SIR—In accordance with the provisions of section 1168, title 1, chapter 19 of the Charter, the Board of Health has the honor to present the following report of the operations of the Department of Health for the year ending December 31, 1899:

PUBLIC HEALTH.

The health of the City during the past year has been excellent. 65,343 deaths were reported, giving a death rate of 18.41 on an estimated population of 3,550,053. These deaths were distributed among the different boroughs as follows:

The number of deaths was less than in 1898 in every borough, being the lowest in Brooklyn, as it was also in the previous year.

The death rate of New York was lower in 1899 than in any of the large cities of Europe, as shown by the following table:

The diminished mortality of the past year is to be attributed partly to the mild temperature of the summer months, which generally have the highest death rates of the year. In the early months, however, the influenza was prevalent and the mortality thereby greatly increased, so that the monthly average for the year did not differ greatly from that of 1898.

The mortality of The City of New York has shown a declining tendency for many years, notwithstanding occasional breaks in the curve, caused, as a rule, by unusual meteorological conditions, like the prolonged hot weather of 1872, 1881 and 1896, or the prevalence of widespread epidemics, like the influenza. The following table gives the deaths and death rates for the past twenty years:

The decline in the mortality was interrupted during the quinquennium 1890-94 by the successive epidemics of influenza, which swept over the world, greatly increasing the reported mortality in every country where such records are kept.

The remarkable decrease within the last five years may possibly prove to be less than supposed on account of overestimated population. This will soon be determined by the results of the United States census, which is being taken when this report is written. In any event, the decrease in the mortality has been continuous and considerable, for the 20 per cent. decrease in the death rate cannot possibly be due to an overestimate of 20 per cent. in the population, as this would allow for almost no increase since the United States census of 1890.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

The number of cases of contagious and infectious diseases reported showed a considerable decrease, viz.: 33,486 in 1899 against 37,637 in 1898. The decrease was greatest in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, as follows:

The only increase was in Richmond, and was due to scarlet fever and typhoid fever, in each of which there was an increase of about 100 per cent., the reported cases of scarlet fever being 122 and of typhoid fever 135 in 1899, against 65 and 61, respectively, in 1898.

The greatest decrease was in the Borough of The Bronx, amounting to almost 50 per cent., viz.: 1,504 in 1899, against 3,003 in 1898. This decrease was mainly in measles and scarlet fever, the figures being respectively 468 and 346 in 1899, against 1,241 and 980 in 1898.

As to the prevalence of the more important of these diseases, there was an increase of diphtheria in Manhattan and Queens and a decrease in the other boroughs. A slight increase of measles in Brooklyn and decrease elsewhere, and an increase of scarlet fever in Queens and Richmond, with a decrease in all the other boroughs.

The deaths varied in the different boroughs in pretty much the same way, the total being much smaller in 1899 than in 1898, as follows:

In both of these tables the diseases included are those which are considered amenable to the recognized methods of sanitary control, viz.: diphtheria, croup, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox.

Of the latter disease there were 99 cases and 18 deaths in 1899 against 16 cases and 1 death in 1898.

DIARRHEAL DISEASES.

This class of diseases, usually looked upon as a test of the sanitary condition of a community, has shown a declining tendency for several years. The following table gives the deaths, by boroughs, from diarrheal diseases (including gastro-enteritis and enteritis):

This decrease was, of course, partly if not mainly due to the remarkably equable temperature of the summer months, which passed with a quite unusual absence of prolonged periods of hot weather.

INFANT MORTALITY.

The mortality among infants is another sensitive test of sanitary condition. The following table shows the number of deaths, by boroughs, of infants under one year of age:

The total percentage of decrease was 8.3, there having been a slight increase in the Borough of Richmond, the reason for which does not appear; but as there are several nurseries on Staten Island where infants are taken from other boroughs, an increase in the number of inmates may account for the slight increase of deaths, e. g., in the Seaside Hospital of St. John's Guild there were 39 deaths of children in 1899 against 25 in 1898.

The deaths of children under five years of age constituted a smaller percentage of the total number of deaths than ever before in the history of the Department of Health. Although this percentage has shown a declining tendency for many years there have been only two abrupt descents in the curve, one in 1883 and the other within the past three years.

