### PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

New York, September 21, 1905.

At a meeting of the New York Adult Blind Protective Union, held on September 11, 1905, a resolution was unanimously passed expressing the union's deep appreciation and gratitude to the Commissioner of the Charity Department of this City for his humane act in securing an increase of the annual donation which the City pays to its blind.

The union also voted its thanks to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the Honorable Board of Aldermen and to his Honor the Mayor for favoring the increase; and the President and Secretary were empowered to convey in some suitable manner to all the aforesaid gentlemen the action and sentiments of the union.

The donation paid this year is the largest since 1897, as for the last few years the amount had been decreasing. Many of the recipients of this donation, especially the women, live with their friends, and can scarcely earn a penny from one donation to the next, so that the increase is a great blessing to them, while the rest of the recipients use the money to pay rent, back debts, to buy clothing, fuel, etc.

On the whole the union can assure the Commissioner and others that the recipients in general use the money to the very best advantage, and that in conveying this vote of thanks they express the sentiments not only of the members of the union, but of every blind person who is benefited by the donation.

### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals:

New York, September 8, 1905.

Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals received on August 7 a special report rendered by Hugh Bonner, Esq., Advisory Member upon Fire Protection, New York City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association, on the subject of fire protection at Bellevue Hospital. This report indicated so alarming a state of affairs that the Fire Commissioner was requested to have the building inspected and report on its condition. The General Medical Superintendent requested the officer who made this inspection to bear in mind in his recommendations that provision had been made for a new Bellevue Hospital and that the present building would be occupied in all likelihood but six or eight years longer, so that any alterations would be in the nature of temporary advantage to the City. The representative of the Fire Department, however, has made recommendations that will entail extensive alterations and repairs, and, in view of the fact that it will be at least four or five years before the portion of the building criticised at present can be entirely vacated of patients, we feel that these recommendations should receive careful attention at your hands. A copy of the recommendations made by the Fire Department is herewith inclosed.

The Board of Trustees deems it its duty to present this matter for your immediate consideration, and would respectfully request that you make such appropriation as will be needed to make the alterations recommended so as to afford protection against loss of life in the event of fire.

Recommendations of Thomas King, Acting Chief of Battalion in Charge, Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances, Fire Department, City of New York.

Under this heading the larger buildings, comprising the group, are to be considered more so than the one and two story structures which are as a rule properly provided with necessary appliances.

### Fire Escapes.

1. Remove wooden floors from present balcony fire escapes on main buildings and substitute iron or fireproof floors.
2. Provide iron balcony outside fire escapes on dispensary building.
3. All shafts, wooden stairs and stairway inclosures to be constructed of fireproof material.

All lathe and plaster ceilings in cellars and other rooms, where necessary (especially where same is broken) be fire-stopped or sheathed with metal.

\*Have present elevator in main building inspected as to safety by the Department of Buildings.

All openings around water, steam and gas pipes that pass through floors, partitions, walls and ceilings, should be fire-stopped and provided with metal sleeves.

Fire doors in attic of main building should be made automatic, or self-closing, as present arrangement of leaving same open, is contrary to purpose intended to prevent the spread of fire over entire area; whitewash roof beams and side walls with two coats of rock lime.

Present electrical wiring should be placed in iron pipe, as same is not properly protected, particularly in attic where it is strung along wooden beams and side wall.

Extend present standpipes to attic floors and provide hose to cover same.

Entire interior alarm in all buildings is defective and requires overhauling, or install a more improved system throughout.

Present dry system of standpipes is disapproved, and tanks of sufficient capacity should be placed on roofs of buildings having standpipe, and connect standpipes to same so as to have a constant supply of water at all times, and avoid any delay that may occur through failure to notify engineer of pumping station in the event of fire, and replace all nozzles wherever missing from hose connections.

Close up passageway in rear of amphitheatre seats, or make same fireproof with metal sheathing.

\*These recommendations have already been attended to.



\*Discontinue practice of placing cloth material on or near steam pipes, and clean up cellar used for storage of drugs, chemicals, etc.

The building used by the Charities Department, drug store and cellar for storage of same in main building, is more or less of a menace, and I would recommend that same be removed from present location to a point nearer the river's edge, and separate from other buildings.

\*Provide time detectors to record movements of watchmen.

\*The fire hydrants on grounds, of which there are several, are supplied by 6-inch main, which should be replaced with a main of larger capacity. I was informed that the Department of Water Supply had same under consideration.

Sir—Hon. Thomas K. Paulding, Secretary and Acting President Board of Trustees, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, in communication under date of September 8, 1905, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$34,335, to be used for certain alterations to the buildings and present fire protection devices of Bellevue Hospital.

It is proposed to expend the money as follows:

I would report that I am heartily in favor of such alterations and additions to the present fire appliances necessary to insure the safety of the occupants of Bellevue Hospital in the event of fire.

I have examined the premises with Chief Beggin, in charge of Auxiliary Fire Appliances of the Fire Department, and while he does not wish to change the report and recommendations of Acting Chief King, he agrees with me that some of the items may be omitted and the results required will be substantially obtained.

I therefore estimate that \$22,100 will allow for sufficient additions and alterations to the present fire appliances to make the buildings reasonably safe in the event of fire, subdivided as follows:

Mason work, taking down all lath and plaster partitions of stair walls and replacing same with fireproof blocks and closing all openings, etc....	\$10,000 00
Carpentry and painting .....	200 00
Automatic regulator on pump to keep up pressure and addition of pressure regulating valves where necessary.....	1,500 00
Repairs to present stand pipes and connections .....	300 00
Putting in working order the present fire alarm system.....	500 00
Fireproof flooring put on balconies in place of present wood flooring..	7,000 00
Metal ceiling in cellar and amphitheatre .....	600 00
Fire escapes for dormitory building .....	2,000 00

The work being necessary I recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$22,100, to provide for additions and alterations to the buildings and present fire appliances at Bellevue Hospital.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 280 Broadway, New York City:

Gentlemen—The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals has the honor to forward herewith reports from the advisory member of the New York City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association, and also from Mr. Thomas King, Acting Chief of Battalion in charge of the Bureau of Violations and Auxiliary Fire Appliances, which reports condemn the present structural arrangements of Bellevue Hospital, and indicate that there would be a serious menace to the safety of the inmates in the event of fire. The Board had hoped that it would be possible to proceed with the construction of the new Bellevue Hospital, and that, by rapid progress of the work, the need for expenditures on the building (which will be occupied in all likelihood but six or eight years longer) would be avoided. The General Medical Superintendent requested the representative of the Fire Department to bear that matter in mind in making his recommendations, but his report indicates that, in his opinion, there is considerable hazard.

To make the necessary alterations recommended in these reports it is estimated that the following amounts will be needed:

Hon. JAMES W. STEVENSON, Deputy and Acting Comptroller:

Sir—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held July 31, 1903, adopted a resolution authorizing the acquisition of a site bounded by Court street, Thompson avenue and the Long Island Railroad Company, in the Borough of Queens, for the erection thereon of a Borough Hall in said borough, at a price not exceeding \$32,000.

The entire site is now vested in The City of New York, and I understand from the Chief Bookkeeper of this Department that the entire appropriation for its acquisition has been used.

The Title Guaranty and Trust Company of the Borough of Brooklyn made an examination of the titles to the property included within the area of the site, and under date of May 26, 1905, transmits a bill for the examination of the title of the property amounting to \$347.48. This office requested the President of the Borough of Queens to draw a voucher for the payment of the bills, and in a communication under date of July 18, 1905, returns bills and states:

"In connection therewith to say that he never ordered nor requested the work done, has no knowledge of the same and will not draw voucher therefor."

As this office has no means of drawing a voucher for the payment of the bills, I would respectfully transmit the same to you, in order that an application may be made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an issue of Corporate Stock for the payment of the same.

Dear Sir—I would respectfully ask that, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will authorize the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for repairs to steamboats of this Department.

Sir—Hon. Francis J. Lantry, Commissioner, Department of Correction, in communication under date of August 24, 1905, requests the Board of Estimate and Appor-



tionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$5,000, to be used for repairs to steamboats of the Department of Correction.

