Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, on Thursday, December 15, 1910.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

The Mayor, Hon. William J. Gaynor, presided.

After disposing of the Public Improvements Calendar the following FINANCIAL MATTERS were considered:

The minutes (Financial and Franchise Matters) of meeting held December 9, 1910, as printed in CITY RECORD December 15, 1910, were approved.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Tenement House Commissioner requesting the establishment of the following grades of positions:

First Deputy Commissioner, per annum, \$5,000; Second Deputy Commissioner, per annum, \$5,000; Superintendents, per annum, \$3,500; Secretary to Department, per annum, \$3,000; Secretary to Commissioner, per annum, \$2,500; Chief Clerk, per annum, \$2,250; Photographer, per annum, \$1,350; Watchman, per diem, \$3; Telephone Operator, per annum, \$1,050; Chief Inspector, per annum, \$2,800; Process Server, per annum, \$1,050; Inspector of Tenements, per annum, \$1,950; Tabulator, per annum, \$1,500.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Secretary presented the following communications (2) from the Comptroller submitting for adoption two resolutions relative to the retirement, pursuant to sections 165 and 166 of the Charter, of Edward O'H. Jervois, Clerk, and Isaac S. Barrett, Bookkeeper, in the Department of Finance, on an annuity of \$1,152 and \$1,200, respectively:

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, December 10, 1910.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—By authority vested in me as Comptroller under section 165 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby recommend to your Honorable Board the retirement from active service of Edward O'H. Jervois, Clerk in the Department of Finance. I further recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment grant to Edward O'H. Jervois the annual sum or annuity of one thousand one hundred and fifty-two dollars (\$1,152), as provided in section 167 of the Greater New York Charter, such payments to continue during the lifetime of the said Edward O'H. Jervois.

Mr. Jervois has been actively employed in the Department of Finance since December, 1869, with the exception of about two and a half years from June, 1881, to November, 1883, aggregating thirty-eight and a half years.

By reason of physical disabilities Mr. Jervois now applies for the annuity provided in the Charter for the retirement of employees in the Department of Finance after a period of thirty-five years or more. He has submitted to me a request that I make this recommendation to your Honorable Board, and that his retirement be made effective December 31, 1910. His request is as follows:

"December 3, 1910.

"WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller:

"Dear Sir—On December 23, 1910, I will have served for thirty-eight years and six months as an employee of the Department of Finance. My original appointment took effect December 23, 1869, but I was out of the service by reason of resignation—leave of absence—for two years and six months, from June, 1881, to November, 1883.

"Of late years I have suffered with rheumatism and catarrh, which, together with my impaired eyesight, compel me to request that I be retired from the City's service, under the provisions of sections 165, 166 and 167 of the Greater New York Charter. Doctor's certificate is hereto attached.

"In making this request, I desire to express the wish that your efforts to better conditions with regard to the government of this City, and to administer in a non-partisan, economical and businesslike manner, may receive the recognition to which, in my judgment, they are justly entitled. "This is to certify that Mr. Jervois, of 101 West 143d street, has been for a number of years and is at present under my professional care, suffering from rheumatism and also from impairment of vision, and in my opinion the close application necessary to the performance of clerical work is largely responsible for the latter condition, and further work of this kind will be detrimental to his health. From the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, submitting for approval, pursuant to resolution adopted June 3, 1910, plans and form of proposed contract for furnishing and erecting three-rail pipe fences in Colonial Park, between 150th and 155th streets, Manhattan, at an estimated cost of \$1,200.

From the President of the Borough of Richmond, requesting the authorization of an issue of \$10,000 special revenue bonds to meet deficiencies in the 1911 appropriation for snow removal.

From the Chief Justice, Court of Special Sessions, requesting the Board to authorize the additional issue of \$20,000 special revenue bonds (chapter 659, Laws of 1910), to provide means for additional salaries and for equipment, etc.