The following table shows the pertinent statistics for ten years past for the old City of New York:

BUBONIC PLAGUE.

The most striking incident of the year was the arrival at this port, for the first time in its history, of that terror of the ages, the Eastern or Bubonic plague. The British steamship "J. W. Taylor," from Santos, Brazil, October 24, with a cargo of coffee, entered the harbor November 18, with two cases of this disease on board, the steward having died of the disease when fourteen days out, and the captain and cook having been seized on November 7. The patients were removed to the Quarantine Hospital and both recovered, the vessel being detained about ten days.

The subsequent action taken by the Board of Health, as indicated by the series of hearings and resolutions given below, was considered by it to be fully justified by the novelty of the situation and the imminence of the peril.

The matter was first brought officially to the attention of the Board by an application from the agents, on behalf of the owners of the vessel, for permission to dock her at her wharf in the Borough of Brooklyn. At the regular meeting held November 29, 1899, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

"Whereas, An application has been made to the Board of Health by Busk & Jevons, agents for the owners of the ship 'J. W. Taylor,' for a permit allowing the said ship and its cargo to be landed within the jurisdiction of The City of New York; and

Whereas, It has come to the knowledge of the Board of Health that the said ship 'J. W. Taylor' cleared from the port of Santos, Brazil, during a period when the said port was infected with the bubonic plague; and the Board of Health having investigated and satisfied itself that the said disease is an infectious disease; and there is every reason to believe that the ship and the cargo contained therein will be likely, if permitted to land within the jurisdiction of this city, to endanger the public health, and the landing and discharge of the cargo within the jurisdiction of The City of New York would be dangerous to the public health and imperil the lives and health of the inhabitants of The City of New York; now, therefore, for the purpose of averting the same, and for the protection of the inhabitants of The City of New York, the Board, deeming that the lives and health of said inhabitants are likely to be seriously imperiled and affected if said ship or any part of its cargo be permitted to come within the jurisdiction of the city; it is

Resolved, That the application for a permit be and the same is hereby denied; and it is further

Resolved, That the President of this Board shall cause such measures to be taken as will notify the owners or consignees of said ship 'J. W. Taylor' and such other persons as may have connection therewith, that under no circumstances will the Board of Health permit either said ship or its cargo to be brought to or landed anywhere within The City of New York; and that if said cargo is brought within the jurisdiction of The City of New York, it will be taken possession of by the Board of Health, to the end that the same may be examined, and if found essential to the preservation of health, condemned, as likely to prove dangerous to the life and detrimental to the health of the inhabitants of this city; it is further

Resolved, That the President of this Board be and is hereby directed to cause a notice to be served upon the owner or owners of the lighters which have been used for the purpose of transferring the cargo from said ship 'J. W. Taylor,' that said lighters will not be again permitted to land at any of the docks or wharves within The City of New York until said lighters have been properly examined and their sanitary condition passed upon by the Board of Health; and the Sanitary Superintendent is hereby directed to take such measures as may be necessary to carry out the purpose of this resolution."

During the following week several communications from individuals and commercial bodies were received relating to the matter, which were considered at the regular meeting of December 6, and disposed of as follows:

"The report of the Sanitary Superintendent in respect to the application of Busk & Jevons, agents, to dock the steamship 'J. W. Taylor' at the wharf in the Borough of Brooklyn was ordered on file."

"A communication in respect to general order to send the cargo of the steamship 'J. W. Taylor' to the General Order Stores, at Erie basin, Brooklyn, was received from Special Deputy Collector of the Port J. J. Couch, and ordered on file."

"A communication was received from Funch, Edye & Co., agents, in respect to docking the German steamship 'Raguso' and unloading the cargo therefrom, and the Secretary was directed to request said parties to attend a special meeting of the Board of Health on Saturday, December 9, 1899, at 10 o'clock A. M., for the consideration of said question."

"A petition was received from merchants, dealers, brokers and others connected with the wholesale coffee trade in The City of New York requesting the release of the merchandise in the ship now in the harbor of New York upon which the Board of Health has placed an embargo. The Secretary was directed to acknowledge receipt of said petition, and to notify said parties that a committee of three or five will be heard at a special meeting of the Board of Health to be held Saturday, December 9, 1899, at 10 o'clock A. M., for the consideration of said question."