I would report that an appropriation of \$15,175, made in the beginning of the year for "alterations and repairs of buildings, apparatus and steamboats," only \$158 remains of the Corporate Stock, amounting to \$25,000, authorized February 24, 1905, and of a held-over balance of \$65.12, but \$2.12 remains, giving money available for present purposes, only \$160.12. The amount asked for is to be used as follows:

In Commissioner Lantry's application, the cost of a new rudder stock is stated as \$1,500, and the figure of \$2,100 has since been obtained from the lowest of the bids submitted for this item. A wooden stock ship, in the spring of this year, having become broken in use, the need of a steel one is apparent. Neglect to comply with the orders of the Government authorities in altering entrances to cabins, installing new life boats, etc., would result in the tying up of the steamer "Minnahanonck."

The need of prison pens on the steamer "Massasoit" has been demonstrated by the escape, during this year, of four or five prisoners. The repairs to the steamer "Bronx" consist of the installation of new guard rails and other minor changes.

The work being necessary, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly authorize the Comptroller, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$5,000, for the purpose of repairs to steamboats of the Department of Correction.

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that, according to the weekly financial statement submitted by the Auditor on September 25, 1905, the balance at its disposal for the erection of buildings and the equipment thereof is \$1,641,209.76; that the estimated cost of the equipment of new buildings and of additions to old buildings now under contract amounts to \$1,489,252, and that the estimated cost of new buildings and additions to old buildings, plans and specifications for which are ready, and proposals for the construction of which are about to be solicited, amounts to \$1,800,675, making a total of \$3,289,927, which should be provided as soon as possible in order that necessary work may be prosecuted.

Your Committee further reports that on February 6, 1905 (see Journal, pages 223-227), the Board of Education adopted resolutions requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock during the year 1905 to the amount of \$12,737,751 for the erection, equipment and improvement of school buildings and the acquisition of sites therefor.

On February 11, 1905, said latter Board authorized the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$3,500,000, and on February 24, 1905, to the further amount of \$5,000,000, making a total of \$8,500,000, out of which, on the request of the Committee on Buildings, the Board of Education turned over to the Committee on Sites for its use, on March 29, 1905, the sum of \$1,500,000, and on June 14, 1905, the further sum of \$500,000, or a total of \$2,000,000. This left at the disposal of the Committee on Buildings the sum of \$6,500,000, all of which has been expended, with the exception of the above mentioned balance, \$1,641,209.76.

As above stated, there will be needed the sum of \$3,289,927 for the equipment of new buildings and additions now under contract and for new buildings and additions, contracts for which are about to be let.

Furthermore, the Committee on Sites is prevented by lack of funds from selecting school sites which are very much needed, and it would seem necessary that a further sum of \$2,000,000 should be turned over to said Committee, so that its work may not be brought to a standstill.

These amounts form an aggregate which will be increased by contingent liabilities for the remainder of the year.

In view of the pressing need for school accommodations, your Committee therefore recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock for so much as still remains unauthorized of the amount asked for on February 6, 1905, viz., \$4,237,751, and submits for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the immediate issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$4,237,751 for the erection, equipment and improvement of school buildings and the acquisition of sites therefor.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of three million dollars (\$3,000,000), to provide means for constructing, improving, permanently bettering and equipping school buildings and additions thereto and the acquisition of sites therefor in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment September 29,

1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding three million dollars (\$3,000,000), to provide means for constructing, improving, permanently bettering and equipping school buildings and additions thereto and the acquisition of sites therefor in The City of New York, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding three million dollars (\$3,000,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Dear Sir—I respectfully request that your Honorable Board adopt a resolution at its next meeting authorizing me to expend without public letting the sum of thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300), for repairing the brickwork of the furnaces of the various public buildings in this borough, and nineteen hundred dollars (\$1,900) for new grates for the same structures. In order that these furnaces may be put in proper repair before the cold weather it will be necessary to proceed with this work at once. As these expenditures may be made chargeable to the "Supplies and Repairs" account of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, I am not asking for any extra appropriation, but am desirous of avoiding the delay made necessary by advertised contracts. Estimates for both these propositions were opened in this office and the total list of the bids for the brickwork was about \$1,200, and for the grates, about \$1,800. I have mentioned a slightly larger figure in each case to cover possible emergencies which cannot now be foreseen and which may require additional orders. As there seems to be some doubt as to whether I am justified in issuing open orders without public letting for both these propositions on the ground that each building would be considered as a unit of computation concerning the one-thousand-dollar clause in the Charter, I respectfully ask that the proper resolution be prepared authorizing me to proceed with this work without advertised contract.

Gentlemen—The Williamsburg Bridge has for more than a year been lighted under contract by the Edison Electric Illuminating Companies, these companies furnishing the electric wiring and fixtures on the bridge necessary for lighting the same.

This Department is now building a lighting plant on Delancey street, under the bridge, and will be ready in a few weeks to cancel the contract with the illuminating companies, and light the bridge itself.

When the contract is canceled the illuminating companies will naturally remove their wiring and fixtures, and this Department will be obliged to replace these items. This change would require considerable time, and would involve considerable cost. I have secured from the companies prices at which they will sell to the Department the wiring and fixtures which they have installed on the bridge, and these prices are as follows:

The New York Edison Company, wiring, fixtures, etc., at the Manhattan terminal of Williamsburg Bridge.....	\$600 00
The Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Brooklyn, wiring, fixtures, etc., at the Brooklyn terminal.....	3,066 52

Making a total of..... \$3,666 52

The amounts charged by the Edison companies represent the cost to them of this wiring etc., and are much less than the Department could duplicate them for at the present time; and this purchase will obviate entirely the inconvenience to the traveling public of the tearing up of pavement, removing of conduits, etc., and the relaying of similar material in its place.

The price of the Brooklyn Edison Company is naturally greater because it includes the conduits, poles, wires, etc., requisite for the lighting of the Brooklyn plaza of the bridge. In order to replace this material a large portion of the asphalt pavement on the plaza would have to be removed and relaid, involving the inconvenience above referred to.

I would respectfully request from your Honorable Board the approval of the purchase, without advertisement and public letting, of the above-mentioned material from the two Edison companies at a cost not exceeding the amount named, \$3,666.52, under the authority vested in your Honorable Board by chapter 419 of the City Charter.

If this approval is granted the Department can begin the lighting of the Williamsburg Bridge on its own account as soon as the electrical plant is completed, on or before the 1st of November, thereby avoiding inconvenience to the public and saving several thousand dollars which it would be necessary to expend if the old work is removed and new work is put in its place.

AN ORDINANCE to promote public morality in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall expose, display, post up, exhibit, paint, print or mark, nor place or cause to be placed, nor suffer to continue when placed, any placard, poster, bill or picture of any show, exhibition, theatrical or other performance in or on any building, bill-board, wall or fence on any street in The City of New York, unless such placard, poster, bill or picture shall have first been approved by the Police Commissioner or some person designated by him. And the Police Commissioner or person so designated shall exclude such placards, posters, bills or pictures as are of lewd, indecent, immoral, immodest, vulgar or suggestive character, calculated to debauch the public or shock the sense of decency or propriety.

Sec. 2. Each and every violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the City Prison or by both, but no such imprisonment, however, shall exceed a term of ten days.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to promote public morality in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. No person shall expose, display, post up, exhibit, paint, print or mark, nor place or cause to be placed, any placard, poster, bill or picture of any show, exhibition, theatrical or other performance in or on any building, billboard, wall or fence on any street, nor in or upon any public place, in The City of New York, which shall be of lewd, indecent, immoral, immodest, vulgar or suggestive character, calculated to debauch the public or shock the sense of decency or propriety.

Sec. 2. Any violation of the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance shall be deemed a minor offence, and upon conviction thereof before a City Magistrate shall be punishable by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars; or by imprisonment in the City Prison, or by both; but no such imprisonment, however, shall exceed a term of ten days.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to hand you herewith a report which was presented to them at their meeting on June 20,

and to request that additional appropriations for their department be provided for by an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$50,000, as follows: \$40,000 for Supplies and Contingencies, \$3,000 for Salaries, and \$7,000 for Additions, Alterations and Repairs.

