I will be glad to appear at the next meeting of the Sinking Fund Commissioners in reference to the matter.

J. A. BENSEL, Esq., Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending December 31, 1905:

Battery Wall, North River.

The existing platforms at this locality and the steamboat landing have been maintained during the quarter. A cluster of piles was driven and braced about 15 feet westerly of the Liberty boat landing.

Rector Street Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under authorization of the Commissioner of Docks of the 16th of December, 1903, and is at the cost and expense of the owners of the property to be improved. The wall has been practically completed for a portion of the section on either side of Pier, new 7, and during the quarter earth filling has been deposited in the rear of that portion of the bulkhead wall built.

Cedar Street Section, North River.

By action of the Commissioner of Docks of December 10, 1902, a section of the bulkhead wall was authorized in the vicinity of Cedar street, extending from the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets northerly to a point 40 feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street. This work included the removal of the old structures and Piers, old 13 and 14, together with the sheds thereon. The building of the wall proper was practically completed during a prior quarter and filling has been placed in rear of the wall built. A pier to be known as Pier 11 has been finished as far as it is intended for the present, and the building of a ferry rack at the outer end of this pier preparatory to work to be done by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey is in progress.

Boiler House on Pier, New 34, North River.

An addition to the boiler house on this pier for housing the electric plant has been built by the Southern Pacific Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Chelsea Section, North River.

On the 28th of December, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third street. Large property interests in this vicinity have in the past been acquired and extensive work done towards the construction of the wall until at present the section is very nearly completed. During the past quarter the work on the section has been in progress, and 349 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made thereby. Earth filling is being placed in rear of that portion of the wall already built. Temporary sewers have been built at West Seventeenth, West Eighteenth, West Nineteenth, West Twentieth and West Twenty-second streets. Buildings occupying the ground over a portion of the section have been condemned for the use of the Department and are being removed by the purchasers.

Fire at the Terminal of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company and the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey Ferry.

On the 20th of December, 1905, a disastrous fire occurred in these premises starting at the upper end of the ferry house of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, and in a short time destroying both the terminal of that company and of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey adjoining the same on the south. The companies affected by this fire immediately started to rebuild the destroyed structures. The ferry racks of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company were still in condition to be used and that ferry has continued to make its landings at its own ferry racks. The condition at the Central Railroad of New Jersey Ferry was, however, so bad that that company made an arrangement with the Erie Railroad Company by which their boats are to land at one of the slips of the Erie. Plans have been filed for the new buildings and the work of reconstruction has been begun.

Pier, New 53, North River.

The work of concreting the deck of this pier has been done during the quarter.

Pier, New 57, North River.

A temporary approach to this pier has been built to facilitate the berthing of the Municipal ferry boats.

Pier, New 59, North River.

The work of constructing a new pier to be known as Pier 59, has been in progress during the quarter.

West Forty-second Street Section, North River.

By an order from the Engineer-in-Chief, dated 14th of November, 1905, the sections originally known as West Forty-second street section, West Forty-third street section extended and West Forty-third street section, were consolidated, and during the quarter the wall was practically completed with the exception of the coping for all the portion except that extending across the foot of West Forty-second street.

Pier 83, North River.

A contract has been prepared and let for constructing a new pier foot of Forty-third street, and work has been in progress.

Clarendon Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under resolution of the Board of Docks passed November 16, 1900. During the past quarter no work on the wall proper has been in progress, but an extension to the pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-third street is being built by the force of the Department.

Between Spuyten Duyvil and Mt. St. Vincent.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are widening the present railroad embankment between these two points, and rip-rap is being deposited along the line of the widening under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Marginal Street, North River.

A contract awarded during a previous quarter with the Sicilian Asphalt Paving Company has been in progress. Under this contract the work of laying concrete foundations and asphalt pavement on the marginal street along the North river has been done. Repairs have also been made where necessary to the asphalt pavement already laid by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company under their various bonds to maintain the pavement in good condition. The granite pavement along certain portions of the water front where necessary has been taken up from time to time and relaid to grade.