The special meeting appointed for December 9 was held, the subjects discussed being indicated by the following extract from the minutes:

A copy of a resolution adopted by the Chamber of Commerce in respect to the embargo placed upon steamers arriving from Santos with coffee, on account of the reported presence of bubonic plague at that port, and expressing full confidence in the ability of the Health Officer of the Port fully to protect the city and the country against the introduction of foreign infectious diseases, was received and ordered on file.

A communication, signed by Crossman Bros. for themselves and others, announcing the appointment of a committee of five, representing the coffee trade, steamship business and warehouse interests, to attend a hearing by the Board of Health to consider the matter of the embargo placed upon steamers arriving from Santos with coffee, to be held December 9, 1899, at 10 o'clock A. M., was received and ordered on file.

An application was received from the Merritt & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company for permission to remove five of the lighters loaded with coffee from the steamship 'J. W. Taylor,' and ordered on file.

Petitions signed by members of the Maritime Exchange, bankers and representatives of steamship and insurance companies interested in the export and import trade of The City of New York, requesting a consideration of the present prohibitory orders placed on the landing of the cargoes of coffee from Santos, Brazil, were received and ordered on file.

Mr. Henry W. O. Edye, John C. Seager and Mr. Taylor appeared before the Board and were heard in respect to landing cargoes of coffee from Santos, Brazil."

On December 12, a second special hearing was had upon the same subject, and at the regular meeting on the 13th, the question of allowing the cargoes of coffee then in the lower bay to land in this city was taken up and considered, and, on motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Health, having considered all the facts having reference to the existence of the plague in Brazil, and having heard all the persons who desired to be heard in relation thereto, and having given due consideration to the whole subject; and it appearing to the Board that the United States Treasury Department has formulated rules and regulations for the conduct of health officers under its jurisdiction, in reference to vessels and cargoes arriving from such infected ports; and this Board of Health deeming that the interests of the health of

the people committed to its care require that the greatest caution should be exercised by it, so as to prevent any possibility of the plague being introduced within the city; it is, therefore, by the Board of Health ordered and determined that the cargoes of coffee now in the lower bay, or that may hereafter come therein upon a vessel or vessels which have not received a clean bill of health from their port of clearance, shall be subjected to a full compliance with the regulations of the Treasury Department in regard to sanitary treatment, and such additional regulations as may be required and enforced by the Health Officer of the Port of New York; and that in a case where the Health Officer of the Port shall certify in writing to this Board of Health that all such regulations have been complied with, this Board of Health does further prescribe and require that the coffee arriving shall, after it is removed to lighters, as prescribed by the regulations hereinbefore referred to, be admitted to the city, only, however, in a case where the Health Officer of the Port shall further certify to this Board that the vessel from which said cargo was removed was not infected during her passage nor had any case of infectious disease (plague) on her during said passage, nor during the time of her detention in Quarantine. Provided, further, that in a case where a vessel had any case of infectious disease (plague) on her during her journey, or was infected at the time of her arrival or during the time of her detention at Quarantine, then the coffee shall be removed from the bagging in which the same is, and shall be conveyed, under the jurisdiction of the Board of Health, to the place or places where the same is to be roasted, during all of which time the same shall be under the observation and jurisdiction of this Board; and

Whereas, It is further determined and ordered that the bagging removed be, by the Sanitary Superintendent of this Department, caused to be destroyed by burning, the same to be done at such place as in his judgment may be deemed safe and proper for such disposition; it is

Resolved, That, upon compliance with the foregoing requirements, the President of this Board be and is hereby authorized to issue the necessary permits to carry the same into effect.

This was the final adjustment of the matter, and an subsequent case of the plague developed either in the city or in the harbor.

The routine work of the Department will be found presented in elaborate detail in the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Registrar of Records, forming the supplement to this report.

The enforcement of the orders of the Board, where an appeal to the Courts became necessary, has been attended to in the most efficient manner by the Assistant Corporation Counsel assigned to this Department, whose reports are presented below:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau during the year 1899.

