MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of May 17, 1910.

Present—President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Richard Welling and Alexander Kengh.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

On motion, the minutes of the meeting held May 13 were approved.

John Curran, of No. 347 E. 84th st., Borough of Manhattan, appeared before the Commission relative to his examination for first grade Clerk. On motion, the matter was laid over.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Appeals, the appeals of the following named candidates for a rerating of their examination papers were denied, no errors of marking or rating having been shown:

Promotion to Lieutenant, Police Department—Patrick J. Madden, No. 189 17th st., Brooklyn; John A. Murphy, No. 986 Union ave., Bronx. Janitor, Steam Heating—Charles A. Neumann, No. 46 Chester st., Brooklyn. Promotion to Third Grade Clerk, Health Department—Jane I. Willis, No. 582 Broome st. Police Doorman and Prison Keeper—Charles A. Peterson, No. 318 E. 44th st. Court Attendant—John J. McCarthy, No. 41 Gouverneur st.

The appeal of Frank P. Kenison for a rerating of his paper on laws and ordinances and of his report in the examination for promotion to Lieutenant of Police was considered and laid over.

The appeal of James Fox, of No. 140 N. 8th st., Brooklyn, a candidate for promotion to third grade Clerk in the Department of Bridges, for a special examination in arithmetic was denied for lack of power.

The appeal of Helen E. Shelley, of No. 227 W. 121st st., for a special mental examination for the position of Attendant was denied for lack of power.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the practice of the automatic appeal be applied to the duties and government papers of James E. Mallon, of No. 25 Virginia place, Brooklyn, a candidate for promotion to fourth grade Clerk in the Health Department, in order that he may receive a passing mark on those subjects.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved: John H. Smyth, from the position of Clerk, at a salary of \$750 per annum, in the office of the Sanitary Superintendent of the Department of Health, to a similar position in the Permanent Census Board, at a salary of \$900 per annum. Francis J. Lee, from the position of Clerk, at a salary of \$300 per annum, in the Board of Education, to a similar position, at a salary of \$600 per annum, in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. John W. Schmidt, from the position of Transitman, at \$1,650 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, to a similar position in the Bureau of Highways, office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn. Harry Krett, from the position of Clerk, at a salary of \$420 per annum, in the office of the Secretary of the Board of Education, to a similar position, at a salary of \$480 per annum, in the office of the Permanent Census Board. William Blend, from the position of Axeman to that of Foreman, in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, pursuant to paragraph 3 of Rule XIV, he having served in the latter position up to February 28, 1907, when he was regularly promoted to the position of Axeman.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the transfer of Joseph W. McMurren from the position of Gateman, at a salary of \$960 per annum, to that of Clerk, at \$1,050 per annum, in the Department of Docks and Ferries, was denied, there being a preferred list for the latter position.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated May 13, requesting instructions of the Commission as to whether the experience paper of a candidate in the examination for Attendant should be rated, in view of the revelation of identity made in answer to question No. 6. The Commission directed that the paper be rated.

A report was presented from the Clerk in charge of the receipt of applications, dated May 13, relative to the application of Clarence G. Hallowell, an applicant for the position of second grade Clerk, who had appeared in the general office of the Commission a fraction of a minute after five o'clock on the closing date set for the receipt of applications. On motion, the application was accepted.

A report was presented from the Chief Payroll Clerk, dated May 13, submitting for consideration by the Commission a voucher in favor of James W. Walker for veterinary services in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn during the quarter ending March 31, 1910, amounting to \$78.75, and calling the attention of the Commission to the fact that Dr. Walker was also serving as a Veterinarian from time to time in the Department of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, under the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII. On motion, the Secretary was directed to communicate with the Comptroller and request him to furnish the Commission with an opinion as to the legality of the employment of an individual in two or more City departments, under the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII. of the Civil Service Rules. On motion, it was

Resolved, That James W. Walker, veterinarian, be and he hereby is excepted from examination, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., to render expert service from time to time, as his services may be required, in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn; provided that his total compensation shall not exceed \$750.

A report was presented from the Record Clerk, dated May 16, relative to Edward Weber, of No. 652 Bergen ave., The Bronx, who had been appointed a Patrolman-on-Aqueduct on April 15, 1910. It appeared that the date of birth given in the application and in the preliminary sheet of the examination papers was July 2, 1882, while in the appointment sheet the same was given as July 2, 1880, which latter date had been substantiated by a birth certificate. The Secretary was authorized to permit the candidate to correct the date of birth given in error.

