AN ORDINANCE selecting a site known as Seton Falls Park for a hospital for contagious diseases, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health. Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby selects as a site to be used as a hospital for contagious diseases, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health the following lands and premises situate and lying in the Borough and County of Bronx, State of New York, described in metes and bounds as follows, to wit:

Beginning on the southerly side of a proposed street known as 233d st., at a point distant two hundred (200) feet westerly from a point which would be the intersection of the said southerly side of said proposed 233d st. with the westerly side of Seton ave. if the westerly side of Seton ave., as shown on a map entitled "Map of Edenwald, etc.," made by Josiah A. Briggs, Civil Engineer, filed in the office of the Register of the County of New York March 23, 1898, by the Map Number 393, were extended southerly in a straight line, running thence southerly at right angles to the said southerly side of said proposed 233d st. fifty (50) feet; thence easterly parallel with the said southerly side of proposed 233d st. one hundred (100) feet; thence southerly at right angles to said last mentioned line twenty-five (25) feet; thence easterly again parallel with the said southerly side of said proposed 233d st. one hundred (100) feet to a point which would be in the westerly side of said Seton ave. if the said westerly side of Seton ave. were extended southerly in a straight line; thence southerly along what would be the continuation of the said westerly side of Seton ave., if the same were extended southerly in a straight line one thousand twenty and ten one-hundredths (1,020.10) feet, more or less, to the northerly side of Pratt ave., as shown on said map as a street sixty (60) feet wide; thence southwesterly along the said northwesterly side of Pratt ave. four hundred and thirty-nine (439) feet and eighty-nine one-hundredths of a foot (89.00), more or less, to the northeasterly side of a street or road called Schieffelin's lane; thence along the southerly boundary line of land hereby conveyed the following courses and distances: North forty-one (41) degrees seventeen (17) minutes and fifty (50) seconds west along the said northeasterly side of Schieffelin's lane one hundred and eighty-seven (187) feet and twenty-eight one hundredths of a foot (28-100); thence north forty-three (43) degrees nine (9) minutes and ten (10) seconds west still along the same one hundred and forty-eight (148) feet; thence north forty-seven (47) degrees fifty-six (56) minutes and fifty (50) seconds west still along the same one hundred and twentyseven (127) feet; thence north fifty-three (53) degrees six (6) minutes and forty (40) seconds west part of the way still along the same and part of the way along the

boundary of land now or late of Thomas Fowler two hundred and forty-five (245) feet; thence north forty-four (44) degrees and thirty-one (31) minutes west still along land now or late of Fowler two hundred and twenty-four (224) feet and ninetytwo one hundredths of a foot (92-100); thence north seventy-five (75) degrees four (4) minutes and thirty (30) seconds west still along the same sixty-four (64) feet; thence north eighty-four (84) degrees and seven (7) minutes west still along the same one hundred and fifty-nine (159) feet and ninety-five one hundredths of a foot (95-100); thence north seventy-seven (77) degrees eighteen (18) minutes and fifty (50) seconds west still along the same one hundred and ninety-four (194) feet to land now or late of Schieffelin; thence north twenty-eight (28) degrees three (3) minutes and twenty (20) seconds east along said land now or late of Schieffelin two hundred and eighty-five (285) feet and thirty-three one hundredths (33-100) of a foot; thence north forty (40) degrees and twenty-six (26) minutes east still along the same one hundred and thirty-one (131) feet and forty-nine one hundredths (49-100) of a foot; thence north thirty-two (32) degrees twenty-seven (27) minutes and ten (10) seconds east still along the same thirty (30) feet; thence north nineteen (19) degrees forty (40) minutes and forty (40) seconds east still along the same eighty-seven (87) feet and twenty-eight one hundredths (28-100) of a foot; thence north seven (7) degrees seven (7) minutes and forty (40) seconds west still along the same thirty-eight (38) feet and sixty-eight one hundredths (68-100) of a foot; thence north forty-five (45) degrees ten (10) minutes and forty (40) seconds west still along the same twenty (20) feet and five-tenths (5-10) of a foot; thence north nineteen (19) degrees ten (10) minutes fifty (50) seconds west still along the same seventy-nine (79) feet and one-tenth (1-10) of a foot; thence north twenty-two (22) degrees one (1) minute and ten (10) seconds west still along the same two hundred and seven (207) feet and eighty-four one hundredths (84-100) of a foot, more or less, to a point which would be in the easterly side of Monaghan ave., if the said easterly side of Monaghan ave., as shown on said map, were extended southerly in a straight line; thence northerly along what would be the continuation of the said easterly side of Monaghan ave., if the same were extended southerly in a straight line north forty-five (45) degrees fifteen (15) minutes and twenty (20) seconds, one hundred sixty-six and 38-100 (166.38) feet, more or less, to the southerly side of said proposed 233d st.; thence easterly and along the southerly side of said proposed 233d st. about one thousand and forty (1,040) feet to the point or place of beginning. Sec. 2. The Corporation Counsel is hereby authorized and directed to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of said lands and premises.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall not preclude the acquisition of the above described lands and premises, or any part thereof, by purchase from the owner or the respective owners thereof, at a price authorized by the Board of Estimate and Appor-

