

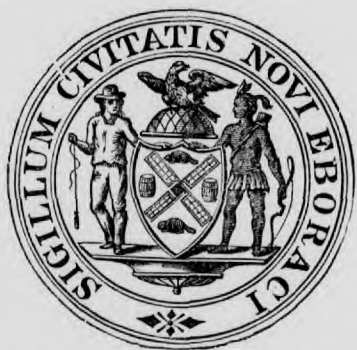

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 20, 1885:

- The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,273.  
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 817.  
 During the past week 476 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.  
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 75 permits.  
 There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 15 permits.  
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 46 miscellaneous permits.  
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks, 295 permits.  
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported 41 visits were made, and 28 disinfections, and 15 fumigations were performed.  
 The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 10.  
 The number of vaccinations performed was 1,952, of which 133 were primary and 1,819 re-vaccinations.  
 There were seized and condemned 7,720 pounds of meat, and 1,400 pounds of fish.  
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 120; the number of analyses of same made was 19, and the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 35.

The certificates of 450 births, 37 still-births, 207 marriages, and 662 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 20, 1885. This shows a decrease of 67 births, 11 still-births and 76 marriages, and an increase of 69 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was a decrease of 124 births, 24 still-births and 29 marriages, and an increase of 28 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 3; scarlatina, 1; croup, 1; whooping cough, 1; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; inanition, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 15; bronchitis, 4; heart diseases, 11; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; suicide, 4; while the deaths from measles increased 10; diphtheria, 8; erysipelas, 4; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 21; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 1; pneumonia, 14; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; convulsions, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 3; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 25; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preterm births, 6; surgical operations, 2. The number of deaths from alcoholism and Bright's disease and nephritis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 170 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 224 under two years, 286 under five years, and 52 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 70 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 42.90 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 112 were in institutions, 385 in tenement-houses, 144 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 134 on the first, 173 on the second, 121 on the third, 72 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 662 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 67 were stated to be single, 151 married, 82 widowed, and the condition of 362 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 662; still-births, 37; bodies in transitu, 21; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 450 births, 207 marriages, 37 still-births, 662 deaths; 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 104 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 10 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 44 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 20, 1885, was 74 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.940, the mean humidity was 66, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 955, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.43 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 602 deaths and still-births, or 86.12 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 18; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 254; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 69; Greenwood (undenominational), 37; Lutheran (undenominational), 85; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 21; Evergreen (undenominational), 53; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 15; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. ## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, Wednesday, June 24, 1885, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners James C. Spencer, William Dowd, and C. C. Baldwin.

Also, Deputy Chief Engineer Fieley, and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works.

Vice-President Dowd presided.

The minutes of the stated meeting of June 17 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 845 and 851, which vouchers were, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, approved by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee next made report upon the claim of James V. Lawrence, for supplies alleged to have been furnished the Engineers of the Department of Public Works engaged upon the surveys for the New Aqueduct, presented by Fordham Morris, Esq., as Counsel, and referred to them at the last meeting, and recommended that the Commissioners decline to certify said claim for payment, for reasons stated in said report.

In this recommendation the Commissioners concurred, and directed the Secretary to notify Mr. Fordham Morris thereof.

The Committee on Construction made reports, dated June 22, as follows:

First—In relation to an additional shaft to be sunk between Shafts Nos. 16 and 17 on Section 8, the Committee made report, accompanied by a form of agreement for the required land, and an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation upon the legality of such agreement, and recommended that the shaft be authorized and provided for, on conditions stated in the report.

Commissioner Dowd presented a letter from the Mayor, suggesting adverse contingencies connected with the sinking of the proposed additional shaft, and requesting that action on the matter be deferred until he could be present.

On motion of the Comptroller, action upon the report was deferred until the next meeting.

Second—The Committee submitted communications received by them from the Chief Engineer, upon which they made recommendations, as follows:

1st. That authority be given to purchase a pair of horses for the use of the Chief Engineer, at a cost not to exceed \$500. This recommendation was approved by the Commissioners, and the purchase authorized within the above limit.

2d. The Committee reported the completion of an arrangement with Brown, Howard & Co., contractors, for the use of the Welger House, at Pocantico Blow Off, during the construction of the New Aqueduct at that place, and the receipt from them of the sum of \$150 therefor; also the direction of the Committee to the Chief Engineer, to have an auxiliary office constructed at that place, at a cost not exceeding \$600. This action was approved by the Commissioners; and the Secretary presented a receipt from the Finance Department for the money, which was ordered placed on file, and entered upon the books of the Commission.