A communication was presented from the Record Clerk, dated May 17, relative to Miss Sadie A. Bryan, who had been appointed a Temporary Clerk in the Department of Finance on May 7, 1910. It appeared that in the declaration sheet filed out at the time of appointment, the date of birth had been given as February 8, 1876, while in the application the date was given as February 8, 1874. On motion, the Secretary was authorized to permit Miss Bryan to amend her papers to conform with the birth certificate furnished.

A communication was presented from the Assistant Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated May 14, forwarding an attested copy of the resolution adopted by the State Board at a meeting held on May 12, relative to the matter of certifying the payrolls of, and certifying names for appointment to, the Board of Education of New York City. The communication was ordered filed.

A letter was presented from the Secretary to the Board of Water Supply, dated May 13, stating that at a meeting of the Board held on that date it had rescinded its action in accepting the resignation of William Muschel, a Transitman. The Secretary was directed to request a more detailed statement as to the reasons for taking such action in view of the fact that there existed a preferred list for the said position.

On motion, it was Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., Mr. William F. Abernethy be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to be employed by the Board of Water Supply, to take the testimony of William Barringer and Louis Boice, claimants against the City of New York, for loss of wages, under chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, his total compensation not to exceed \$750.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated May 13, stating that John W. Kessler, who had been reported as having failed to respond to a notice of appointment sent him, had since declined the proffered appointment on the score of location. The Secretary was directed to amend the records accordingly.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated May 11, requesting authority to reinstate Jacob Platt, Jr., in the position of Patrolman-on-Aqueduct, with compensation at the rate of seventy-five dollars a month, and stating that Platt had resigned from the said position on February 12, 1910. It appearing from the records of the Commission that Mr. Platt had resigned before completing his period of probation, the Secretary was directed to restore his name to the eligible list and to recertify it to the Board of Water Supply for appointment.

A letter was presented from the Board of Water Supply, dated May 11, requesting approval of the following appointments: Thomas Higgins, Fishkill Landing, N. Y., Mining Blacksmith, at a salary of \$3.50 per diem, appointed May 10, 1910; Lewis H. Porter, Stone Ridge, N. Y., Clerk, First Grade, at a salary of \$480 per annum, appointed May 10, 1910. The appointments were approved under paragraph 7 of Rule XII.

A letter was presented from Mr. Calvin I. Crocker, Engineer in Charge of the Brooklyn Bridge, Department of Bridges, dated May 12, relative to Michael Keating and Frederick Hamilton, who had been disqualified in the recent examination for promotion from Bridge Tender to Bridge Keeper for communicating. It appearing that the communication for which the candidates had been disqualified had taken place after they had completed and turned in their papers, the Commission directed that the same be rated.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Bridges, dated May 16, designating the following officers of his Department as a Board of Promotions: William H. Sinnott, Deputy Commissioner; Alexander Johnson, Chief Engineer; Daniel M. Simpson, Chief Clerk. The designation was approved.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of Licenses, dated May 16, designating the following officers of his Department as a Board of Promotions: Samuel Prince, Deputy Commissioner; Joseph O. McShane, Chief Inspector; John J. Caldwell, Secretary. The designation was approved.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting that John Keenan and Michael Comerford, who had been rejected in the physical examination for promotion to Assistant Stable Foreman, be given a re-examination, as both men had been injured in the discharge of their duties. The Secretary stated that the record showed that the candidates had been rejected for lameness. The request was granted.

On motion, it was Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., Mr. James Beggs, of No. 133 E. 84th st., New York City, be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to be employed by the Comptroller to investigate and report as to whether or not each member of the various bands and orchestras which furnish music in the parks, recreation centres and piers of the City is an actual musician; provided, however, that the total compensation shall not exceed seven hundred and fifty dollars.

A communication was presented from Edmund D. Fisher, Esq., Deputy and Acting Comptroller, dated May 16, requesting authority to employ Mr. Richmond Smith, of No. 351 W. 56th st., Manhattan, as a Statistical Expert, at a compensation not to exceed \$3,600 “in any one year.” The matter was laid over pending the receipt of additional information.