The Sanitary Bureau of the Department of Health is under the charge of the Sanitary Superintendent, assisted by five Assistant Sanitary Superintendents, one in charge of each of the five Boroughs:

F. H. Dillingham, M. D., in charge of the Borough of Manhattan.
Robert A. Black, M. D., in charge of the Borough of Brooklyn.
Eugene Monaghan, M. D., in charge of the Borough of The Bronx.
Obed L. Lusk, M. D., in charge of the Borough of Queens.
John L. Feeny, M. D., in charge of the Borough of Richmond.

The Sanitary Bureau is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting, in proper form, all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health; with the execution of the orders of the Board; with the care of contagious diseases; with the inspection of foods and offensive trades; with the inspection of mercantile establishments and issuance of employment certificates; with the pathological, bacteriological and chemical research and investigations, and with the inspection of scholars attending the public, parochial and private schools.

To the Board of Health:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the report of the Bureau of Records for the year 1899.

GENERAL STATISTICS.

There were reported during the year 77,632 births, 30,474 marriages and 65,343 deaths, showing a decrease of 1,296 births, an increase of 1,589 marriages and a decrease of 951 deaths as compared with 1898.

There was an increase in the number of marriages and a decrease of deaths in every borough, but the decrease in the reported births was almost altogether in the Borough of Manhattan, there having been reported 1,438 less than 1898, with 192 less in Brooklyn, offset by an increase of 147 in The Bronx, of 117 in Queens and of 70 in Richmond.

These figures represent a birth-rate of 21.87 and a marriage-rate of 8.58, or 17.16 of persons married in an estimated population of 3,350,053, against a birth-rate of 22.95 and a marriage-rate of 8.40 in an estimated population of 3,438,899 in 1898.

The marriage-rate is high, ranging from 5.29 in the Borough of Queens to 10.67 in the Borough of Manhattan, and it is probable that nearly all of the marriages are reported. In the absence of a license law, this point cannot be absolutely determined.

A considerable proportion of the births, however, are not reported at all; the number reported for the entire city, 77,632, exceeds the number of deaths by only 12,289, of which 12,206 were in the Borough of Manhattan alone, the deaths in the Borough of Brooklyn exceeding the reported births by 446. The birth-rate in the city must be at least 30 per 1,000, which would give a total of nearly 110,000, or at least 40 per cent. more than are reported at present.

DEATHS.

The deaths during the year numbered 65,343, making the death-rate 18.41 on an estimated population of 3,350,053 against 19.28 in 1898, when the population was estimated to be 3,438,899. The United States census, soon to be taken, will furnish the means for a revision of the estimates of population for the past few years. The deaths were distributed among the boroughs as follows:

The death-rates show a decrease from 1898 in every borough, being the lowest in Brooklyn, as it was also the previous year.

It will be noticed that the chief increases were in tuberculous diseases, pneumonia and Bright's disease, while the largest items of decrease were in diarrhoeal diseases, diseases of the nervous system and accidents. The excess of deaths from the first list of causes was due to the prevalence of influenza during the earlier months of the year, and the diminished number of deaths from the second list was mainly due to the mildness of the weather throughout the summer and autumn months. The excess of deaths in 1899, during the first six months of the year, was more than counterbalanced by the diminished mortality of the second half, as is shown by the following table:

INFLUENZA.

The influenza has now been prevalent in this city, in greater or less degree, for ten years, in marked contrast to previous visitations of the disease, such as those in the latter part of the eighteenth century and in 1848 and 1849, when two or three years of great discomfort and increased mortality were followed by the entire disappearance of the disease. It appears now to have become a permanent addition to the morbid influences in Europe and America, and although its visitations are less sudden and alarming than at first, it forms no inconsiderable factor in the mortality every year.

The latest epidemic began in November, 1898, culminated in December, and dragged along until the following May, when it disappeared. In November, 1899, it reappeared and extended into the following year with increasing violence. The following table shows the course of influenza and pneumonia throughout 1898 and 1899:

The close correspondence in the number of deaths from pneumonia in each year during the months that were free from the disturbing influence of the influenza is quite striking.

The following table shows the number of deaths from influenza by months since it first appeared in 1890. The epidemic started here in December, 1889, when there were seven deaths attributed to the disease. In this table are given all the deaths reported by physicians as due to influenza alone or to influenza complicated with bronchitis or pneumonia, but no others:

The greatest number of deaths is thus shown to have occurred in 1891 and the least in 1896. The heaviest average monthly mortality was in January, and the next heaviest in April, with December and February following nearly abreast.

It is very plain that this disease attacks chiefly the adult portion of the population, the absolute mortality, and much more, the relative mortality increasing with age. Those of sixty-five years of age and upward suffer the most, and especially females. Under forty-five, the excess of deaths is among those of the male sex, but above that age the excess of deaths among females is so great that out of the grand total for the ten years of 3,796 deaths, 2,042, or nearly 54 per cent., were females. Of both sexes, 3,028, or nearly 80 per cent., were twenty-five or upward; 2,135, or more than 56 per cent., were forty-five or more, and 1,047 or almost 28 per cent., were sixty-five years old or upward.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

Every one of these diseases showed a decrease in 1899 with the single exception of diphtheria (including croup), which showed an increase of 146, mostly in the Borough of Manhattan, as shown in the following table.

This is the first interruption of the steady annual decrease of deaths from these diseases since 1894, when the use of antitoxin was first begun. Even now, the total number of deaths from diphtheria and croup in 1899, in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (the former city of New York) was lower than for any year since 1871, when there were 704.

DIARRHOEAL DISEASES.

For many years there has been a steady decrease in the number of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases. In 1899 the decrease was 1,399, as compared with 1898. This very large decrease was mainly due to the remarkably even and temperate weather of the summer months. In July, August and September, for example, the total deaths from all causes in 1899 were 17,102, as against 19,665 in 1898—a difference of 2,473. Of these totals, 8,020 in 1899 were deaths of children under five years of age, against 9,870 in 1898—a decrease of 1,850. The greater part of this decrease was in diarrhoeal diseases during the summer quarter, there having been 2,412 deaths from diseases of that class in 1899, against 3,867 in 1898—a decrease of 1,455.

Beside the deaths directly stated in the certificates as due to diarrhoeal diseases, there were many deaths classified as gastro-enteritis and enteritis, a very large proportion of which were undoubtedly diarrhoeal.

The following table gives, by boroughs, the number of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, gastro-enteritis and enteritis in 1898 and 1899:

The decrease in 1899 was 1,291, of which 921 was in the Borough of Manhattan, and 357 in the Borough of Brooklyn, while in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond there was an actual increase in deaths of this class, amounting in Richmond to more than 13 per cent.

The greater portion of the decrease was not in July (usually the hottest month of the year) but in August and September, as is clear from the following table, giving the mortality from the same diseases by months, for the third, or summer quarter of the year.

INFANT MORTALITY.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered only 23,801, against 25,499 in 1898, constituting only 36.42 per cent of the total number of deaths, a surprising showing, although the percentage has exhibited a declining tendency for many years, as the following table demonstrates:

These figures of infant mortality, together with the table of deaths from diarrheal diseases, seem to indicate a better food supply, especially milk supply, in Manhattan than in the other boroughs.

ACCIDENTAL DEATHS.

The total number of deaths by accident was 2,600, against 2,861 in 1898, a decrease of 261. This decrease was due to the mild temperature of the summer months, the number of sunstrokes, which are included in this class, being only 141, against 549 in 1898.

The first death recorded in this Bureau from an automobile accident, and the only one during the year, occurred in the Borough of Manhattan. There were 10 deaths by bicycle accidents, of which 7 were in Manhattan, 2 in Brooklyn and 1 in Richmond. There were 20 deaths by cable cars, of which 19 were in Manhattan and 1 in Brooklyn; and 20 by horse cars, all in Manhattan. Of the 127 deaths by trolley-car accidents 48 were in Manhattan and 62 in Brooklyn.

There was one death during the year from that rare form of disease known as the "calisson disease," due to abnormal air pressure.

SUICIDES.

There were 628 suicides during the year, against 695 in 1898, a decrease of 67. 465, about three-quarters of the entire number, were males, and 163 females. 200 were natives of Germany, and 201 of the United States, the remaining third being divided among other nationalities.