Thanks to the increased provision of beds at Bellevue Hospital by the erection of the portable Ducker buildings last February, we have not been under such pressure to transfer patients to the hospitals on Blackwell's Island. Previous to that time we received a report about once a week from these institutions, of the death of a patient occurring within seventy-two hours after the time of transfer. Since then there has not been a single report of a death, although there are, no doubt, still cases of hardship involved in the transfer of patients from our wards on account of the need of beds for our incoming acute cases.

The increased census, resulting from the larger number of persons applying for relief at the hospital and from our keeping these patients for a longer period than formerly, has naturally caused an increase in the expense of the department, as shown in Dr. Gregory's letter.

To the Board of Trustees, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals:

Gentlemen—I beg to submit the following report to your Honorable Board regarding the matter of additional appropriations under the following items:

Under the item "Supplies and Contingencies," an additional appropriation of \$40,000 will be needed. Our appropriation under this item for the current year is \$350,460.78, of which we have spent during the first five months \$163,627.78. During the corresponding period of the year 1904 our expenditures under this heading were \$143,788.17, showing an increase in 1905 of \$19,839.61. However, of this amount \$10,000 expended for furniture and fittings in the new portable buildings was an extraordinary expense, and this, deducted from the above, leaves a net increase of \$9,839.61, or 6.85 per cent. This increased amount was required on account of our increase in daily census. During the first five months of the year 1905 the average daily census of the Department, based on patients, was 1,161, compared with 1,094 during the corresponding period of the previous year, an average daily increase of 67 patients, or 6½ per cent.

It will be observed that the increased expenditures are proportionate to our increase in population, and scarcely increase our per capita cost. This increase in census has resulted from the fact that we are no longer compelled to transfer patients to other institutions before they are in a fit condition to go, as heretofore, which dangerous custom was necessitated by our constant endeavor to make room for those more urgently needing the accommodations of the hospital. The increase of census due to natural increase in population of the City must also be considered.

Assuming that there will be the same proportionate increase in census and consequent expense for the remainder of the year, which, from present indications, will undoubtedly be the fact, an additional appropriation of \$40,000 under this item will be required to offset the threatened deficit of \$28,553.96 (\$18,533.96 for increased census and \$10,000 for furnishings in portable buildings), and provide for unforeseen emergencies, such as epidemics, intense and continuous heat, etc. It must be remembered that the above estimate is based on the patients alone, and that the increase of help, as a result of increased census, must also be considered.

Under the item "Additions, Alterations and Repairs," we shall need an additional \$7,000. As you are well aware, the buildings are old and in need of constantly increasing repairs. The above will hardly be adequate if the greatly needed central sterilization plant is installed.

Under the item of "Salaries" we should have a special appropriation of \$3,000 to carry into effect the improvements in the management and personnel of the Reception Office. In this office patients and visitors are first received and their impression of the hospital in general is largely dependent upon the way they are here treated. It is very important therefore that it be brought to as high a degree of efficiency as possible. In compliance with the request of your Board, I have carefully inquired into the conditions existing in this office and beg to offer the following tentative suggestions for improving the efficiency of this important department.

1. A position should be created for a capable man who should have entire charge of this office and be held strictly responsible for the proper conduct of this department. A man capable of properly filling such a position cannot be obtained for less than \$900 per annum.

2. Still more important is our force of Stretcher Carriers. These men transport the patients from the ambulances to the wards and come in intimate contact with the patients, their friends and visitors. Neat, orderly appearance, as well as kind, gentlemanly conduct, is therefore most especially desirable in this class of employees. We pay our Stretcher Carriers only \$12.50 per month, increasing to \$20 after several months of service. For such small compensation it is impossible to secure the grade of men we require, and consequently most of our men are recruited from lodging-houses and similar places, remaining with us but a short while. To get proper men for this class of work it would be necessary, I think, to pay \$30 to \$35 per month.

3. The employment of a female graduate Nurse in our male insane ward has proven satisfactory, and I think the substitution of a female graduate Nurse for the male Nurse now employed in the Reception Office would not only have a restraining influence on the men employed, but also a favorable effect on the patients and visitors.

The changes above suggested would entail an increased expenditure of \$3,000 per annum.

Section Third—Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, corporation or corporations to offer, sell or receive a greater price for admission to any theatre, theatres or place of public amusements in The City of New York, than that advertised and posted in said theatre, theatres or place of public amusements.

Section Fourth—Hereafter no person or persons, corporation or corporations, owning, operating and managing any licensed theatre, theatres or places of public amusements in The City of New York, shall receive from any person or persons, any ticket or other evidence of the right of admission to said licensed theatre, theatres or places of public amusements than that purchased directly from the owners or managers of the said licensed theatre, theatres or places of public amusements.

Section Fifth—Violation of any of the above sections of this ordinance is hereby designated a misdemeanor and the penalty for each and every violation of this ordinance shall be a fine of \$10, or in default of said fine, ten days in the City Prison.

Section Sixth—All ordinances and parts of ordinances conflicting with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

To cut, break or in any way injure or deface the trees, shrubs, plants, grass, posts, railings, chains, lamps, lampposts, benches, tree-guards, buildings, structures or other property in or upon any of the public parks, parkways, squares or places of or within The City of New York, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, or to dig into or upon the soil within the boundaries of any such parks, parkways, squares or places, or of any roads or roadways upon or across the same.

II. To go on foot or otherwise upon the grass, except when and where permitted, or to throw or leave any paper, refuse or rubbish on any of the lawns or walks of the said parks, parkways, squares or places.

III. To expose any article for sale or exhibition, unless previously licensed by the Department of Parks therefor, on any part of such public parks, parkways, squares or places.

IV. To post any bill, placard, notice or other paper upon any structure within such public parks, parkways, squares or places, or upon any street or avenue adjacent thereto under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, unless previously licensed so to do by the Commissioner having jurisdiction, and in accordance with the provisions of section XVI. hereof.

V. To play upon any musical instrument within such public parks, parkways, squares or places, or take into, carry or display any flag, banner, target, or transparency without the permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

VI. To erect any structure, stand or platform, or hold any meetings in such parks, parkways, squares or places, without previous permission therefor from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

VII. To use threatening, abusive or insulting language upon any of such public parks, parkways, squares or places, or doing any obscene or indecent act thereon, or any act tending to a breach of the public peace.

VIII. No hackney coach, carriage, wagon, cart or other vehicle for hire shall stand upon any such public park, parkway, square or place, or upon any street or avenue adjacent thereto under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks without previous license, and then only at such place as shall be indicated and allowed by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

IX. No horse or other animal shall be allowed to go at large upon such public parks, parkways, squares or places, except that dogs may be allowed therein when led by a chain or proper dog-string not exceeding six feet in length.

X. No person shall bathe or fish in any of the waters or fountains, nor cast any substance therein, nor disturb or interfere in any way with the fish, birds or animals within such public parks, parkways, squares or places, except in the waters adjacent to Pelham Bay Park, where bathing and fishing shall be permitted, subject to the rules and regulations prescribed by the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx. Fishing may be allowed in the lakes of Prospect Park under permits granted by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XI. All drunken, disorderly, or improper persons, and all persons doing any act injurious to such parks, parkways, squares or places, shall be removed therefrom by the parkkeeper or police in charge thereof. When necessary to the protection of life or property, the officers and keepers of the park may remove all persons from any designated part thereof.

XII. No animal or vehicle shall be permitted to stand, nor any incumbrance of any kind be allowed to remain upon any street adjacent to or bounding upon any public square or place in The City of New York, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, without permission of the Commissioner for the boroughs wherein located, except that vehicles may be permitted to take up and set down passengers, and to load and unload merchandise in the usual manner, and may occupy the street a reasonable time for the purpose; provided, however, that they shall not, while so doing unnecessarily incumber the street or obstruct travel therein.

XIII. No one shall throw stones or other missiles, nor beg or publicly solicit subscriptions or contributions, nor tell fortunes, nor play games of chance or with any table or instrument of gaming, nor make any harangue, nor climb upon any wall, fence, shelter, seat, statue or other erection within such public parks, parkways, squares or places within The City of New York.