A letter was presented from the Secretary to the Commissioner of Public Works, dated May 11, stating that Albert Scherick, Assistant Foreman in the Bureau of Highways, had been reassigned to duty on that date and his compensation reduced to \$2.50 per diem. The Secretary was directed to note the fact on the records.

On motion, it was Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 6 of Rule XII., Mr. Arthur Farwell be and he hereby is excepted from exam-

ination, to serve in the Department of Docks and Ferries as a Musical Expert and Supervisor of Music on the recreation piers, with compensation at the rate of fifty dollars a week, the total compensation not to exceed seven hundred and fifty dollars.

The Secretary submitted a copy of the opinion of Mr. Justice Miller in the matter of Hogan vs. Board of Education, 8 N. Y. Supp. The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Corporation Counsel and request an opinion as to the status of the Board of Education of The City of New York, in view of the conflicting opinion rendered by the Attorney General under date of April 15, 1910.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated May 16, requesting an amendment of the Civil Service Classification by striking from the exempt class the position of Chief Engineer of Water Supply, Brooklyn, and inserting in lieu thereof "Deputy Chief Engineer"; also by including in the exempt class for his Department the newly created position of Auditor. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the classification of exempt positions under the heading, "Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity," by striking therefrom the lines, Chief Engineer, Water Supply, Manhattan; Chief Engineer, Water Supply, Brooklyn, and substituting therefor, Chief Engineer of Water Supply, Deputy Chief Engineer, also by including therein the position of Auditor.

A letter was presented from the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated May 16, with further reference to his request for authority to promote Frank Slevin, Messenger, to a clerkship, and Messrs. G. Huerstel, Topographical Draftsman, and John P. Metcalf, Transitman, to Assistant Engineer. The Secretary was directed to certify the preferred lists for the positions of Clerk and Assistant Engineer and state that the persons whose names appeared thereon could not be ignored on the ground that the vacancies in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity could be more satisfactorily filled by promotion from among those already in the Department.

A letter was presented from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, dated May 16, relative to the eligibility for promotion of Inspectors Seaton and White. After consideration the matter was laid over, pending the decision of the court in the action brought against the Commission to restrain it from grading, as to salary, positions formerly included in what was known as the ungraded service.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities, dated May 13, requesting authority to appoint Dr. William A. Polglase, of No. 145 W. 178th st., as Deputy Medical Superintendent of the Metropolitan Hospital, in the absence of an eligible list for that position. The appointment was approved for a period of fifteen days, in accordance with paragraph 4 of Rule XII, and the Secretary was directed to summon Dr. Polglase for a non-competitive examination to qualify him for provisional appointment.

Letters were presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated May 13, requesting authority to employ Paul Glasgow, of No. 444 W. 57th st., Borough of Manhattan, as a Laboratory Assistant, for assignment in the Division of Communicable Diseases (Diagnosis Laboratory), Borough of Manhattan, with a salary at the rate of \$600 per annum. The appointment was approved for a period of fifteen days, in accordance with paragraph 4 of Rule XII, and the Secretary was directed to summon Mr. Glasgow for a non-competitive examination for provisional appointment.

A letter was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated May 13, requesting approval of the following emergency appointments: Miss Edith P. Tanzer, of No. 294 W. 92d st., Manhattan, as Stenographer and Typewriter, on May 9, 1910, with salary at the rate of \$2 a day; Miss Mary A. Brothers, of No. 237 W. 11th st., Manhattan, as Stenographer and Typewriter in the office of the Secretary, on May 9, 1910, at 11.30 a. m., with salary at the rate of \$3 per day. The appointments were approved in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII.

The appointment of Miss Addie A. Kelly, of No. 3800 Broadway, as a Clerk in the Permanent Census Board for a period of fifteen days was approved in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII.

The Secretary presented the following communication from G. L. Sterling, Esq., Acting Corporation Counsel, dated May 13, 1910:

"Hon. John C. McGuire, President, Municipal Civil Service Commission: Sir—I desire to acknowledge receipt of a letter dated April 16, 1910, signed by Frank A. Spencer, Secretary of your Commission, a copy of a portion of which is as follows:

"I am instructed by the Commission to call your attention to the following facts, and to request your opinion as to the proper course to be pursued:

"On December 31, 1909, the terms of Alfred S. Ambler and Samuel D. Nutt as Coroners for the Borough of Queens expired. There were in the employ of the Coroners as Coroners' Physicians prior to that date Timothy J. Flynn, Walter G. Frey and William H. Nammack. Under a decision rendered by Mr. Justice Garretson, of the Supreme Court of the Second Department, Timothy J. Flynn and Walter G. Frey were held to be the regular appointees, and William H. Nammack to have been irregularly employed.

