George L. Rives and Albert B. Boardman, Counsel; George S. Rice, Chief Engineer, and Alfred Craven, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

The minutes of the meeting of the 22d of June were read and it was moved that they be approved.

Whereas, Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, the contractor, has made requisition on this Board, dated June 19, 1907, and numbered Requisition No. 20, Four-Track and Connections, Extra Work, for extra work done and materials furnished under contracts dated July 21, 1902, and June 9, 1905, for the construction and operation of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, additional work in four-tracking in Fulton street, Flatbush avenue, etc., in the Borough of Brooklyn, to the 31st day of May, 1907, and amounting to the sum of thirty-five thousand five hundred and ninety-nine dollars and twenty cents (\$35,599.20); and

Whereas, George S. Rice, Chief Engineer, has certified that such extra work done and materials furnished has been done and furnished in accordance with the terms of the said contracts; that such value has been ascertained relatively to the contract value of the whole work, and that no certificate has previously been made for such work and materials;

Resolved, That this Board hereby approves the said requisition and directs that a voucher be drawn in due form on the Comptroller for the said amount.

Mr. Rives presented drafts of contracts 1, 2, 4, 5 and 6 for the Fourth avenue and Coney Island route, with a memorandum as follows, and the Chief Engineer submitted plans for this work and for other work on the same route:

I.

Manhattan Bridge No. 1.

This contract is for the part extending along the Flatbush avenue extension from the northerly line of Nassau street (Brooklyn) where the Bridge plaza ends, to the centre line of Willoughby street. The estimated cost of this subsection is about \$1,500,000. It is proposed to have a bond for \$150,000 and a deposit from bidders of \$12,500. It is proposed to allow the bidders twenty months in which to complete the work. Pipe galleries are shown on the plans and separate bids are to be submitted for constructing them which the Board may or may not accept. There is to be a station between Tillary and Johnson streets. The station specifications in this and all other contracts now submitted are considerably amplified, as the Engineers think it will reduce the cost if the contractors have more details to govern them. On the Flatbush avenue extension the contractor is to be permitted to prosecute his work with open trench excavation, but must finish this work within fifteen months. The street surface at all cross streets is to be kept substantially boarded over at all times. A change has also been made in the clause by which the contractor is to assume all risk of injury to persons or property. This change consists in the first place in an addition to the phraseology, by which it is made entirely clear that only direct damages are to be paid for injury to property, and that loss of rent or business, etc., is not to be paid for. In the second place, another clause has been inserted providing that, before beginning work, the Engineer of the Board, upon notice to the contractor and property owners, shall make an inspection of each piece of property along the route so as to guard against any imposition by property owners upon the contractor or vice versa. Otherwise, the specifications in contract 9-O-4 for the Delancey street extension will generally cover all the contracts, although there will have to be slight changes made in each separate contract to conform with special local conditions.

II.

Contract 9-C-1, From the Centre Line of Willoughby Street to a Point Near the Corner of Fulton Street and Ashland Place.

The estimated cost of this subsection, which involves very complicated construction, is about \$2,000,000. It is proposed to require a bond for \$200,000 and a deposit by bidders of \$15,000. The time allowed for completion is twenty-four months. The provisions for pipe galleries are to be the same as in the contract above mentioned. There is to be a station in Flatbush avenue extension at DeKalb avenue. This station being situated at a considerable depth, it is proposed to install moving stairways. The general form of the contract is to be the same as the one above mentioned except in respect to excavation. In the present contract open excavation is permitted on the Flatbush avenue extension but along Fulton street and Ashland place and at all street crossings the surface is to be kept substantially boarded over.

The reason for the complications in this contract is that provision must be made for future connections, first, to a line running westerly under Willoughby street; second, to a four-track line running easterly along Fulton street, and third, to a line connecting with the road now being constructed on Fulton street and Flatbush avenue. These connections or extensions will not be made now but it is necessary to provide for the possibility of making them in future.

III.

The next contract in order would be one for a railroad extending from a point near the corner of Fulton street and Ashland place to Fourth avenue and Sackett street.

In building this piece of road it would, however, be necessary to build a new sewer on Hanson place and Fourth avenue; but it appears that the Borough of Brooklyn has already let a contract for a new sewer which will do away with the present one. It will be fifteen months at least before this sewer will be ready, and until it is no contract for a road through Ashland place and Fourth avenue to Sackett street can be let, as the present sewer cannot be removed until the new one is built.

IV.

Contract 11-A-2, on Fourth Avenue, From Sackett Street to Tenth Street.

The estimated cost of this subsection is about \$1,500,000. It is proposed to require a bond for \$150,000 and a deposit from bidders of \$12,500. The contractor is to be allowed twenty-four months to complete. There is a provision for pipe galleries similar to that in the contracts above described. Upon this subsection there are to be two stations, the first between Union and President streets, and the second between Eighth and Ninth streets. The specifications for the stations are to be the same as above mentioned. In regard to excavation it is provided that except within the park areas the streets are to be kept substantially boarded over; but within the park areas the contractor may prosecute his work in open trench excavation. New trees are to be supplied by the contractor such as the Commissioner of Parks may require, and in such position as he shall indicate, and the whole placing or planting of trees and grass plots is to be governed by the requirements of the Park Commissioner. The clause by which the contractor guarantees abutting property owners and others against damages is omitted, inasmuch as Fourth avenue being wide and the work simple, there is no necessity for this clause. The contractor, however, remains liable in case of any negligence on the part of himself or his subcontractors.