XIV. No automobile or horseless vehicle shall be driven upon or over the drives of such public parks, parkways, squares or places at a greater rate of speed than eight miles an hour.

XV. No fence in or about any land fronting upon or adjacent to any public park, parkway, square or place in The City of New York, shall be erected until a plan, showing the height, character and method of construction of the proposed fence, has been submitted to the Commissioner of Parks having jurisdiction, and approved by him, and a permit in writing issued therefor.

XVI. No poster or advertising device shall be placed upon any fence or other structure used for advertisement or the exhibition in, about or upon any land fronting upon or adjacent to any public park, parkway, square or place in The City of New York, until a description or a drawing of the same shall be filed with the Commissioner of Parks having jurisdiction, and approved by him, and a permit in writing issued therefor.

XVII. Owners of fences or other structures now existing in, about or upon lands fronting upon or adjacent to any park, parkway, square or place in The City of New York used for advertising or exhibition of advertisements, shall not modify or alter such structures or the advertising device placed thereon until a written application has been made to the Commissioner having jurisdiction over the same, requesting his permission for the said alteration or modification, which shall be fully described in the said application, and the necessary permit obtained therefor.

XVIII. No military or target company, or civic or other procession, shall be allowed to parade, drill or perform upon any of the parks, parkways, squares or public places, without permission from the Commissioner of Parks having jurisdiction, except in the case of the use of Van Cortlandt parade ground in Van Cortlandt Park and the Parade Ground adjacent to Prospect Park, by the National Guard of the State of New York.

XIX. No automobile, stage or other vehicle shall be allowed to carry passengers for hire over or upon any of the parks, parkways or drives, concourses, plazas or circles, under the control of the Department of Parks, excepting upon traffic roads and except by special permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XX. It shall be unlawful for the owner or operator of any automobile or other vehicle to stop near any of the music stands or other places, in or about any of the parks, parkways, plazas, concourses, circles or squares, of the said Department of Parks, where any number of persons are accustomed to congregate, or where such automobiles would be a source of danger to life and limb, except by permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXI. No garbage, ashes, manure or other offensive material, is to be carried over any of the parkways or through such parks, circles, squares or concourses, except upon traffic roads set apart for such purpose. When such refuse is to be removed from residences fronting on any of the above parkways, etc., the vehicles collecting such refuse must leave the parkway as soon as such collection is accomplished, and within the time prescribed by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

No earth, sand or broken stone is to be carted over any of the parkways, except on traffic roads, unless special permit for the same is obtained from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXII. It shall not be lawful to modify, alter, or in any manner interfere with the lines or grades of any of the aforesaid parks, parkways, concourses, circles, squares, avenues, roads, streets, entrances or approaches under the jurisdiction of the said Department of Parks, nor to take up, move or disturb any of the curb and gutter-stones, flagging, trees, tree-boxes, railing, fences, sod, soil or gravel, or to go upon or cross said parks, parkways, concourses, circles, squares, roads, streets or avenues, except by the means and in the manner provided therefor; nor shall it be lawful to open or otherwise expose or interfere with any of the water, gas and sewer pipes, or any of the hydrants, stop-cocks, basins or other constructions within or upon said places, nor to take any water or gas therefrom, nor to make any connection therewith, except by special written consent of the Commissioner having jurisdiction, and where such consent is given a deposit of money may be required to insure the restoration of the said curbs, gutters, flagging, etc.

XXIII. No person in bathing costume will be permitted to walk or ride upon any parks, parkways or beaches, except Pelham Bay Park, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks. No boat or vessel shall be placed upon any of the waters of the said parks, except by special permission from the Commissioner having jurisdiction. No skating or sledding will be allowed on the lakes unless the ice is declared by the Commissioner having jurisdiction to be in a suitable condition for that purpose.

XXIV. No one shall fire or carry any firearm, fire cracker, torpedo, or fireworks, nor make a fire, nor make any oration, nor conduct any religious or other meeting or ceremony within any of the parks, parkways, squares or places in The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks without special permission from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXV. No one shall enter or leave the parks except at the established entranceways; nor shall any one enter or remain therein after 12 o'clock at night, except as, on special occasions, use thereof may be authorized beyond the regular hours.

XXVI. The drives shall be used only by persons in pleasure vehicles, on bicycles, or on horseback; the bridle paths only by persons on horseback. Animals to be used on either shall be well broken, and constantly held in such control that they may be easily and quickly turned or stopped; they shall not be allowed to move at a rate of speed on the drives or bridle paths of more than eight miles an hour; and when it shall be deemed necessary to safety, good order, or the general convenience that the speed of an animal or vehicle should be checked, or that it should be stopped, or its course altered, and the officers on duty shall so direct, by gesture or otherwise, such direction shall be obeyed; and no horse or other beast of burden nor automobile shall be driven or suffered to stand anywhere except on the drive or bridle path.

XXVII. No hackney coach or other vehicle for hire shall stand within the public parks, parkways, squares or places under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks for the purpose of taking up passengers, other than those whom it has brought in, excepting with the permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction. No public omnibus or express wagon, and no wagon, cart or other vehicle, carrying or ordinarily used to carry merchandise goods, tools or rubbish shall enter such public parks, parkways, squares or places without permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction, excepting upon traffic roads provided for the purpose. No fire engine or other apparatus on wheels for extinguishing fire shall enter or be allowed upon any part of the park excepting the Transverse and Traffic roads.

XXVIII. No military or target company and no civic, funeral or other procession, or a detachment of a procession, and no hearse or other vehicle, or person carrying the body of a dead person shall enter or be allowed on any part of the public parks, except by the permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXIX. No person shall bring into or carry within the parks any tree, shrub, plant or flower, nor any newly plucked branch or portion thereof without a permit from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXX. No person shall solicit passengers for any coach or other vehicle for hire within or upon any of the parks, parkways, squares or places within the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks. All drivers or attendants of vehicles for hire standing upon or within any such parks, parkways, squares or places shall remain in close proximity to their vehicles while so standing, and shall not follow, solicit or importune any person entering or leaving the said parks, parkways, squares or places.

Ordinances relating to the use of vehicles in the public parks, parkways and streets under the jurisdiction and control of the Commissioners of Parks of The City of New York:

1. All vehicles must carry a lighted lamp, showing a white light ahead, from thirty minutes after sunset until thirty minutes before sunrise.

2. All vehicles and horsemen when passing another vehicle or horseman going in the same direction, must keep to the left and leave the vehicle or horseman they are passing on the right hand.

3. All vehicles or horsemen going at a walk or slow trot must keep near the curbstone or gutter on the right hand side of the road; those going more rapidly must keep nearer the middle of the road.

4. No vehicle shall stop for any purpose without drawing up to the curbstone or gutter, and always on the right hand side of the road.

5. Before pulling up and before crossing from one side to the other of the road or street the driver should signal to those behind him by raising his whip.

6. On all drives and parkways where grass plots divide the drive all vehicles and horsemen must keep on the right hand side drive or bridle path.

7. Drivers, riders and cyclists must not exceed a speed of eight miles an hour in the parks and parkways.

8. Cyclists must not coast in the parks, nor on the parkways, or bicycle paths, and must keep their feet on the pedals and their hands on the handle bars.

9. Cyclists must not mount or dismount, except on the extreme right of the roads or bicycle paths.

10. All bicycles, tricycles, velocipedes or other vehicles of propulsion must be provided with a bicycle bell, not to exceed three inches in diameter.

11. Riding more than two abreast is prohibited.

12. Instruction in operating automobiles, bicycles, tricycles, velocipedes or other such vehicles of propulsion, and all trick or fancy riding on the same, is prohibited in the parks and parkways at all times.

13. Wheelmen shall not ride on the paths in any park; those walking upon the park paths may push their wheels along said paths; but in no case shall the wheels be taken upon the turf.

