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EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

A PROCLAMATION BY THE MAYOR.

Whereas, Authority is conferred by law upon the Mayor of the City of New York to direct that the next ensuing term of any court other than the Court of Appeals, appointed to be held in this City, shall be held in any building within the City of New York other than the building where the same is regularly to be held if, in his opinion, among other things, the want of suitable accommodation renders it necessary that some other place should be selected; and

Whereas, I am of the opinion that the want of suitable accommodation for the March Term of Part Three of the Court of General Sessions of the Peace in and for the City and County of New York, renders it necessary that some other place than that where the same is regularly to be held should be selected.

Now, therefore, I, Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby by this proclamation select and designate the room described and known as that wherein the Court of Common Pleas for the City and County of New York holds Part Two of the Trial Terms of said Court, in the building known as the County Court-house in the City Hall Park in said City, as the place wherein the ensuing March term of Part Three of said Court of General Sessions of the Peace in and for the City and County of New York shall be held.

Done at the Mayor's office, at the City Hall, in the City of New York, this 28th day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS—OFFICE OF THE ENGINEER-IN-CHIEF,
PIER "A," FOOT OF BATTERY PLACE,
NEW YORK, February 1, 1887.

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my supervision for the quarter ending 31st January, 1887.

PIER "A," NORTH RIVER.

Secretary's Order No. 6121.

A temporary wooden platform was laid at the entrance to the offices on the Pier.

Chambers Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 24th November, 1877, and 21st November, 1878.

Two temporary wooden drain-boxes were placed for surface drainage of new made land between Piers, new 20 and new 21, North river.

Laight Street Section—Resolutions of the Board, 30th July and 3d November, 1880.

Portions of the old timber-work of the old bulkhead platform were removed to make room for earth filling between Piers, new 27 and new 28, North river, and 1,894 loads of filling were received by tickets and deposited.

PIER, NEW 36, NORTH RIVER.

Secretary's Order No. 5952.

The area of the new made land formerly occupied by the rail track leading to the Pier was graded by the Department force after the removal of the track by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Co., and the paving-blocks originally laid in sand were relaid by G. F. Doak, under Treasurer's Order No. 12069, and the joints were filled with gravel and coal tar by the Department force.

NEW MADE LAND SOUTH OF PIER, NEW 42, NORTH RIVER.

Resolution of the Board, 20th October, 1886.

An area of about 758 square yards of temporary cobble-stone pavement in rear of and adjoining the bulkhead wall south of Pier, new 42, North river, was taken up by the Department force, and the cobble-stones were deposited in rear of the bulkhead wall at West Thirty-second street Section as stone filling. This area was graded by the force of the Department and was paved in sand with Belgian blocks by George F. Doak, under Treasurer's Order No. 12057.

PIER NEW 42, NORTH RIVER.

Secretary's Order No. 6043.

A silt-basin was put in the new paved land opposite Pier, new 42, North river, to carry surface water to the sewer. The silt-basin was furnished by the Jordan L. Mott Iron Works, under Treasurer's Order No. 12111, and was put in place and connected with the sewer by Thomas C. Townsend, under Treasurer's Order No. 12112.

PIER, NEW 43, NORTH RIVER.

Secretary's Order No. 6042.

A silt-basin was put in the new paved land opposite Pier, new 43, North river, to carry surface water to the sewer. The silt-basin was furnished by the Jordan L. Mott Iron Works, under Treasurer's Order No. 12111, and was put in place and connected with the sewer by Thomas C. Townsend, under Treasurer's Order No. 12112.

CHRISTOPHER STREET FERRY, NORTH RIVER.

Secretary's Orders No. 5861 and No. 6089.

Five waiting places on platforms were built and placed on the new paved land opposite the entrance to the Christopher Street Ferry.

West Twenty-third Street Section—South End—Resolution of the Board, 5th November, 1880.

BULKHEAD BETWEEN PIERS, NEW 54 AND NEW 55, NORTH RIVER.

The earth filling in rear of the wall was leveled off and drained.

PIER, NEW 55, NORTH RIVER.

The plank approach to the pier was repaired and resheathed with four-inch plank.

PIER, NEW 56, NORTH RIVER.

The plank approach to the pier was repaired.

WEST TWENTY-SEVENTH STREET OFFICE.

The section office was removed from Pier, new 57, North river, to Pier, new 60, North river.

West Twenty-third Street Section—North End—Resolution of the Board, 28th June, 1882.

A temporary wooden sewer-box, about 440 feet in length, to connect the end of the brick sewer at the old crib-bulkhead at the foot of West Thirtieth street, with the sewer opening through the bulkhead-wall was begun and nearly finished.

