"Memorial."

At the regular monthly meeting of the "Associated Employees of the Bureaus of Buildings of The City of New York," held on May 1, 1903, the following resolutions were submitted and unanimously adopted:

Know ye by these presents that—

Whereas, The "Constitution" of the "United States" and the "State of New York" have, in a spirit of liberty, granted unto all citizens the right to join together for mutual protection and advancement while in pursuit of happiness, and

Whereas, It is a just saying, "that the mechanic is worthy of his hire," which must be admitted in every locality where equity and impartiality prevail; and whether skilled or unskilled it is but right that the remuneration be in proportion to the value of the services rendered to the employer, be that employer an individual, firm, corporation, community, city or government;

Therefore, in order to set forth in clear, just and concise terms the facts which embody the duties of Inspectors of Buildings in The "City of New York," the value of their services and responsibilities, and the insufficiency of the salaries paid them in proportion to the extent of said services, added to the consideration of the small percentage of mechanics competent to pass the examinations necessary to qualify, as indicated by the records of the "Civil Service Bureau," we hereby offer this "memorial."

Stated briefly the question resolves itself into the simple theorem, under two heads:

I.—Are or are not the present salaries of Inspectors of Buildings adequate or commensurate to the services rendered?

II.—Would the Inspectors be justified in asking for more salary? How should they ask for it? And how proceed successfully in order to obtain an increase in salary?

In answering the first query it will be necessary to set forth the actual details of the duties and their value, in comparison with others of a similar nature, so we answer:

No—It is not adequate or sufficient, for the following reasons:

By comparison—The wages now prevailing in the trades engaged in the several branches will show that those who inspect the work are paid less than those who execute it, and the annexed schedule will explain that; the following prices of labor paid up to May 1, 1903, is taken from the scale of wages paid members of the unions controlled by the New York Board of Building Trades:

From the above schedule it will be seen that the Inspectors of Buildings receive less salary than the wages of any of the mechanics and only 4 cents per day more than the highest paid laborer, despite superior qualifications as skilled mechanics and higher attainments as experts which they must possess to pass the Civil Service Examination as laid down by law. In plain words they are rated below the status of the Union Mechanics and rank in regard to financial value, slightly above skilled laborers.

Taking up now the question of their increased duties and responsibilities we maintain that the Building Inspectors are entitled to an increased salary for the following reasons, viz.:

I.—By the necessity for closer vigilance on the work.

II.—By its hazardous nature, as buildings are now deeper and higher, and consequently more dangerous.

III.—By the increased technical knowledge required whereby Inspectors must read and keep abreast of contemporaneous practice.

IV.—By the risks involved in night duty, on-fires, emergency unsafes, and so forth.

V.—By the fact that Inspectors on account of their advanced education, knowledge,

and experience, are entitled to more compensation than the artisans, whose varied and different branches of work they must not only be familiar with, but likewise inspect, supervise, and see completed according to law; Thus placing them on a par with the highest professional element of building construction, composed of Architects and Engineers, with whom they are in daily consultation in matters of building technics and law.

VI.—By the fact that Inspectors are subject to duty 365 days of the year.

VII.—Because their positions and responsibilities are primarily the most important in the municipal service of New York.

VIII.—The changed and exacting conditions, consequent with the rapid evolution of building construction since the year 1892, when the building code first went into force, a period of ten years has changed the entire nature of the forms of construction, in all details, from brick and timber methods, and elementary plumbing, to the skeleton steel and iron frames, complicated combinations of brick, stone, terra-cotta, and various patented processes which comprise Architectural Engineering; and similarly with plumbing, for this too has undergone a complete revolution of methods and materials, so that the Plumbing Inspector of to-day must be a Sanitary Engineer; in the same way as a Construction Inspector must combine an architect's and engineer's knowledge, yet there has been no extra or increased compensation for either during these years. Concerning the Inspectors of Iron and Steel Work, it is to be said that they too must have had similar experience in the several branches of the trades coming under their supervision. For example—skeleton steel and iron frames, and their multitudinous parts, and have worked as practical mechanics for a period of not less than five years, and be familiar with the theory of the construction. With all this requisite knowledge, they are still paid less than the mechanics whose work they superintend and inspect, bridgemen and iron-setters being paid \$5 per diem, while the salary of an Inspector of Iron Work is but \$3.29 per diem; proving that, although the Inspector must be possessed of greater technical knowledge than the mechanic, yet he receives less salary or wages, as you may please to term the compensation. Elevator Inspectors, or inspectors to supervise elevators, must also be skilled machinists of not less than ten years' experience, be thoroughly familiar with all the electrical and hydraulic machinery used in connection with elevators and be mechanical engineers and elevator builders, for which qualifications they are paid less than the machinists and builders who erect the elevators.

Furthermore, the Inspectors are entitled to increased salary by the following comparative schedule:

The City of Boston pays its Inspectors of Buildings the sum of \$1,800 to \$2,000 per annum, with a population of 560,000.

The City of Chicago pays its Inspectors \$1,800 per annum, with a population of 1,689,575.

The City of New York pays its Inspectors \$1,200 per annum, with a population of 3,437,202; or \$600 less than the two sister cities of lesser population.

The United States Government pays each Superintendent of Construction in the employ of the Architect of the Treasury, who is in charge of only one Government building, from \$6 per diem to \$3,000 per annum, according to the size of the building and the responsibilities involved. Private firms engaged in building construction, also corporations, pay their foremen \$6 to \$8 per day, and superintendents from \$40 to \$100 per week. The Department of Education of New York City pays each Inspector, on the construction of one school building only, \$5.50 per diem—\$1,500 per annum. The Bureau of Sewers of the City of New York pays its Inspectors, on the construction of new street sewers, from \$1,200 to \$2,100 per annum, and this only involves leveling and the superintendence of the brickwork of the sewers. A Tenement House Inspector of the City of New York only requires slight technical knowledge, need have had no experience, nor have been a practicing mechanic, yet he obtains a salary of \$1,200 per annum.

We, therefore, maintain that the present salaries of the Inspectors are too small in consideration of the comparisons set forth above, in addition to which might be added the facts that the Charter of the City of New York compels them to be men of a calibre superior to any classified in Class D of the Civil Service list, and insists that each and every Inspector of Buildings must have at least five years practical experience, be a skilled mechanic, in good physical condition, pass two examinations—one before the Civil Service Commission and one before the Board of Examiners—either of which may disqualify him for office.

The technical knowledge necessary to pass can only be acquired by years of actual practice at a trade or handicraft, and in many cases it is absolutely unattainable in less than ten years.

In many of the cases quoted herein, we have demonstrated there are many skilled employees of the City who are better paid with much less onerous duties and responsibilities, and for another example we might cite the Inspectors of Masonry on the Rapid Transit Tunnel construction, who are at present earning on an average of from \$4.50 to \$5.50 per diem, and with overtime from \$35 to \$40 per week; but the District Inspectors of the Bureaus of Buildings are each responsible for the construction of from 25 to 50 and the legal care, condition and safety of from 500 to 2,000 houses, ranging from the frame shed to the steel skeleton fire-proof sky scrapers, receive the least compensation of all, viz.: the small sum of \$3.29 per diem, \$25 per week and \$1,200 per annum. We therefore ask your Honorable Body to give full and earnest consideration to the statements contained in this "memorial," as we believe it holds facts and figures which are irrefutable, and will tend to show the vital necessity for active and urgent action on the part of the association to increase the compensations of the Inspectors of the several "Bureaus of Buildings" by an early and sincere effort to lay these facts before the higher authorities for their consideration and action.

We believe that an increase of salary can be obtained by placing the data and facts as herein set forth in the form of a "memorial" before the Superintendent of each Borough first, in order that each may scrutinize and approve of the procedure, and when approved and indorsed may serve as an instrument for him to lay before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment when the appropriations for the several Departments for the year 1904 are under consideration, or it might be submitted in the meantime to the Presidents of the five boroughs for their approval by the Superintendents of Buildings before the fall of 1903, thus making the "memorial" lawful and regular.