14. The delivery of supplies to the residences of West Seventy-second street, West Eighty-sixth street, Riverside drive, Cathedral parkway and Morningside avenue, west, in Manhattan, and the Shore road in Brooklyn, will be permitted in the forenoon; but no business vehicles shall enter upon or pass over said parkways after the hour of noon, excepting by special permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction. In passing over the said parkways, business vehicles must go direct to place of delivery, must leave the said parkways without unnecessary delay, and by the shortest route—the place of entry, if possible. The said parkways must not be used to enable business vehicles to reach places exterior to them.

Ordinances applying to the Harlem River Driveway:

1. The use of the Speedway is restricted to light vehicles of the classes known as buggies, runabouts, surreys and other like vehicles adapted to the speeding of light harness horses, seating not more than four persons and drawn by one or two horses, except by permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction. Exercising carts may be used until 1 P. M. only.

2. Speeding on Sundays and holidays, and after 3 o'clock P. M. on other days, will be permitted in one direction—from north to south only.

Turning is forbidden except at the ends of the driveway and at the bridges.

3. When not speeding, drivers must keep closely to the right hand side of the road and keep moving.

4. Pedestrians must not cross on the Speedway; subways are provided for that purpose.

5. Loud shouting to make horses break or to urge them on is strictly forbidden.

6. The use of hobbles, or other similar device or apparatus to fetter or connect the legs of horses, for the purpose of restricting or hampering their motion or gait, is forbidden upon the Harlem River Driveway.

Rules and regulations for establishing limits of projection for constructions on the line of Riverside drive:

1. No structure or construction of any description or any part thereof shall be placed or permitted on or under Riverside avenue until working plans in duplicate, drawn to a scale of one-quarter inch to the foot, shall have been filed with the Department of Parks, with an application for the erection or construction of the said structure; said drawings to show elevations, floor plans and vertical sections of the extent of projections, and that the applicant has received permission to erect the said projection, as shown on drawings from the Department of Parks.

A (a) Stoops or steps, courtyards and areas, or any part or appurtenance thereof shall not project in the avenue beyond the building line to the extent of more than 5 feet where the sidewalk is 16 feet wide; 7 feet where the sidewalk is 20 feet wide; 8 feet where the sidewalk is 25 feet wide; and in proportion to the above where the sidewalk is between 16 and 20 feet or between 20 and 25 feet.

(b) No stoop or steps shall be covered, except over the landing or platform at the top; nor shall they be inclosed except by an open railing not more than 4 feet in height.

B (a) Bay windows shall not project in the avenue beyond the building line to the extent of more than 4 feet.

(b) Bay windows when allowed to project in the avenue shall not occupy longitudinally with the avenue more than two-thirds of the width of the building from which they project.

C (a) No balcony, cornice or ornament shall project in the avenue beyond the house line to the extent of more than 4 feet.

(b) No balcony shall be inclosed on the front or side, except by a railing not over 4 feet in height.

D. No vault or other construction below the sidewalk shall be built, except in such manner as shall leave the sewers, gas and water pipes, or space proposed to be occupied by the same, free and uninclosed and in safe condition; nor in any case to extend in the clear beyond the curb line.

Ordinance adopted, pursuant to chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902:

1. No shade or ornamental tree or shrub shall be planted in any of the streets, avenues or public thoroughfares of The City of New York until such tree or shrub shall have been first approved by a duly appointed employee or expert of the Commissioner having jurisdiction, and a permit granted therefor.

2. No holes or excavation shall be prepared for planting any tree or shrub unless sufficient mould of satisfactory quality shall be used, and a duly appointed employee or expert of the Department of Parks shall report that the conditions, such as the absence of poisonous gas and deleterious substances, have been made satisfactory and a permit granted therefor.

3. No stem, branch or leaf of any such tree or shrub shall be cut, broken or otherwise disturbed until a permit has been granted therefor by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

4. No root of any such tree or shrub shall be disturbed or interfered with in any way by any individual or any officer or employee of a public or private corporation until a permit shall have been issued therefor by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

5. The surface of the ground within three feet of any tree or shrub growing on any street, avenue or other public thoroughfare shall not be cultivated, fertilized, paved, or given any treatment whatever, except under permit granted of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

6. It shall not be lawful to attach or maintain any guy rope, cable or other contrivance to any tree or shrub, or to use the same in connection with any banner, transparency, or any business purpose whatever, except under a permit from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

7. It shall not be lawful to cut, deface, mutilate, or in any way misuse, any tree or shrub, nor shall any horse or other animal be permitted to stand in a manner or position where it may or shall cut, deface or mutilate any tree or shrub, nor shall any building material or other material of any kind or any debris be piled or maintained against any tree or shrub.

8. It shall not be lawful to attach or string any electric or other wire, or to adjust or carry the same into or over any park or parkway, except under a permit from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

9. Any person violating the foregoing ordinances of chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall on conviction thereof before a City Magistrate be punished by a fine not exceeding \$50, or in default of payment of such fine, by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

Rules and regulations relating to projections and line of curb and surface constructions, under provisions of section 612 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 723 of the Laws of 1901:

1. Each Commissioner may grant permits for the erection and maintenance of projections on any park, parkway, square or public place in his jurisdiction, and on all streets and avenues within a distance of three hundred and fifty feet from the outer boundaries thereof, upon such terms and conditions and upon the making of such compensation to the City as in his discretion he may determine with respect to the particular locality.

2. Where permits have heretofore been granted upon the making of compensation and a new permit is desired to correct any irregularity, defect or supposed want of jurisdiction in the granting of such permit, a new permit may be granted without the making of further compensation.

3. Each Commissioner may determine the line of curb and the surface constructions of all streets and avenues lying within any park, parkway, square or public place in his jurisdiction or within a distance of three hundred and fifty feet



from the outer boundaries thereof as he may deem advisable according to the particular locality, and best calculated to maintain the beauty and utility of such parks, parkways, squares and public places.

4. All applications for the privilege of erecting bay windows or other house projections shall be made to the Commissioner in whose administrative jurisdiction the park or parkway affected lies, who may in his discretion grant the same upon payment of a fee to be determined in each case by said Commissioner.

5. Working plans in duplicate, drawn to a scale of one-quarter inch to the foot, shall be required to accompany each application, showing elevation, plans and vertical section of extent of projection, one copy of which will be filed in the office of the Commissioner having jurisdiction, and one other shall be returned to the applicant for filing in the Department of Buildings, with the approval of said Commissioner.

6. No permit will be granted to cover more than four feet of projection beyond the house or building line, nor shall the projections occupy longitudinally with the street or avenue more than two-thirds of the width of the building from which they project.

#### *Affecting Central Park and Fifth Avenue, Manhattan.*

1. Owners of property on the easterly side of said Fifth avenue, between Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Eleventh streets, are permitted to inclose, for courtyard purposes, and not otherwise, fifteen feet of the sidewalks adjacent to and in front of their respective lots; and the stoops of buildings erected on said avenue may, in such cases, project to the extent of such courtyards; provided further, that such stoops shall, in every instance, be open above the railing or balustrade thereof, and the form, size and character thereof, together with the form, size and character of the area railings, shall be subject to the approval of the Commissioner having jurisdiction; and provided further, that no stoop or area railing shall be constructed or put upon said Fifth avenue, or upon any of the streets or avenues surrounding said park, within the boundaries first above mentioned, until the plan thereof has been submitted to and approved by the said Commissioner.

2. No more than four horses shall be allowed to be driven together in the parks of the Borough of Manhattan, and then only when attached to private vehicles, except by special permit.

3. No person shall go on the turf without the permit of the Commissioner having jurisdiction except when and where a blue flag with a white star is shown as an indication that at that time and place all persons are allowed to go on it.

4. No bicycle or tricycle shall be allowed to be taken upon or remain on the Mall in Central Park during the progress of a concert.

#### *Rules Relating to Park Conservatories.*

1. The Conservatories will be open daily between 10 A. M. and 4.30 P. M.
2. Visitors on entering will keep to the right in order to avoid crowding.
3. Any person found pilfering flowers or leaves or causing damage to the buildings or plants will be arrested and punished.
4. No intoxicated, noisy or disorderly persons will be admitted.
5. Children under eight years of age will not be admitted except when accompanied by parents or guardians.
6. No dogs will be allowed inside the buildings or on the grounds.
7. The scattering of paper or refuse inside the buildings or on the grounds is prohibited.
8. Any incivility on the part of employees should be reported to the Commissioner having jurisdiction. Visitors are requested not to engage in unnecessary conversation with employees.
9. Fifteen minutes before closing time visitors will be warned by the call "All out."
10. No person will be permitted in a house or wing of the conservatory which is shown to be closed.
11. No smoking will be allowed.
12. Loud, indecent or noisy language is strictly prohibited.