Poison, as usual, was the favorite means employed for quitting this life, there having been 350 such cases, 217 males and 133 females, more than one-half of the entire number of suicides.

The poison most frequently used, as has been the case for several years, was carbolic acid. There were 201 of these, 113 males and 88 females.

The second poison in numerical importance was illuminating gas, accounting for the death of 70 males and 33 females. Gunshot wounds caused the death of 131 males and 5 females; while opium and its preparations, probably on account of the difficulty in purchasing them, were used by only 12—8 males and 4 females.

BIRTHS.

The number of births reported during the year was 77,632, against 78,928 in 1898. This is certainly not more than two-thirds of the true number, but all attempts to procure more complete returns have so far proved futile. The births are more generally reported in the Borough of Manhattan than in the other boroughs, there being an excess of births over deaths of 12,206, while in Brooklyn the deaths exceeded the births by 446.

Of the 77,632 births reported, 42,771, a trifle over 55 per cent., were reported by physicians, and 34,861, a little less than 45 per cent., by midwives. These proportions are almost exactly the same as in 1898. There is good reason to believe, as shown in former reports, that physicians are the chief delinquents in making these reports. Indeed, among the so-called upper classes, the report of a birth in this Bureau is of comparatively infrequent occurrence.

The male births numbered 40,013 and the female 37,619, about 1.063 males to every 1,000 females. This is a higher proportion than usual for this city, the proportion usually ranging from about 1,040 to 1,050. There were 572 pairs of twins reported, about one in every 136; and 1,337 births were reported as illegitimate, about 1.72 per cent.

SEARCHES AND TRANSCRIPTS.

22,611 searches were made of the records of births, marriages and deaths, and 19,395 transcripts from them were issued, against 21,124 and 18,753, respectively, in 1898; an increase of 1,487 searches and 642 transcripts.

NOVEMBER 10, 1900.

Right Rev. HENRY C. POTTER, Bishop of New York, Lafayette place, New York:

RIGHT REV. SIR—The Police Board has, under date of the 16th inst., received a communication from the Hon. Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor of the City, transmitting a communication from you dated November 15, and which communication in part states as follows:

"The statement now in my possession of two clergymen of the highest character contains the testimony of two men given without exaggeration, with the most painstaking reserve, and with absolute truthfulness. In substance it is briefly this: that when one of them complained to a Police Captain of a condition of things in his immediate neighborhood, whose disgusting infamy is a matter of common notoriety—a condition of things easily verified by any intelligent citizen who passes through the streets in which it exists—he was told that he lied; and that when, disheartened by such an experience, he carried his complaint to a higher authority in the Police Force, he was met with insolent derision."

The first knowledge that any member of the Police Board had of this alleged insult, was conveyed in the public prints of September 28, which reported the proceedings of the Episcopal Convention having reference to this subject-matter. The resolution adopted by such convention, called for an investigation by you, and, if the facts justified it, the presentation of a suitable communication to his Honor, the Mayor.

In view of this resolution, the Police Board has awaited the result of your investigation and such action as you should deem necessary.

The receipt of your communication from the Mayor places the matter now before the Board for its action, and to the end that proper charges may be formulated against the officers complained of, the preparation of which necessarily requires a specific statement of the dates and times of the alleged offense, and the person against whom the offense was committed, I respectfully request that you cause to be submitted to me for the use of the Board the name of the person or persons against whom the offense was committed, the date or dates of its occurrence, and the language used, as nearly as may be.

Upon the receipt of such information, charges will be formulated and preferred against the officers who may be named.

The practice of the Police Board has been to permit the appearance of counsel for the party making complaint on the trial had against a member of the force. In this case, however, there is no desire that the complaint should be made by the party to whom the alleged insult was given, the Police Board preferring the charge. It will, however, permit, and it most earnestly requests that you designate some counselor-at-law who will represent you in the prosecution of his complaint, and, if in his judgment it is deemed best, the form of complaint may be drafted by such counsel.

In reference to the statements contained in your communication as to open and public

violations of law and discipline in the neighborhood of the Pro-Cathedral, the Board has taken action thereon.
