### Resolution to Authorize the Surrogates of New York County to Purchase Metal Furniture Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, pursuant to section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Aldermen hereby authorizes the Surrogates of New York County to incur an expenditure not in excess of \$1,700, without contract at public letting, for the purpose of rebuilding and reconstructing four steel cabinets from materials in their possession and available for the purpose, together with such new material as may be necessary.

### Resolution to Authorize the Commissioner of Docks to Make Repairs to Certain Municipal Ferryboats Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Docks be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to enter into contracts, without public letting, as follows:

A. Repairs to the Municipal Ferryboat "Manhattan," which shall provide for labor, material and expense necessary to complete the work of repairs called for in Contract No. 1533, dated December 12, 1916, upon which the contractor defaulted, estimated cost not to exceed \$2,000.

B. For all labor, material and expense necessary to repair the hull, tail shaft and install a propeller on the Municipal Ferryboat "Manhattan," estimated cost not to exceed \$6,000.

Also to make necessary repairs to the boilers, main engines, auxiliaries and condenser of the Municipal Ferryboat "Richmond," damaged by collision with the Steamship "City of Boston" on December 13, 1917.

The Corporation Counsel may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may by him be deemed necessary, but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller on the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Corporation Counsel, covering the expenditures of money paid thereon.

Third, that for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the Brooklyn branch office of the Law Department, the Corporation Counsel may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding four hundred fifty dollars. The Corporation Counsel may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may by him be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriations set apart for the purposes of the Law Department, but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller on the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers certified by the Corporation Counsel, covering the expenditures of money paid thereon.

#### Resolution Requesting the State Food Commission to Declare Ice, Whether Natural or Artificial, a Necessary Within the Meaning of the Law and Endorsing Bills Before the State Legislature Relating to the Subject of Ice.

Whereas, General conditions justify the municipal authorities of The City of New York in anticipating that unless sufficient precaution is taken there is likely to be a shortage of ice in the summer of 1918, and that ice is an absolutely necessary commodity for use in connection with the preservation of food, and is in itself an article of necessary human consumption; and

Whereas, In order to avail the City of the authority conferred by section 14, chapter 813, laws of 1917, enabling municipalities, with the consent of the State Food Commission, in case of an actual or anticipated emergency on account of a deprivation, by reason of excessive charges, or otherwise, to purchase food or fuel on municipal credit and provide storage for and sell the same to its inhabitants through such agencies as it may determine, and to exercise such authority with respect to ice in the event of aforesaid emergency becoming actual or imminent, the State Food Commission would have to promulgate an order, declaring ice to be one of the necessities as defined in section 3 of said law, and that, therefore, it would be wise to be prepared to act quickly should the occasion arise.

Resolved, That the State Food Commission be, and hereby is, requested, under and by virtue of the provisions of section 8, chapter 813, Laws of 1917, to declare ice, whether natural or artificial, a necessary, within the meaning of said law; and

Whereas, Natural ice, within the State of New York, serviceable for commercial purposes, is formed outside of the limits of the municipality in waters not subject to municipal control, and that plants and facilities necessary for the manufacture of artificial ice are not susceptible to municipal control within the time necessary for adequate action, and that both conditions, therefore, would render it non-feasible for the City to adequately provide for the obtaining and storage of ice in sufficient quantities to meet the vast demands of the municipality during the summer months, and that such necessary activity to conserve ice and to control and adjust sufficient distribution thereof, be more efficiently exercised within the power of the State, to avoid the threatened emergency.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York does hereby express its approval of Senate Bill No. 182, introduced by Senator Wagner, and the same Assembly Bill No. 203, introduced by Assemblyman Donohue, amending section 8, chapter 813, Laws of 1917, which requires the State Food Commission to investigate the storage and manufacture of ice to determine the adequacy of the probable supply to meet the public needs, and to acquire and store ice in such quantities as it may deem sufficient, and for that purpose, lease or purchase equipment, ice-houses, etc., and fix the price at which ice shall be sold, and enter



upon any public waters for the purpose of cutting ice, and respectfully urges its speedy enactment upon the Senate, Assembly and Governor of the State of New York.

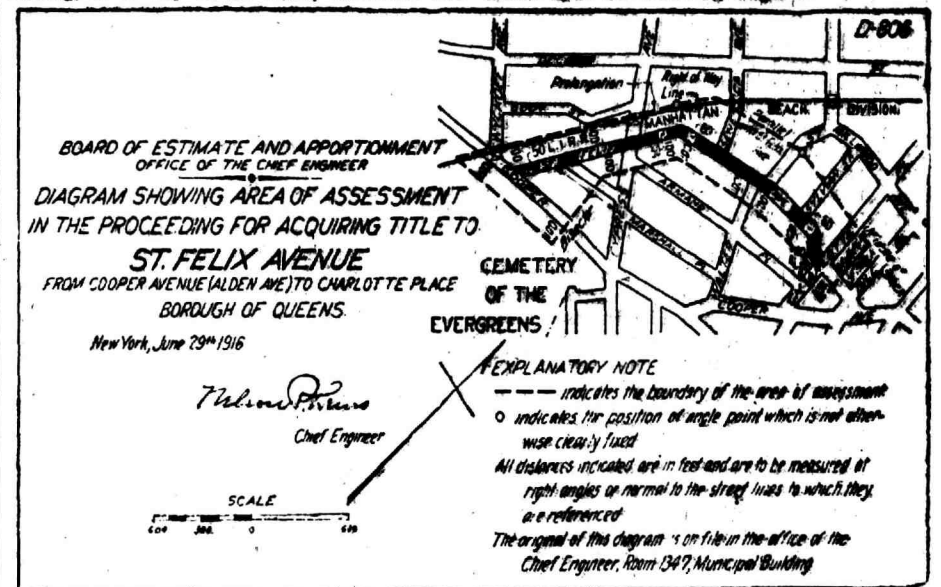

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York in shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
