Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of October, November and December, 1903.

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

- I.—To make the topographical surveys.
- II.—To prepare the design for the street system, and to make the maps for adoption and filing.
- III.—To define on the ground by stones and bolts the lines of the adopted street system, and to protect the said monuments when improvements are being made in the streets.
- IV.—To prepare the design for the drainage and sewerage system and determine the grades of streets and sewers.
- V.—To make surveys, searches, technical descriptions and maps for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of acquiring title to avenues and streets.
- VI.—To keep in custody the records and maps of all matters pertaining to the above-mentioned five (5) items.
- VII.—To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

I.—To Make the Topographical Survey.

The general topographical survey of the Borough of The Bronx having been completed, topographical surveying is done in connection with street opening matters, setting monuments, establishing grades, which will especially be mentioned under the respective heads.

The plotting of the topographical survey of the territory east of the Bronx river, on a reduced scale of 150 feet to the inch, was progressed.

- II.—To Prepare the Design for the Street System, and to Make the Maps for Adoption and Filing.

A number of petitions were received by the Local Boards for amendments to the filed maps; on some of them action was taken, and maps were forwarded to the Chief Engineer of the Borough for consideration and adoption.

They were as follows:

1. Map or plan showing a modification of the lines and the grades of White Plains road, southerly of Boston road, and a proposed extension to Morris Park avenue, in accordance with the plan of the street system, easterly of the Bronx river, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903.
2. Map or plan showing the locating and laying out and the grades of West Farms road, from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad to Westchester creek, and of a public place near the junction of Westchester avenue.
3. Map or plan showing the change of grades of Tee Taw avenue, from East One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street to East One Hundred and Ninetieth street.
4. Plan and profile showing the change of grade in Tiebout avenue, between East One Hundred and Eightieth street and East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, and in East One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Webster avenue and Valentine avenue.
5. Map or plan showing the locating and laying out of Bronx Boulevard, from the Bronx and Pelham parkway to East Two Hundred and Forty-second street (Demilt avenue).
6. Map or plan showing the reduction of width of Exterior street, from East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street.
7. Map or plan showing the change of grades of avenues and streets affected by the change of line and the depression of tracks of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street and the East river.
8. Modified plan of drainage, showing location, sizes and grades in Sewerage District No. 33 XXX, Ryer avenue, from Burnside avenue to East One Hundred and Eighty-second street; East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, from Ryer avenue and Anthony avenue.

District East of the Bronx River.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 15, 1903, adopted a resolution deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out and amending the street system in that part of the Borough of The Bronx lying easterly of the Bronx river, and a hearing was held on May 29, 1903, at 10.30 A. M. On that date a resolution was passed to adopt the plans which had been presented by the President of the Borough of The Bronx and which were drawn in two sections on a scale of 300 feet to the inch. One map covers the area bounded by the Bronx river, Bronx Park, Bronx and Pelham parkway, Pelham Bay Park, Eastern Boulevard, Westchester creek and East river, and includes the widening of Fort Schuyler road, from Eastern Boulevard to Tremont avenue; the Town Dock road, from the Eastern Boulevard to Long Island Sound, and Tremont avenue, from the Eastern Boulevard to Fort Schuyler road; the second map covers the area bounded by the Bronx river, the northern boundary of the city, the Pelham Bay Park and the Bronx and Pelham parkway.

These maps, being drawn upon a comparatively small scale, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed an additional resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board, in suitable sections and drawn to a larger scale, three similar copies of the adopted general plan of the street system, for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible, in a general way, the nature and extent of the proposed changes and amendments, laying out and extending of streets, roads, avenues, squares or places.

The whole district east of the Bronx river was subdivided in thirty-five sections numbering from 29 to 64; the scale of the said section maps will be 150 feet to the inch; twelve of these sections, numbering 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 36, 38, 39, 41, 45 and 47, are forwarded in triplicate and all the other sections are in preparation. Five sections, namely, 29, 30, 31, 33 and 38 were actually filed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The area covered by the maps adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does not, however, embrace the whole district east of the Bronx river.

Computations of the block dimensions, studies and profiles for establishing grades of all the sections, which were forwarded for filing, are under way, but the progress is slow on account of the small force which could be assigned to this work.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, etc., which had been before the Local Boards and for which maps were forwarded for adoption or filing.

Office work in connection with the above laying out and amending has been done as follows:

Working up final street system in sections 29, 30, 31, 34, 38, 40, 43, 44, 47, 50, and amending sections 15 and 13.

Amending Bronx Boulevard, from the Bronx and Pelham parkway to Demilt street.

Amending Elliott avenue, from the Bronx and Pelham parkway to Morris street.

Amending White Plains road avenue, from the Bronx and Pelham parkway to Morris Park avenue.

Amending East Two Hundred and Thirty-third street, from Baychester avenue to Boston Post road and Hutchinson river.

Amending East Two Hundred and Forty-first street, from the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad to Bronx river (Harlem Division).

Plotting new fixtures and monument sheet divisions on prints of sections 29, 30, 33 and 38.

Making co-ordinate sheets of section 29.

Plotting miscellaneous working sheets.

During the quarter, work in office and field has progressed as usual.

Orders for regulating and grading completed have received more attention than heretofore with the gratifying result of many monuments being restored by accurate references which otherwise would have been dependent on restoration by traverses. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true. Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 450 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
