out thereon a public place for a parade ground, and to authorize the taking of the same," passed April 20, 1871, three-fifths being present, the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York will apply to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term of said Court, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on Monday, the 28th day of June, 1875, at the opening of the Court on that day, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter.

The nature of the improvement hereby intended is the acquisition of title in the name and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to all the lands required for laying out and establishing in that part of said city, above Fifty-ninth street, a public square or place, and the streets and avenues bounding said public square or place, as shown on the duplicate maps thereof, made, certified, and filed, pursuant to the provisions of the second section of the aforesaid chapter 628 of the Laws of 1871, one of which is now on file in the office of the Department of Public Parks, and the other of which is now on file in the office of the Department of Public Works; said public square or place, and the streets and avenues by which the same is bounded, to be maintained for the use of said First Division of the National Guard of the State of New York, for military encampments, parades, drills, reviews, and other military evolutions and exercise, and when not required for such military evolutions or exercise, to be appropriated to such other uses as shall be conducive to public good. In its extent, the said improvement will embrace all the lands and premises, with the buildings thereon and appurtenances thereto belonging, situate, lying, and being in that part of the City of New York, hereinbefore mentioned, as follows:
