#### To the Board of Police:

I would report the result of the trial of the cases of the following-named Surgeons of Police, to wit:

Surgeon Charles H. Wade, fined three (3) days' pay.  
" Hans Powell, fined three (3) days' pay.  
" Stephen G. Cook, fined three (3) days' pay.  
" John H. Dorn, fined two (2) days' pay.  
" George Steinert, fined two (2) days' pay.  
" William H. Ensign, complaint dismissed.  
" S. R. W. McLeod, complaint dismissed.

The charges against Surgeons Ensign and McLeod are dismissed, for the reason that they were not properly notified.

I would state that there seems to have been a pernicious custom recognized, which permitted Surgeons, in case they did not receive the notice to attend Police cases within an hour after it had been sent, to consider themselves relieved from attending, on the supposition that the Police Department would be more successful in finding the next Surgeon, and a careless attention to duty has been the natural result of such a practice.

Any custom that looks to the relieving of Police Surgeons of the trust they assumed, is considered abrogated, and they will take means hereafter to ascertain, when they do receive a notice to attend, no matter how long a time may have elapsed between the sending of the message and their receipt of it—whether their presence is required.

Police Surgeons are not prohibited from attending patients other than those belonging to the Police Department, provided such labor does not interfere with their duties to the Board of Police, whose officers they are.

The lightness of the penalties in these cases are not to be considered as an indication of the future action of the Board of Police in cases of neglect of duty.

In case the private practice of Police Surgeons is such as to interfere with the duty they owe to the public, such grave consequences might result from tardiness, they will consider this as notice, that they must abandon it or resign their office.

## LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

[From the Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen, March 2, 1876.]

(G. O. 97.)

The Committee on County Affairs, to whom were recommended the annexed report and resolutions in favor of furnishing rooms for the Court of General Sessions, and removing Parts I. and II. of the Marine Court to the old City Hall, respectfully

## REPORT:

That they have carefully examined the whole subject, and recommend that the resolution heretofore offered by your Committee be adopted.

Resolved, That the rooms in the old City Hall, formerly used as meeting-rooms for the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Supervisors, be and they are set apart and appropriated for the use of the Marine Court, Parts I. and II., and the rooms in the Brown Stone Building, fronting on Chambers street, now occupied by said Parts I. and II. of the Marine Court, be and they are hereby assigned to the use and for the occupation of the Court of General Sessions and the Grand Jury; and the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to carry into effect the provisions of this resolution, and to refit and refurnish the rooms hereby respectively assigned to the Marine Court and the Court of Sessions, using, where possible, the present office fixtures and furniture; the expense to be charged to the appropriation for "Public Buildings—Construction and Repairs."

Resolved, That Riverside avenue, from Seventy-second street to One Hundred and Thirtieth street, be regulated and graded, as a country road, with wooden supports, where necessary, under the direction of the Commissioners of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

In connection with the above Alderman Morris offered the following:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby respectfully requested to inform this Board if, in his opinion, the resolution and ordinance now pending in the Board of Aldermen, being G. O. 70, provides that the work contemplated therein (being the regulating, etc., of the Riverside avenue) shall be done by contract and at the expense of the property benefited.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the negative, on a division called by Alderman Morris, viz.:

Affirmative—Aldermen Billings, Hess, Morris, Pinckney, and Wade—5.

Negative—The President, Aldermen Cole, Gumbleton, Guntzer, Keenan, Lysaght, McCarthy, Purroy, J. Reilly, Sauer, Seery, Sheils, and Tuomey—15.

Alderman Morris moved to amend by adding, "the work to be done by contract."

Alderman J. Reilly moved, as an amendment to the amendment, to add as follows, "or in such manner as the Department of Public Parks may deem for the interest of the city and the owners of property."

But he subsequently withdrew the motion.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with the motion of Alderman Morris.

Which was decided in the negative, on a division called by Alderman Morris, viz.:

Affirmative—Aldermen Billings, Cudlipp, Gross, Hess, Morris, Pinckney, and Wade—7.

Negative—The President, Aldermen Cole, Gumbleton, Guntzer, Keenan, Lysaght, McCarthy, Purroy, J. Reilly, Sauer, Seery, Sheils, and Tuomey—13.

Alderman Hess moved to amend by inserting "the cost of the work not to exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars."

But he subsequently withdrew the motion.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution and ordinance.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote (three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof):

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cole, Cudlipp, Gross, Gumbleton, Guntzer, Hess, Keenan, Lysaght, McCarthy, Pinckney, Purroy, J. Reilly, Sauer, Seery, Sheils, and Tuomey—17.

Negative—Aldermen Billings, Morris, and Wade—3.
