MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, Held Wednesday, June 20, 1917, at 10.30 A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

On motion, the minutes of the meetings held May 23 (2) and May 25 were approved.

Albert DeRoode, attorney and counsellor at law, appeared and requested the Commission to certify the payroll for \$167.86 in favor of one Robert B. Brown for services rendered as Deputy Lay Superintendent at the Municipal Lodging House, Department of Public Charities, for the period from Jan. 1, 1917, to Feb. 19, 1917, inclusive. The matter was laid over.

Haven Emerson, Commissioner of Health, appeared and requested that Sanitary Inspectors be admitted to the examinations for promotion to Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, Borough of Brooklyn, and District Health Officer. In connection therewith, the Commission considered a report dated June 20 from the Acting Chief Examiner recommending that all persons serving under the title of Medical Sanitary Inspector or in positions under the title Sanitary Inspector where the nature of the duties require that the incumbent be a physician be admitted to the examinations for promotion to District Health Officer, Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, Borough of Brooklyn, and Director, Bureau of Preventable Diseases. The recommendation was adopted.

John E. O'Brien, attorney and counsellor at law, appeared before the Commission in connection with a petition from an Association of Nurses in the Department of Health protesting against the assignment of Nurses to position of Supervising Nurse, etc., without examination. Haven Emerson, Commissioner of Health, also addressed the Commission in the matter. The matter was referred to the Acting Chief Examiner.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the candidates named therein:

Resolved, That the disqualification appearing against the name of Joseph L. Behan, 237 Argyle rd., Brooklyn, on the eligible list of Oculist, be and the same hereby is removed.

Resolved, That the disqualification appearing against the following names on the eligible list of Fireman be and the same hereby is removed: George C. Pierpont, 659 E. 165th st., Bronx; William Wichendahl, 323 E. 80th st., Manhattan.

Resolved, That James K. Price be and he hereby is marked "Qualified" for employment as Inspector of Iron and Steel Construction in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII.

Resolved, That the name of John Territo, 14 Monroe st., Manhattan, be and the same hereby is removed from the list of persons disqualified for employment in the City service and his application for the position of Asphalt Worker be and the same hereby is accepted.

Walter Walsh, 66 Gouverneur st., Manhattan, a candidate for employment as Automobile Engineer (Ambulance), in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals under the provisions of clause 11 of Rule XVIII., failed to appear as directed. The Secretary was instructed to inform the candidate that his payroll would not be certified until he did appear.

Edward J. Murray, 11 E. 102d st., Manhattan, failed to appear to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Patrolman under the provisions of clause 14 of Rule VII. The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walls, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations, shall be torn down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by the purchaser at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all money paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furring, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms or conditions, shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as, if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, endorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York, is shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

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