Whitehall Terminal.

The work of constructing a new ferry terminal at this point for the Municipal ferry to Staten Island has been begun. A portion of the old ferry house was removed, and a new slip is in course of construction. A contract is being prepared and will shortly be let for the erection of a new ferry house at this point.

Sewer at Pier, New 4, East River.

A wooden barrel sewer has been constructed across the marginal street through the bulkhead wall and extending to outer end of this pier by the Department of Sewers under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Old Slip Section, East River.

The Commissioner of Docks on the 7th of December, 1904, issued the necessary authorization for the construction of the bulkhead wall from the northerly side of Pier, new 7, where it joins the Broad street section to the westerly side of Burling slip, East river. This stretch of wall is divided into two sections, the Old slip section and the Maiden lane section. The Old slip section extends from the northerly or upper end of the Broad street section and runs along the established bulkhead line to a point opposite the southerly line of Wall street. This section contemplates the erection of four new piers to be known as Piers 8, 9, 10 and 11. During the quarter the work of constructing the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress, and contracts have been awarded for building the piers.

Pier 8, East River.

The work of constructing this pier has been in progress during the quarter. The outer end of the pier has been completed, and work is now suspended pending the completion of the bulkhead-wall at the inner end.

Pier 9, East River.

A contract has been prepared and will shortly be let for constructing this pier.

Pier 10, East River.

A contract has been awarded for constructing this pier and the work is in progress.

Pier 11, East River.

The work of constructing this pier has been in progress during the quarter. The outer end of the pier has been completed, and work is now suspended pending the completion of the bulkhead-wall at the inner end.

Storage of Concrete Material on Pier 8, East River.

It having been thought advisable to provide a place in the lower part of the City where concrete material could be stored, the outer end of this pier was fitted up with derrick for handling material, and broken stone, sand and cement have been stored at this locality.

Maiden Lane Section, East River.

By authorization of the Commissioner of Docks, dated 7th of December, 1904, the construction of the bulkhead-wall along this stretch of water front has been ordered. The work extends from the southerly line of Wall street, where it joins the Old slip section, to about the southerly line of Burling slip, and work on the bulkhead-wall proper has been in progress during the quarter. This section includes Piers 12, 13, 14 and 15. Pier, new 12, was built in 1901.

Pier, New 13, East River.

Contract No. 927 has been awarded for the construction of this pier and the work has been in progress.

Pier 14, East River.

The work of building this pier under Contract No. 905 was completed on the 9th of December, 1905.

Pier 15, East River.

The work of building this pier under Contract No. 897 has been completed, and shed foundations have been built on the pier by the lessees under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Fulton Section, East River.

This section of the bulkhead-wall was authorized by the Board of Docks on the 26th of April, 1901. This resolution was amended by action of the Commissioner of Docks on the 7th of December, 1904. During the present quarter the work of constructing the bulkhead-wall proper has been in progress, and a retaining wall was constructed to retain earth filling. This section embraces within its limits Piers, new 16, 17 and 18. Pier, new 16, was built in 1901. Pier, new 17, was built during a previous quarter. During the present quarter a steel shed has been erected at the outer end of Pier 16 by C. H. Mallory & Co.

Pier, New 18, East River.

Contract No. 911 has been awarded for constructing this pier and the work is in progress.

Market Station, East River.

The authorization for this section is the resolution of the Board of Docks passed 23d of February, 1900. During the quarter work has been in progress on the bulkhead-wall proper.

Pier 28, East River.

Contract No. 921 has been awarded for the construction of this pier and the work is in progress.

Corlears Hook.

Temporary platform, about 236 feet on the southerly side and 180 feet on the easterly side, was built in the above locality by the Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks, and an extension to the platform was built by the same company under a further permit from the Commissioner.

East Thirty-eighth Street Section, East River.