"In July, 1909, pursuant to notice, the name of William H. Nammack was placed upon a preferred list for Coroners' Physician, which made him presumably eligible for reappointment to the position of Coroners' Physician, Police Surgeon or Medical Officer, Fire Department.

"On December 30, 1909, a communication was received from Walter G. Frey requesting that his name be placed upon a preferred list, pursuant to the decision of Mr. Justice Garretson, in which it was held that the office of Coroner and Coroners' Physician were coterminous, and that therefore his (Frey's) term of office expired December 31, 1909.

"On January 5, 1910, a requisition was received from the Police Commissioner for an eligible list from which to appoint one Police Surgeon to a vacant position.

"Under a decision recently rendered by Mr. Justice Gerard, of the Supreme Court, First Department, it was held that William H. Nammack was not legally removed from the position of Coroners' Physician, Borough of Queens, but the motion of Nammack to compel the Civil Service Commission to certify his name from the preferred list to the Police Commissioner was denied.

"The Civil Service Commission would like to be advised, first, whether any (or all) of the said Coroners' Physicians is entitled to be placed upon the preferred list, pursuant to the provisions of section 1543 of the Greater New York Charter, upon the expiration of the term on December 31, 1909, and, second, whether the Commission should now certify from the regular competitive eligible list for appointment to the position of Police Surgeon.

"Before directly replying to the questions set forth in said letter, I deem it advisable to review the history of the contention that has taken place in respect to the office or position of Coroners' Physician in the Borough of Queens.

"On or about March 31, 1909, this office advised the Comptroller that only two Coroners' Physicians for the Borough of Queens were entitled to payment of salary from The City of New York, and as a result of certain correspondence with the Board of Coroners for said borough the said Board notified Dr. William H. Nammack, one of the three Coroners' Physicians then acting, that his services were no longer required and informed the Municipal Civil Service Commission of their action. In consequence of said action of the Board of Coroners for the Borough of Queens, the Municipal Civil Service Commission placed the name of William H. Nammack upon the preferred eligible list for such position and the similar position of Police Surgeon.

"As a result of a proceeding, entitled in the Matter of Timothy J. Flynn against Herman A. Metz, as Comptroller, and in which William G. Frey and William H. Nammack were impleaded, for the payment of salary of each of said petitioners for the months of March, April, May, June and July, 1909, as Coroners' Physicians, Mr. Justice Garretson, sitting in Special Term of Queens County, decided on or about December 4, 1909, that Timothy J. Flynn and Walter G. Frey were the duly appointed and legally acting Coroners' Physicians for said borough and that William H. Nammack was not during said months a legally acting Coroners' Physician. In consequence of said decision, an order was entered directing the issuance of a peremptory writ of mandamus requiring the payment of salary to said Drs. Flynn and Frey, and which contained the following provision:

"Ordered, that the aforesaid motion of said William H. Nammack for a peremptory writ of mandamus requiring the said Comptroller to pay to said William H. Nammack salary as Coroners' Physician of said borough, be and the same hereby is denied, since he was not during the period for which he claims such salary one of the Coroners' Physicians of said borough."

"The opinion of Mr. Justice Garretson, handed down prior to the entry of the order, held that the official term of Coroners' Physician was coterminous with that of the Coroner appointing him and that Dr. Nammack's last legal appointment expired December 31, 1905, his alleged appointment on January 1, 1906, having been made by one of the Coroners who had already exhausted his power of appointment in appointing Dr. Flynn.

"As a result of said order the Municipal Civil Service Commission removed the name of said William H. Nammack from the preferred eligible list for appointment to the position, among others, of Police Surgeon. As a further result of such action by the Civil Service Commission, Doctor Nammack moved at a Special Term, Part I. of the Supreme Court, New York County, Mr. Justice Gerard presiding, for a peremptory writ of mandamus requiring the Municipal Civil Service Commission to restore his name to the preferred eligible list for appointment to the position, among others, of Police Surgeon. Mr. Justice Gerard denied the motion, stating in an accompanying opinion that the term of Coroner's Physician was not coterminous with that of the Coroner appointing him, and that as the relator was a veteran Volunteer Fireman and had never been tried on charges, his removal by the Board of Coroners in July, 1909, was contrary to the provisions of the Civil Service Law. Such finding by the learned Justice was equivalent to one that the said Nammack was still in the employ of the Board of Coroners as a Coroner's Physician at the time of making the motion. As Doctor Nammack had made no such claim, it is believed that the finding was irrelevant to the motion before him. Judge Gerard directed the entry of an order in accordance with his opinion.