West Thirty-second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, 22d October, 1885.

BULKHEAD WALL.

Dredging—14,526 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from the site of the bulkhead-wall by the Union Dredging Company, under Treasurer's Orders Nos. 12,009 and 12,077.

Stone Filling—1,823 cubic yards of small cobble-stones and 2,075 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were delivered and placed in the wall by Brown & Fleming, and 702 cubic yards of small cobble-stones were delivered and deposited on the new filled land by Brown & Fleming for use during the close of navigation.

Piling and Woodwork—129 vertical piles and 17 bracing piles were driven in the wall, and work was begun on binding frames.

Spruce timber for this section was received from Bell Brothers, under Treasurer's Order No. 12031.

GENERAL CHARGES TO SECTION.

Removing Old Work—About 140 lineal feet of the outer end of the old pier between West Thirty-second street and West Thirty-third street, North river, were removed to make room for the extension northerly of the bulkhead-wall.

Mooring Piles—Seven piles were driven for moorings for floating property engaged at the section, and one pile was driven to protect the work from the ice.

New Pier and Approach at West Fortieth Street, North River—Contract No. 231.

Richard Cronin, contractor, removed the old pier at the foot of West Fortieth street, North river, and began the work of building a new pier and approach at the foot of said street under his contract therefor. Begun 17th November, 1886.

The Department dredged the site of the pier after the old pier was removed.

Proposed New Bulkhead between West Seventy-seventh and West Seventy-eighth Streets, North River—Secretary's Order No. 6075.

Test piles were driven to ascertain the nature of the river bottom.

Bulkhead between West Seventy-eighth and West Eightieth Streets, North River—Secretary's Order No. 5920.

The surface of the newly filled land was cleared of rubbish and leveled.

Pier, new 32, East River—Resolution of the Board, 1st December, 1886.

About 40 feet in length of the outer end of Pier, old 41, was removed and temporary repairs were made thereto, and the outer crib was dredged up preparatory to building Pier, new 32, on the site thereof.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Blacksmiths made and repaired iron work for different sections and for floating property. 500 barrels of Portland cement were received and stored for Department use. Two samples of cement were tested for private parties by order of the Board.

Platform for Docking Scows—Resolution of the Board, 21st November, 1883.

A temporary platform, about 85 feet long and 45 feet wide, for docking scows was built on the southerly side of the pier at its inner end.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

The yard has been maintained and the property there has been taken care of. New anchorage blocks for the derrick guys were put in place.

Floating Property.

The 100-ton derrick "City of New York."—The crew and force of floating property cut out old girders and are putting in new girders under deck, repaired steam-pipes, suction pipes in tanks, engines and machinery, pumped out bilges, put glass in windows, painted sides, packed valves, cleaned tubes in boiler, boiler, engines and machinery.

December 17, 18, 20, 1886.—Diver examined bottom of scow and reports that it is in good condition, with the exception of being very dirty, also reports iron-castings on corners all right.

November 11, 1886.—Police Department inspected boiler.

January 29.—Shifted 2 ballast-blocks from deck to pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river.

10-ton derrick.—The force of floating property repaired house, cleaned machinery, caulked deck and overhauled blocks.

Dredge No. 4.—Was towed from Ferry slip at East Ninety-ninth street, East river to One Hundred and First street, East river, on November 8, 1886, and on November 9, 1886, to Twenty-ninth street, North river, and returned to the Union Dredging Co.

Dredges Nos. 3 and 4, remain in the possession of the Union Dredging Company.

Tug "Manhattan."—Has done all the towing required by the Department.

Laid up to clean boiler on November 3, and December 14, 1886, and January 8, 1887.

The force of floating property caulked sides, put iron on flag-staffs, repaired steam-pipes, engines and machinery, covered smoke-stack with paraffine varnish, put in glass, made fenders, and mould for ice-cutter, fitted and put on new wrought-iron ice-cutter furnished by John W. Sullivan, under Treasurer's Order No. 12100. Samuel A. Suydam, under Treasurer's Order No. 12127, furnished one No. 6 game range for galley.

Thomas C. Dunham, under Treasurer's Order No. 12051, furnished 5 gallons of paraffine varnish and can.

Pile Driver No. 1.—No work required.

Pile Driver No. 2.—The force of floating property repaired ways and machinery. John W. Sullivan, under Treasurer's Order No. 12016, furnished one new upright boiler, and, under Treasurer's Order 12099, furnished patterns and drum frame castings.

Pile Driver No. 3.—Is on the deck of West Fifty-seventh street Pier. The force of floating property laid new deck plank, calked bottom, deck, etc., painted sides and ends, put on and fastened wearing pieces, corner bands, cleats, hatch combings, iron-work on bits, etc., repaired door and made hatch covers.

