BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

(Received at City Record Office, December 15, 1910.)

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Friday, October 21, 1910,

Present-Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; and Messrs. Paulding, Robbins Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused-Messrs. Drummond, Farley and O'Keeffe. Consideration was given to the minutes of the meeting held on October 6, at which

no quorum was present, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was Resolved. That these minutes, a copy of which had been sent to each member, be approved, and that the proceedings therein be ratified as follows.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the office of Mr. Sachs, 60 Wall st., on Thursday, October 6, 1910, at

Present-Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; and Messrs. Paulding, Sachs, and Stern, Trustees. Excused-Messrs. Farley, Drummond, O'Keeffe and Robbins. The President reported that since last meeting he had consulted representatives \$240. of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and had learned that it was desirable that the Board should submit statements showing the Budget allowance for 1911 revised and reduced below the departmental allowance for 1910 to an amount not exceeding \$1,027,854.45, being 10 per cent. less than the original appropriation granted for 1910, as had been requested. The General Medical Superintendent submitted a statement of the functions of the Department which would require to be curtailed or abolished should the proposal of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to reduce the allowance be carried out, and stated that in order to bring the Budget within the amount designated, it would be necessary to reduce the departmental estimate as already filed by the sum of \$295,619.98. This amount could be met by omitting funds which had been included for the following activities of the Department:

Dr. W. H. Smith, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The rule regarding transfers within the hospital is somewhat indefinite. It is recommended that the following rule be added:

"No patient should be transferred from one ward to another ward in the hospital until such transfer has received both the approval of the visiting physician or surgeon in charge of the ward from which the patient is to be transferred and of the Superintendent or Assistant Superintendent. If it is not possible to obtain the signature of the visiting physician or surgeon, the transfer may be made if approved by the Superintendent or his Assistant.'

A revision of the salary and wages schedule of the Budget is necessary in order to conform with the payroll for the month of September.

The Auditor and Contract Clerk recommends that certain transfers within th appropriations for 1910 be requested.

The appointment of special Nurses reported by the General Medical Superintendent was approved.

Permission was granted the Amateur Concert Club to conduct a concert in Bellevue Hospital.

It was resolved to disapprove of the request made by the Second Division for apparatus to be installed in the ward laboratory.

J. M. Knopp, \$4.604; Louis Koenig, \$4,923; A. & W. Gray & Co., Inc., \$4,992; George Hildebrand, \$5,147; William Horne Co., \$5,170; Robert S. Pollock Co., \$5,495; John J. Kenney Co., \$5,783; Neptune B. Smyth, Inc., \$6,439; Otto Metz, \$6,690; Henry R. Asserson, \$7,226. It was resolved to award the contract for the temporary passageway, etc., to the

lowest bidder, J. M. Knopp.

The Secretary reported that through an error as to the time of opening the bids for the alterations to ward 31, upon the advice of the Corporation Counsel, he did not open the bids which were presented on October 17, but returned them to the bidders. This action was approved, and it was resolved to readvertise for bids for this work.

A communication dated October 15 was presented from Dr. Goldwater relative to the ventilation of pavilions L and M. The letter stated that after careful and prolonged study and consultation with the Engineers, he recommended that no provision be made for the artificial ventilation of the wards of pavilions L and M other than the installation of exhaust ducts in the walls and the use of a perforated sash board in the lower sash of each window. After consideration, it was resolved to adopt the recommendations of Dr. Goldwater, and to refer them to the architects in order that the specifications could be amended to comply therewith.

The President submitted a communication received from McKim, Mead & White, stating the amount which would be saved by the omission of the ventilating system

which had been proposed.

A communication dated October 14 was received from McKim, Mead & White with a report on the fire alarm system which had been provided for in the specifications for pavilions L and M. It was resolved to refer this communication to the Building Committee to arrange a conference.