"The opinion of Mr. Justice Garretson in the matter of Flynn is reported in 65 Misc., 233, and similar decisions have been made by Mr. Justice O'Gorman in People ex rel. Williams vs. Zucca, 36 Misc., 260, and Mr. Justice Greenbaum in People ex rel. Whitman vs. Goldenkranz, 38 Misc., 682. The latter case is cited with approval on this point in People ex rel. Schulum vs. Harburger, 132 App. Div., 260. The weight of authority, therefore, seems to be on the side of the decision of Mr. Justice Garretson and not on that of Mr. Justice Gerard.

"Mr. Justice Greenbaum also decided in the case of People ex rel. Whitman vs. Goldenkranz above referred to, that, on the expiration of the term of office of a Coroner's Physician the occupant was not entitled to be placed upon the preferred eligible list in pursuance of the provisions of section 1543 of the Revised Greater New York Charter.

"It is therefore apparent that neither Doctors Flynn or Frey are entitled to be placed upon the preferred eligible list under the provisions of section 1543 of the Greater New York Charter, for the reason that their terms of office expired on December 31, 1909, through operation of law.

"In a proceeding brought at the same time with that of People ex rel. Whitman vs. Goldenkranz, and reported in the Law Journal for September 19, 1902, under the title of People ex rel. Schultze vs. Ogden and others, for a writ of mandamus to compel the respondents to certify the name of the relator to the Board of Coroners from the regular eligible list for appointment as Coroner's Physician, Judge Greenbaum granted the motion on the basis of his decision in the first named case.

"In respect to your second question, therefore, I advise you on the authority of Judge Greenbaum's decision in the case of People ex rel. Schultze vs. Ogden, that you may now make certifications from the regular competitive list for appointment to the position of Police Surgeon. Yours truly, G. L. STERLING, Acting Corporation Counsel.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to certify from the competitive eligible list for appointment to the vacancy in the position of Police Surgeon.

The emergency appointment of Miss A. L. Barrett as Stenographer and Typewriter in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on December 7, 1909, was approved, under the provisions of paragraph 4 of Rule XII.

The Secretary presented the following vouchers in payment of salary to persons not regularly employed by The City of New York, for special services rendered to the City during the periods indicated: Charles Pickler, Stenographer, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, April 19, 1910, \$58.10; N. Y. Telephone Co., Board of Education, August 16 to September 4, 1909 (services of Relief Operator), \$30. The Secretary was directed to certify the vouchers in accordance with paragraph 6 of Rule XII.

Wolf, of No. 227 E. 72d st., and his application for Clerk, Second Grade, is hereby accepted, it appearing that Mr. Wolf came to the United States when he was eight years of age, has been educated in the New York Public Schools, and has declared his intention of becoming a citizen of the United States.

Minutes of Meeting of May 18, 1910.

Present—President John C. McGuire and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling.

The President, Mr. John C. McGuire, presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the exempt class the following: Board of Ambulance Service—Director, Borough of Manhattan; Deputy Director, Borough of Manhattan; Deputy Director, Borough of Brooklyn.

Dr. R. S. Copeland, representing, the Board of Ambulance Service, appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment. There being no opposition, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session, the minutes of the meeting held May 17 were approved.

The appeal of Edward F. Galloway, candidate for promotion to the rank of Battalion Chief in the Fire Department, was referred to Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Promotions, for a report.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the examination papers of John Curren, No. 347 E. 84th st., Borough of Manhattan, candidate for Clerk, first grade, be rated and his name placed upon the eligible list in the order of his final percentage.

Hon. William F. Baker, Commissioner of Police, appeared before the Commission relative to the conduct of the forthcoming examination for promotion to the rank of Captain. After a general discussion of the matter, the Police Commissioner retired, and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the following method be used in rating the forthcoming examination for promotion to Captain of Police: Seniority and record, 50 per cent.; mental examination, 50 per cent. Necessary to pass, 80 per cent. on total and 70 per cent. on mental examination.