In all the movements which will affect the welfare and progress of individuals and organizations a time arrives when concerted action becomes necessary, that the initiative must be taken, and the best ideas and methods essential to success be transmitted to paper; this we believe we have done in this "memorial," and such are fairly and impartially set forth.

Recognizing, however, the truth that there are many members among your Honorable Body whose suggestions and propositions would tend to strengthen and improve the value of the document, it is submitted in this elementary form as a simple basis for future action, and the promotion, discussion and interchange of ideas on the extremely important subject of increasing salaries.

The present progressive movement of the time shows that never in the mechanical history of New York have the trades and crafts reached such a scientific height, and we, in conclusion, put forward our request, as being fair, just, equitable and due our increased attainments and responsibilities.

With the assurance to the organization of our best efforts in all things vital and beneficial to its members, this memorial is very respectfully submitted.

To the Members and the President of the New York Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Honorable Sirs—Acting under instructions from the Taxpayers' Alliance of the Borough of The Bronx, an organization having a membership of 5,000 taxpayers, we communicate with you for the purpose of asking you to kindly report out favorably at once, and act favorably at once on the application of the New York and Port Chester Railroad, which came before your body on Tuesday, March 8, 1904. As the matter of this application has been exhaustively discussed at two hearings called last year by the Railroad Committee of the Board of Aldermen, and at one hearing held this year, which, however, was called up on behalf of a corporation which has long since ceased to exist, by the name of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company, but at which hearing it was demonstrated conclusively that it was the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company's application which the public wanted acted upon, we, as citizens and representatives of the public, which will be vitally and essentially affected, cannot see why the New York and Port Chester Railroad application shall not be reported out at once. We are further convinced that this can be done with entire propriety, in view of the action which was taken by your body and by the Mayor in connection with the hold-up corporation which has been opposing the New York and Port Chester Railroad.

If your Honorable Body decides that another hearing is necessary for any purpose whatever, kindly notify us at once, and we assure you that the Borough of The Bronx, through its representatives, will be present and further finally inform you of the unanimous desire for immediate favorable action on the New York and Port Chester Railroad application.

We inclose you herewith a statement or digest which we desire to have brought before your Honorable Body, and go on the records of the proceedings of your Honorable Body, showing the legal rottenness and defects of the fake corporation which has been opposing the New York and Port Chester Railroad. We desire to call your attention to the fact that this digest showing the legal defects of the alleged New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company is not a series of opinions of any man or men, but is a statement of facts, chronologically recorded, and all of which are on record in the archives of the courts of this State. We have verified all of these facts, and should you desire, we will send you certified copies of all these proceedings.

We further call your attention to the fact that the New York and Port Chester enterprise is a solid enterprise amply backed and has stood the test of the most rigid investigations, as to its intentions, financial backing and ability, etc., in the matter of two commissions, one before the Railroad Commission of the State of New York and the other before Justice Keogh's Supreme Court Commission. In addition, it has practically completed all of its legal requisites in having sustained its charters, unanimously, before the New York Court of Appeals.

Our object in requesting you to act favorably upon this matter expeditiously is for the reason that in any application of this kind, that is, of the kind made by the New York and Port Chester Railroad, under section 11 of the Railroad Law, for the right to cross streets, after the assent of the Board of Aldermen has been granted, the entire matter is then again taken before the Railroad Commission of the State, which Commission determines the details, under the statutes of the laws of New York, of the crossings, over or under the grades of the streets, to be made by the Railroad Company.

Your Honorable Board will see that after you have granted your formal assent to the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, there yet remains, under the laws of the State, details to be done and completed which will require some months. We call your attention to this fact and ask you to kindly bear it in mind, and ask you to give this matter the expeditious favorable consideration which you have done in another application of a like nature, without doubt, however, under a misapprehension.

Thanking you and asking you to notify us promptly of any proceedings of any hearing which may be called, we remain

Record of Legal Facts and Proceedings Establishing the Legal Rottenness, Non-Existence and Death of the Alleged New York, Westchester & Boston Railway Company.

1. Incorporated March 20, 1872, by filing articles of association in the office of the Secretary of State.

2. Articles were so filed in violation of express provision of law, as there was not attached to the articles of association the affidavit required by section 2 of the Railroad Law of 1850, and the filing of the same had no more legal effect than the filing of a piece of blank paper.

3. In or about the year 1876 whatever there was of this corporation became insolvent, and one Seaver was appointed permanent receiver thereof by final judgment on March 25, 1876.

4. By an order of the Supreme Court, on March 22, 1881, the receiver was directed to sell all the rights of said company and all the right, title and interest of the company, legal or equitable, in and to its roadbed and right of way, and all its real estate, tracks and fixtures, free and clear of all liens of any kind, except taxes on real estate belonging to or in which said corporation may have an interest.

5. In pursuance of said order Seaver, the receiver, sold the same to William F. Van Pelt for \$5,500 on May 7, 1881.

6. The sale was duly confirmed by an order of the Supreme Court, and thereafter by deed, dated June 2, 1881, and recorded June 7, 1881, the receiver conveyed to Van Pelt all the franchises and rights of the said New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, and any right or rights which it may have had to condemn right of way, etc. This sale, under the statutes, also stripped the said New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company of any located route which it might claim under its map filed at White Plains in 1872, and also deprived the said New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad Company of any right to relocate a line or route unless it subsequently acquired authority from the Legislature to do so, which authority has not been given.

7. Upon his purchase Van Pelt and his associates, under the authority of section 5 of the Railroad Law of 1850, as amended by chapter 710 of the Laws of 1873, executed and filed articles of association forming a new corporation by the name of The East River and Connecticut Railway Company, as a reorganization of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, and thereby The East River and Connecticut Railway Company succeeded to all the property, rights, privileges and franchises of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company.

8. The articles of association of The East River and Connecticut Railway Company were filed in the office of the Secretary of State on the 13th day of June, 1881.

9. The East River and Connecticut Railway Company, although incorporated in 1881, has never completed the construction of any railroad, or, so far as ascertained, done anything toward the construction of the same save filing the articles of association reorganizing the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company.

10. The deed of the receiver to Van Pelt, made in pursuance of an order of the Court and confirmed by the Court, stripped the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company of all its rights and property, and the organization of The East River and Connecticut Railway Company by Van Pelt and his associates in reorganization of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, vested in the former all the rights conveyed to Van Pelt by the receiver, so that nothing remained of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company.

11. In a recent petition to the Supreme Court by a person claiming to be the receiver of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, the petitioner states:

"And your petitioner shows that there is grave reason to doubt whether under said articles of association said defendant corporation was ever legally incorporated or became a lawful corporation and was entitled to exercise its franchise for the following reasons:"

Then follows a reference to Laws of 1850, chapter 140, section 2, prohibiting the filing of articles of association until the prescribed affidavit is annexed thereto or indorsed thereon; and then the petition states:

"The articles of association of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company neither contained such an affidavit nor was it annexed thereto, but there was an entire omission of the required affidavit. In addition to this difficulty, the objection also presents itself that the company if it ever had a charter had forfeited it by reason of failure to complete and put its road in operation within the time limited by law."

Here follows a reference to Laws of 1867, chapter 775, providing that on failure of a railroad corporation to complete its road and put it in operation within ten years after filing its articles of association, "its corporate existence and powers shall cease."

The petition then proceeds further, as follows:

"Your petitioner further shows and is advised by his counsel, Mr. John S. Wood, and verily believes, that if said franchise were sold independently neither the purchaser nor any new corporation organized to take over the franchise could under existing statutes amend or remedy the defects in the certificate of incorporation, nor escape the forfeiture of the franchise by lapse of time; but that the existing corporation might possibly, although the questions of law are not clear, under existing statutes, by the action of its directors, amend the defects in the certificate of incorporation and secure a remission of the forfeiture from lapse of time."