A communication dated October 13 was received from McKim, Mead & White with estimates for the installation of a temporary water supply in the pathological department and men's dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital on the basis of the scheme recommended by the Department of Finance, the lowest bid for which was \$2,100. The President reported that as this amount was considerably in excess of the cost of the plan originally recommended by the architects, he had transmitted all the papers to the Department of Finance for recommendation. This action was approved.

A communication dated October 11 was received from the Fire Department, stating that the water mains in the vicinity of Bellevue Hospital are not sufficient in cas of a large fire. It was resolved to inform the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of this report and to request that steps be taken to increase the water facili-

ties in the neighborhood of the hospital.

A communication dated September 23 was received from Gaites, Peace & Co., requesting an extension of time on their contract for the installation of lighting fixtures in the pathological department and men's dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital. The President reported that upon receipt of this communication he had forwarded it to the architects for recommendation, and he submitted a communication from the architects dated October 4 recommending that the request be granted. It was resolved to deny the request for an extension of time and to inform the contractors that they will be held strictly accountable for any delay in the execution of their contract for which they are responsible.

The President reported that he had also transmitted this communication to the architects for recommendation, and submitted a reply dated October 3 in which it was stated that the statements of the contractors were correct and that they were entitled to the extension of time requested. It was resolved to grant an extension of time of ninety days. It was further resolved that the President should confer with the Department of Finance and request that steps be taken to pay the final bill of the Wells & Newton Co. in order that the work of that firm may be accepted and the other contractors permitted to proceed with their

The minutes of a meeting of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board held on October 4 were presented. It was resolved to approve the appointment of Dr. Joseph Stammers as Pathological Interne, to date from July 1, 1910.

The minutes of a meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital held on October 1 were presented. A communication was received from Dr. F. C. Holbrook, resigning from the place of Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients on the Fourth Division of Bellevue Hospital.

A communication dated October 14 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of a resolution which had been adopted approving the plans and specifications for the construction of pavilions L and M of the new Bellevue Hospital at an estimated cost of \$957,000.

Resolved, To authorize the printing of the specifications as soon as the corrections in regard to the ventilating and fire alarm systems are made.

A communication dated October 14 was received from the P. J. Carlin Construction Co., stating that two boilers are connected and ready for the supply of steam to the men's dormitory when desired. This communication was referred to the Building Committee for information.

The request for an extension was denied. It was resolved to draw the attention of the architects to the fact that they had not notified the Trustees of the expiration of

A communication dated October 19 was received from Dr. Huber, requesting the protection of the balconies at Gouverneur Hospital against rough winds and inclement weather. The communication was referred to the President and General Medical Superintendent.

A communication dated October 18 was received from the Commissioner of Accounts, stating that in accordance with the request of the Board an examination of the books of the Department will be made within a week or two.

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on September 20, requesting that preference be given to employees injured in the service in assignments to lighter work, was submitted, and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to comply with the request should such circumstances arise in the Department.

A communication dated October 7 was received from R. F. 

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and Conron Bros. Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain conduits with the necessary branches and extensions therefrom, leading directly into private property, The time for the completion of the work and the full performance of the contract is forty-five to consumers, provided that no conduit be of a (45) days. The amount of security required is Six Hundred Dollars (\$600). to be constructed and operated only beneath the

surface of such of the streets, avenues and high-

First—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of renewal of said contract for the further period

of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such

right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, with out the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual

hereby authorized to operate. Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to b imposed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said conduit line, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface con struction under the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth-Any alteration to the sewerage o drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner

as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having juris-diction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of

the conduit line and its appurtenances.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth-The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes to be contained within the conduits hereby authorized whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity The conditions of such test shall be as follows: (a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be sub jected to a pressure of two hundred (200) ounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates:

(a) Consumers making monthly contracts: Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over. (b) Consumers making yearly contracts: Fifteen (15) cents per year per cubic foot o

box.

These rates to apply to boxes located no above the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth-The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corpora tion whose premises are located within the dis-trict hereinbefore described shall extend its conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any building.
