That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, and the ground space cleaned, disinfected, cemented and so graded and repaired as to discharge all surface water and liquid matter into a water-tight cesspool by and through a properly-trapped, extra heavy iron drain; that the floors of the horse stalls be provided with a valley drain, properly trapped, and connected with the cesspool-connected drain.

That the use of said premises as a stable be discontinued, and that all cows be removed from the premises forthwith.

Whereas, The premises Garrison street, near Flushing avenue, Maspeth, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being, in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the keeping of cows thereat and the selling of milk without a permit from this Department be discontinued forthwith; that the walls and ceiling of the stable be cleaned and whitewashed; that the defective wooden floors of the cow stalls and stable and the saturated earth beneath same be removed, the site cleaned and disinfected, and that the floor of the stalls be made watertight and so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a watertight properly trapped cesspool connected by valley drain; that the manure box thereat be promptly repaired, made watertight and provided with a tight fitting cover; that a properly constructed milk house having no connection with stable or dwelling be provided thereat; said house to have a watertight floor, and that no milk be handled or stored except in the aforesaid house; that the feeding of garbage to the cows be discontinued forthwith; that the yard thereat be thoroughly cleaned of all offensive matter and disinfected.

Whereas, The premises, corner Liberty and Maure avenues, Dunton, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being, in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the keeping of cows and chickens thereat and the selling of milk without a permit from this Department be discontinued forthwith; that the walls and ceiling of the stable be cleaned and whitewashed; that the drainage from the stable be conveyed to a properly constructed, tight covered cesspool by and through an earthen or iron pipe; that all manure be removed from about the premises, and that hereafter manure be kept in a watertight covered box and removed therefrom weekly; that a properly constructed milk house having no connection with stable or dwelling be provided thereat; said house to have a watertight floor, and that no milk be handled or stored except in said house.

Whereas, The premises, Old Flushing road, near Grand street, Metropolitan, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the defective valley drains of the cow stable thereat be removed, the site cleaned and disinfected, and that watertight valley drains so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into the cesspools thereat by and through an iron or earthen pipe be substituted therefor; that a properly constructed milk house, having no connection with stable or dwelling, be provided thereat; said house to be dust proof, properly and sufficiently lighted and ventilated and have a watertight floor.

Mr. Everett moved that the motion offered by Mr. Barrett be amended by striking out the words "through the methods advocated by the Civil Service Commission," and substituting in lieu thereof, "by the direct-employment method as advocated by the Civil Service Commission."

The amendment was accepted by Mr. Barrett and the motion, as amended, was adopted.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Buildings in assigning to duty as Inspector of Repairs on September 11, 1905, James T. McNally, Richmond terrace, New Brighton, S. I., heretofore serving in the same capacity at the Normal College, at the rate of compensation of \$30 per week.

Mr. Adams presented the following report which was adopted by a unanimous vote: To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that, according to the weekly financial statement submitted by the Auditor on September 25, 1905, the balance at its disposal for the erection of buildings and the equipment thereof is \$1,641,209.76; that the estimated cost of the equipment of new buildings and of additions to old buildings now under contract amounts to \$1,489,252; and that the estimated cost of new buildings and additions to old buildings, plans and specifications for which are ready and proposals for the construction of which are about to be solicited, amounts to \$1,800,675, making a total of \$3,289,927, which should be provided as soon as possible in order that necessary work may be prosecuted.

Your committee further reports that on February 6, 1905 (see Journal, pages 223-227), the Board of Education adopted resolutions requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock during the year 1905 to the amount of \$12,737,751, for the erection, equipment and improvement of school buildings and the acquisition of sites therefor.

On February 11, 1905, said latter Board authorized the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,500,000, and on February 24, 1905, to the further amount of \$5,000,000, making a total of \$8,500,000, out of which, on the request of the Committee on Buildings, the Board of Education turned over to the Committee on Sites for its use on March 29, 1905, the sum of \$1,500,000, and on June 14, 1905, the further sum of \$500,000, or a total of \$2,000,000. This left at the disposal of the Committee on Buildings the sum of \$6,850,000, all of which has been expended with the exception of the above-mentioned balance, \$1,641,209.76.

As above stated, there will be needed the sum of \$3,289,927 for the equipment of new buildings and additions now under contract and for new buildings and additions, contracts for which are about to be let.

Furthermore, the Committee on Sites is prevented by lack of funds from selecting school sites which are very much needed, and it would seem necessary that a further sum of \$2,000,000 should be turned over to said committee so that its work may not be brought to a standstill.

These amounts form an aggregate which will be increased by contingent liabilities for the remainder of the year.

In view of the pressing need for school accommodations, your committee therefore recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock for so much as still remains unauthorized of the amount asked for on February 6, 1905, viz., \$4,237,751, and submits for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the immediate issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$4,237,751 for the erection, equipment and improvement of school buildings and the acquisition of sites therefor.

Report of a Special Committee.

Mr. Dix presented the following:

To the Board of Education:

The Special Committee on Bookkeeping Revision appointed on February 14, 1905, to examine and report upon the matter set forth in a communication addressed to the Board by the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, dated January 9, 1905 (see Journal, pages 103-105), respectfully reports as follows:

Immediately upon its appointment your Committee conferred with the representatives of the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, from which the suggestion leading to its appointment emanated. Your Committee has been in frequent consultation with said representatives and their expert advisers, who have been afforded every facility for the examination of the books, records and activities of the Department. From the investigations made it has clearly developed that the present method of collecting and recording data omits certain essential facts, and in the treatment of such facts as are recorded lacks classification, co-ordination, co-operation and unity.

We therefore recommend that this Committee, with such additional members as the Board may desire, be continued as a Commission in charge of this subject and be empowered to employ such expert assistance as may be necessary to make an exhaustive study of the details of the methods in use in the Department, and submit recommendations looking to their revision upon lines that will afford full, prompt and exact information on all points relative to the work of the Department and the results obtained therefrom.

Your Committee further recommends that it be empowered to expend a sum not to exceed \$15,000 during the current school year in prosecuting the work above referred to.

It is the mature conclusion of your Committee, in presenting these recommendations, that the best results will follow to all arms of the Department by the appointment of a registrar's division, to act as a clearing-house on all data arising from Department activities, said data being therein analyzed, digested, correlated and applied to the distinct purposes of a definite policy and flowing out to the various branches of administration and to the public.