12. The New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company having been incorporated under the General Railroad Act of 1850, could not possibly acquire the right to construct a railroad in The City of New York.

People ex rel. N. Y. City & Westchester Ry Co., vs. Board of Railroad

Commissioners, 81 App. Div., 237. Affirmed, 176 N. Y.

People ex rel. N. Y., N. H. & H. R. R. Co. vs. Board of Railroad

Commissioners, 81 App. Div., 242. Affirmed, 175 N. Y., 516.

In these two cases the Appellate Division held that a corporation organized under the general act of 1850, after 1860 and 1890, has not authority to build a railroad in The City of New York, as follows (81 App. Div. at p. 241):

"Beyond all this, I am at a loss to discover how the relator acquired, under its organization, any right to build any road within the limits of New York City. It was organized in 1887, under the general act of 1850, and since the passage of chapter 10 of the Laws of 1860 it seems to be the conceded rule that no company claiming an organization and authority under the act of 1850 merely could build any road within the City. I do not understand that the relator claims, or offered to show, that it based its authority upon any other act than that of 1850, and hence it does not seem to be in a position to object to the issuance of this certificate."

And again, 81 App. Div., at pp. 244 and 246:

"The relator claims that since chapter 10 of the Laws of 1860 was enacted there has been no law under which a railroad such as the applicant seeks to construct could be organized for operation in New York City."

"That act provides as follows: 'It shall not be lawful hereafter to lay, construct or operate any railroad in, upon or along any or either of the streets or avenues of The City of New York, wherever such railroad may commence or end, except under the authority and subject to the regulations and restrictions which the Legislature may hereafter grant and provide.'

"After such enactment it became the accepted conclusion that no railroad could be constructed in New York City except pursuant to legislation had subsequent thereto. From that date, up to the enactment of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1890, which is the 'Railroad law' now in force, three general acts were passed under which railroads could be built in such City, and each one of them, so far as it was applicable to the City, had reference to a road the purpose of which was to utilize the streets or public places of the City as and for its right of way. During that time no railroad organized under the general act of 1850 (chapter 140) could be built in the City, and therefore the situation was practically this, that only street railroads could be built in such City. \* \* \*

"The courts held that such language applied to a road that merely crossed a street in New York City as well as to those that sought to utilize a street as a right of way. (People's Rapid Transit Company vs. Dash, 125 N. Y., 93.)"

Sir—I have the honor to request authority from your Honorable Board to enter into a contract, without public letting, for repairs to the fireboat "David A. Boody," now at the drydock foot of Seventh street, East river, the estimated cost of the repairs to be about \$5,700.

This boat has been placed out of service by the United States Government Inspectors, and cannot be placed in service again until such time as the necessary repairs are made. As the fireboat "Seth Low" is also out of service, undergoing extraordinary repairs, the Department is greatly crippled in respect to fire protection on the Brooklyn river front. For these repairs to be given out by contract in the usual form, it will take at least six weeks before the work would be under way, which is entirely too great a delay in view of the existing conditions. I therefore urge early and favorable consideration of this request.

Whereas, Application was made January 7, 1904, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen for authority to be given the Police Commissioner to increase the Police Force of The City of New York by adding to the number of Patrolmen from time to time during the year 1904, not to exceed 150 \* \* \* and provided that the salaries of such additional Patrolmen shall be paid out of the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1904, entitled "Police Fund—Salaries of Police Commissioner, etc.", and provided the same is sufficient for such purpose; and

Whereas, It appears that the liability at this time of such account is such in amount that the Police Commissioner could not pay the salaries of 150 additional Patrolmen without exceeding the appropriation made to the Police Department for said account; and

Whereas, An urgent necessity exists at this time for the increase in force allowed under the Charter by the appointment of such one hundred and fifty Patrolmen,

Ordered, That the proceedings of January 7, 1904, asking for authority to appoint such additional Patrolmen be amended by striking out the words "and provided that the salaries of such additional Patrolmen shall be paid out of the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1904, entitled 'Police Fund—Salaries of Police Commissioner, Deputy Police Commissioners, Inspectors of Police, Surgeons, Captains, Sergeants, Roundsmen, Patrolmen, etc.'" and that there be substituted therefor the words "and that provision be made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the payment of salaries of such additional Patrolmen, with the approval of the Board of Aldermen."

Resolved, That the salary of Clinton H. Smith, Assistant Secretary of the Park Board, he and the same hereby is fixed at \$4,000 per annum, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen.

Adopted, all the Commissioners voting in the affirmative.

This action of the Park Board is not to be taken as an increase of the salary account, although it appears so on the surface. It is in effect a saving of \$1,500 as it follows and supplements the previous action of the Board abolishing the position of Clerk of the Board, established under the last administration.

The place of Clerk of the Board was an extravagant and unnecessary charge upon the salary account to the amount of \$2,000. At the same time its abolishment adds considerable to the burden upon the rest of the office, especially in the case of the Assistant Secretary.

The duties thus added to those of the Assistant Secretary are discharged with increased efficiency, together with those which previously devolved upon him. They make an arduous and responsible total.

The official affected is one of the most experienced and longest in the Park service. His fidelity, efficiency and industry are in evidence early and late. No question of office hours ever governs him when there is work to be done, and the recognition tendered to him by the Park Board is heartily recommended to the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen as deserved, proper and fitting.

Sir—In compliance with your instructions, investigation has been made of the request of the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of certain changes proposed in the payrolls of the hospitals under their control. Said request having been referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Finance Department for a report as to the facts, the following statement is respectfully submitted:

The new positions proposed and increases in salaries suggested are taken up in the order in which they appear in a communication from the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of February 8, 1904.

On account of the recent great increase in the number of patients and also with a view to betterment of the service in hospitals in which the City's poor are cared for, the following recommendations are made:

That four Admitting Physicians at Bellevue Hospital be appointed at \$600 a year each, to serve six hours a day.

In asking for the appointment of these Physicians, President Brannan of the Trustees says:

"Frequently over 100 patients are received during twenty-four hours, and they must be carefully examined before being assigned to their proper wards. The members of the house staff are unable to do this work in addition to their other duties in the hospital."

That the salary of one Male Helper be increased from \$600 to \$720, and another Male Helper from \$480 to \$720. Justification for these two increases is found in President Brannan's statement that,

—“the Helper in charge of the general storeroom of the Department and the Helper in charge of the Bellevue storeroom hold important and responsible positions.”

Application is made for the appointment of a Dietician at \$1,000 per annum. Inasmuch as the appointment at this time of a Dietician is not recommended in this report, improved service in the kitchen might be gained by advancing the pay of one Female Cook from \$300 to \$360 a year.

The request for increases in salaries of Male and Female Helpers seems reasonable and should be granted. It is proposed to increase the salaries of fifty-five Female Helpers who receive \$120 a year, twenty-three who receive \$144, and fourteen who receive \$150 to a uniform wage of \$180. It is also proposed to increase the salaries of twenty-seven Male Helpers who are paid \$150 a year and eleven who receive \$144 to \$180 a year, and twenty-five who receive \$150 and one who is paid \$180 to \$240 a year.

It appears from investigation that in private hospitals Female Helpers are paid \$180 a year and Male Helpers \$240. The payment of a fair wage will, it is expected, attract to the City's hospitals Male and Female Helpers of a higher standard of character, who may be depended upon to more satisfactorily discharge the delicate duties incumbent upon those who have the care of the sick poor. It is fair to assume also that reliable men and women who are underpaid by the City do, when opportunity presents, desert the public hospitals for more lucrative employment in private institutions.

When the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals made request for increase in salaries of Hospital Helpers last year they said, in an accompanying letter to the Board of Estimate:

"These people are brought into very close relations with the patients. The men assist in the reception room and carry the patients on stretchers to the wards, or from the wards to the operating room; the women are engaged in keeping the wards clean, and aid the nurses in caring for the patients."

The Trustees say in their present application for increase:

"Another year's experience in the management of the hospitals of the Department has emphasized the necessity of paying the same rate of wages that prevails in the private hospitals of the City."