(On July 29, 1910, the Board authorized the issue of \$30,000 on account of the requisition for an appropriation of \$50,000 for the above purposes.)

From the Chief City Magistrate, First Division, requesting the Board to appropriate \$3,500 to provide for the payment of the salary of a temporary Magistrate for the period of six months, to take the place of Magistrate L. B. Crane.

From the Public Service Commission for the First District, requesting an appropriation of \$946,316 to provide for expenses and the compensation of employees during the year 1911.

From the Commissioner of Docks, submitting for approval, pursuant to resolution adopted June 3, 1910, plans, specifications and form of contract for replacing the present walls and partitions of the Record Room at Pier "A," North River, with fireproof construction, and for installing metal filing cases therein, at an estimated cost of \$8,700.

And resolutions of the Wyckoff Heights Taxpayers' Association, Borough of Queens, protesting against the decrease of \$175,000 in the appropriation to the Board of Education in the 1911 Budget.

Which were referred to the Comptroller.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Corporation Counsel in response to resolution adopted December 1, 1910, directing him to prepare and submit to this Board by December 9, 1910, a petition to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for a determination of the amount of the indebtedness incurred by The City of New York prior to January 1, 1910, for the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad which may be excluded in ascertaining the power of The City of New York to become otherwise indebted.

Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, December 7, 1910.
Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sirs—I am in receipt of a communication from your Secretary under date of December 1, 1910, transmitting resolution adopted by you directing me to prepare and submit to you by December 9, 1910, a petition for a determination of the amount of the indebtedness incurred by The City of New York prior to January 1, 1910, for the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad which may be excluded in ascertaining the power of the City to become otherwise indebted.

It appears from the recitals in the preamble thereof that your action was based upon the statement submitted by the Comptroller to you on May 31, 1910, which shows the status of rapid transit investment, including the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, as of December 31, 1909.

I am unofficially informed that there have been changes in the investment for this railroad since said day in the following, and possibly in other, particulars:

(a) Bonds to the amount of \$222,600 have been issued to discharge liability incurred.

(b) Payments of \$34,935.88 on April 30, 1910; \$35,330.06 on July 30, 1910, and \$36,727.25 on October 31, 1910, respectively, have been made for the quarters terminating April 1, 1910; July 1, 1910, and October 1, 1910, for interest-rental. These amounts are larger than those paid during the similar periods of 1909.

(c) There will be paid on December 31, 1910, the yearly sinking fund payment (one per cent on the bonds issued), as per October 31, 1909, which will also be larger than the amounts paid on this account in the year 1909.

(d) In the contract and land liability.

With this in mind, as well as the comparative remoteness of the statement submitted by the Comptroller to you on May 31, 1910, I am of opinion that the safer course will be to have the Comptroller prepare and submit a statement showing the present financial situation of this investment.

Chapter 276 of the Laws of 1910 provides for the presentation by The City of New York to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the First Judicial Department of "a verified petition, setting forth the facts." Furthermore, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is required by said act "to ascertain the proportion of the interest and amortization instalments of such indebtedness which the current net revenue received by the City from such investment is sufficient to meet."

The question might be raised that the proceeding could not be predicated upon a petition which did not set forth the facts as they were at a time at least approximately near to the day of its verification, and that you did not have before you the facts upon which you could ascertain the proportion, as required by the statute.

To obviate this question, I transmit for your adoption a resolution requiring the Comptroller to submit a statement as of the present date. Respectfully yours,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 1 of chapter 276 of the Laws of 1910, the Comptroller be and is hereby required to prepare and to submit to this Board a statement showing in detail indebtedness incurred by The City of New York for the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad prior to the first day of January, 1910, with the dates of maturity of such indebtedness, the terms of any and all agreements and contracts made by or in behalf of The City of New York with respect to such investment, the gross revenue received by the City therefrom, the interest paid and to be paid by the City on said indebtedness, the annual instalments necessary for the amortization thereof and the current net revenue derived by the City from said investment, to enable this Board to ascertain the proportion of the interest and amortization instalments of such indebtedness which the current net revenue received by the City from such investment is sufficient to meet.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy Comptroller, The President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The Secretary presented communications as follows:

Five, in response to resolution adopted November 23, 1910, relative to statements of the prospective requirements and needs of the several Departments, etc., for the authorization and issue of corporate stock during the year beginning July 1, 1911, and in subsequent years to 1915, as follows:

From the Change of Grade Damage Commission, from the Public Service Commission, from the Metropolitan Sewerage Commission (2), from the Department of Correction, from the Board of Water Supply.

From the East Side Flatbush Taxpayers' Association urging an appropriation for the development of Jamaica Bay.

From William Stonebridge, protesting against the expenditure of any funds for additional subways in view of the urgent need for better school accommodations.

And a report of the Comptroller, approving of the plans, specifications and estimate of cost (\$6,510) for forming new class rooms in Public Schools 10, 11 and 43, The Bronx, and for iron railings for Public Schools 93, 110 and 179, Manhattan, but advising that the matter be referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee before receiving the approval of the Board, for the reason that the books of the Finance Department do not show an available balance of \$6,510 in the account "CDE-83," to which fund it is proposed by the Board of Education to charge the cost of the work.

Which were referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

(On October 28, 1910, the above matter was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented communications, etc., as follows:

From the Secretary of the Citizens Union of The City of New York, submitting memorandum of the Citizens Union in favor of preserving effective competitive elements in the matter of rapid transit extensions under consideration.

From the Chairman, Executive Committee, Property Owners' Association of The Bronx, submitting resolution adopted by said association, protesting against the award of any contract for additional subways that does not include the Borough of The Bronx.

From Secretary, O. E. Larson Company, Brooklyn, requesting Board to favorably consider the triborough subway.

From John Beet, 5521 3d avenue, Brooklyn, urging the Board to favorably consider the extension of the 4th avenue subway now under construction to Fort Hamilton.

Resolution of the Board of Aldermen urging the Public Service Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to conclude at as early a date as possible any plan under consideration for increased transit facilities.

Resolution adopted by the East Side Property Owners and Business Men's Association endorsing the proposition relative to constructing additional subways made by Mr. William G. McAdoo.

Which were referred to the Transit Committee, consisting of the Mayor, the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller relative to the unscientific methods of carrying out certain local improvements, involving useless expense to be borne by the taxpayers of the City at large, as well as causing annoyance to residents on the line of said improvements, and recommending the adoption of resolutions (3) directing the Presidents of the various Boroughs and other City officers having in charge work involving paving, repaving or other surface improvement of streets, before advertising for bids to obtain from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity a certificate which shall set forth any contemplated improvements below the surface of such streets, etc., and that they co-operate with said Department to the end that the work contemplated be done at the same time, etc.

Which was referred to the Consulting Engineers of the different Boroughs for consultation with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

(On December 1, and again on December 9, 1910, the above matter was laid over for one week.)

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller, recommending approval, pursuant to resolution adopted June 3, 1910, of the specifications for the purchase of 150 fire alarm box mechanisms, 100 fire alarm box cases and 250 fire alarm box keyless doors, at an estimated cost of \$18,200.

Which was laid over.

(On December 1, 1910, the request of the Fire Commissioner for approval of the above specifications was referred to the Comptroller.)

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Department of Public Charities requesting, and report of the Comptroller recommending, approval, pursuant to resolution adopted June 3, 1910, of the plans, specifications and estimate of cost for the following work:

1. For pumping machinery, etc., for insane pavilion and two female dormitories, New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island; estimated cost, \$2,500.

2. Sewers for New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island; estimated cost, \$3,500.

(On November 23, 1910, the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities for approval of the above plans, etc., was referred to the Comptroller.)

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, Foot of East 26th Street, November 16, 1910.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In accordance with the resolution adopted by your Honorable body on June 3, 1910, requiring all City Departments to submit for the Board's approval, plans, specifications and estimates of cost prior to advertising for bids upon public works, funds for which have been released since January 14, 1910, or may be released hereafter, from the provisions of the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on January 14, 1910, or may be authorized in the Corporate Stock Budget for the year, I beg to submit herewith for your approval:

1. Plans and specifications for all labor and material required for auxiliary pumping machinery, pump house and water mains for insane pavilion and two female dormitories, New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island; estimated cost, \$2,500.

2. Plans and specifications for sewers for the New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island, at an estimated cost of \$3,500.

This is to be made a charge against the remainder of the corporate stock of C-CH-5, for additional dormitories, City Farm Colony, Staten Island, the original appropriation for which was \$200,000, the unencumbered balance in this appropriation being \$10,440.

In view of the fact that the construction of these sewers and the erection of this pump house and the laying of the water mains are absolutely necessary for the care of the inmates of these institutions, I would request that this matter be given immediate consideration in order that we may make the contracts for this work before the winter fully sets in. Gentlemen—Hon. Michael J. Drummond, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, with a communication dated November 16, 1910, transmits for approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board on June 3, 1910, plans and specifications for

1. All labor and materials required for auxiliary pumping machinery, pump house and water mains for the pavilion for the insane and two dormitories for female inmates, New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island; estimated cost, \$2,500.

2. All labor and materials necessary for the construction of sewers and appurtenances thereto at New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island, at an estimated cost of \$3,500.

I would report upon each item separately:

Item 1—The plans and specifications submitted call for water mains supplying the new pavilion for the insane and the two dormitories for female inmates with pumping apparatus designed to produce a suitable water pressure in all the buildings at the New York City Farm Colony.

The present water supply at the New York City Farm Colony, obtained from driven wells on the grounds and pumped by two small Worthington pumps, is inadequate.

A new dormitory for male inmates at the City Farm Colony has recently been occupied. A new pavilion for the insane, not yet occupied, has a temporary water connection, but is not in the vicinity of any sewer. Two new dormitories for female inmates, one of which is finished and the other to be ready in June, 1911, are not near any water or sewer main and cannot be used until proper sewer and water connections are made. These buildings are greatly needed.

Item 2—The plans and specifications provide for the extension of the sewer from the present point of discharge by means of an 8-inch vitrified earthenware pipe sewer to a point north of the dormitories for female inmates, eliminating the bacterial tanks and providing sewer connections for the new dormitories for female inmates and the pavilion for the insane.

The new sewer is designed to empty into a sedimentation tank to be installed in connection with another sewerage system from part of the Sea View Hospital, plans for which have been prepared and are about to be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

At the present time the sewer system from three dormitories of the Sea View Hospital, adjoining the New York City Farm Colony, discharges into bacterial tanks on the grounds of the New York City Farm Colony north of Manor road; the discharge from these tanks on the fields is very offensive.

A sufficient unexpended balance for the completion of these works is available from the amount released in the Corporate Stock Budget June 3, 1910, in the Fund C-CH-6, "Additional Dormitories, City Colony, Staten Island."

These improvements, being urgently necessary, and the plans and specifications and estimates of cost satisfactory, I advise that, pursuant to the resolution adopted June 3, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve:

1. Plans and specifications for all labor and material required for auxiliary pumping machinery, pump house and water mains for insane pavilion and two female dormitories, New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island; estimated cost, \$2,500.

2. Plans and specifications for sewers for the New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island, at an estimated cost of \$3,500. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—The Department had selected one of its most competent Enginemen to act in a supervisory capacity over the enginemen and mechanics employed in the pumping stations connected with the Brooklyn water supply system.

Complaints were filed with the Civil Service Commission that the assignment of this Engineman was in violation of the Civil Service Law. The Department stated all the facts in connection with this special assignment to the Civil Service Commission. Upon due consideration the Commission ruled that the Engineman would have to be returned to his regular duties, and that if the Department desired to continue such a position it would be necessary to have it properly established by law.

