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Earth Day Trout Release



eputy Commissioner Paul Rush and BWS Chief of Staff Jennifer Garigliano help students from the Studio School in Manhattan identify the organisms the juvenile brown trout they raised will eat after being released into the Cross River in Westchester County. Through the Trout in the Classroom program, more than 1,500 students from schools in New York City and the upstate watersheds raised the trout from eggs and will release them into

watershed streams over the next two months. While raising the trout in their classrooms, students learn that they are sensitive to changes in water quality and serve as an important indicator species. The students monitored water temperature, clarity, dissolved oxygen, ammonia, and PH while the trout are raised in tanks. They also learned about how trout play an important role in the water ecology of the streams that feed New York City's water supply.

Don't Drive Distracted!

Each day in the United States, more than nine people are killed and more than 1,060 people are injured in crashes that are reported to involve a distracted driver.

- In 2011, 3,331 people were killed in crashes involving a distracted driver.
- The number of accidents in 2011 involving a distracted driver—387,000.
- According to the Centers for Disease Control, 69 percent of surveyed U.S. drivers ages 18-64 said that they had talked on the cell phone while driving. Thirty-one percent of the same

surveyed drivers reported that they had sent text messages or emails while driving.

Talking and texting while driving is illegal in New York State; yet they still occur in many of our places of work. As April is "Distracted Driving Awareness Month," help one another to break the distracted driving habit. Employees in a vehicle with a distracted driver have the responsibility to speak up to encourage your co-workers to put down the cell-phones.

Commissioner's Corner



On April 22, 1970, more than 20 million Americans celebrated the first Earth Day. People from coast to coast took to the streets, parks, and auditoriums to rally for a healthy, sustainable environment. Earth Day is widely credited with helping to launch the modern environmental movement and made pollution control a political issue in the run-up to the 1972 Presidential election. With bi-partisan support, Congress passed the 1972 Clean Water Act, which included billions in grants for wastewater treatment plants and other controls. DEP has continued that legacy by investing more than \$20 billion over the past decade and more than \$14 billion in the next 10 years in drinking water and clean water programs. Yet at a time when we need support, there are few grants from the federal government, and the EPA is cutting drinking water and clean water revolving loan programs that help us borrow at low rates. Last week I participated in a National Infrastructure Summit in Washington, D.C. with utilities from other major cities to make the case for stronger federal support for investing in infrastructure

This is an issue that has wide-spread support. Today more than 1 billion people participate in Earth Day activities, making it the largest civic observance in the world, and DEP is celebrating with a number of events that align with our mission. Last Saturday, we hosted a Rain Barrel Giveaway and distributed hundreds of free rain barrels to single-family homeowners in Southeast Queens. DEP also hosted

two educational events for New York City school kids this week to help them connect with nature and appreciate the work that our employees do every day to keep our waterways clean. On Monday, Deputy Commissioner Paul Rush joined Trout Unlimited's Lilli Genovesi and 22 students from the Studio School in Manhattan to release nearly 50 juvenile brown trout into the Cross River in Westchester County. And earlier today, I joined Dana Gumb and Robert Brauman from BWSO, as well as Chris Bowser from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation in leading students from the Saint Clare School at the second annual count of juvenile eels at Staten Island's Richmond Creek Bluebelt.

Tomorrow, at noon, DEP will hold an official Earth Day celebration in the 3rd floor cafeteria at our Lefrak Headquarters. GrowNYC's Jon Klar will give a short presentation on the future of recycling in New York City and Deputy Commissioner Diana Jones-Ritter will present DEP's Recycling Committee with the first-ever DEP Earth Day Award. Finally, this Saturday DEP will host our sixth Hurricane Sandy Bluebelt Clean-up event in Midland Beach, Staten Island, and will also participate in the citywide MillionTrees planting at Alley Pond Park, Queens. James also enjoys opportunities to work in the field and educate New Yorkers about New York City's high quality drinking water. She has staffed events like World Water Day, Water-Onthe-Go, and last weekend volunteered at DEP's rain barrel giveaway event in Jamaica, Queens. In addition to her work in the press office, James also serves as BCIA's facilities coordinator.

James says the most challenging time of her career was in the aftermath of September 11, 2001. She, and other BCIA volunteers, worked in Manhattan staffing a call center to help people locate family members. "We would work all day here in Queens and then head straight downtown to help out," she recalls. "Days afterwards people were still looking for their family members. Hearing their stories was the hardest part."

"Jaunita is the glue that holds our office together," said DEP Press Secretary **Ted Timbers**. "She not only keeps us organized and on track, she's also got a great attitude and is a lot of fun to work with."

James moved to Brooklyn from Guyana in 1990. Today, she lives in Queens with her husband of 20 years and their son and daughter. In her spare time Juanita enjoys spending time with her family and is still close with relatives in Guyana. She also enjoys traveling and says one of her favorite places is Los Angeles, California.

Rain Barrel Giveaway



On Saturday Commissioner Strickland joined Councilman Leroy Comrie at DEP's 2013 Rain Barrel Giveaway event at Roy Wilkins Park in Jamaica. Queens. DEP distributed hundreds of free rain barrels to single-family homeowners in Southeast Queens. During the spring and summer months, watering lawns and gardens can account for up to 40 percent of an average household's water use. The 60-gallon rain barrels given away at the event will help conserve drinking water and save homeowners money by capturing rain water that can be used for gardening and lawn care. Rain barrels can also help mitigate street flooding and keep stormwater from entering the sewer system, reducing the volume of water carried to the wastewater treatment plants during storms and easing pressure on the system. At previous rain barrel giveaway events held between 2008 and 2011, DEP distributed more than 2,000 rain barrels. DEP selected homeowners in flood prone areas in Southeast Queens for this year's giveaway along with people who signed up for a wait list after the last rain barrel giveaway in 2011.