The experiment of placing graduate female nurses in charge of the male prison and male alcoholic ward appears to have proved a success. A woman must have special qualifications for such a trying position. Four of these nurses at \$600 a year each are asked for by the Trustees, and it would seem to be money well spent to employ them. The presence of women in the male wards apparently has had the

effect of preventing a recurrence of scandals of the past, when inhuman treatment of alcoholic patients was charged upon male attendants.

Ten additional Pupil Nurses, whose total salaries will amount to \$960, are requested. As they are designed to relieve the overworked Nurses, the request should be granted.

Two Enginemen at \$1,277.50 a year each are found to be necessary, in order to conform to the prevailing rate of wages and eight-hour law.

A skilled male Helper at \$600 a year appears to be needed in the Harlem Hospital to make daily repairs. Of this request, President Brannan says:

"The buildings occupied by Harlem Hospital are of wood and require almost constant attention to keep them in good repair."

The following additional appointments are also recommended:

The appointment of additional help in the hospitals would appear to be justified by the figures given out by President Brannan, who says:

"During 1903 there were treated in the hospitals of the Department 5,994 more patients than during 1902. In Bellevue Hospital alone there were 23,073 patients in 1902, and 27,068 in 1903, an increase of 3,995, or more than 17 per cent."

Dr. Brannan again says:

"The increases are asked for in order to enable us to raise the wages of the Hospital Helpers in all the hospitals of the Department to an amount sufficient to secure and retain respectable and efficient men and women to perform the important work that falls to this class of employees."

Based upon the facts and conditions disclosed in this examination, the following recommendations for the establishment of new positions and increases in salaries of employees in the City hospitals are hereby made:

The total amount necessary to meet the creation of new positions and the increase in wages is \$32,239, divided as follows:

New positions .....	\$10,900 00
Increase to various employees .....	21,339 00

Of the \$32,239 increase, \$5,000 is required for a Director of the Pathological Laboratories, and \$1,500 for an Assistant Director. Every modern, well-equipped hospital should have a pathologist to direct the scientific investigation of the causes of death, and in order to secure a competent man for this place, the salary mentioned is required. The Director will also supervise the laboratories of the other hospitals of the Department.

The sum of \$2,400 is required for four Admitting Physicians, each to receive \$600, and to serve six hours a day. Frequently over one hundred patients are received during twenty-four hours, and they must be carefully examined before being assigned to their proper wards. The members of the house staff are unable to do this work in addition to their other duties in the hospital.

The economical use of food supplies calls for the appointment of a Dietician, who can arrange a scientific, ample and varied diet, and see that the food is so prepared as to bring about the best results with the quantities allowed.

In a hospital of the size of Bellevue, where people of all nationalities apply for treatment, it is necessary to have as an Interpreter a competent man at a salary of not less than \$1,000.

These various positions amount to \$10,900, and the balance of \$21,339 is to increase the wages of certain employees and to provide certain additions; \$2,555 is needed for two Enginemen, in order to conform to the prevailing rate of wages and to have all Enginemen serve but eight hours a day; \$800 is required for an expert Cataloguer, to assume charge of filing and indexing the medical records of the institution. An additional \$500 is requested for the salary of the Assistant Superintendent, whose duties have been largely increased and who frequently is on duty both day and night. The Supervising Engineer who has the immediate charge of all the mechanical part of the Department, together with the responsibility for same, is underpaid, and should receive an increase of \$300.

It is desired to place in charge of the Male Prison and Male Alcoholic Wards competent graduate women Nurses. These should receive a salary of \$600 a year, a total of \$2,400. The sum of \$1,920 is needed in order to provide better supervision in certain of the general wards of the hospital. The Helper in charge of the General Store Room of the Department and the Helper in charge of the Bellevue Store Room hold important and responsible positions; the total amount of these increases is \$360. A skilled male Helper at \$600 is needed at Harlem Hospital to make the daily repairs around this old institution. The buildings occupied by the Harlem Hospital are of wood, and require almost constant attention to keep them in good repair.

The sum of \$960 is needed in order to increase the number of Pupil Nurses by ten. The number now employed is not sufficient to give proper care to the patients and at the same time allow the necessary amount of rest to the nurses, who are on continuous duty for twelve hours of the twenty-four. During 1903 there were treated in the hospitals of the Department 5,994 more patients than during 1902. In Bellevue Hospital alone there were 23,073 patients in 1902 and 27,068 in 1903, an increase of 3,995, or more than 17 per cent. Because of this heavy service six additional Male Helpers (orderlies) at \$240 a year are to be employed to assist in the wards.

The remaining increases are asked for in order to enable us to raise the wages of the hospital Helpers in all the hospitals of the Department to an amount sufficient to secure and retain respectable and efficient men and women to perform the important work that falls to this class of employees. This request was made in our estimate of last year, but was not granted. As was stated at that time in the letter accompanying our estimate, "these people are brought into very close relations with the patients; the men assist in the reception room and carry the patients on stretchers to the wards, or from the wards to the operating rooms; the women are engaged in keeping the wards clean, and aid the nurses in caring for the patients." Another year's experience in the management of the hospitals of the Department has emphasized the necessity of paying the same rate of wages that prevails in the private hospitals of the City. This rate is \$20 a month for the men and \$15 a month for the women, a rate that cannot be called excessive.

The above increases and additions to the salary list can be provided for, without adding to the total appropriation for the Department, by the transfer to the appropriation for Salaries of \$10,000 from the appropriation for Additions, Alterations and Repairs, and \$22,239 from the appropriation for Supplies.

Sir—In compliance with your instructions, investigation has been made of the request of the Board of Health for approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of proposed increases of salaries of Telephone Switchboard Operators employed by the Department, said request having been referred by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the Finance Department for a report as to the facts, and the following statement is respectfully submitted:

In a communication dated February 16, 1904, addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the request is made  
—“to fix the salaries of Telephone Switchboard Operators employed in the Department of Health at \$900 per annum, to conform with the amounts received by persons performing similar duties in the Law Department, the Department of Education, the Department of Street Cleaning, the Municipal Civil Service Commission and the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.”

According to the Civil List for 1904, there are employed by the Department of Health three Telephone Switchboard Operators at a salary of \$750 each, whose salaries are asked to be increased to \$900 a year.

Examination of the Civil List shows that the following salaries are paid Telephone Switchboard Operators in various departments:

Subject—Consideration of communications sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting certain increases in salaries and wages.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor:

Sir—We have given consideration to the communications sent to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Board of Education, the Commissioner of Police and the Hostlers of the Police Department, requesting certain increases in salaries and wages, which communications your Honor transmitted to us with instructions to prepare "comparative statements of the salaries paid for the positions mentioned" therein, and beg to submit our report.

Board of Education.

On December 16, 1903, the Board of Education adopted a resolution increasing the salaries of one "Inspector of Heating and Ventilating" from \$36 to \$40 per week, and one "Electric Inspector" from \$35 to \$40 per week, and at the same time passed a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen to fix the increased salaries as proposed.

We do not find that these titles, descriptive of duties performed, are used in any other department of the City government than in the Board of Education, nor can we say that the ability, duties and responsibilities of those persons who perform work of a somewhat similar nature in other departments, furnish a criterion by which to measure the value of the services of those whose salaries it is here proposed to increase. Other "Inspectors of Heating and Ventilating" and other "Inspectors of Electricity" employed by the Board of Education are paid at the rate of \$30 and \$27 per week, but their duties may not be the same.

The Bridge Department employs an "Electrical Engineer" at \$1,200 per annum, while the Fire Department pays \$2,400 to an employee with precisely the same title.

In the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity "Inspectors of Electrical Construction" are paid variously \$1,350 and \$1,800. "Inspectors of Lighting and Conductors" are paid \$1,500, and "Electrical Inspectors" are paid \$1,252 per annum.