The work at this section is being done under resolution of the Board of Docks passed May 4, 1900. The wall proper at this section has been practically completed for some little time. During the past quarter the marginal street has been paved with second-hand paving blocks.

Between Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth Streets, East River.

A steel frame grain elevator has been erected on the bulkhead at this locality by the New York City Milling Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Yorkville Section, East River.

The Commissioner of Docks by action of October 10, 1904, authorized the construction of the bulkhead-wall between the centre line of East Sixty-fourth street and the northerly line of East Eighty-first street. This portion of the water front has been divided into two sections, the first known as Yorkville section, extending from the centre line of East Sixty-fourth street to the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street, a distance of 2,848 feet. This section embraces the work done under Contract No. 844 for excavating for a new marginal street, between East Sixty-fourth and East Eighty-first streets, which was completed on the 18th of December, 1905.

Blackwell Section, East River.

By action of the Commissioner of October 10, 1904, Bureau Order No. 2756, the work of improving the water front which was being done under resolution for the East Seventy-fourth street, East Seventy-fifth street and East Seventy-seventh street sections, was consolidated and a new section established as Blackwell section, beginning at the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street and extending to the northerly line of East Eighty-first street, a distance of 1,958.03 feet. A portion of the section in the neighborhood of East Seventy-fourth street was practically completed for quite a strip of wall during a previous quarter, and the work at this particular point has been suspended until the wall in the other sections makes a joint with it.

Between Ninetieth and Ninety-first Streets, East River.

A dry rubble retaining wall, about 3 feet above mean high water, was constructed along the shore line from bulkhead-wall terminating at south side of Ninety-first street, a distance of about 75 feet, and grounds in rear were leveled off by depositing and grading earth filling by the Pastime Athletic Club under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

One Hundred and Eighth Street, Harlem River.

The work of constructing a new pier in this locality under Contract No. 890 was completed on the 21st of November, 1905.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Port Morris.

A contract, No. 929, has been awarded for the construction of a new pier in this locality and work is in progress.

Between One Hundred and Forty-fifth and One Hundred and Forty-sixth Streets, Harlem River.

A bulkhead platform was constructed by John P. Kane at this locality, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced August 1, 1905, and completed October 10, 1905.

Between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth Streets, Harlem River.

A coal pocket was constructed at this locality by Leonard Brothers, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work commenced August 22, 1905, and finished October 15, 1905.

North of One Hundred and Fifty-ninth Street and East of Speedway, Harlem River.

A bulkhead platform is being constructed and other improvements are being made at this locality by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work commenced September 1, 1905, and is in progress.

Between Two Hundred and First and Two Hundred and Second Streets, Harlem River.

A pile platform bulkhead was built at this locality by the Harlem Contracting Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced November 15, 1905, and finished December 27, 1905.

Morris Heights, Harlem River.

A rip-rap wall is being built and filling placed behind same at this locality by the Gas Engine and Power Company (Seabury's) in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced December 15, 1901, and is in progress.

Eastchester Creek.

The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company are constructing an embankment along its trestle each side of the drawbridge by the depositing of earth filling under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. This work was commenced May 23, 1904, and is in progress.

One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Port Morris.

A power station, pier and concrete bulkhead are being erected and a discharge tunnel built at this locality by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, East River, Oak Point.

The Rock Plaster Company of New York and New Jersey are building a crib bulkhead and filling in behind same at the above location, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced May 15, 1905, and is in progress.

Putnam Railroad Bridge to Highbridge.

A pile and timber trestle is being built by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the same filled in with rip-rap in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced July 25, 1904, and is in progress.

Marble Hill, Spuyten Duyvil, Harlem River.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are constructing a new road bed in connection with the Marble Hill cut-off, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced in 1904 and is in progress.

One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Harlem River.

The crib bulkhead at this location has been rebuilt by Church E. Gates Company, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced May 29, 1905, and finished October 10, 1905.

Dock and Thames Streets, Westchester Creek.