V.

Contract 11-A-3, on Fourth Avenue, From Tenth to Twenty-seventh Street.

The estimated cost of this subsection is about \$1,500,000. It is proposed to require a bond for \$150,000, and a deposit from bidders of \$12,500. The contractor is to be allowed twenty-four months to complete. Upon this subsection there are to be two stations, the first between Prospect and Seventeenth streets, and the second between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets. In other respects the contract is the same as 11-A-2 above, except that more latitude is allowed as to the width of open trench excavation.

VI.

Contract 11-A-4, From Twenty-seventh Street to Forty-first Street.

The estimated cost of this subsection is about \$1,500,000. It is proposed to require a bond for \$150,000, and a deposit from bidders of \$12,500. The contractor is to be allowed twenty-four months to complete. In this subsection there is to be a station at Thirty-sixth street. There are to be tracks branching to the east between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, so as to provide for a connection with the Bensonhurst, Bath Beach and Coney Island route. In other respects, this contract is similar in form to contract 11-A-3, above referred to.

The following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That this Board hereby approves the contracts and plans now submitted, including changes in location of stations and minor changes in specifications, and directs that a hearing as to the form of said contracts be held on the last Thursday in July next.

GENTLEMEN—For the greater safety and comfort of passengers using the tunnels of this company, it is highly desirable that means for ventilating the same should be maintained at or near the point where they emerge from beneath the bed of the Hudson river, at the foot of Morton street. For this purpose our engineers have prepared plans for a small tower for ventilation, the same to be located over the shaft now operated by us on the marginal street south of Morton street. Upon completion of the work of constructing the tunnels, this shaft will be closed up, with the exception of this ventilating tower.

We submit herewith plan entitled "New York and Jersey Railroad. Morton Street Shaft. Plan Showing Proposed Location of Ventilating Tower," dated November 2, 1906, Serial No. 2459-A. We respectfully request your approval of this plan.

The following resolution was moved:

Whereas, This Board did, on the 14th day of January, 1897, and 4th day of February, 1897, adopt certain routes and general plan for a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, a copy of which is hereto annexed entitled "Copy Routes and General Plan;" and

Whereas, The said routes and general plan were afterward duly approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York, and were duly consented to by commissioners appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, which consent was duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division, in lieu of the consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along said routes; and

Whereas, Thereafter, and on or about the 21st day of February, 1900, The City of New York did by this Board enter into a certain contract with John B. McDonald for the construction and operation of said rapid transit railroad; and

Whereas, By written instrument bearing date the 10th day of July, 1902, the said John B. McDonald, with the written consent of this Board, concurred in by six members thereof, duly assigned the right or obligation to maintain and operate the said rapid transit railroad for the term of years specified in the said contract and all rights included in the leasing provisions of the said contract, together with the obligation to provide equipment for the said railroad, unto Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which company also guaranteed the performance by the said John B. McDonald as such contractor, of the provisions of his said contract not so assigned to it; and

Whereas, It is the interest of The City of New York, and, in the opinion of the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company, it is likewise in its interest as such lessee, and it desires that said routes and general plan shall be changed in the respect hereinafter mentioned, but without other change in the said routes and general plan; now therefore it is

Resolved, That, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in these resolutions hereinafter mentioned, the said routes and general plan heretofore adopted by this Board be and they hereby are modified by adding to the said routes the following, to wit:

"And also an additional track extending along the easterly side of Broadway from a point near the centre line of Ninety-sixth street to a point about seventy-five (75) feet north of the northerly line of One Hundred and Second street. The said easterly additional track is more particularly described as follows:

"A track the centre line of which shall begin at or near a point where the centre line of Ninety-sixth street intersects the centre line of the easterly track as originally constructed upon this route; thence diverging from the said easterly track originally constructed and running northeasterly and northerly and generally parallel with the easterly line of Broadway, and distant therefrom not less than twenty-four (24) feet nine (9) inches, and so continuing to a point near the southerly line of One Hundred and Second street; and thence curving northwesterly and again uniting with the said easterly track of the railroad as originally constructed upon this route at a point about seventy-five (75) feet north of the northerly line of One Hundred and Second street.

"Also two additional tracks extending along the westerly side of Broadway from a point near the centre line of Ninety-sixth street northerly to a point near the centre line of One Hundred and First street. The said two tracks are more particularly described as follows:

"First—A track the centre line of which shall begin at or near the point where the centre line of Ninety-sixth street intersects the centre line of the westerly track as originally constructed upon this route; thence diverging from the said westerly track originally constructed and running northwesterly and northerly generally parallel with the westerly line of Broadway, and distant therefrom not less than twenty-four (24) feet and nine (9) inches, to a point about fifty (50) feet south of the southerly line of One Hundredth street; and thence curving northeasterly, and again uniting with the said westerly track as originally constructed upon this route, at a point near the intersection of the centre line of the said westerly track with the centre line of One Hundred and First street.

"Second—A track the centre line of which shall diverge from the centre line of the additional track last above described at a point about twenty (20) feet south of the northerly line of Ninety-sixth street; and thence running northerly and parallel, or nearly so, with the westerly line of Broadway, and distant about forty (40) feet therefrom, to a point about fifty (50) feet north of the northerly line of One Hundredth street; and thence curving northeasterly and continuing to a point near the intersection of the centre line of One Hundred and First street with the centre line of the lower westerly track originally constructed upon this route, and known as the southbound Lenox avenue track.

