The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 277 Broadway, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—The Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company has applied to this Commission for the necessary authority to extend its subway in Sixth avenue, from its present terminus at Thirty-third street up Sixth avenue and through Forty-second

street to the Grand Central Station. In Forty-second street, the tunnel will pass immediately below the present subway and will be above the Steinway tunnel. If the Steinway tunnel, at some future time, is extended under Forty-second street beyond Fourth avenue, it will be immediately below the tunnel to be built by the Hudson and Manhattan Company.

If these two extensions are made, the situation at the intersection of Forty-second street and Fifth avenue will be as follows, provided the present surface of Forty-second street be not depressed below its present level: The first level immediately below the surface of Fifth avenue may be occupied by a subway either for urban transportation or for use by an interurban railroad, such as the New York Central or the New Haven Railroad; upon the second level there will be the present subway; upon the third level the Hudson and Manhattan subway; upon the fourth level the Steinway tunnel extension.

If the level of Forty-second street be depressed, according to plans now before you, it will be impossible to build a subway, either for urban or interurban traffic, immediately below the surface. Any subway in Fifth avenue must then be placed upon the fifth level, or nearly 100 feet below the surface of the street. This will seriously interfere with and perhaps wholly prevent the construction of any subway running north and south upon this avenue, will greatly increase the cost of operation and decrease its usefulness.

In view of the limited number of longitudinal avenues which may be used for transportation purposes, it is the opinion of this Commission that nothing ought to be done which will interfere with their use for transit purposes, except what is absolutely necessary for a greater benefit to the City in other directions.

### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be in closed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
