Hon. JAMES KANE, Commissioner of Sewers:

DEAR SIR—In compliance with your instructions I hand you herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, for the quarter ending December 31, 1899.

17,720 linear feet of sewer and 38 basins connected therewith have been built, making the present total length of the sewerage system of this borough 2,582,184 linear feet (489,  $\frac{8}{10}$  miles), with 5,847 receiving-basins, which number includes 21 built under special contract, as hereinafter stated. In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Department.

Hon. JAMES KANE, Commissioner of Sewers:

DEAR SIR—I submit herewith the operations of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter ending December 31, 1899.

The total length of sewers in the streets of this borough on the 31st day of December, 1899, is 633,304 miles.

During the quarter there has been built 33,384.10 linear feet of pipe sewers, and 3,287.50 linear feet of brick sewers, or 6.323 miles, and .622 miles respectively; a total length of both brick and pipe sewers of 6.945 linear miles.

The receiving-basins, constructed and connected with the above total mileage of sewers in the streets of this borough reaches a total of 7,523 and of this total of receiving-basins, 26 were built during the last quarter of the year, ending the 31st of December, 1899.

356 manholes also were built during said quarter.  
During the quarter 65 contracts have been in force: of this number 13 contracts have been completed; 13 contracts have been entered into; 26 contracts have been in course of construction; 26 contracts have been completed, but are under the guarantee period for repairs to pavements, etc.; 4 of the number entered into have been completed; 3 contracts have not been begun in construction.

In all of the contracts in force during the quarter, 15 have been built by private individuals, pursuant to section 560 of the Charter of Greater New York.

In addition to this 21 contracts have been authorized by the Board of Public Improvements, of which number proposals have been received for 11, but contracts not as yet consummated, and the remaining 10 are in the stage of the preparation of plans and specifications for the receipt of proposals.

In the tabulated statements, which are a part of this report, will be found details of the work accurately set forth.

The reports of the Chief Engineer and Superintendent of Sewers, herewith appended, show in detail the work performed in the construction of sewers and the maintenance of the sewerage system.