It would appear, moreover, that the Board of Education did not await the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but that the increased salaries proposed were paid from and after January 1, 1904; which action appears to have been fully warranted under a decision rendered by Justice Morgan J. O'Brien of the Court of Appeals on October 6, 1903, in the case of Gunnison vs. the Board of Education.

Department of Police.

The Police Commissioner has requested that the following salaries be increased:

The Chief Engineer of steamboat "Patrol" from \$1,140 to \$1,500 per annum, and the Assistant Engineer of the steamboat "Patrol" from \$900 to \$1,320 per annum.

It is not possible for us to determine the relative value of the duties pertaining to these positions with those of steam Engineers employed otherwise, on vessels or on shore, but we have collated the following facts:

The Department of Public Charities on its steamboat force employs one "Supervising Engineer" at \$2,100 per annum; one "Engineer" at \$1,200, and a number of "Enginemen" at \$3 per day, with food and quarters.

The Department of Correction employs one "Steamboat Engineer" at \$1,200, two at \$1,000, and two at \$900 per annum; the Department also furnishes three meals a day to its Engineers.

The Department of Health employs one "Steamboat Engineer" at \$1,220 per annum.

In the Fire Department the fixed salary for "Engineers" and "Engineers of Steamers" is \$1,600 per annum.

The Department of Bridges employs three engineers on each of the draw bridges spanning the Harlem River. They are entitled "Steam Engineers," and the salaries paid are, one at \$1,500 and two at \$1,277.50 each.

The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity employs steam Engineers at its pumping stations, who are classed as "Enginemen." The salaries paid are as follows:

1 Engineman at \$2,500 per annum.

2 Enginemen at \$1,750 per annum.

1 Engineman at \$1,600 per annum.

18 Enginemen at \$1,277.50 per annum.

2 Assistant Enginemen at \$1,800 per annum.

63 Assistant Enginemen at \$1,277.50 per annum.

In private business we find that on the steamer lines using the City piers, chief engineers are paid \$1,500 and assistant engineers \$1,200, "with keep"; engineers on ferryboats are paid \$1,500, and those on harbor tugs are paid \$1,200 per annum, both "without keep."

Police Department Hostlers.

The Hostlers of the Police Department who have petitioned the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an increase of wages from \$2 to \$2.50 per day, contend that the former rate "is less than the rate prevailing in the other departments."

We find that the title "Hostler" is used in other than the Police Department only by the Department of Correction, who employs one at \$900 and one at \$800 per annum, and by the Department of Street Cleaning, where the rate is uniform at \$730 per annum, with \$2.30 paid extra for Sunday work.

The Fire Department employs four "Stablemen," one at \$912 and three at \$730 per annum, while the Health Department pays to the same designated employees \$600, \$720 and \$780 per annum.

Both the Adams and the American Express Companies pay their hostlers \$50 per month, the latter company increasing the pay to \$55 per month after three years' service.

The Metropolitan Street Railway Company pays its hostlers at the rate of \$12.25 per week of seven days.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Section One Hundred and Nine of the Building Code.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section one hundred and nine of the Building Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 109. Theatres and Places of Public Amusement.—Every theatre or opera house, or other building intended to be used for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainments of any kind, hereafter erected for the accommodation of more than three hundred persons shall be built to comply with the requirements of this section. No building which, at the time of the passage of this Code is not in actual use for theatrical or operatic purposes, and no building hereafter erected not in conformity with the requirements of this section, shall be used for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainments of any kind, until the same shall have been made to conform to the requirements of this section. And no building hereinbefore described shall be opened to the public for theatrical or operatic purposes, or for public entertainments of any kind, until the Department of Buildings and the Fire Commissioner shall have approved the same in writing as conforming to the requirements of this section. Every such building shall have at least one front on the street, and in such front there shall be suitable means of entrance and exit for the audience, not less than twenty-five feet in width. In addition to the aforesaid entrances and exits on the street there shall be reserved for service in case of an emergency an open court or space in the rear and on the side not bordering on the street, where said building is located on a corner lot; and in the rear and on both sides of said building, where there is but one frontage on the street as hereinafter provided. The width of such open court or courts shall be not less than (seven) ten feet where the seating capacity is not over one thousand people, above one thousand and not more than eighteen hundred people (eight) twelve feet in width, and above eighteen hundred people (ten) fourteen feet in width. Said open court or courts shall (begin on a line with or near the proscenium wall, and shall extend the length of the auditorium proper to or near the wall separating the same from the entrance lobby or vestibule.) extend the full length and height of the building and across on each side and rear thereof where its sides or side does not abut on a street or alley, and shall be of the same width at all points, and exits hereafter specified shall lead into such open courts. (A separate and distinct corridor shall continue to the street from each open court through such superstructure as may be built on the street side of the auditorium, with continuous walls of brick or fireproof materials on each side the entire length of said corridor or corridors, and the ceiling and floors shall be fireproof. Said corridor or corridors shall not be reduced in width to more than three feet less than the width of the open court or courts, and there shall be no projection in the same; the outer openings to be provided with doors or gates opening toward the street.) During the performance the doors or gates in the corridors shall be kept open by proper fastenings; at other times they may be closed and fastened by movable bolts or locks. The said open courts and corridors shall not be used for storage purposes, or for any purpose whatsoever except for exit and entrance from and to the auditorium and stage, and must be kept free and clear during performances. The level of said corridors at the front entrance to the building shall be not greater than one step above the level of the sidewalk where they begin at the street entrance. The entrance of the main front of the building shall be not on a higher