"And also spurs or connections to unite the said three additional tracks, or any one or more of them, with any of the other tracks constructed upon this route.

"The additional tracks, spurs and connections herein provided for, above described, shall be built (except where the same curve to unite with or diverge from any of the four tracks first constructed upon this route) between the walls of the railroad or subway, and the easterly and westerly sides of Broadway, respectively.

"The additional track on the easterly side shall descend from a point at or near the centre line of Ninety-seventh street at a grade of about 1 per cent, to a point about forty (40) feet north of the centre line of Ninety-ninth street, and then level to a point which is about thirty-five (35) feet below the surface of Broadway and near the southerly line of One Hundredth street, at which point a spur or connection shall diverge to connect with other tracks. Said easterly additional track as above described shall from said lowest point ascend to about the centre line of One Hundred and Second street, and shall continue thence on the same grade as the easterly line originally constructed upon this route, which is known as the northbound Broadway track.

"The first of the two additional westerly tracks shall be constructed upon the same grade as the westerly track first constructed upon this route, which is known as the southbound Broadway track.

"The second of the said two additional westerly tracks shall continue on the same grade as the first of the said additional westerly tracks from the point of beginning, as above described, to a point near the intersection of the centre line of Ninety-eighth street; from thence it shall descend to a point about the northerly line of One Hundredth street, at which it will be on the same grade as the two centre tracks first constructed upon this route, known as the Lenox avenue tracks; and from thence it shall continue on the same grades as the said two Lenox avenue tracks."

In all other respects the provisions of the said general plan of construction adopted January 14 and February 4, 1897, as heretofore amended, shall be applicable to the portion of the route hereinabove mentioned; and it is further

Resolved, That, whereas this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigation necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modification aforesaid of the said routes and general plan are necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York, and should be established as herein provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said routes and general plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned; and it is further

Resolved, That the said modifications of the routes and general plans shall take effect only upon and after the following consents and approvals thereto shall be duly had, to wit:

1. The consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York as the local authority having control of the streets above mentioned.

2. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.
3. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along that portion of Broadway in the Borough of Manhattan which is included in the portion of the routes added as aforesaid; or, if such consents cannot be obtained, then, in lieu thereof, the determination of three commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

4. The consent of the said John B. The Secretary reported that a communication had been transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as follows:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Long Island Railroad Company is a railroad corporation owning a trunk line railroad now constructed which is partly within the limits of The City of New York, with a terminus within the city limits, and is engaged in interstate commerce in connection with other trunk line railroads, and is operated and used as part of an interstate trunk line.

In connection with the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, which is now engaged in completing the tunnels under the East river, the Long Island Railroad Company intends to make extensive additions, betterments and facilities for the better management, maintenance and operation of their railroads, and as a part of its general scheme of improvement it has applied to this Board to fix and determine a route or routes by which it may more directly connect certain points of its existing lines, and improve, establish, construct, extend and connect its lines within this city.

This application was made pursuant to chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, and the various acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto. The connections for which a franchise is desired are known respectively as the Montauk cut-off and the Glendale cut-off. Each of these routes lies wholly within private property, acquired, or to be acquired, by the railroad company, except where the same crosses over or under certain streets.

The Montauk cut-off, as proposed and approved by this Board, is to be a two-track, standard-gauge railroad, running from a point on the Montauk Division to the freight house and yards of the North Shore Division of the Railroad, now situated on the East river, between Third and Fifth streets (Long Island City). The said lines will cross by bridge or viaduct over Meadow street, Crane street, Hunter's Point avenue, Fourth street, Third street, Borden avenue, as now laid out or proposed, and Dutch Kills creek.

The Glendale cut-off, as proposed and approved by this Board, is to be a two-track standard-gauge railroad running from a point on the main line of the Long Island Railroad so as to enable it to connect with the railroad of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, now under construction. This connection is intended also to promote and make convenient the use by the New York and Rockaway Beach Railway Company, on proper terms, of the additional yards of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company. This connection is to be located upon the company's own right-of-way, except where it crosses, by bridge or viaduct, Whitepot road, Metropolitan avenue, Trotting Course lane, Walling street and Walnut street, of which streets Walling street and Walnut street are not now open.

The Long Island Railroad Company claims to be the owner in fee of the streets at the points where they will be crossed by the railroad, subject only to such rights and easements as may exist to use the same for street purposes.

In connection with the Glendale cut-off there are to be two spurs for connections, one running from the intersection of the main line with Remsen's lane to a point where the centre line of the proposed cut-off crosses Whitepot road, and the other running from a point where the centre line crosses Metropolitan avenue to a point on the tracks of the Montauk Division of the railroad company.

Plans for those proposed cut-offs are annexed to the certificate of this Board hereinafter mentioned.

It is proposed that the Long Island Railroad Company shall have the right, in its discretion, to add in the future to these connections, on the same routes, not exceeding two additional tracks, provided the same are constructed within ten years.