Subjects and Weights, Mental Examination—Administration, 4; Rules and Regulations, 2; Laws and Ordinances, 2; Report 2, total, 10.

Record and Seniority, Colorless Record—Beginning with date of appointment as Lieutenant, 80 per cent. For every additional four months in the grade add $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1 per cent. or $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. a year, making at the end of ten years a maximum of 95 per cent.

Added Points—Honorable mention and medal, add 3 per cent.; honorable mention, add 2 per cent.; commendation, add 1 per cent.

Deducted Points—For each day's fine in the grade since 1898, deduct $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1 per cent.; for each reprimand since 1898, deduct $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1 per cent.; fine or reprimand previous to 1898 not considered.

Reports were presented from the Chief Examiner, dated May 17, asking the instructions of the Commission as to whether five experience papers of candidates in the examination for Female Attendant should be rated, in view of the revelation of identity in answer to question 6. The Commission directed that the papers be rated.

On motion, it was Resolved, That the eligible list resulting from the examination for Assistant Director of the Bacteriological Laboratory, held on March 29, 1910, be and the same hereby is established as of May 13, 1910, the date on which the rating of the papers was completed.

A report was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated May 17, suggesting the following subjects and weights for the coming examination for Veterinarian: Technical 6; experience, 4; 75 per cent. required. (Candidates to be required to produce a license to practice in the State of New York). The report also stated that it would be necessary to employ experts for the examination, and that the Chief Examiner had previously found satisfactory ones by applying to the American Veterinary Hospital, No. 141 W. 54th st. After consideration of the matter, the recommendations of the Chief Examiner were adopted.

A report was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated May 17, recommending that a physical re-examination of the persons appearing on the list of Bridge Painter be ordered by the Commission, under the provisions of clause 9 of Rule XIX, for the reason that there were over seventy names appearing on the said list, which would be adequate for the needs of the service for another year. Connolly, an Assistant Foreman, was at present on a vacation leave of twenty-one days, beginning April 27, that it had been impossible to notify him to appear before the Commission for physical examination for promotion to Foreman, and requesting that his time be extended. The Commission directed that the candidate be given the necessary physical test at a later date.

Kiniry, of No. 113 Nelson st., Brooklyn, an applicant for Inspector of Supplies and Repairs, who had passed the examination with a percentage of 73.20. After consideration of the report, the Secretary was directed to summon Mr. Kiniry to show cause why his name should not be removed from the list under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, relative to Michael A. Sullivan, No. 208 E. 82d st., an applicant for Inspector of Taxicabs. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to summon Mr. Sullivan to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII, for unsatisfactory character.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated May 17, relative to Harvey H. James, No. 241 W. 109th st., an applicant for Inspector of Taxicabs. The appointments were approved for a period of fifteen days, under paragraph 4 of Rule XII, and the Secretary was directed to summon the candidates for a non-competitive examination, to qualify them for provisional appointment.

A letter was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated May 11, relative to the promotion of seven Foremen in his Department (from a salary of \$1,050 to \$1,200 per annum), regarding whom the Commission had notified the Borough President that, before promotion could be recognized, it would be necessary for them to pass an examination. 95. Paving with asphalt on a concrete foundation Prospect ave., where not already paved with asphalt and thereby abolish the present centre plots between E. 149th st. and Crotona Park East. Estimated cost, \$42,500. Assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$10,204,000. The centre line length for the above improvement is about 8,070 linear feet. On this basis the average cost per linear foot of frontage will be about \$2.63, or about \$65.75 per each 25-foot lot. Laid over until June 8, 1910.

98. Paving with asphalt blocks on a concrete foundation Quarry road, between 3d ave. and Arthur ave., setting curb where necessary and all work incidental thereto. Estimated cost, \$16,200; assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is \$454,500. Petition signed by two owners of property. Sewer in the street; water in the street from 181st st. to Monterey ave.; gas in the street to Arthur ave. The centre line length of the proposed work is about 988 feet. On this basis the average cost per linear foot of frontage will be \$8.19, or about \$204.75 per each 25-foot lot. No one appeared in opposition. On motion of Alderman Herbst, the matter was laid over until June 8, 1910.