level from the sidewalk than four steps, unless approved by the Department of Buildings. To overcome any difference of level in and between courts, corridors, lobbies, passageways and aisles on the ground floor, gradients shall be employed of not over one foot in twelve feet, with no perpendicular rises. From the auditorium opening into the said open courts or on the side street, there shall be not less than two exits on each side in each tier from and including the parquet and each and every gallery. Each exit shall be at least five feet in width in the clear and provided with doors of iron or wood; if of wood, the doors shall be constructed as hereinbefore in this code described. All of said doors shall open outward, and shall be fastened with movable bolts, the bolts to be kept drawn during performances. There shall be balconies not less than (four) six feet in width in the said open court or courts at each level or tier above the parquet, on each side of the auditorium, of sufficient length to embrace the two exits, and from said balconies there shall be staircases extending to the ground level, with a rise of not over eight and one-half inches to a step and not less than nine inches tread, exclusive of the nosing. The staircase from the upper balcony to the next below shall be not less than (thirty-six) forty-eight inches in width in the clear, and from the first balcony to the ground (three) four feet in width in the clear where the seating capacity of the auditorium is for one thousand people or less (three feet and six inches) four feet six inches in the clear where above one thousand and not more than eighteen hundred people, and five feet in the clear where above eighteen hundred people and not more than twenty-five hundred people, and not over five feet six inches in the clear where above twenty-five hundred people. All the before-mentioned balconies and staircases shall be constructed of iron throughout, including the floors, and of ample strength to sustain the load to be carried by them, and they shall be covered with a metal hood or awning, to be constructed in such manner as shall be approved by the Department of Buildings. Where one side of the building borders on the street, there shall be balconies and staircases of like capacity and kind, as before mentioned, carried to the ground. When located on a corner lot, that portion of the premises bordering on the side street and not required for the uses of the theatre may, if such portion be not more than twenty-five feet in width, be used for offices, stores or apartments, provided the walls separating this portion from the theatre proper are carried up solidly to and through the roof, and that a fireproof exit is provided for the theatre on each tier, equal to the combined width of exits opening on opposite sides in each tier, communicating with balconies and staircases leading to the street in manner provided elsewhere in this section; said exit passages shall be entirely cut off by brick walls from said offices, stores or apartments, and the floors and ceilings in each tier shall be fireproof. Nothing herein contained shall prevent a roof garden, art gallery or rooms for similar purposes being placed above a theatre or public building, provided the floor of the same forming the roof over such theatre or building shall be constructed of iron or steel and fireproof materials, and that said floor shall have no covered boards or sleepers of wood, but be of tile or cement. Every roof over said garden or rooms shall have all supports and rafters of iron or steel, and be covered with glass or fireproof materials, or both, but no such roof garden, art gallery or room for any public purpose shall be placed over or above that portion of any theatre or other building which is used as a stage. No workshop, storage or general property room shall be allowed above the auditorium or stage, or under the same, or in any of the fly galleries. All of said rooms or shops may be located in the rear or at the side of the stage, but in such cases they shall be separated from the stage by a brick wall, and the openings leading into said portions shall have fireproof doors on each side of the openings, hung to iron eyes built into the wall. No portion of any building hereafter erected or altered, used or intended to be used for theatrical or other purposes as in this section specified, shall be occupied or used as a hotel, boarding or lodging house, factory, workshop or manufactory, or for storage purposes, except as may be hereafter specially provided for. Said restriction relates not only to that portion of the building which contains the auditorium and the stage, but applies also to the entire structure in connection herewith. No store or room contained in the building, or the offices, stores or apartments adjoining, as aforesaid, shall be let or used for carrying on any business, dealing and articles designated as specially hazardous in the classification of the New York Board of Fire Underwriters, or for manufacturing purposes. No lodging accommodations shall be allowed in any part of the building communicating with the auditorium. Interior walls built of fireproofing materials shall separate the auditorium from the entrance vestibule, and from any room or rooms over the same, also from lobbies, corridors, refreshment or other rooms. All staircases for the use of the audience shall be inclosed with walls of brick, or of fireproof materials approved by the Department of Buildings, in the stories through which they pass, and the openings to said staircases from each tier shall be the full width of said staircase. No door shall open immediately upon a flight of stairs, but a landing at least the width of the door shall be provided between such stairs and such door. A firewall, built of brick, shall separate the auditorium from the stage. The same shall extend at least four feet above the stage roof, or the auditorium roof, if the latter be the higher, and shall be coped. Above the proscenium opening there shall be an iron girder of sufficient strength to safely support the load above, and the same shall be covered with fireproof materials to protect it from the heat. Should there be constructed an orchestra over the stage, above the proscenium opening, the said orchestra shall be placed on the auditorium side of the proscenium fire-wall, and shall be entered only from the auditorium side of said wall. The moulded frame around the proscenium opening shall be formed entirely of fire-proof materials; if metal be used, the metal shall be filled in solid with non-combustible material and securely anchored to the wall with iron. The proscenium opening shall be provided with a fire-proof metal curtain, or a curtain of asbestos or other fire-proof material approved by the Department of Buildings, sliding at each end within iron grooves, securely fastened to the brick wall and extending into such grooves to a depth not less than six inches on each side of the opening. Said fire-proof curtain shall be raised at the commencement of each performance and lowered at the close of said performance, and be operated by approved machinery for that purpose. The proscenium curtains shall be placed at least three feet distant from the footlights at the nearest point. No doorway or opening through the proscenium wall, from the auditorium, shall be allowed above the level of the first floor, and such first floor openings shall have fire-proof doors on each face of the wall, and the doors shall be hung so as to be opened from either side at all times. There shall be provided over the stage, metal skylights of an area or combined area of at least one-eighth the area of said stage, fitted up with sliding sash and glazed with double thick sheet glass not exceeding one-twelfth of an inch thick, and each pane thereof measuring not less than 300 square inches, and the whole of which sky-light shall be so constructed as to open instantly on the cutting or burning of a hempen cord, which shall be arranged to hold said sky-lights closed, or some other equally simple approved device for opening them may be provided. Immediately underneath the glass of said sky-lights there shall be wire netting, but wire glass shall not be used in lieu of this requirement. All that portion of the stage not comprised in the working of scenery, traps and other mechanical apparatus for the presentation of a scene, usually equal to the width of the proscenium opening, shall be built of iron or steel beams filled in between with fire-proof material, and all girders for the support of said beams shall be of wrought iron or rolled steel. The fly galleries entire, including pin rails, shall be constructed of iron or steel, and the floors of said galleries shall be composed of iron or steel beams, filled with fire-proof materials, and no wood boards or sleepers shall be used as covering over beams, but the said floors shall be entirely fire-proof. The rigging loft shall be fire-proof. All stage scenery, curtains and decorations made of combustible material, and all woodwork on or about the stage shall be painted or saturated with some non-combustible material, or otherwise rendered safe against fire, and the finishing coats of paint applied to all wood work through the entire building shall be of such kind as will resist fire to the satisfaction of the Department of Buildings. The roof over the auditorium and the entire main floor of the auditorium and vestibule, also the entire floor of the second story of the front superstructure over the entrance, lobby and corridors, and all galleries and supports for the same in the auditorium shall be constructed of iron or steel and fire-proof materials, not excluding the use of wood floorboards and necessary sleepers to fasten the same to, but such sleepers shall not mean timbers of support, and the space between the sleepers, excepting a portion under the stepping in the galleries, which shall be properly fire-stopped, shall be solidly filled with incombustible material up to under side of the floor boards. The fronts of each gallery shall be formed