#### *Rules and Regulations Relating to the New York Botanical Garden in Bronx Park.*

1. The picking of flowers, leaves, fruits, nuts, or the breaking of branches of any plants either wild or cultivated, the uprooting of plants of any kind, the defacing of trees, and the carrying of flowers, fruits or plants into or from the grounds of the Garden, are prohibited, except by written permission of the Director-in-Chief of the Garden.
2. Leaving or depositing paper, boxes, glass or rubbish of any kind within the grounds of the Garden is forbidden.
3. Dogs are not allowed within the limits of the Garden except in leash.
4. It is forbidden to take fish from within the Garden, or to molest in any way squirrels, birds, snakes, frogs, toads, turtles or any other wild animal.
5. Throwing stones or other missiles, playing ball, football, tennis or any other game is prohibited.
6. It is forbidden to offer for sale food, candy, newspapers, books, tobacco, beverages, flowers or other objects, without written permission from the Director-in-Chief and the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx.
7. Boating or rafting on the ponds, lakes and streams is forbidden.
8. Trucking, or the driving of business wagons of any kind, is forbidden on the roads of the Garden, except those designated for such purposes.
9. It is forbidden to accept or solicit passengers for any cab, carriage, or other conveyance at any point within the grounds of the Garden without written permission from the Director-in-Chief of the Garden and the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx.
10. Visitors are not allowed within the Garden after 11 o'clock at night nor before 6 o'clock in the morning, except upon driveways and paths designated for their use between those hours.

#### *Ordinances Applicable to the Ordinary Use of the Ocean Boulevard, the Eastern Parkway and the Speedway in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.*

Light harness driving on the Speedway, Ocean parkway (Ocean Parkway, between Bay parkway and Kings Highway) shall not be restricted as to speed between the hours of sunrise and sunset; speeding, however, is only to be permitted from Bay parkway toward Coney Island, and drivers shall be compelled to observe the rules of the road. Automobiles will not be permitted on the Speedway, but must take the west road on the Ocean parkway, between Bay parkway and Kings Highway, at all times.

Business wagons, trucks, etc., heavy or light, are prohibited from using the main drive of the Ocean parkway, and must use the west road at all times. Business wagons, trucks, etc., must use the block pavement at either side of the main road or the traffic roads of the Eastern parkway.

#### *Prospect Park.*

1. All lawns in Prospect Park are commons, and may be used as such, except those restricted by special order, and such restricted sections plainly indicated by proper signs.

#### *Coney Island Cycle Paths.*

Cyclists must use the west path when going toward Coney Island and the east path in returning.

Cyclists must not exceed a speed of twelve miles an hour on the bicycle paths. Racing on the bicycle paths is prohibited, except by special permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

Horses, wagons, carriages and pedestrians must not use the bicycle paths. All ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted affecting the parks, parkways and public places of The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks inconsistent with or in conflict with the ordinances above set forth are hereby repealed.

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be amended by inserting between the word "flag" and the word "banner" in the second

line of paragraph V. the following words, "except the national colors or emblem," and that the said ordinance as so amended be adopted.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on March 21, 1905 (Minutes, page 1291), the annexed ordinance in favor of amending section 189 of the Revised Ordinances of 1897 in relation to awnings, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 189 of the Revised Ordinances of 1897, in relation to awnings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 189 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Awnings of tin or other light metal or canvas may be erected across the sidewalk of any of the streets of New York except Broadway, Fifth avenue, Madison avenue and the Bowery, and those parts of Lexington avenue which are distant 200 feet from any intersecting cross street upon which a surface car is operated, provided any and every awning shall not be higher than the floor of the second story of the building, the first floor being the ground floor, but in no case to be covered with wood; and every such awning that may be built on Lexington avenue shall be constructed of steel with glass roof, and every awning or water shed of any kind covering one-half, or more than one-half, or less than the full width of the sidewalk shall have connected therewith a gutter and leader of material and size sufficient for conducting the water from the same to the outer line of the curbstone; a penalty of \$5 for each day such awning or water shed shall remain without such appurtenances to be imposed.

Sec. 2. All awnings erected hereunder, or under and pursuant to this section, shall be erected only with the consent and subject to the supervision of the President of the Borough wherein such awnings are to be erected.

Sec. 3. Any person, firm or corporation erecting any awning hereunder shall be liable for all loss or damage that may happen or come by reason of the erection and maintenance of such awning.

Sec. 4. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the revocation by the Board of Aldermen of the license to erect any awning hereunder.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That section 105 of the Building Code of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 105—Fireproof Buildings. Every building hereafter erected or altered, to be used as a hotel, lodging-house, school, theatre, jail, police station, hospital, asylum, institution for the care or treatment of persons, the height of which exceeds thirty-five feet, excepting all buildings for which specifications and plans have been heretofore submitted to and approved by the Bureau of Buildings, and every other building the height of which exceeds seventy-five feet, except as herein otherwise provided, shall be built fireproof, that is to say, they shall be constructed with walls of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel, in which wood beams or lintels shall not be placed, and in which the floors and roofs shall be of materials provided for in section 106 of this Code. The stairs and staircase landings shall be built entirely of brick, stone, Portland cement concrete, iron or steel. No woodwork or other inflammable material shall be used in any of the partitions, furrings or ceilings in any such fireproof buildings, excepting, however, that [when the height of the building does not exceed twelve stories nor more than one hundred and fifty feet,] the doors and windows and their frames, the trims, the casings, the interior finish when filled solid at the back with fireproof material, and the floor boards and sleepers directly thereunder, may be of wood, but the space between the sleepers shall be solidly filled with fireproof materials and extend up to the under side of the floor boards.

#### [BUCKS AND SLEEPERS.]

When the height of a fireproof building exceeds twelve stories, or more than one hundred and fifty feet, the floor surfaces shall be of stone, cement, rock asphalt, tiling or similar incombustible material. [or the sleepers and floors may be of wood treated by some process, approved by the Bureau of Buildings, to render the same fireproof.] All outside window frames and sash shall be of metal, or of wood covered with metal. The inside window frames and sash, doors, trim and other interior finish may be of hard wood. [covered with metal, or of wood treated by some process approved by the Bureau of Buildings to render the same fireproof.]

All hall partitions or permanent partitions between rooms in fireproof buildings shall be built of fireproof material and shall not be started on wood sills, nor on wood floor boards, but be built upon the fireproof construction of the floor and extend to the fireproof beam filling above. The tops of all door and window openings in such partitions shall be at least twelve inches below the ceiling line.

(, and every dirt cart) Every vehicle of whatever description, whether or not described as a dirt cart, shall be furnished with a good and tight box, whereof the sides, forepart and tailboard shall be at least eighteen inches high, and of sufficient capacity to contain not less than twelve cubic feet, and shall be securely covered when loaded, so as to prevent the contents from being scattered upon the streets.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal or public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Each and every railroad company operating cars on the surface of any of the streets, avenues or public places of The City of New York, whose motive power is electricity, shall equip each and every car so operated with a safety fender or safeguard attached to the front platform of said car or cars, which shall extend from the platform of said car or cars to within not more than three inches from the tracks, and to be made and modelled in such a manner that it will be impossible for any person or persons to pass under the fender or the platform of said car or cars and come in contact with the wheels of said car. The said front platform of said car to be construed as the platform occupied by the motorman, no matter in what direction the said car may be going.

Sec. 2. For each and every violation of the provisions of the ordinance there shall be recoverable against the company so offending a penalty of fifty dollars in an action brought in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting herewith are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after the date of approval thereof by his Honor the Mayor.

