

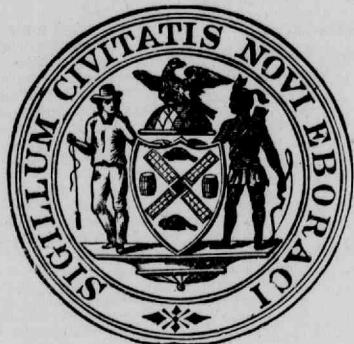

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held November 20th, 1878.

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller called attention to the matter of the removal of the stands in the streets adjacent to the markets, by the Superintendent of Incumbrances, and referred to the necessity of the question being judicially determined without delay; whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That Elliott Sandford be employed as Counsel to represent the interests of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in the public markets, and to protect the revenues thereof, as affected by the action of the Commissioner of Public Works and the Superintendent of Incumbrances.

The bill of D. M. Seaman, for appraisement of premises No. 49 Leonard street and Nos. 9 and 11 Franklin street, amounting to \$50 was received, and, on motion, ordered paid.

Order of Court in the case of Samuel N. Haight against Simon P. Kase, in Marine Court, discontinuing said action without costs to either party, was received and referred to the Comptroller.

No alteration whatsoever shall be made of the records of births, marriages, or deaths which occurred previous or subsequent to May 11, 1873, except to correct clerical errors.

Resolved, That under the provisions of section 15 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1867, the Board of Health approves of the following plan, which has been duly submitted, for light and ventilation in the premises No. 605 East Fifteenth street, in the building, 25x60 feet, and extension on first story, 43 feet deep and 5 stories in height, viz.: Bay-windows in each room, extension with windows and large ventilating skylight, 6 feet by 12 feet, and a sketch of the alterations in the original plan of said building, as approved by the Board, be filed in this Department.