of fireproof materials, except the capping, which may be made of wood. The ceiling under each gallery shall be entirely formed of fireproof materials. The ceiling of the auditorium shall be formed of fireproof materials. All lathing, whenever used, shall be of wire or other metal. The partitions in that portion of the building which contains the auditorium, the entrance and vestibule and every room and passage devoted to the use of the audience shall be constructed of fireproof materials, including the furring of outside or other walls. None of the walls or ceilings shall be covered with wood sheathing, canvas or any combustible material. But this shall not exclude the use of wood wainscoting to a height not to exceed six feet, which shall be filled in solid between the wainscoting and the wall with fireproof materials. The walls separating the actors' dressing rooms from the stage and the partitions dividing the dressing rooms, together with the partitions of every passageway from the same to the stage, and all other partitions on or about the stage, shall be constructed of fireproof material approved by the Department of Buildings. All doors in any of said partitions shall be fireproof. All shelving and cupboards in each and every dressing room, property room or other storage rooms shall be constructed of metal, slate or some fireproof material. Dressing rooms may be placed in the fly galleries provided that proper exits are secured therefrom to the fire escapes in the open courts, and that the partitions and other matters pertaining to dressing rooms shall conform to the requirements herein contained, but the stairs leading to the same shall be fireproof. All dressing rooms shall have an independent exit leading directly into a court or street, and shall be ventilated by windows in the external walls; and no dressing room shall be (more than one story) below the street level. All windows shall be arranged to open, and none of the windows in outside walls shall have fixed sashes, iron grills or bars. All seats in the auditorium, excepting those contained in boxes, shall be not less than thirty-two inches from back to back, measured in a horizontal direction, and firmly secured to the floor. No seat in the auditorium shall have more than six seats intervening between it and an aisle on either side. No stool or seat shall be placed in any aisle. All platforms in galleries formed to receive the seats shall not be more than 21 inches in height of riser, nor less than 32 inches in width of platform. All aisles on the respective floors in the auditorium (having seats on both sides of same) shall be not less than three feet wide where they begin, and shall be increased in width towards the exits in a ratio of one and one-half inches to five running feet. (Aisles having seats on one side only shall be not less than two feet wide at their beginning and increased in width the same as aisles having seats on both sides.) The (aggregate capacity of the) foyers, lobbies, corridors, passages and rooms for the use of the audience, not including aisles spaced between seats, shall (on each floor or gallery, be sufficient to contain the entire number to be accommodated on said floor or gallery, in the ratio of one hundred and fifty superficial feet of floor room for every one hundred persons) on the first or main floor where the seating capacity exceeds 500 or more, be at least 16 feet clear, back of the last row of seats, and on each balcony or gallery at least 12 feet clear of the last row of seats. Gradients or inclined planes shall be employed instead of steps where possible to overcome slight difference of level in or between aisles, corridors and passages. Every theatre accommodating three hundred persons shall have at least two exits; when accommodating five hundred persons, at least three exits shall be provided; these exits not referring to or including the exits to the open court at the side of the theatre. Doorways of exit or entrance for the use of the public shall be not less than five feet in width, and for every additional one hundred persons or portions thereof to be accommodated, in excess of five hundred, an aggregate of twenty inches additional exit width must be allowed. All doors of exit or entrance shall open outwardly and be hung to swing in such a manner as not to become an obstruction in a passage or corridor, and no such doors shall be closed and locked during any representation, or when the building is open to the public. Distinct and separate places of exit and entrance shall be provided for each gallery above the first. A common place of exit and entrance may serve for the main floor of the auditorium and the first gallery, provided its capacity be equal to the aggregate capacity of the outlets from the main floor and the said gallery. No passage leading to any stairway communicating with any entrance or exit shall be less than four feet in width in any part thereof. All stairs within the building shall be constructed of fireproof material throughout. Stairs from balconies and galleries shall not communicate with the basement or cellar. All stairs shall have treads of uniform width and risers of uniform height throughout in each flight. Stairways serving for the exit of fifty people shall be at least four feet wide between railings or between walls, and for every additional fifty people to be accommodated six inches must be added to their width. The width of all stairs shall be measured in the clear between hand rails. In no case shall the risers of any stairs exceed seven and a half inches in height, nor shall the treads, exclusive of nosings, be less than ten and one-half inches wide in straight stairs. No circular or winding stairs for the use of the public shall be permitted. Where the seating capacity is for more than one thousand people, there shall be at least two independent staircases, with direct exterior outlets, provided for each gallery in the auditorium, where there are not more than two galleries, and the same shall be located on opposite sides of said galleries. Where there are more than two galleries one or more additional staircases shall be provided, the outlets from which shall communicate directly with the principal exit or other exterior outlets. All said staircases shall be of width proportionate to the seating capacity as elsewhere herein prescribed. Where the seating capacity is for one thousand people, or less, two direct lines of staircases only shall be required, located on opposite sides of the galleries, and in both cases shall extend from the sidewalk level to the upper gallery, with outlets from each gallery to each of said staircases. At least two independent staircases, with direct exterior outlets, shall also be provided for the service of the stage and shall be located on the opposite sides of the same. All inside stairways leading to the upper galleries of the auditorium shall be inclosed on both sides with walls of fireproof materials. Stairs leading to the first or lower gallery may be left open on one side, in which case they shall be constructed as herein provided for similar stairs leading from the entrance hall to the main floor of the auditorium. But in no case shall stairs leading to any gallery be left open on both sides. When straight stairs return directly on themselves, a landing of the full width of both flights, without any steps, shall be provided. The outer line of landings shall be curved to a radius of not less than two feet, to avoid square angles. Stairs turning at an angle shall have a proper landing without winders introduced at said turn. In stairs, when two side flights connect with one main flight, no winders shall be introduced, and the width of the main flight shall be at least equal to the aggregate width of the side flights. All stairs shall have proper landings introduced at convenient distances. All inclosed staircases shall have, on both sides, strong hand-rails firmly secured to the wall about three inches distant therefrom and about three feet above the stairs, but said hand-rails shall not run on level platforms and landings where the same is more in length than the width of the stairs. All staircases eight feet and over in width shall be provided with a centre hand-rail of metal, not less than two inches in diameter, placed at a height of about three feet above the centre of the treads, and supported on wrought metal or brass standards of sufficient strength, placed not nearer than four feet nor more than six feet apart, and securely bolted to the treads or risers of stairs, or both, and at the head of each flight of stairs, on each landing, the post or standard shall be at least six feet in height, to which the rail shall be secured. Every steam boiler which may be required for heating or other purposes shall be located outside of the building, and the space allotted to the same shall be inclosed by walls of masonry on all sides, and the ceiling of such space shall be constructed of fireproof materials. All doorways in said walls shall have fireproof doors. No floor register for heating shall be permitted. No coil or radiator shall be placed in any aisle or passageway used as an exit, but all said coils and radiators shall be placed in recesses formed in the wall or partition to receive the same. All supply, return or exhaust pipes shall be properly incased and protected where passing through floors or near woodwork. Standpipes four inches in diameter shall be provided with hose attachments on every floor and gallery, as follows, namely: One on each side of the auditorium in each tier, also on each side of the stage in each tier, and at least one in the property room and one in the carpenter's shop, if the same be contiguous to the building. All such stand pipes shall be kept clear from obstruction. Said stand pipes shall be separate and distinct, receiving their supply of water direct from the power pump or pumps, and shall be fitted with the regulation couplings of the Fire Department, and shall

be kept constantly filled with water by means of an automatic power pump or pumps, of sufficient capacity to supply all the lines of hose when operated simultaneously, and said pump or pumps shall be supplied from the street main and be ready for immediate use at all times during a performance in said building. In addition to the requirements contained in this section, the standpipes shall also conform to the requirements contained in section 102 of this Code. A separate and distinct system of automatic sprinklers, with fusible plugs, approved by the Department of Buildings, supplied with water from a tank located on the roof over the stage and not connected in any manner with the standpipes, shall be placed each side of the proscenium opening and on the ceiling or roof over the stage at such intervals as will protect every square foot of stage surface when said sprinklers are in operation. Automatic sprinklers shall also be placed, wherever practicable, in the dressing rooms, under the stage and in the carpenter shop, paint rooms, store rooms and property room. A proper and sufficient quantity of two and one-half inch hose, not less than one hundred feet in length, fitted with the regulation couplings of the Fire Department and with nozzles attached thereto, and with hose spanners at each outlet, shall always be kept attached to each hose attachment as the Fire Commissioner may direct. There shall also be kept in readiness for immediate use on the stage, at least four casks full of water, and two buckets to each cask. Said casks and buckets shall be painted red. There shall also be provided hand pumps or other portable fire extinguishing apparatus and at least four axes and two twenty-five-foot hooks, two fifteen-foot hooks, and two ten-foot hooks on each tier or floor of the stage. Every portion of the building devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public, also all outlets leading to the streets and including the open courts and corridors, shall be well and properly lighted during every performance, and the same shall remain lighted until the entire audience has left the premises. All gas or electric lights in the halls, corridors, lobby or any other part of said buildings used by the audience, except the auditorium, must be controlled by a separate shut-off, located in the lobby, and controlled only in that particular place. Gas mains supplying the building shall have independent connections for the auditorium and the stage, and provision shall be made for shutting off the gas from the outside of the building. When interior gas lights are not lighted by electricity other suitable appliances, to be approved by the Department of Buildings, shall be provided. All suspended or bracket lights surrounded by glass in the auditorium, or in any part of the building devoted to the public, shall be provided with proper wire-netting underneath. No gas or electric light shall be inserted in the walls, woodwork, ceilings, or in any part of the building, unless protected by fireproof materials. All lights in passages and corridors in said buildings, and wherever deemed necessary by the Department of Buildings, shall be protected with proper wire network. The footlights, in addition to the wire network, shall be protected with a strong wire guard and chain, placed not less than two feet distant from said footlights, and the trough containing said footlights shall be formed of and surrounded by fireproof materials. All border lights shall be constructed according to the best known methods, and subject to the approval of the Department of Buildings, and shall be suspended for ten feet by wire rope. All ducts or shafts used for conducting heated air from the main chandelier, or from any other light or lights, shall be constructed of metal and made double, with an air space between. All stage lights shall have strong metal wire guards or screens, not less than ten inches in diameter, so constructed that any material in contact therewith shall be out of reach of the flames of said stage lights and must be soldered to the fixture in all cases. The standpipes, gaspipes, electric wires, hose, footlights, and all apparatus for the extinguishing of fire or guarding against the same, as in this section specified, shall be in charge and under control of the Fire Department, and the Commissioner of said Department is hereby directed to see that the arrangements in respect thereto are carried out and enforced. A diagram or plan of each tier, gallery or floor, showing distinctly the exits therefrom, each occupying a space not less than fifteen square inches, shall be printed in black lines in a legible manner on the programme of the performance. Every exit shall have over the same on the inside the word "Exit" painted in legible letters not less than eight inches high.

