Brooklyn Bridge.

Surface car and elevated railway train service over the bridge was maintained free from long delays.

Routine repair work on roadways, planking, etc., continued without interruption and cable wire was renewed under eighteen truss supports in cables Brooklyn land span, and seven suspender bands on the river span. Seizings were renewed on several of the crossings of overfloor stays and suspenders, on cables A, B and C, New York land span; long clamps erected on long overfloor stays to stop slipping over the saddles, and work continued on extra cover plates on lower chords of river span trusses. Eleven weak truss chord splices were repaired and re-enforced and broken counter bar on river span, together with broken truss post on New York land span were replaced with new posts.

Uniform repainting of the superstructure was begun in September and the work is progressing rapidly.

Williamsburg Bridge.

During the past quarter, two contracts were let for construction work at Williamsburg Bridge; namely, "the strengthening of the end spans" and "furnishing and installing electric feeder cables."

The following is a detailed account of the progress on these contracts:

Strengthening end spans, Manhattan—The Incinerator plant and chimney on the site of pier under panel point No. 10 has been demolished and removed.

Roof-beams and trusses are stored at the rear of the anchorage, September 15, 1911, Arthur McMullin Company, sub-contractors started delivering plant to site. September 26, 1911, started excavation for northerly side of pier under panel point No. 10, and at present excavation is down to high water level.

Brooklyn—The dumping platform, partly on site of pier, has been removed to new location at foot of South 6th street. Work of excavating for foundation of pier under panel point No. 10 started August 9, 1911, and completed September 9, 1911.

Pile driving completed in southerly pier site and about fifty per cent. completed in northerly pier site.

September 28, 1911, started dredging bed of river for pneumatic caisson work under panel point No. 20.

Construction of the four cassions is now being carried on at Harrison, N. J. The first caisson was launched on September 24, 1911.

Furnishing and installing electrical feeder cables—Comptroller's certificate was attached to contract with Eugene Frank for this work on August 30, 1911.

All material, except the lead covered cable, has been ordered.

General repairs—Ke-driving rivets in yokes and stringers under Metropolitan tracks, completed from panel point No. 49, Manhattan main span, to panel point No. 29, Manhattan connecting span.

Erecting oil pans around roller bearings, Manhattan anchorage, completed.

Angles replaced at roadway expansion joints at panel points Nos. 30, 36 and 42, Manhattan approach.

The following painting was done during the quarter: Bottom chord, Manhattan end spans, north side completed; elevated columns at Manhattan anchorage completed; police booths completed; exterior and interior of Administration building cleaned and painted, with the exception of first floor, completed; top surfaces of main tower bracing girders, below roadway, completed on both towers; facing below roadways main towers painted; Manhattan Subway station, fifteen per cent. of columns were painted during the quarter.

Replaced 20½-pound channels in roadway under flooring with 25-pound channels, owing to former being too light.

All other general repairs and replacements were made as required.

Traffic—The collection of tolls on the roadways of this bridge was abandoned on July 19, 1911, at midnight.

Queensboro Bridge.

The contract for the construction of elevators, stairways and electrical work in connection therewith progressed to about eighty per cent. completed. The sides of the shafts were waterproofed and excavation for motor foundations practically finished. Electrification of conduit tracks and track extension practically completed. Twenty-three per cent. of this contract was completed during the last quarter.

The entire superstructure has received the first coat of paint on all metal above the roadway level, with the exception of railings and gratings, and the painting of the underflooring is being rapidly pushed to completion. All other maintenance requirements were met with during the quarter and studies have been pursued with the development of the property underneath this bridge in view.

Manhattan Bridge.

During the quarter the principal features of progress on construction of the Manhattan Bridge were as follows:

Completion of contract for the construction of the railings, stairways, etc., roadway and footwalk, pavements, track and electrical equipment.

Completion of erection of painting platforms and runways and awarding of the contract for the construction of the westerly subway and Bayard street retaining wall.

The following gives a detailed description of the work accomplished during the quarter:

Railings, roadways and electrical equipment—Completed the installation of bronze tablets on towers August 10, 1911.

Painting platforms and runways—The six platforms were erected during the quarter and machinery installed. Platforms were tested and found to work satisfactorily.

Fire protection system and compressed air line—Completed laying compressed air pipe along Prospect street, Brooklyn, from boiler house at Washington street to Pier D on Brooklyn approach. Drilling holes in steel work and masonry for pipe hangers.

Laying compressed air and water pipe along structure and fitting expansion joints and hangers. Approximately 97 per cent. of pipe has been delivered and about 85 per cent. installed.

Westerly subway and Bayard street retaining wall—Contract to Ryan-Parker Construction Company for this work was certified by Comptroller August 28, 1911.

September 8, 1911, contractor started delivering material and work is progressing satisfactorily.

September 11, 1911, closed westerly footwalk to traffic and started removing westerly stairway at Manhattan abutment.

September 13, 1911, closed Bayard street to vehicular traffic between Division and Chrystie streets.

Suspenders of river and land spans have been readjusted for tension and load.

Steel grating platforms and ladders have been erected at each tower and around rocker arms, and a portion of the tower legs equipped with wiring and lamps to facilitate inspection.

Municipal Building.

The preparation of plans and specifications for the elevators and interior finish was continued to substantial completion.

Study of the present space and equipment of each of the prospective tenants of the building was carried on and was about seventy-five per cent. completed. The basement of the building was placed in readiness for the subway construction contracted for through the Public Service Commission.

Bridges in the Borough of Queens.

Metropolitan Avenue Bridge—Modification of bulkhead line of Newtown Creek approved by Secretary of War July 11, 1911, closing to navigation the creek at the north house line of the avenue. Report of the cost of filling in avenue under the bridge completed.

All other bridges in this and other divisions maintained and operated without interruption during the quarter. Necessary repairs effected by Departmental labor.

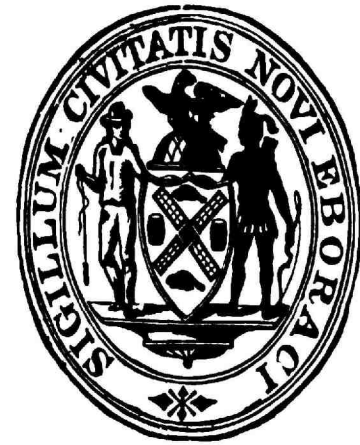

office of the County Clerk of New York County on the twenty-fourth day of July, 1911, and which are not shown outlined in red upon the map accompanying the said petition of October 11, 1911, a copy of which is attached hereto and forms a part of this contract.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to, and abide by and perform all of the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
