

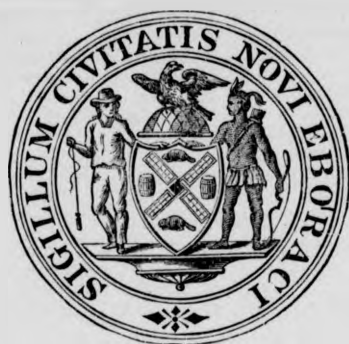

The minutes of the meeting held on the 22d instant were read and approved.

The Board of Assessors state that "the assessment-list has been changed in accordance with the objections of Mary G. Pinckney, numbered 1, 2, and 3."