This Board has, therefore, by a concurrent vote of seven of its members, fixed and determined the locations and plans of construction of the proposed new railroads, the times within which they are to be constructed and the compensation to be paid therefor to the City by the company, and has also prescribed such terms, conditions and requirements as to the Board appear to be just and proper for the grants in question, including the terms, conditions and requirements provided by the Rapid Transit Act. The Board now transmits the certificate adopted by it, which is in terms made subject to the approval and consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City and the Mayor of the City.

The general form of the certificate follows closely the form of the certificate granted under date of February 14, 1907, to the New York Connecting Railroad Company, which was approved by your Board on February 15, 1907. It is, therefore, unnecessary to state all of the features of the certificate now transmitted. The compensation to be paid to the City for the first twenty-five years is to include:

First—An initial payment.

Second—An annual payment for the first five years of operation; and

Third—An annual payment for the next fifteen years of operation.

In addition, annual payments are prescribed for each additional track above two.

The payments to be made to the City are as follows:

For the Montauk Cut-off.

Not more than four tracks are permitted upon each of these pieces of road, besides sidings not exceeding 40 per cent. of the total length of the main line.

A bond for \$5,000 is to be given.

The only other material deviations from the form of the Connecting Railroad franchise are the following:

1. The provision that the company shall file maps every year in the Comptroller's office showing the number and length of tracks laid is omitted. As the cut-offs here provided for are only part of a much larger system, and as the rental is a fixed sum annually, it is thought that such maps would be of no practical value to the City.

2. As to motive power, it is merely provided that the company shall have the right to use the same motive power as it uses on the other adjacent parts of its lines. This is plainly fair.

3. The height of the railroad, where it crosses over any street, is to be not less than fourteen feet in the clear, which is understood to be ample.

The Board is satisfied that it is for the interest of the public and The City of New York that the proposed connections should be constructed as soon as possible on the terms proposed, and it therefore requests your Honorable Board to approve of said certificate pursuant to and as required by section 32 of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891 as amended by chapters 472 and 606 of the Laws of 1906.

The matter of contract for providing that the additional work for ventilating the subway and certain of the work for the same purpose already completed be made as an extra under Contract No. 1 was discussed. Mr. Bryan, the president of the Interborough Company, who was present, requested the Board to authorize the Chief Engineer to provide for an opening 6 feet wide, instead of 4½ feet, at the One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street yards. It was so understood, whereupon the following resolution was moved:

Resolved, That the officers of this Board be and they hereby are authorized to execute contract in form substantially as follows:

Agreement made this day of June, in the year nineteen hundred and seven, between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York (hereinafter called the Board), party of the first part, and John B. McDonald of The City of New York (hereinafter called the Contractor), party of the second part, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called Interborough Company), party of the third part, witnesseth:

Whereas, Heretofore and on or about the 21st day of February, 1900, the City, acting by the Board, entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction and operation of a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York and otherwise, as therein mentioned, the said contract for construction and operation being hereinafter styled the Contract, which Contract has been from time to time modified by certain other agreements between the said parties; and

Whereas, The Contractor has deposited with the Comptroller of the City certain security for the performance of the Contract on his part, and has given certain bonds as further security for such performance, and upon such bonds there are now sureties as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, the City Trust Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland; and

Whereas, By written instruments bearing date the 10th day of July, 1902, the Contractor, with the written consent of the Board, concurred in by six members thereof, duly assigned the right and obligation to maintain and operate the said rapid transit railroad for the term of years specified in the Contract, and all rights included in the leasing provisions of the Contract, together with the obligation to provide equipment for the said railroad unto Interborough Company, which company also guaranteed the performance by the Contractor of the provisions of so much of the Contract as was not assigned to it; and

Whereas, It is provided in the Contract that the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners shall have the right to require additional work to be done or additional materials to be furnished, or both, within the general purview of a rapid transit railroad as therein described, the reasonable value of which shall be additionally paid to the Contractor; and

Whereas, The Contractor desires, and the Board approves, a modification of the Contract in order to provide for the construction of certain vault light openings;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises, and subject to the consents hereinafter provided, it is agreed that the said Contract of February 21, 1900, be and the same is hereby modified as follows:

In addition to all other work of construction, there shall be constructed vault light openings, covered with suitable gratings, at the several stations between Ninety-third and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth streets, with the exception of the station at Manhattan street and at the storage yard at Broadway, between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Forty-third streets. All of the said work is to be constructed in accordance with the general plans and drawings prepared and issued by the Chief Engineer of the Board, copies of which are hereunto annexed as a part of this agreement, and which are marked and numbered as follows, to wit:

Drawing No. T-159—Typical details of sidewalk gratings and frames.

Drawing No. T-138—Sketch showing vault light and grating areas at stations One Hundred and Third, Cathedral parkway, Columbia University, One Hundred and Thirty-seventh, One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh streets on Broadway.

Drawing No. T-269—Plan and sections of grating over storage yard at Broadway, One Hundred and Thirty-ninth to One Hundred and Forty-third street.

And it is further agreed that the cost of constructing the said vault light openings, together with all the work incidental thereto, including necessary changes to present structure and apparatus, shall be deemed a part of the cost of constructing said rapid transit railroad, and shall be paid to the Contractor in the manner provided in the Contract, in addition to the amounts in said Contract agreed to be paid unto said Contractor; and such cost shall be included in the total cost of the construction of the said railroad in determining the amount of rental to be paid under said Contract, in like manner as if such work had been originally required by or authorized in the said Contract;

Provided, however, and it is expressly agreed, that this agreement shall take effect if and when and only when the following consents shall have been duly had, to wit:

The consents as subjoined of Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland.