The man who has been selected has served about thirty (30) years as an Engineman, is thoroughly familiar with all the pumping appliances in the Brooklyn stations, and is a most capable and efficient employee. I would therefore request that, pursuant to section 56 of the Charter, there be established for this Department the position of Supervisory Engineer, at a salary of \$2,500 per annum. This is the present rate of salary, so that the new position will not entail any additional expense upon the Department. Yours truly,

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On November 5, 1910, the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested the establishment in that Department of the additional position and grade of Supervisory Engineer, at \$2,500 per annum, to provide for the appointment of a competent man to act in a supervisory capacity over the Enginemen and Mechanics in the Brooklyn pumping stations.

The duties of Supervisory Engineer were assigned, some time ago, to Frederick W. Hancock, who, according to the Civil List, entered the service of the City on August 3, 1874, and is now an Engineman at \$2,500 per annum. Complaints were made that the assignment of this Engineman was a violation of the Civil Service Law, whereupon the Municipal Civil Service Commission ruled that the Engineman would have to be returned to his regular duties.

The Commissioner states that the man selected to serve as Supervisory Engineer is thoroughly familiar with all the pumping appliances in the Brooklyn stations, and is a most capable and efficient employee.

It appears to be advisable that the Enginemen and Mechanics attached to the several pumping stations in Brooklyn should be under the supervision of a competent person in immediate charge of the operation and maintenance of the mechanical equipment of the stations, and we recommend the establishment of the requested position and grade for one (1) incumbent.

Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, 13 to 21 Park Row, New York, November 28, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Sir—I have to request that the following transfers amounting to the sum of two hundred and eleven thousand nine hundred and forty dollars and forty-five cents (\$211,940.45) and a revision of schedules be made within the appropriation of this Department for the year 1910, as per attached resolution.

The adoption of the accompanying resolution will enable me to transact the business of this Department for the balance of the year, and to liquidate all estimated liabilities.

You will note I am requesting a transfer of \$93,000 from the Borough of Manhattan, Special Contract Obligations, Disposal of Ashes, etc., to a similar account in the Borough of Brooklyn as the estimated annual output of ashes, etc., from the latter Borough will exceed the appropriation granted me for the current year by this amount.

To the Code No. 700, Repairs and Replacements by Contract or Open Order, Manhattan, Scow and Dumper Repairs, I have added the sum of \$11,000 for repairs to scows. These repairs must be made at once, as under the terms of the existing contracts for the Removal of Ashes, etc., in the Borough of Manhattan, the City leases these scows to the contractors at \$6 per diem.

To Code No. 696, the sum of \$24,700 is added to reimburse the accounts of Drivers, Hostlers and Stablemen.

To Code No. 720, Apparatus, Machinery, etc., Brooklyn, I have transferred the sum of \$20,225 for necessary equipment, as this Borough is constantly increasing in population, and requires additional plant to meet the situation; this also applies to the Borough of The Bronx, while in the Borough of Manhattan the transfer is for the replacement of wornout and condemned apparatus.

To Code No. 723 and No. 741, Hired Teams, Horses and Carts, I have transferred the sum of \$3,500 and \$7,000, respectively, as the equipment in these Boroughs is inadequate, and with the present force we are unable to care for the collection of the ashes and other material.

The balance of the transfers requested will enable me to adjust the various accounts. Respectfully,

Gentlemen—In the matter of the communication of Wm. H. Edwards, Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, under date of November 28, 1910, requesting the transfer of two hundred and eleven thousand nine hundred and forty-nine dollars and forty-five cents (\$211,949.45) and modification of schedules within the appropriations made to the Department for the year 1910, which was submitted to me for consideration and report, I submit the following:

That portion of the request relative to the transfer of ten thousand five hundred dollars (\$10,500) to appropriation accounts, entitled Hired Teams, Horses and Carts, was made the subject of report by me and has been provided for by a resolution of your Board adopted December 1, 1910.

