SIR—There were 646 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 12, 1885, which is a decrease of 19, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 205 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending September 5, 1885, was 640, which is 1.0 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.69 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,404,928.