In witness whereof, this contract has been executed for The City of New York by its Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, under and by a resolution duly adopted by said Board, concurred in by six of its members, and the seal of the said Board has been hereto affixed and these presents signed by the President and Secretary of the said Board, and the Contractor has hereto set his hand and seal, and Interborough Company has caused these presents to be duly executed by its proper officers under its corporate seal the day and year first above written.

To the Honorable Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, Manhattan Borough:

SIRS—On the 29th ult. I transmitted to the Chief Engineer of your Board two plans, one a general plan and the other a plan showing changes at a column, "J," temporary extension of Manhattan terminal, Brooklyn Bridge, and requested at that time that a permit be issued for the construction of the footing at column "J."

In connection with this the Chief Engineer of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company has advised me that he is disposed to favor the granting of the permit requested provided the City will widen about 3 feet the stairway of the northbound local platform, Brooklyn Bridge station, at which the column is located.

I respectfully ask your Honorable Board to issue a permit for the construction of a column in the stairway of the northbound local platform at the Brooklyn Bridge station, as shown on the plan submitted to your Chief Engineer, and I hereby agree that when required, and incidental to the construction of the temporary extension of Manhattan terminal, Brooklyn Bridge, the City will widen the said stairway about 3 feet, so as to allow a passage of 3½ feet at the south side of the column.

Letter of the Chief Engineer was read as follows:

NEW YORK, June 25, 1907.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, New York City:

DEAR SIR—Herewith is a study for two memorial tablets to be located on the north wall of the north ticket house at Borough Hall station.

It is proposed that one of the tablets will have upon it the names of the Commissioners, Mayors and builders of the Brooklyn subway, and that the other will have the names of the engineering staffs of the Commission and builders engaged upon the work.

You will please note that it is proposed to construct the body of the tablets of mosaic work similar to that used for the name tablets for the station. Inscriptions are to be upon inserted bronze tablets. It is estimated that the cost of the two tablets will be about \$1,200.

I respectfully submit the matter to the Board for their consideration.

The Secretary reported that the Vice-President had signed lease for rooms in the Jefferson Building, No. 4 Court square, Brooklyn, for the year ending May 1, 1908, at \$1,056 per annum.

The Secretary reported that the Vice-President had executed contract, dated the 27th of May, 1907, with the Cranford Company, for the construction of the Brooklyn loop lines, section 9-O-3, in accordance with its proposal, dated May 14, 1907, as authorized.

The Secretary reported that the Vice-President had signed permit to the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company to make excavation from the surface at Sixth avenue and Ninth street, under its certificate dated February 2, 1905, in accordance with its application dated May 22, 1907, as authorized by the Board.

The following resolution was moved by the President and seconded by the Vice-President:

Resolved, That this Board desires to place on record its appreciation of the efficiency and singleness of purpose which have characterized the work of its Secretary during the past eight years. Having had entire charge of the office of the Board, he has carried on practically all the correspondence, seeing all visitors, answering all inquiries and representing the Board in its constant relations with the newspapers.

That citizen, rich or poor, taxpayers' or property owners' association, corporation or public official, has yet to be found who can say that he or it was not treated with courtesy and impartiality. Not a single complaint from any of these numerous and varied interests or from the newspapers or their representatives has ever been received by the President or any Commissioner as to the conduct of the office during these years, and the office has always been kept wide open and free from official formalities, as all offices should be, but which is impossible, unless, as in this case, there are no secrets to hide and no favorites to be preferred.

Resolved, further, That this Board hereby commends its Chief Engineer and his unusually efficient staff of assistants, and the Auditor, individually and collectively, for efficient and excellent service.

The Vice-President addressed the Board as follows:

Mr CHAIRMAN—I have but scant sympathy with people who praise men for performing a public service, honestly and with fidelity and industry.

It is the simple duty of men so situated to do their work honestly, faithfully and with painstaking industry.

So much at least should be demanded of them. While this is true, however, it may also be said, that it is not given to every man to look back upon a service of seventeen years with a body of public officials, to which in all that time, not one breath of criticism as to its honesty and fidelity of purpose has ever been directed.

This proud distinction, gentlemen, belongs to me, as a member of the Rapid Transit Commission of New York. I cherish it beyond the possibility of adequate expression. I leave it to those who come after me as an enviable heritage. This I presume may be the last meeting of our board, and as you go your several ways, speaking as the oldest member of the Commission, in point of service and in years, I congratulate you and myself, upon the unity of purpose, if not of view, which has always characterized our deliberations.

According to our lights we have labored for the best interests of the people we have promised to serve.

As the years go on I think they will be more and more appreciative of the work we have done.

I trust you may all live yet many a year to be made aware of this appreciation. I shall always cherish in fondest memory my association with you, and with feelings of the warmest esteem and regard, I bid you farewell and God speed.

The Mayor addressed the Board, saying that he did not want the Board to adjourn without his having an opportunity to express on behalf of The City of New York the thanks of the people for the work which the Board had done. "There is not a thinking man," said he, "who does not realize that during the thirteen years this

Board has been in existence, its members have discharged their trust faithfully, economically and earnestly, with an eye single to the public welfare. You could not have done the impossible. It is the impossible that has often been asked of you, but at least you did your best and no one can do more than that, and I wish to thank you and congratulate you most heartily and most sincerely in behalf of the people of The City of New York, whose Mayor I have the honor to be."

