BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

Monday, 2 p. m., May 26, 1902.

A meeting of the Board of City Record was held this day.

Present—Hons. Seth Low, Mayor, George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, and Edward M. Grout, Comptroller.

The minutes of the meeting of May 19 were approved as submitted.

The Supervisor brought to the attention of the Board bids which he had opened on Requisitions Nos. 4833 and 4839 for index cards for the Tenement House Department. Bids had been submitted by The Fred Macey Company, of Chicago and Grand Rapids, who maintain a New York office; by the Library Bureau, of Boston, who maintain a New York office, as well as by the United States Card Index Company, Messrs. Clarke & Baker, Clarence S. Nathan and The J. W. Pratt Company. The J. W. Pratt Company had protested against the award being made to The Fred Macey Company, who were the lowest bidders, on the ground that they were a foreign corporation.

In connection with the matter the following letter was submitted from the J. W. Pratt Company:

New York, May 26, 1902.

To the Honorable Seth Low, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller, and George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel:

Gentlemen—This company has made a bid to supply cards for the Tenement House Department through the City Record office.

Our bid is the lowest from any bidder in the State or City of New York.

It is our intention to do the work in conformity with the Labor (or eight hour) Law, and in the City of New York.

We employ only the best workmen, and pay the prevailing scale of wages in this locality, which are higher than in any other city.

In view of these conditions, we feel that your Board should award us this contract, for the reason that we are the lowest bidders in the city.

The late William L. Strong, as Chairman of the Board of City Record, established such a precedent in awarding a printing contract to a New York City firm in preference to a bidder from Albany, N. Y.

We are regular bidders for the City supplies, and we are in touch with the departments daily, and are familiar with their special needs.

Whereas, The Fred Macey Company has been invited to bid for the Tenement House cards and are the lowest bidders; therefore

Resolved, That the contract for Tenement House cards be awarded to them; but

Resolved, That hereafter printing for the City, as far as practicable, shall be done in The City of New York, and that a condition to this effect shall be inserted in the request for bids.

The resolution was unanimously carried.

A letter from the Corporation Counsel, concerning advertising street opening proceedings in the *North Side News*, was laid on the table.

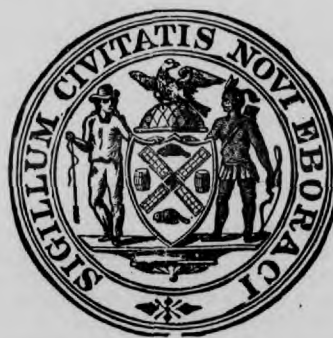

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contractor, party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