3d. The Chief Engineer having reported the granting of leave of absence to certain engineers, and requests for similar leave from others of his corps, the Committee reported their approval of the action of the Chief Engineer, and recommended that, in view of the custom of all the Public Departments of the city to grant limited leave of absence to faithful employees during some portion of the year, the Chief Engineer be authorized to grant to the engineers and employees in his Department leave of absence, with pay, for not exceeding an aggregate of two weeks in any one year; said leave to be granted at his discretion, having due regard to the requirements of the work of the Commission; and that the Secretary be given similar authority with regard to the employees in his department.

These recommendations were approved by the Commissioners, and the Chief Engineer and Secretary authorized to grant leave of absence as above stated.

Third—The Committee reported upon a change in the line of the New Aqueduct through Central Park, as proposed by the Commissioners of Public Parks, submitting with their report the Chief Engineer's report and estimate of the additional cost of said route.

Commissioner Baldwin moved that action upon the matter be deferred, and that the Commissioners of Public Parks be invited and requested to meet the Aqueduct Commissioners for conference upon this subject, on Wednesday next, July 1st, at 4 o'clock P. M. Which motion was adopted unanimously.

Fourth—The Committee submitted an amended form of Rule 3, for the selection and appointment of Inspectors, which, on motion of the Comptroller, was laid over for further consideration.

The Comptroller, under date of the 20th instant, gave notice of the issue of warrants for vouchers not certified by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal for the City and County of New York, and of Westchester County, amounting in all to \$7,930.34. Which notice was ordered placed upon file and entered upon the books of the Commission.

The Chief Engineer made report of this date, of the suspension, by him, of Richard Vredenburg, Night Watchman, and George Wilson, Fourth Helper on Drill C. C., and his reasons therefor. On motion of Commissioner Dowd, the suspension of said persons by the Chief Engineer was approved, and they were dismissed from employment in the Commission; said dismissal to date from the time of their suspension.

The Commissioners being informed that the Counsel to the Corporation was of the opinion that instead of an easement in perpetuity upon lands required for Shaft No. 30 in One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and designated "Parcel 44" on the property map approved and adopted by the Commissioners on the 17th instant; and for lands in Convent avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, near Shaft 32, and designated on said property map "Parcel No. 70," the said lands should be taken "in fee."

Commissioner Spencer offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and requested to amend, before its filing, the property map submitted to us by him on the 17th of June, 1885, and marked Exhibit "C. C.," and by us approved and certified on the same day, by including in the parcels thereon described as lands to be taken in fee for the construction of the New Aqueduct and its appurtenances, Parcel No. 44, in One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and Parcel No. 70, in Convent avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, as said parcels are shown upon said map, and to delineate said parcels on said map as lands to be taken "in fee," instead of lands upon which an easement in perpetuity is to be acquired.

This resolution was adopted by the affirmative vote of all the Commissioners present.

A communication, dated this day, was received from the Counsel to the Corporation, returning the form of contract, specifications and bond for constructing Section No. 1 of the New Aqueduct, and advising the addition of certain clauses to paragraph H. in relation to "Extra Work."

The communication was read, and Commissioner Dowd moved that said forms be amended in accordance with the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation, by including therein the clauses recommended by him; upon which motion the vote was:

Affirmative—The Comptroller and Commissioner Dowd.

Negative—Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Spencer and Baldwin.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the time and place for the opening of bids for constructing said Section No. 1 of the New Aqueduct was fixed as Wednesday, July 29, 1885, at 2 o'clock P. M., at this office; and the length of time and designation of the newspapers for the advertisement of the letting, as required by section 26 of the act, was referred to the Committee on Construction, with power.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the Secretary was directed to prepare the necessary form of bid for said section, in accordance with the form and requirements for bids heretofore approved by the Commissioners, and to have two hundred and fifty copies thereof printed.

A communication was presented by Fordham Morris, Esq., in relation to the alleged imperfect guarding of the highway near Shaft No. 22 in the Twenty-fourth Ward, which was read, and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, was referred to the Chief Engineer for investigation and report.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, section 127 of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 127. That no live chickens, geese, ducks, or other fowls shall be brought into, or kept, or held, or offered for sale, or killed in any yard, area, cellar, coop, building, premises or part thereof, or on any sidewalk or other place within the built-up portion of the City of New York, except in the public markets of said city, without a special permit in writing from the Health Department and subject to the conditions thereof.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 10 to 3 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt. Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