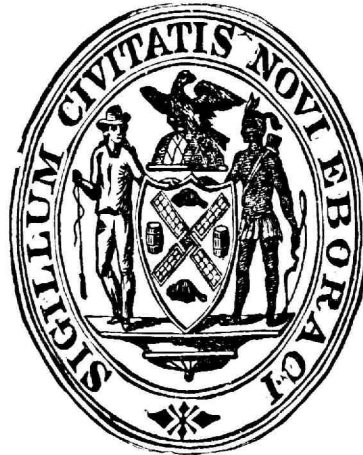

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held June 28, 1910, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 132 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 132. Every animal which shows symptoms of rabies and every animal that has been exposed to such disease shall, by the person owning the same or having possession thereof, be at once confined in some secure place for such length of time as to determine whether such disease exists or to show that such exposure has not given such animal said disease, and so as to avoid all danger to life or health. And such person shall also forthwith notify the Department of Health thereof, and of the place where such animal is confined. Every animal which is mad or has rabies shall at once be killed by the owner or person having possession thereof, or by the Department of Health, and the body of any animal that has died of such disease, or being suspected of such disease, has been killed, shall be at once surrendered to the Department of Health to be by it disposed of.

Should a dog bite any person it shall be the duty of the owner or person having the same in his possession or under his control, to at once notify said Department thereof, and surrender said dog to said Department for inspection and observation; and such dog shall be returned to the person from whom the same shall have been received if found not rabid or vicious, and if found to be rabid or vicious to such an extent as to be unsafe to be at large, it shall be destroyed by said Department.

When the police or other person or authorities destroy a dog for any of the causes herein mentioned, it shall be his or their duty to immediately notify the said Department thereof and of the location of its body, so that the same may be obtained by the said Department; and it shall be unlawful to remove any such dog or the body of any such animal heretofore mentioned except as herein provided.

Sec. 97. Every owner, lessee, tenant and occupant of any stall, stable or apartment in the built up portions of The City of New York, in which any horse, cattle or other animal shall be kept, or of any place in which manure, stable refuse or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, shall cause such manure, stable refuse or liquid to be promptly and properly removed therefrom, and shall at all times keep or cause to be kept such stalls, stables or apartments, and the drains, yards and appurtenances thereof, in a clean and sanitary condition, so that no offensive odors shall be allowed to escape therefrom. Every such stable, and the yards and appurtenances thereof, shall be connected with the sewer in the street in front thereof. It shall be the duty of every such owner, lessee, tenant or occupant to cause all manure and stable refuse to be removed daily from such stable or stable premises, unless the same are pressed in or otherwise protected or adequately screened or otherwise protected or covered so that flies cannot have access thereto, as hereinafter provided. It shall not be lawful to remove manure and stable refuse in carts or wagons, or to cart the same within the City without a permit from the Board of Health, and such carts and wagons shall be of a construction approved by said Board and every such cart or wagon must have a permit from the Board, and be used in accordance with the terms of such permit, and not otherwise. Manure carts and wagons shall be loaded within the stable premises and not upon the street or sidewalk, and the manure and stable refuse shall be removed from such premises in a manner not in any way offensive or so as to cause any nuisance. All manure and stable refuse, when transported through the streets, must be covered and secured so that no part of the same will fall upon the street, and so as to prevent the escape of offensive odors, and the same shall not be unloaded or deposited within the City limits, except upon the conditions of a permit from the Board of Health, and at such docks and places as shall be approved by the Board, and to which a permit in writing for such use shall have previously been granted by said Board. No manure or stable refuse shall be thrown upon or allowed to fall or remain upon any street or sidewalk, or upon any ground near any stable. No manure vault shall be built or used on any premises within the built up portions of The City of New York.

Every owner, lessee, tenant and occupant of any stall, stable or apartment in the built up portions of The City of New York, in which any horse, cattle or other animals shall be kept, and from which the manure and stable refuse are not removed daily, as hereinafter provided, shall cause the same at least twice in each day to be pressed in bales, barrels or boxes, and adequately screened or otherwise protected or covered so that flies cannot have access thereto, and so pressed as to reduce the same to not more than one-third of the original bulk. Manure and stable refuse pressed in bales, barrels or boxes shall be removed to such docks or places as shall be approved by the Board of Health, and to which a permit for such use shall have previously been granted by said Board, and such bales, barrels and boxes shall not be opened until delivered at such docks or places.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