I would further report on other items of the said request as follows:

Salaries and Wages.

The necessity for the request of transfer and the modification of schedules of appropriation accounts applicable to the payment of Salaries and Wages, is due to the fact that in the administration of the Department it has been deemed necessary by the Commissioner to exceed the specific appropriations for the payment of wages of Drivers, Hostlers, Stablemen and crews of steam dumpers, and to provide for the appointment of a Confidential Inspector, a position established by resolution of the Board of Aldermen July 19, 1910, but for which no provision was made in the Budget for the year 1910.

The violation of allowances granted in the schedule should have been avoided, and request made by the Commissioner for appropriate action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment prior to the administrative action on the part of the Department, causing a depletion of the specific appropriation accounts.

Examination of the Department records of expenditures made in the payment of salary and wages to November 24, 1910, and the estimated requirements for the balance of the year shows that the following appropriation accounts will require additional funds, viz.:

The total amount appropriated for the stated function for the several Boroughs is therefore in excess of the total estimated requirements. The surplus shown in the Borough of Manhattan will permit the transfer of \$111,227.15, the amount necessary to make provision for the estimated deficiencies of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, leaving an apparent surplus of \$14,248.96. This transfer would be within the appropriation, and does not involve additional funds.

Repairs to Scows.

Request is made for transfer of amount, \$11,000, to augment the appropriation account entitled 700, Repairs and Replacements by Contract or Open Order, Borough of Manhattan, to provide for the expense necessary to be incurred in the repairs to scows. The equipment of the Department consists of 58 scows, which are rented to the contractors at the rate of \$6 per day each, as provided under the terms of the existing contract for the Removal of Ashes, etc., in the Borough of Manhattan. The Department is prepared to award contract, on bids submitted, for the repairs of scows now out of service and additional appropriation is necessary to make contract effective. Aside from their rental value, the Commissioner deems it important that the scows be put in condition for active service, and to that end that contract be awarded at once. This amount, viz., \$11,000, may be transferred from appropriation account entitled 702, Special Contract Obligations, Disposal of Ashes, Street Sweepings and Rubbish, etc., Borough of Manhattan.

Gentlemen—In reference to a request from the Commissioner of Docks, under date of December 12, 1910, for the transfer of \$12,000 within appropriations to the Department of Docks and Ferries for the year 1910, I report as follows:

The request is in three wages accounts. It is proposed to take \$7,800 from No. 155, Bureau of Superintendence, and \$4,200 from No. 171, Operation, Bureau of Ferries, the total of \$12,000 to be credited to No. 145, Mechanical and Labor Force Engaged on Repairs, Bureau of Engineering.

The appropriation to No. 145 was \$180,000. This total has been decreased to \$108,000 by debit transfers. It is stated there is only \$996 in the account to meet payrolls to the amount of \$10,500 for the remaining three weeks of the year. Within two weeks the payroll for the account has been increased from \$2,800 to \$3,500. It is stated this payroll of \$3,500 a week is for a force at work repairing bulkheads along all parts of the water-front. It is further stated that \$3,500 is the lowest possible estimate for each of the two remaining weeks of the year. On the departmental estimate, and with a balance of \$996 in the account, \$9,504 would appear to be necessary.

I herewith transmit, without recommendation, for the consideration of this Board, two resolutions, which, if adopted, will grant the request to the extent of \$9,504.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On October 7, 1910, the President of the Borough of Richmond requested an authorization of corporate stock to the amount of \$38,000, for the Topographical Bureau in his office, on work in connection with the making of the City map during the first three months of 1911. In connection therewith, we report as follows:

A report by the Comptroller to your Board on May 27, 1910, contained a complete analysis of the expenditures and work of the Bureau from 1902 to 1909, inclusive. Based upon this report a total of \$159,000 in corporate stock was made available for the Bureau for 1910.