Section 2. The provisions of the foregoing section shall not be construed to mean or made to apply to any theatre, opera house or building intended to be used for theatrical or operatic purposes for which plans have heretofore, and on or before January 1, 1904, been approved by the Superintendent of Buildings.

Section 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 122.

By Alderman Malone—

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and providing for the location of a public market place and for the establishment and maintenance of a public market in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, for the acquisition of lands for this purpose, and for the regulation and maintenance of the same.

Whereas, The requirements of the inhabitants of the southerly and westerly portion of the Borough of Brooklyn, comprising an area equal to one-third of the entire Borough, demand the location of a public market in that vicinity, there being no market south of the Wallabout Market, distant about four miles from said localities; and

Whereas, The means of transportation by vehicles and cars, both trolley and steam, throughout said localities concentrate at or near the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry, in said borough; and

Whereas, The establishment of a public market in that vicinity would tend to greatly increase the assessed valuations of real estate throughout said localities, which are capable of sustaining a population at least four times greater than that now existing.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Provision is hereby made for the acquisition and establishment of a public market in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon the lands or lands under water hereinbelow described, which are hereby selected for a public market in said Borough of Brooklyn, and surveys and maps thereof are hereby directed to be made and filed as provided by law. Said lands or lands under water shall be acquired for said purposes by purchase or by condemnation proceedings as required by law; provided, however, that this matter be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no further proceedings be taken until the acquisition of said lands or lands under water is approved and authorized by a majority vote of all the members of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as required by law.

Sec. 2. The Corporation Counsel is directed and instructed to take the necessary steps to acquire title to said lands or lands under water and any and all rights and hereditaments in and to the same by condemnation proceedings to be conducted as required by law.

Sec. 3. The lands or lands under water so selected, whether purchased or acquired as above specified, shall be set apart for use as a market and dedicated to market purposes, and shall be used and occupied as such in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 4. The expense of the purchase and acquisition of said lands or lands under water and interests therein or any part thereof, and the amounts of the awards made in condemnation proceedings for the value of said lands or lands under water and interests therein, and the money for the payment thereof, together with the fees of the Commissioners of Estimate, compensation of such necessary clerks or assistants as they may employ, and all other necessary expenses in and about said condemnation proceedings, including the fees of counsel employed by the Corporation Counsel in the proceeding, and all other reasonable expenses incurred by said Corporation Counsel in the conduct of said proceeding, shall be paid through the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, and the Comptroller of said City is hereby authorized and directed, upon the requisition of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to issue such Corporate Stock of The City of New York from time to time to the amount of such requisition or requisitions, in the manner provided by law, and the amount so issued is hereby created a fund for the purposes aforesaid, but no bonds or other evidences of indebtedness shall be issued under the authority of this ordinance unless the proposition for creating such debt shall first be approved by a majority vote of the whole Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by law. The proceeds of such bonds shall be paid into the City Treasury and shall be used solely for the purposes aforesaid.

Sec. 5. The lands or lands under water hereinabove mentioned and referred to are described as follows: All that certain plot, piece or parcel of land or land under water situate, lying and being in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City of New York, State of New York, bounded and described as follows, to wit: Beginning at a point on the westerly line or side of Second avenue, 375 feet northerly from the centre line of Thirty-ninth street, as said street is laid down on the map of the Commissioners appointed by the Legislature of the State of New York to lay out streets, avenues and squares in The City of New York, running thence westerly on a line parallel with and distant 375 feet from said centre line of Thirty-ninth street and a line drawn in continuation thereof 994.52 feet; thence northerly 350.89 feet to a point 717 feet northerly from the continuation of the centre line of Thirty-ninth street; thence easterly, parallel with said centre line of Thirty-ninth street, 916.02 feet, to the westerly line or side of Second avenue; thence southerly along the westerly side of Second avenue 342 feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

On motion of the Comptroller, the minutes of the meetings of December 29 and 31, 1903, not yet approved, were approved, as printed in the "City Record."

###### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, building approaches and placing fences in East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Park avenue to the Southern Boulevard, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors, at meeting of December 31, 1903, with instructions to reduce the assessment by five per cent. from the gross amount thereof, were presented by the Comptroller, having been returned by said Board amended under date of January 25, 1904.

Mr. Robert L. Luce, of counsel for the New York and Harlem Railroad Company and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, was heard, and opposed the placing of any assessment upon the property of the railroad on the ground that it is not benefited by the work.

No others appearing in opposition, after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, from Morris avenue to Grand Boulevard and Concourse, and in Creston avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-first street to Field place, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of December 31, 1903, with instructions to reduce the assessment by ten per cent. from the gross amount thereof, was presented by the Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board amended under date of January 25, 1904.

Mr. J. C. O'Conor, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment upon the property of his client, for the reason that it is covered by the assessment for the sewer in Morris avenue, thereby being practically double taxation.

Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, appeared by representative, and asked that further relief be granted in the matter.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments the objections filed to the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Mohegan avenue, from East One Hundred and Eightieth street to East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, from Honeywell avenue to the Southern Boulevard, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of December 31, 1903, with instructions to reduce the assessment by ten per cent. from the gross amount thereof, were presented by the Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board amended, under date of January 25, 1904.

Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, appeared by representative, and objected to the sums charged against the property of his clients, on the ground that the assessment exceeds the benefit derived by it.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Comptroller the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

## BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading and paving a street, Austin place, 60 feet in width, from Richmond turnpike to Ward avenue, and objections of the Church of Our Lady of Good Counsel, Tompkinsville; C. J. Stelzner, by Hugo J. Stelzner, attorney; L. DeJonge & Co., by DeGroot, Rawson & Stafford, attorneys, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 18, 1904.

The Assessors reported that the assessment against the church property had been reduced \$1,074.60, being the cost of the cement masonry wall built in front of it.

Mr. Rawson, of Messrs. DeGroot, Rawson & Stafford, attorneys, was heard in opposition to the amount charged against the property of their clients on the ground that the benefit derived from the improvement is not exclusive to the property owners, and urged that the area of benefit be largely increased.

Mr. Stelzner, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment charged against the property represented by him, inasmuch as it had derived no advantage from the improvement, which was not intended to be merely local, but for the benefit of the people at large who attended the church and school, and claimed therefore that the area or district of benefit should be extended.

Father Murphy, rector of the church, appeared.

After consideration, on motion of the Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members voting in the affirmative.

## BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for paving with granite block pavement the carriageway of East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, from St. Ann's avenue to Prospect avenue, and objections, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, in behalf of Henry Boschen and others, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 10, 1904.

Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard by representative, and asked that some concession be made in the charge against Lot 56 in Block 2665, which is used exclusively for church purposes, and derives no benefit from the work.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

## BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Herren, attorney, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of February 25, 1904.

Mr. James N. Butterly, attorney, representative of Mr. Walter B. Hopping, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment on the ground that this sewer on the west side of the roadway was made necessary by reason of the rail tracks in the centre thereof, and that but for this fact one sewer would have been sufficient, and also that the railroad had not been assessed for the benefit derived by it from the sewer.

On motion of the Comptroller the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to consult with the Corporation Counsel in regard to the questions raised in the objections, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for repaving Cherry street for a distance of 150 feet in a westerly direction from the corner of Jefferson and Cherry streets

(which is a grant of land under water) with sheet asphalt on present foundation, and objections of Hecker-Jones Milling Company and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney; John M. Dempsey and estate of Robert C. Maxwell, deceased, filed by W. B. Marx, attorney, and opinion of the Corporation Counsel in said matter, dated December 31, 1903, received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 9, 1904.

Mr. Marx, attorney, appeared, and objected to the assessment charged against his clients' property for the reason that the pavement was not solicited or requested by them and that no benefit is derived therefrom by the property.