On motion of Alderman Lundy, the matter of amending proceedings to open Seventy-fifth street, between Eleventh and Fourteenth avenues, by including therein the portion of Seventy-fifth street lying between Fort Hamilton avenue and Eleventh avenue, was laid over.

A resolution to pave with asphalt on concrete Bay Ridge parkway, from the Shore road to Fort Hamilton avenue, was adopted by unanimous vote.

A resolution to regulate, grade, set or reset curb on concrete and lay cement sidewalks on Fifty-seventh street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, was adopted by unanimous vote.

No. 330.

A resolution to regulate, grade, set or reset curb on concrete and lay cement sidewalks on Warehouse avenue, between Surf and Neptune avenues, was adopted by unanimous vote.

No. 331.

A resolution to construct a sewer in Fifty-third street, between Thirteenth and Fifteenth avenues, with an outlet sewer in Fifty-third street, between Fifteenth and Seventeenth avenues, was adopted by unanimous vote.

No. 332.

A resolution to construct a sewer in Sixty-first street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, was adopted by unanimous vote.

No. 333.

A resolution to construct a sewer in Eighty-second street, between Twelfth and Thirteenth avenues, was adopted by unanimous vote.

No. 334.

A resolution to construct a sewer in Fourth avenue, east side, between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-seventh streets, was adopted by unanimous vote.

No. 335.

A resolution to pave with cement five feet wide, the sidewalks opposite lots lying on the south side of Fifty-eighth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues; on the west side of Sixth avenue, between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets; and on the north side of Fifty-ninth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, known as Nos. 37, 38, 39, 40 and 45, Block 856, was adopted by unanimous vote.

No. 336.

A resolution to pave with cement five feet wide the sidewalks opposite lots lying on the south side of Fifty-eighth street, between Sixth and Seventh avenues, and on the east side of Sixth avenue, between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, known as Nos. 1, 2, 10, 12, 34 and 41, Block 857, was adopted by unanimous vote.

No. 258.

The Secretary read the following report made by Alderman Lundy in the matter of the proposed alteration in the map or plan of The City of New York by striking therefrom First avenue, from Sixty-third street to Sixty-sixth street; Sixty-third street, from Second avenue to New York Bay; Sixty-fourth street, from Second avenue to New York Bay, and Sixty-fifth street, from Second avenue to New York Bay:

"Brooklyn, June 11, 1905.

"To the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District:

"Gentlemen—There was referred to me, on motion of Alderman Malone, at a meeting of your Board held on May 11, certain petitions of the Long Island Railroad Company for an alteration in the map or plan of The City of New York by striking therefrom First avenue, from Sixty-third street to Sixty-sixth street; Sixty-third street, from Second avenue to New York Bay; Sixty-fourth street, from Second avenue to New York Bay, and Sixty-fifth street, from Second avenue to New York Bay.

"After consideration of this matter I would report that I believe the interests of the City would be best served by denying the petition for the striking of Sixty-third street, from Second avenue to New York Bay, from the map of the City, and by



adopting resolutions striking Sixty-fourth street and Sixty-fifth street, from Second avenue to New York Bay, from the City map, and First avenue, from Sixty-third street to Sixty-sixth street, from the City map, upon an agreement to be made by the Long Island Railroad Company, the petitioner in this proceeding, under which said railroad company shall construct a viaduct for the full width of First avenue from Sixty-third street to Bay Ridge parkway, said viaduct to be constructed in accordance with specifications prepared and approved by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and to be, after its completion, the property of The City of New York and open thereafter at all times as a public highway.

The Secretary also read the following report made by Commissioner Brackenridge and Alderman Malone, a Committee appointed to investigate and report upon the proposed alteration in the map or plan of The City of New York by striking therefrom First avenue, from Sixty-third street to Sixty-sixth street; Sixty-third street, from Second avenue to New York Bay; Sixty-fourth street, from Second avenue to New York Bay, and Sixty-fifth street, from Second avenue to New York Bay:

"Brooklyn, June 9, 1905.

"To the Local Board of the Bay Ridge District, Borough of Brooklyn:

"Gentlemen—On motion of Alderman Malone, there was referred to the undersigned, as a Committee of the Local Board, at a meeting held on June 7, 1905, petition of the Long Island Railroad Company to close Sixty-third street, Sixty-fourth street and Sixty-fifth street, from Second avenue to high-water line, and to close First avenue from Sixty-third street to Sixty-sixth street. These proceedings had been, at a public meeting of the Board, referred to Alderman Lundy for report, and at the meeting of June 7 he had reported verbally in favor of a compliance with the desire of the petitioner. On motion of Alderman Malone, the verbal report of Alderman Lundy was received. Alderman Malone then moved that this being a very serious proposition, and it not being deemed wise to act upon a verbal report, this matter be referred to the Commissioner of Public Works, as Chairman, and Alderman Malone, for a written report thereon which would better safeguard the interests of the City and assure to it all protection in the future with regard to easements in Sixty-fourth street for the great trunk sewer and its outlets, and all other matters pertaining to the City's interests.

"Your Committee has carefully examined the ground required for the improvement projected by the Long Island Railroad Company, and being impressed by the desirability of this improvement and its importance to the commercial development of the borough, as well as by the prospect it affords of employment to our citizens, believes that the petitioner's desire should be granted in the main, but that the City should proceed in this matter in such a way as to safeguard all its interests. Your Committee therefore respectfully reports:

"First—That the petition to strike from the map Sixty-third street, from First avenue to high-water line, be denied.

"Second—That the petition to strike from the map Sixty-fourth street and Sixty-fifth street, from Second avenue to high-water line, be granted.

"Third—That the petition to strike from the map First avenue, from Sixty-third street to Sixty-sixth street, be denied, for the reason that a compliance with the desire of the petitioner in this respect would obstruct and make useless a great longitudinal thoroughfare connecting Thirty-ninth Street Ferry and the great business interests along First avenue with Fort Hamilton and Bay Ridge.

"In consideration of the above action by the City, there should be exacted from the Long Island Railroad Company, the petitioner herein, an agreement:

"First—To grant to The City of New York a perpetual easement in Sixty-fourth street for sewer purposes, with the right of access thereto at all times, and the right to pass upon the plans for the occupancy of the proposed railroad yard over the aforesaid sewer, and to insist upon such measures as shall safeguard the sewer construction.

"Second—That an agreement shall be exacted from the Long Island Railroad Company to construct, under the supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works, a viaduct over the tracks of the railroad company, beginning at a point at or near Sixty-third street and extending along the lines of First avenue to a point at or near the northerly line of Bay Ridge parkway, such viaduct to be the full width of the roadway of First avenue, with a further provision of a sidewalk at least 8 feet wide on each side of said roadway; said viaduct to be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications approved by the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Brooklyn, and to be constructed under his supervision, the viaduct, upon its completion, to be turned over to The City of New York, and thereafter to be open at all times as a public highway. The maintenance of said viaduct should be a charge upon the railroad company, the petitioner herein, or its successors, with the exception of the maintenance of the pavement of said sidewalk and roadway, which should be a charge upon The City of New York.

"All of which is respectfully submitted, together with the subjoined resolutions, the adoption of which your committee respectfully requests.

On motion of Alderman Malone the following resolutions were adopted by unanimous vote:

Recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an alteration in the map or plan of The City of New York by striking therefrom Sixty-fourth street, from Second avenue to the high-water line of New York Bay.

Resolved, That said action be taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon the filing with the President of the Borough of Brooklyn by the Long Island Railroad Company, the petitioner herein, of an agreement giving to The City of New York forever a sewer easement in Sixty-fourth street, from Second avenue to the pier-head line of New York Bay, and guaranteeing further that the President of the Borough of Brooklyn shall at all times have access to said sewer, and shall determine the nature of the railroad construction and operation in the proposed yard above the said sewer with respect to the effect of said construction and operation upon the safety of said sewer. And a further agreement binding said railroad company to construct, within a time to be fixed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, a viaduct over and along the line of First avenue, from a point at or near the southerly line of Sixty-third street to a point at or near the northerly line of Bay Ridge parkway, and the said First avenue and the sidewalks of said viaduct to be each eight feet in width; said viaduct to be constructed under the supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Brooklyn, and in accordance with plans and specifications approved by him, and said viaduct to be delivered to The City of New York when completed, and to be considered thereafter at all times open as a public highway. and said viaduct to be delivered to The City of New York when completed, and to be considered thereafter at all times open as a public highway. The cost of maintenance of said viaduct to be a charge upon the Long Island Railroad Company, with the exception of the pavement of the roadway and sidewalks of said viaduct, the maintenance but not the installation of which shall be a charge upon The City of New York.

## BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

September 12, 1905.

Present—Messrs. Walter Cook, Warren A. Conover, Charles G. Smith, Edward F. Croker, Lewis Harding, Charles Buek and William J. Fryer, Chairman.

Meeting called to order at 2 p. m.

On motion, minutes approved as read.

Appeal 41, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 8, of 1905, premises No. 38 East Twenty-first street, Manhattan; Hopton & Weeks (agents), appellants. Laid over at last meeting.

On presentation of report and on motion, appeal was denied.

Appeal 42, Alteration No. 465 of 1905, premises Nos. 702 and 704 East One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, The Bronx; Louis Falk, appellant.

No. 1. Proposed alteration is unlawful (section 32 of the Code), the height of the building being only seven feet above the limit, and the side walls having recesses, and the new brick walls to be laid in cement mortar.

To allow the 12-inch brick wall to be carried up 47 feet in height, in place of 40 feet, as per Building Code.

There being no machinery above the first story, the new fourth story proposed is only to be used for light cabinet work.

Mr. Louis Falk appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved on condition that the walls of the old building are found to be in good condition and in plumb.

Appeal 43, New Building No. 941, of 1905, east side of Bronx avenue, 150 feet north of King street, The Bronx; Copeland & Dole, appellants.

Proposed structure is unlawful; same exceeds three stories in height. Superintendent has refused to approve the plans submitted.

Whether the building is a two-story flat, as claimed, or does the use of the cellar as an entrance to the story above make it a story? We claim that it does not.

That the plans submitted are within the law as defined in section 146 of the Code, and that the Superintendent has no lawful excuse for not approving the same.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 44, Alteration No. 2139, of 1905, premises No. 267 Lexington avenue, Manhattan; William H. Russell, appellant.

No. 2. The space between the studs should be filled in with fireproof material (section 48 of the Code).

An equally good and more desirable form of construction is employed. To allow in this three-story private dwelling a vent shaft extending through one-story only to be lathed with iron on both the outside and inside of the studs, and plastered with cement mortar, in lieu of filling in solidly between the studs.

In all other respects than that iron lathing and cement plastering is used on the studs instead of the studs being filled in solidly the requirements of the Building Code are to be complied with.

The object of making this change from the strict requirement of the Code is to avoid the weight that brick or hard burnt clay blocks will impose on the present wood floor beams, and not to save expense, as the proposed method is the more costly.

The framing of the floor is such that iron beams could not well be placed to carry the greater weight, and the Code does not require iron beams. A vent shaft is allowed by the Code in private dwellings to be built of wood filled in solidly when extending through not more than one story, irrespective of the height of the dwelling, while this dwelling is only three stories in height, and the proposed construction is equally as safe from a fire standpoint and has the important advantage in this case of being lighter in weight.

On motion, approved.

The committee appointed at the last meeting of the Board to answer the letter of Mr. Lowell M. Palmer reported that they had prepared and forwarded a reply. A copy of the same was read, and, on motion, ordered on file, together with the communication from Mr. Palmer.

On motion of Mr. Conover, the following resolution presented by the Chair was read and adopted:

Resolved, That the following be adopted as a standing rule of this Board:

"The papers and plans filed with this Board are to be considered public records, and as such open to public inspection at all reasonable times.

"No papers, drawings, photographs or prints filed with this Board shall be removed from the Board rooms.

"The tracing, photographing or other copying of drawings, photographs or prints filed with this Board shall not be permitted."

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Commonwealth Telephone Company the right and franchise to construct, operate and maintain in, upon and along the streets, highways and public places of The City of New York and the several boroughs thereof, wires, cables and other appliances proper and necessary for the purpose of carrying on a general telephone and telegraph business.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York hereby grants to the Commonwealth Telephone Company the right, franchise and privilege of constructing, operating and maintaining its wires, cables or other electrical conductors, together with the poles, fixtures and other appliances proper and necessary in the telephone business, in said City, through, over, under and along any and all of the streets, avenues, squares, parks and other public places within the limits of The City of New York, for the purpose of conducting a general telephone and telegraph business and for no other purpose; subject, nevertheless, to all the express terms and conditions hereinafter particularly set forth.

Sec. 2. The franchise hereby granted shall exist and continue for a term of twenty-five years from the date of this ordinance; subject, nevertheless, to a renewal and extension thereof for such further period as may be lawful and authorized by this Board upon a valuation thereof and of the lines and property then owned by the grantee or its successor, such value to be established either by arbitrators to be mutually selected and agreed upon by and between the said grantee or its successor and the municipal authorities of The City of New York, then authorized by law to regulate, grant and determine public franchises, or, in the event of failure or inability to fix and establish such a valuation by arbitration, then same to be fixed either by judicial proceeding or in such manner as may be otherwise provided and established by law. For the purpose of fixing and establishing the valuation of the property and franchises contemplated by this ordinance, together with any extension thereof, within the said City of New York, and also for the purpose of determining the amount of earnings of the grantee hereunder and of fixing the proportion thereof payable to the said City of New York, the books, papers and corporate records of the said grantee shall at all times be open to the full inspection and examination of the Comptroller of The City of New York and of his subordinates thereunto specifically authorized.

Upon the expiration of the franchise hereby granted or of any extension thereof which may be hereafter made, The City of New York shall have the right to acquire for itself all the plant and property of the grantee or its successor in the streets, avenues, highways and public places of The City of New York, upon just compensation, to be established as hereinbefore specified.

Sec. 3. The rates for telephone service within the said City of New York which may be lawfully charged and collected by the said grantee or its successor are hereby fixed as follows; subject only to modification by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, but no change in the said rates shall be made within the period of five years from the date of this ordinance:

First—For telephone service contracted or paid for by the message and for toll service between the boroughs of said City:

For a call not exceeding five minutes in duration by connections wholly within any single borough of said City, not exceeding five cents.

For a call not exceeding five minutes in duration by connections between any two boroughs of said City, the boundaries of which are contiguous, not exceeding ten cents.

For a call not exceeding five minutes in duration by connections between any two boroughs of said City, the boundaries of which are not contiguous, not exceeding fifteen cents.

For the purpose of defining said boundaries between boroughs of said City all waterways intervening between boroughs shall be regarded as though the same did not exist.

Second—For telephone service contracted or paid for without limit as to number of messages per annum:

For business places within the Borough of Manhattan, not exceeding \$90 per annum.

For business places within the boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, not exceeding \$75 per annum.

For business places within the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, not exceeding \$60 per annum.

For residences within the Borough of Manhattan, not exceeding \$50 per annum.

For residences within the boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, not exceeding \$40 per annum.

For residences within the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, not exceeding \$30 per annum.

Sec. 4. In consideration of the grant of this franchise, the grantee or its successor shall render service and make payments to the said City of New York as follows:

First—It shall furnish for the exclusive use of said City and of the officers thereof, upon municipal business, free telephone stations connected with its exchanges as follows: In the Borough of Manhattan 300; in the Borough of Brooklyn 200; in the Borough of The Bronx 100; in the Borough of Queens 100; in the Borough of Richmond 50; service at each and all of said stations to be without charge to The City of New York for communications and connections wholly within a single borough of said City; service by connections between stations in different boroughs to be at 50 per cent. of the rates hereinbefore fixed for toll connections between the said boroughs.

Second—The said grantee or its successor shall pay to The City of New York annually, at such date as may be fixed by this Board, a sum equal to 4 per cent. of its gross earnings for business within The City of New York for the first five years of said ordinance; 5 per cent. of its gross earnings for business within The City of New York for the second five years of said ordinance; 6 per cent. of its gross earnings for business within The City of New York for the remaining fifteen years of said ordinance.

##### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