Sec. 4. The Clerk of this Board is hereby directed to prepare two similar surveys, maps or plans of said lands and premises and file the same—one in the office of this Board and the other in the office of the Register of the County of Bronx, in accordance with the provisions of section 1436 of the Greater New York

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen April 14, 1914. Approved by the Mayor April 28, 1914. No. 184.

Such reports shall be made on a form to be prescribed by the Commission. After the Board of Promotions has passed upon the terms to be used to indicate the degree of efficiency of the several employees, the original reports and the recommendations made in accordance shall be transmitted to the Commission for its approval before any entries are made upon the efficiency record. Whenever, in the judgment of the Commission, more exact information is

names in excess of the number prescribed by the rules having been certified to | be consulted or such other action taken as may be deemed advisable. The Commission shall have power to change or amend any of the recommendations made by the Boards of Promotions, as to the terms to be used to indicate the degrees of efficiency, where it shall find that such terms are not warranted by the reports submitted or that such reports do not contain a fair and true account of the comparative efficiency of the several employees whose names appear therein. Where such changes are made, the reasons shall be given in writing to the Department concerned. When the Commission has considered the recommendations made in the reports, it shall transmit an account of its findings to the several Departments, after which the entries shall be made upon the efficiency records. 

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

Rules and Regulations.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held April 21, 1914, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the following rules and regulations in relation to maintaining tent, camp or bungalow within The City of New York be and the same are hereby adopted, to take effect May

1, 1914: 1. Water Supply.

a. An adequate supply of pure drinking water must be provided on camp grounds; at least 1 tap provided for every four tents; said taps must be so arranged as to be easily accessible to occupants of tents. Water from wells other than public water supply cannot be used without a permit from the Board of Health.

2. Disposal of Waste Liquids.

a. Waste liquids shall be disposed of so as not to create a nuisance.
3. Privy Accommodations.

a. Sewer-connected, water-supplied, properly flushed waterclosets shall be provided where sewer connections are possible.

Where sewer connections are not possible

dry earth system must be used.
c. Where dry earth system is used the privy house and appurtenances shall be so constructed that the platform on which privy cans are set shall be at least 4 inches above the surface of the surrounding ground; said platform to be of nonabsorbent material.

d. Privy house must be provided with sufficient seats and seats must be provided with tight covers and closed when not in use.

e. Privy houses must be constructed and ar ranged so as to prevent saturation of same by y liquids.
Privy houses must be adequately ventilated

and properly screened and protected against flies.

4. Garbage and Refuse Disposal. a. All garbage and refuse must be stored in metal cans with tight covers.

b. Garbage must be removed daily from prem-

ses before 8 a. m.
5. Premises on which tent, camp or bungalow is located must be owned by applicant or proof furnished that premises are occupied by permission of or under lease from owner.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeture of the pur-chase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occu-pancy of any such building by any tenant free, rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of

None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to re main on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than twe feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be con-sidered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean

earth. The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and reg-ulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity

that this has been performed. The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all me sewer connections to the main sewer in

the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser

of the building. Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on ac-count thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against

he security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the suc-cessful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, mplements or appliances used in the removal

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed

by the operations of the Contractor.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested. it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or Na. tional banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of

of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not

e in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart ment, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen thera.