Pile Driver No. 5.—(Fitted up as pile cutter.) The force of floating property fastened bottom of water tank, fitted hatches and cleaned machinery.

Pile Driver No. 6.—Has been in commission from time to time on work of general repairs. The force of floating property made and painted hatch covers and repaired oil cups, machinery, etc.

Pile Driver No. 7.—Has been in commission from time to time on work of general repairs. The force of floating property cleaned boiler, machinery and repaired ways and machinery.

Pile Driver No. 8.—The force of floating property cleaned machinery and fastened bottom of water tank.

Pile Driver No. 9.—The force of floating property repaired ways, deck, engine, machinery, etc., and at work on steam fittings for new boiler. John W. Sullivan, under Treasurer's Order No. 12016 furnished one new upright boiler. McNab & Harlin Manufacturing Co., under Treasurer's Order No. 12122, furnished one No. 6 Utica Steam Gauge.

Pile Driver No. 10.—Is in commission at West Thirty-second Street Section. The force of floating property repaired ways, drum friction, machinery, etc., cleaned boiler, water tanks, etc., and made board for holding steam gauge.

Pile Driver No. 11.—The force of floating property repaired ways and machinery, etc.

Deck Scow "B."—Is at West Fifty-seventh street Yard in good order.

Deck Scow "C."—Is at West Fifty-seventh street Yard in good order.

Deck Scow "D."—Is at West Fifty-seventh street Yard in good order. The force of floating property are caulking its deck.

Deck Scow "E."—Is at West Fifty-seventh street Yard in good order.

Deck Scow "F."—(Used and fitted up for carrying coal.) Is in good order.

Deck Scow "Jim."—Is at West Fifty-seventh street Yard loaded with piles and timber for use of General Repairs.

Deck Scow "Joe."—Is at West Fifty-seventh street Yard, sunk and worthless.

Deck Scow "May."—Is at West Fifty-seventh street Yard, and not worth repairing.

Deck Scow "Willie."—Is at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. Has been in use from time to time.

Divers Scow "G."—Is at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard. The force of floating property made and put on new hatch combings, repaired doors, shutters, sash, windows, house, etc., put in glass and painted roof and inside of house, also outside.

Small Divers' Scow.—Is at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard in good order.

Boring Machine "Woodcock."—Is at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and is in good order.

Small Boats.—The new 15-foot yawl boat No. 17, which was begun last quarter, has been finished. Constructed and painted one new 15-foot yawl boat No. 18. Got keel out for a 15-foot yawl boat, to be known as No. 19. Repaired and painted yawls, skiffs, etc.

Pier "A," North River.

Boiler-room.—Fitted up second boiler and steam-fittings, put up sheet-iron partition for boiler-room, cemented floor, made, put up and painted closet, steam-gauge board and coal box, and fitted up and painted. Police Department inspected new boiler on the 18th of December, 1886, and boiler No. 1 on the 21st of December, 1886. Patterson Bros., under Treasurer's Orders Nos. 12032 and 12095, furnished 38 sheets B. B. galvanized-iron for boiler-room partition. McNab & Harlin Manufacturing Co., under Treasurer's Order No. 12122, furnished one brass marine clock, and under Treasurer's Order No. 12070, furnished steam fittings for new boiler.

Offices, etc.—Various repairs were made to the office building on the pier.

West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

The Police Department inspected the boiler in the pipe shop on the 18th of December, 1886.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

The boiler, derrick and machinery in the yard were overhauled.

Various other small pieces of work have been done on account of floating property, machinery of the Department, office fittings, automatic tide gauges, etc.

Surveying Party.

The Surveying Party has given all the lines and levels required for the various work of the Department.

Fifteen surveys have been made on the North river water-front, six on that of the East river, and five on the Harlem river, eight of which on the North river, one on the East river, and five on the Harlem river, were in connection with the supervision of work done by private parties under permit from the Board, and plots of the same have been made for the records of the Department, and the necessary lines have been determined and given for work under permit.

In addition to the above a new continuous survey of the North river water-front, from the Battery to Barclay street, has been carried on.

18,644 disk soundings have been taken by the Surveying and Sounding Parties in 127 slips, and 289 rod soundings in 5 slips; of which 5,263 disk soundings in 27 slips and 74 rod soundings in 2 slips were on the North river, and 13,381 disk soundings in 100 slips, and 215 rod soundings in 3 slips, were on the East and Harlem rivers.

The greater part of these soundings have been recorded, and the remainder are nearly ready for record.

The automatic tide gauges have been attended to.

Bulkhead south of Pier, new 1, Secretary's Order No. 6096.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