The President thanked the Mayor on behalf of the Board, and stated that it had been the effort of the Board to do everything in its power in furtherance of that purpose for which the Board was created. Mr. Orr added: "I do not think it necessary to say anything more except that I have received nothing in the thirteen years in which you have honored me with the presidency, other than kindness, courtesy and continuous support, and I wish to express my gratitude to each of you individually and as a body, and to the Secretary and to the Auditor and to the Chief Engineer and his staff for intelligent and efficient co-operation."

Commissioner Smith stated that he was desirous of placing on the record his appreciation of the uniform courtesy and fidelity displayed by the President. "He has been untiring in his efforts, and has given us an example of painstaking fidelity and care in the discharge of the onerous duties of the presidency, so that I feel we are all under a great obligation to him, and it gives me great pleasure to express my personal obligation, and I have not the slightest doubt that I express the opinion of every member of this Board."

The Board then adjourned.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: From May 26 to June 1, inclusive, thirty operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, eight at Gouverneur Hospital, four at Harlem Hospital and nine at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

Reports of the attendance of the visiting physicians and surgeons of Bellevue, Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham hospitals are presented herewith.

The Contract Clerk has been working on extras, commissions, etc., that are due on the Harlem Hospital contract, and apparently this amount exceeds the amount of the appropriation, but the reason that your attention has not been invited to this matter has not been properly explained by Mr. Eckstein. It was hoped that a clear report would be ready to-day. The Contract Clerk has been asked to elaborate the report and have it ready for the Board meeting.

Mr. Rickard, the Assistant Superintendent, presented a statement in regard to certain items that had been ordered and did not appear on the books of the Bookkeeping Department. Mr. Rickard also spoke of the need of additional help in that Department, and of the Male Employees' Club and its needs. Mr. Rickard further reported upon the various appropriations for the year.

Moved, seconded and carried, that the items reported by the Assistant Superintendent as not having passed through the Bookkeeping Department be referred to the General Medical Superintendent for explanation as to why this was not done. Moved, seconded and carried, that a statement be carefully prepared covering the various appropriations and the expenditures already made and authorized under them, and also what deficiencies are likely to arise in the same, this statement to be presented to the Board at its next meeting on Monday, June 10, at 9 a. m.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Resolution adopted at a meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the headquarters of the New York City Fire Department, April 23, 1907, amending the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission:

Resolved, That section 22 of the Garage Regulations of The City of New York be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 22. Fire, Lights, etc.

No stove, forge, torch, boiler or other furnace, flame, fire, or fire heat, no electric dynamo, motor, hoist or other exterior sparking electric appliance, and no artificial light (except the incandescent electric light), shall be used or allowed.

1. In a garage, or—

2. In any portion of a building on or below the topmost floor of the garage that is not—

a. Provided with an entrance on the outside of the building, and—

b. Separated from the garage by unpierced, approved firewalls and floors.

Provided, however, that upon application being made the Fire Commissioner may, in his discretion, modify the provisions of the section relative to electric motors and electric switches in any fireproof building already erected or that may be hereafter erected.

They shall be packed in tin cans provided with an air-tight screw cap, and not containing more than one quart. The cans shall bear a label bearing the word "Danger; this can contains dangerous inflammable liquid," in letters at least 1/4-inch in height and 1/4-inch in width and a warning against the use of the material within 15 feet of any fire, and shall also bear the name and address of the manufacturer or jobber who shall be a licensee of the Fire Department. Manufacturers and dealers in metal polishes that contain a volatile inflammable liquid shall pay an annual license as follows: Manufacturers, wholesale dealers and jobbers whose names appear on the label as licensees, \$50; other dealers, \$2.

Section 44c. The manufacture, sale or use of stove polish or insecticides that will emit an inflammable vapor at a temperature below 100 degrees Fahrenheit when tested in the open air, or the closed pyrometer of Guiseppe Tagliabue, shall be prohibited within the limits of The City of New York.

These amendments shall become operative within four months after the date of their approval by the Mayor.

Approved safety cans for storing volatile inflammable liquid in a garage shall be of a capacity of five gallons or less, and when not in use shall sit in drip pans, either in a pump house or in an approved closet

a. Portable filling tanks for transporting volatile inflammable liquids from the storage tank to the automobile may be used under the following conditions:

1. Application must be made to the Fire Commissioner for a special permit in the case of each tank to be used.

2. The tank must be kept only in the pump house or in a storage closet of approved construction when not in use.

3. The construction of the tank and its carriage must conform to the following specifications and must otherwise meet the approval of the Fire Commissioner.

4. Specifications—The tank shall, if cylindrical, have concave heads, body of 1/4-inch mild steel, the heads of the same material, 3-16-inch thick, if rectangular the tanks shall be made of 3-16-inch mild steel throughout. All joints shall be riveted and caulked and all pipe connections shall be reinforced. The capacity of the tank shall not exceed 50 gallons. The tank shall be carried on a strong iron frame, firmly attached to it and provided with rubber tired wheels. The tank shall be discharged by pumping and not by air pressure and the outlet shall be free from leakage when the pump is not working. No hose attached to the tank shall be more than eight feet in length. All hose connections shall be Keystone brass unions.