A coal pocket was built at this locality by Watson H. Brown, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced October 15, 1905, and finished December 20, 1905.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Harlem River.

A coal pocket and tower are being constructed at this locality and the grade of a portion of the crib bulkhead was raised by S. Trimmer & Sons.

Riker's Island.

The work of building a rip-rap embankment on the easterly side of Riker's Island, under Contract No. 776, was completed December 18, 1905.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Between Forty-third and Fifty-first Streets, Brooklyn.

Five new piers are in course of construction in this locality by the Bush Company, Inc., under permit from the Commissioner of Docks and Secretary's Order 21424.

Seventy-ninth Street.

A sewer outlet is being constructed at this locality by the Bureau of Sewers, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced March 30, 1905, and is in progress.

Ninety-second Street.

A sewer outlet is being constructed at this locality by the Department of Public Works under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced July 22, 1904, and is in progress.

Adams Street.

A coal plant and apparatus are being constructed at this locality by the Moquin-Offerman Company, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced August 15, 1905, and is in progress.

Division Avenue, Wallabout Canal.

The Transit Development Company are constructing a bulkhead foundation for coal towers, ash pockets and a system of condensing water tunnels south of Division avenue, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced August 10, 1904, and is in progress.

Montague Street.

The New York Dock Company are constructing Piers 10, 11, 12 and 13 at this locality, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced May 8, 1905, and is in progress.

Bridge Street.

The Jay Street Terminal Company are building a pier and slip for car floats and a transfer bridge at this locality, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced December 6, 1904, and is in progress.

Gold Street.

The Kings County Electric Light and Power Company are rebuilding the bulkhead wall and building foundations, screening wells, etc., at this locality, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Sheepshead Bay, Manhattan Beach.

The Manhattan Beach Hotel and Land Company are dredging, filling and bulkheading at this locality, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced January 30, 1905, and is in progress.

Grand Street and Gardiner Avenue, English Kills.

A bulkhead platform and basin are being constructed at this locality by the Cross, Austen & Ireland Lumber Company, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Stagg and Scholes Streets.

An asphalt paving plant is being constructed at this locality by the Barber Asphalt Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Washington Street.

A boat coal pocket was erected at this locality by the Carsten-Offerman Company, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work commenced August 15, 1905, and finished November 10, 1905.

Montague Street.

The New York Dock Company are building pier sheds on Piers 10, 11, 12 and 13 at this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced October 9, 1905, and is in progress.

Fifty-second and Fifty-sixth Streets, Jamaica Bay.

John R. Corbin is doing dredging and filling in on his property at this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced August 1, 1905, and is in progress.

Flatbush Avenue, Jamaica Bay.

Terence F. Curley is constructing a pile bulkhead, filling in behind same and doing dredging at this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Greenpoint and Kingsland Avenues.

Storage sheds and tanks are being constructed at this locality by the Rockland-Rockport Lime Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced September 6, 1905, and is in progress.

Sullivan and Wolcott Streets, Buttermilk Channel.

A pile platform is being built by the New York Dock Company at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced September 20, 1905, and is in progress.

Sixth Street Basin, Gowanus Canal.

A concrete building is being erected at this locality by the Concrete Building Stone Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced October 17, 1905, and is in progress.

Taylor and Wilson Streets.

A coal hopper, engine house, etc., were built at this locality by Thomas F. Taylor in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced September 11, 1905, and finished December 5, 1905.

Bell Street, Newtown Creek.

A dumping board was built at this locality by the American Sugar Refining Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced October 16, 1905, and finished October 24, 1905.

Franklin and Manhattan Avenues, Newtown Creek.

A coal hoisting apparatus was erected at this locality by the American Sugar Refining Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced November 1, 1905, and finished December 1, 1905.

Seventh Street Basin.