On September 30, 1910, an unencumbered balance of \$38,000 was available for the topographical work in Richmond. The President states this will be reduced to \$37 on December 31, 1910, by the following expenditures:

This force represents a yearly payroll of \$135,850. The expenditures for the first nine months of 1910 for other than payrolls amounted to \$9,461.69. It is estimated that the total for the twelve months will be \$12,620.

The estimate for 1911 calls for a force of 106, with a total payroll of \$140,050. Other expenditures are estimated at \$12,620, making a total for 1911 of \$152,670. This is \$6,330 less than the 1910 appropriation.

It is also proposed to increase five Laborers from \$720 to \$900 per annum each.

The President states it has been the plan in the Bureau to fix the rate for Laborers on topographic work at \$900, after one year of satisfactory service. At present there are 19 Laborers at \$900 and 5 at \$720. The latter are stated to have done satisfactory work for more than a year, and so it is proposed to increase their pay.

The President states that the additional Clerk at \$1,050 is necessary in order that the resolution of your Board requiring estimates based upon unit costs may be complied with. The Clerk is needed, the President states, for the collection of the data.

On December 9, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the authorization of corporate stock in an amount sufficient for the Topographical Bureau in The Bronx for the first six months of 1911. This action was recommended by your Committee so that allowances for the entire year for the Topographical Bureaus in the several Boroughs might be fixed in the Corporate Stock Budget.

We recommend that the request be granted in the sum of \$75,000 for the six months to July 1, 1911, and that a schedule of salaries and wages for the corporate stock fund of the Bureau be approved by the adoption of the attached resolutions.

Report of Transactions, November 7 to 13, 1910.

Communications Received—From the Comptroller: Receipt for security deposits accompanying proposals for poultry, fruits, etc., for Thanksgiving Day and Christmas; also for miscellaneous supplies opened November 10, 1910.

Stating that certificate was endorsed upon contract of the National India Rubber Co. of October 19, 1910, for lead-covered feeder, cables, etc., on Harts Island, on November 4, 1910.

Referring to failure of Contractor J. F. Donovan to make satisfactory delivery of soap under his contract with this Department, Comptroller asks what action will be taken in the matter. omies may be effected by such method of purchase. Letter answered by stating that the Department of Correction makes its contracts for meat by the carcass.

Transmitting form contemplated for City contracts, for consideration by the Commissioner of Correction. Form of contract returned with comments and suggestions. The 10 per cent. clause of section 518 of the Ordinances is meant for work contracts and not for contracts for supplies.

Chairman of Commission asks for data to be used in formulating a report on the Standard Testing Laboratory, submitting ten questions for answer. First eight questions may be answered in the negative. Milk is inspected for the Department of Correction by the Department of Public Charities and samples are sent to the Health Department for laboratory tests. All this is done by the courtesy of those Departments, without expense to the Department of Correction. About ten outside tests have been made. A test of soap was paid for by the Commissioner personally. The Commissioner of Correction favors the establishment of a central testing laboratory. Above information sent to Deputy Comptroller Fisher, Chairman of the Commission on Standardization.

From Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Transmitting copies of resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate, and which, in effect, place the responsibility for all plans and specifications for electrical light or power equipment on the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. That Department asks, therefore, that such plans and specifications be submitted as long a time as is possible before work is to be advertised, so as to allow for their careful consideration. 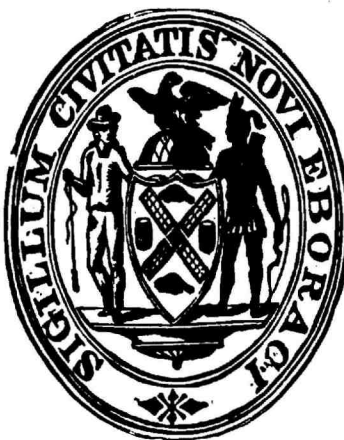