9. Floors must be swept or mopped every day and all furniture and woodwork kept free from dust.
10. Hot and cold running water must be provided.
11. A copy of these regulations is to be hung in a conspicuous place in each shop.

Customers are recommended to have their own brushes, combs, razors and cups, in order to avoid as far as possible the contracting of contagious skin diseases, and are requested to report any failure of barbers to comply with the above rules.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

MINUTES OF THE LOCAL BOARD OF MORRISANIA, TWENTY-FOURTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, met in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, in the Municipal Building, Crotona Park, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, on Thursday, June 20, 1907, at 4 p. m.

Present—Alderman Harnischfeger, Alderman Kuntze and the President of the Borough of The Bronx. Alderman Morris appeared while petition No. 640 was under discussion.

Absent—Alderman Murphy and Alderman O'Neill.

Minutes of the previous meeting were adopted as typewritten.

Hearings.

No. 637. Constructing receiving basins and appurtenances at the following locations, so as to provide for proper drainage of surface:

Northeast corner of East One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Sherman avenue.

Southwest corner of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street and Sherman avenue.

Northwest corner of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street and Sherman avenue.

Report of the Chief Engineer, dated May 28, 1907, setting forth the necessity of constructing these basins was read, as was also the report of the Engineer in Charge of Sewers, dated June 20, 1907.

Estimated cost, \$750. Assessed value of the real estate with improvements included within the probable area of assessment is \$92,900.

No one appeared in opposition at this hearing.

On motion, duly seconded, the following was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for constructing receiving basins and appurtenances at the following locations:

Northeast corner of East One Hundred and Sixty-second street and Sherman avenue.

Southwest corner of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street and Sherman avenue.

Northwest corner of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street and Sherman avenue.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 638. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Concord avenue, between St. Joseph's street and St. Mary's street.

Petition of Frederick Klemmen and another, and report of the Engineer in Charge of Sewers were read.

Estimated cost, \$2,775. Assessed value of the real estate with improvement included within the probable area of assessment is \$18,800.

No one appeared in opposition at this hearing. Title vested. Outlet sewer is built.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Concord avenue, between St. Joseph's street and St. Mary's street.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 639. Paving and repaving with sheet asphalt blocks on a concrete foundation Kingsbridge road from Jerome avenue to Creston avenue, the cost of the same to be apportioned between The City of New York, the property benefited, and the New York City Interborough Railway Company.

Petition signed by A. O. Salter and others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

No. 640. Laying out an extension of Elsmere place, from Crotona parkway to Boston Road.

On motion, duly seconded, the petition of Frances L. Breidenbach and two others was denied.

Protest in writing signed by Rev. A. J. Derbyshire and eight others filed with papers.

No. 641. Regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in West One Hundred and Ninety-second street, between Davidson avenue and Jerome avenue.

Petition of Thomas H. Thorn and two others was read. Also report of the Engineer in Charge of Highways.

Estimated cost, \$1,900. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$105,570.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for regulating and grading, setting curbstones and flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in West One Hundred and Ninety-second street between Davidson avenue and Jerome avenue.

Unanimously adopted.

Laid Over Matters.

No. 631. Acquiring title to the lands necessary for the widening of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Brook avenue and Third avenue.

Petition of John W. Decker and others was read, as was also report of the Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer.

Alderman Harnischfeger, to whom this matter was referred, made the following report in writing:

"Report of Committee Appointed by Local Board to Report on One Hundred and Sixty-first Street Widening.

"In compliance with instructions received from this Board, I herewith respectfully submit my report on the subject of acquiring title for the purpose of widening East One Hundred and Sixty-first street.

"Before expressing my ultimate determination as Alderman of the district affected by the proposed improvement, I may be permitted for a moment to reiterate here the many reasons I have heretofore honestly urged in opposition thereto.

"With the many theories advanced by the more than mortal critics for my attitude on this question, I have nothing to do; but this I can say, appreciating heartily and sincerely as I do the confidence reposed in me for so many years by the people of my district, that whatever opposition I offered, and I make no apology for it, was offered according to the dictates solely of my own conscience and reasoning faculties and predicated, as I believed, and still believe, on sound premises.

"No man or body of men interested in the defeat of the subject at issue either directly or indirectly influenced or dictated my past course in this matter. My individual judgment to-day remains the same.

"The actualities urged by me, however, remain:

"1. Assuming that the strip of 30 feet on the north side of One Hundred and Sixty-first street is taken, the blank wall of the power station will hardly form a picturesque background for the handsome court house whose detail and erection gave so much concern to the Art Commission.

"I am still of the opinion that the whole block bounded by One Hundred and Sixty-first and One Hundred and Sixty-second streets, from Brook to Third avenues, should be taken and a public square or park made of the plot. This would give the proper surroundings to the handsome structure now in course of erection. By this arrangement the assessment would be paid by the City at large and relieve the immediate property owners of a burden they should not be called upon to assume.

"2. The widening of the street at the intersection of Third avenue is of no practical advantage:

"(a) Because it will be impossible to make it 100 feet wide as petitioned for unless 20 feet of the power house is torn down, and this is not contemplated. But assuming this were done, it would only result in making it a 100 foot street with an unsightly bend at Elton avenue, and to no advantage whatsoever.

"(b) Because the street really ends at the square formed by Elton, Brook and Washington avenues, and the necessity for the widening of a continuing street to Third avenue does not exist.