Three storage sheds are being built by the Bracken, McCleeny Company at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced December 21, 1905, and is in progress.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

At Lawrence Point the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company are constructing two crib piers with bulkheads. At Fourteenth avenue, Whitestone, a crib bulkhead is being built by the Long Island Railroad Company. At Fulton and Franklin streets, Long Island City, the old crib is being removed and a new crib is being built by the Astoria Marble Company. At Preston avenue, Newtown creek, the Agricultural Chemical Company have rebuilt the crib in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Between Hunter Point avenue and Anable avenue, Dutch Kills, Newtown creek, a crib bulkhead on piles is being built by the Degnon Contracting Company in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

A number of pieces of work have been done by private parties and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries in this borough. At Mariner's Harbor a crib and close-pile bulkhead and a small pier and wooden shed are being constructed by the New Jersey Dock and Bridge Building Company, and a pier and extension to the pierhead line are being constructed by Henry DuBois Sons Company between Central and Van Pelt avenues. At St. George a crib bulkhead and sheet-pile bulkhead are being built by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, and a crib lighterage pier and a crib bulkhead are being constructed by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company. At Port Richmond a dry-stone wall retaining structure is being constructed offshore of the railroad trestle by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company. At West New Brighton fender piles have been driven alongside the dock at Bard avenue by the Richmond Light and Railroad Company. At Huguenot a pile and crib runway has been built by Leonard R. & Lawrence R. Kerr. At Stapleton a crib bulkhead is being built at the James D. Leary Long Dock by Bernard Brady. At Tottenville a crib or pile bulkhead with filling behind same is being constructed, and a pier is being constructed and dredging done at the foot of Henry street by Henry Cossey; a pier is being constructed easterly of Henry street by Harry Cossey, and the ferry bridge at Tottenville is being replaced with a new bridge by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company; piles have been driven and two dolphins erected north of Johnson street, Tottenville, by the Standard Oil Company. At New Brighton a crib bulkhead is being erected by J. B. King Company. At Tompkinsville the American Dock and Trust Company are extending their pier known as Pier 3, near the foot of Arrietta street, and also extending the shed on said pier.

Pavement on Marginal Street, North and East Rivers.

The asphalt pavement has been repaired at various places along the North and East rivers where necessary to repair pavement already laid, and the work under Contract No. 879 for the repairing of the wearing surface and binder and concrete foundations for the asphalt pavement along the North and East rivers has been in progress.

Pavement on East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river water front as required.

Timber Basin, Seventy-fifth Street, North River.

At the timber basin timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained and cared for.

Pile Basin, Sherman's Creek.

The pile basin at Sherman's creek, on the Harlem river, has been maintained and cared for.

Basin for Storage of Old Material, Brooklyn.

At this basin old material has been rafted and cared for.

Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

Floating Property.

All of the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary. Work has been in progress under Class I. of Contract No. 907; for building pile drivers. The work under Class IV. of the above contract for building derrick has not yet been commenced.

Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or private parties.

Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to, and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer, weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the water fronts of Richmond and Queens is in progress, and bench levels are being run along the water front between North Beach and College Point, in the Borough of Queens.

Repairs.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various times under orders from the Commissioner of Docks.

Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties, under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks, have been supervised during the quarter.

Recreation Structures.

The recreation structures have been maintained and cared for during the quarter.

Public Baths.

The public baths have been removed during the quarter and the premises restored to commercial use.

New Staten Island Ferry.

On the 10th of June, 1904, a contract was awarded for the construction and delivery of five steel screw propelling ferryboats, with two two-cylinder compound engines each. Four of these boats were built by the Maryland Steel Company, at Sparrow's Point, Md., and the fifth boat was built by the Burlee Dry Dock Company, at Staten Island, to whom a portion of the contract was sublet. All these boats have been finished during the quarter and went into commission on the 25th of October, 1905.

Contracts having been awarded for the construction of the necessary ferry terminals at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, and at St. George, Staten Island, the work has been in progress during the quarter.

Draughtsmen.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 4,172 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements, 4,559 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 141,333 square feet.

The total increase in wharfage room made by private parties under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries is 2,748 linear feet.