"(c) Because the railroad company intends to remove its rails from the street east of Elton avenue, and the congestion caused by its present maintenance will thereby be removed.

"3. When the street was originally regulated and graded by the building of a retaining wall the property owners in the neighborhood had to pay a heavy assessment, and I do not think they should be called upon to pay for a further widening of the street.

"It will be remembered that some years ago, when the original maps were prepared by the engineers, the authorities then deemed it unwise to widen One Hundred and Sixty-first street east of Elton avenue on the grounds that the street could not be continued east of Third avenue and because of the steepness of the grade at that point, and in lieu thereof determined that One Hundred and Sixty-third street be widened east of Elton avenue and thus form practically the continuation of One Hundred and Sixty-first street for transit facilities. As a result One Hundred and Sixty-third street has been widened to a 100-foot street, and apparently in further contemplation of the scheme as originally outlined the railroad company has made application for a franchise through that street to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Bureau of Franchises. The tracks removed on One Hundred and Sixty-first street east of Elton avenue and all One Hundred and Sixty-first street cars swinging into One Hundred and Sixty-third street through the board plaza at Elton avenue, thence to Third avenue, would necessarily remove the transfer point to One Hundred and Sixty-third street an away from the elevated railroad station at One Hundred and Sixty-first street, thus eliminating the present confusion and congestion at One Hundred and Sixty-first street, which, in the event of a continuation of present conditions, even with 30 feet added to the street, will be intensified still more within a short period by the operation of the St. Ann's avenue railroad, which will have its outlet into Third avenue directly at this point.

"It needs but a moments reflection to realize the immense confusion that would be caused if the contemplated crosstown cars were permitted to run up Third avenue from One Hundred and Sixty-first street to One Hundred and Sixty-third street, where they will turn east, inasmuch as there are now in operation at this point the cars of the West Farms, the Fordham, West Mount Vernon and St. Ann's avenue lines.

"These objections were appreciated by those who originally laid out this thoroughfare. They were also appreciated by this Local Board prior to my becoming a member, and that Board rejected the plan to widen One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and the property to be taken now was not at that time owned by its present owners.

"As I apprehend the sentiment to-day it is for a 100-foot street. With this I am in perfect accord, and my only regret is that the wishes of my constituents cannot be realized.

"At best the street will be 80 feet wide, and in order to straighten it east of Elton avenue at least 20 feet would have to be taken off the new Court House, which is absurd.

"Thus, the practical advantage of a straight 100-foot street will never be realized; but so insistently and zealously have certain manufacturers of public opinion been at work that many, including the public press, have been blinded to the actual facts and sincerely believe that on the taking of the property on the north side of the street it will be 100 feet wide, and thereby prove a perfect panacea for the present congestion.

"The action of the original planners of the thoroughfare, the former determination of the local board, of which I was not a member, my familiarity with the actual facts and circumstances, and above all my desire to perform conscientiously and honestly my duty to my constituents have caused me to take the stand I have in the past on this proposition; but the will of the people should be carried out by its representative, and while I have received numerous petitions in opposition to this proposed improvement, and which are on file with this Board, it is not for me to question the sincerity of the movement in favor thereof and which seems to voice the opinion of the majority. I therefore report favorably on the proposed widening of One Hundred and Sixty-first street.

Resolved, That proceedings be, and the same are hereby, initiated for acquiring title to the lands necessary for the widening of East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, between Brook avenue and Third avenue, and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment determine by resolution that 50 per cent. of the cost and expense of the said proceeding be borne and paid by The City of New York, and the other 50 per cent. thereof be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 636. Laying out a public park at the confluence of the Spuyten Duyvil creek and the Hudson river, occupied by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and designated as Lots Nos. 150 and 160, and in Block 3410, and shown on map attached to petition.

On motion, duly seconded, the petition of C. C. Ferris and others was denied.

No. 566. Change of grade of Harlem river terrace from Cedar avenue to within 180 feet of West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, and the grade of the 50-foot street located 392.94 feet south of West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street connecting Harlem river terrace with Cedar avenue.

Laid over to first meeting in October, 1907.

No. 570. Paving with creosote wood block on concrete foundation and setting curb where necessary on Rogers place, between Dongan street and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.

Petition of John Andres and others was read. Also report of the Engineer of Highways.

Estimated cost, \$11,800. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$275,430.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for paving with creosote wood block on concrete foundation and setting curb where necessary on Rogers place, between Dongan street and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 593. Laying out a new street 60 feet in width parallel to Kingsbridge avenue and 200 feet easterly therefrom, southerly of West Two Hundred and Thirty-fourth street.

Opposition and protest in writing.

Laid over for executive session.

No. 633. Constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Woodlawn road, from Webster avenue to the New York and Harlem Railroad line.

Petition of John Gallaher was read.

Estimated cost as reported upon by the Engineer in Charge of Sewers, \$4,600. Assessed value of the real estate, with improvements, included within the probable area of assessment is \$76,700.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That proceedings be and the same are hereby initiated for constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Woodlawn road, from Webster avenue to the New York and Harlem Railroad line.

Unanimously adopted.

No. 583. Paving with asphalt blocks on a concrete foundation the roadway of East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, from Arthur avenue to the Southern Boulevard, where the gradient is less than 5.5 per cent., and with iron slag block or granite blocks on a concrete foundation where the gradient is greater than 5.5 per cent., and setting curb where necessary.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
