REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER.

Hon. CALVIN TOMKINS, Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending December 31, 1911.

North River.

The landings in this locality have been maintained and repaired during the quarter by the force of the Department.

Pier "A," North River.

This pier upon which are located the executive offices of the Department has been maintained and kept in repair during the quarter. The work of replacing the present walls and partitions of the Record Room on Pier "A" with fireproof construction under Contract No. 1255, Class 1, was begun on September 11, 1911, and completed November 20, 1911. The work of installing metal filing cases in the Record Room under Class 2 of Contract No. 1255 was begun October 23, 1911, and is in progress.

Pier (New) 1, North River.

The work of constructing stairway on this pier under Contract No. 1255 was begun June 1, 1911, and finished October 18, 1911.

Cortlandt Street Section, South, North River.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has in progress the work of improving the waterfront in accordance with the new plan, beginning at the northerly line of Liberty st. and extending northerly 203.03 feet. This work is being done under a permit from and under the supervision of this Department.

The work at this section is being done under authorization of the Commissioner

of Docks of September 21, 1909, B. O. 6647. This section extends from the northerly side of 28th st. to the southerly side of 36th st., South Brooklyn, a distance of 2,142.82 feet, more or less. There have been completed up to date 2,022.824 linear feet of bulkhead wall on the top course of granite under the coping, leaving a balance of about 120 linear feet to be completed. During the quarter work has been in progress on the bulkhead wall proper, and 406 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made available.

Test piles and wash borings have been taken between 28th and 61st sts. Old wrecks have been removed from rear of the bulkhead wall between 28th and 36th sts. Backing log, cleats and mooring posts have been placed along the bulkhead wall between 33d and 36th sts. The approach to the pier at 35th st. is being graded and paved. The roadway along the bulkhead wall between 35th and 36th sts. is also being graded and paved. Filling is being placed between 28th and 31st sts. by the E. E. Smith Contracting Company, under B. O. 8724, and between 32d and 36th sts. by the same parties under B. O. 8284.

30th St., Brooklyn.

A contract, No. 1209, was prepared during a prior quarter for building a new pier at the foot of 30th st., South Brooklyn, to be known as the 30th Street Pier, but the contract has not yet been let.

33d St., South Brooklyn.

A contract, No. 1279, has been awarded for building a new steel freight shed with appurtenances on the pier at this street, and the work was begun on the 20th of June, 1911, and is still in progress.

39th St., South Brooklyn.

The pavement on the approach to the ferry at this street is being taken up and relaid under B. O. 6918. Ashes are being deposited under the trolley platform. 39th st. westerly of 2d ave. is being repaved and temporary drainage system placed thereat.

51st St., South Brooklyn.

The work of extending bulkhead platform, reinforcing bulkhead, pier, etc., is in progress under B. O. 8711.

54th St., South Brooklyn.

A sheet pile bulkhead has been constructed at this locality by the Kings County Lighting Company under B. O. 9495. Work was begun June 1, 1911, and finished October 20, 1911.

Bay Ridge Avenue Pier, Brooklyn.

Repairs have been made to this pier by the force of the Department under B. O. 9098.

South 5th St., Brooklyn.

The pier at this street has been repaired by the force of the Department under B. O. 9894.

Wallabout Basin, Brooklyn.

Repairs have been made to bulkhead along Clinton ave. extension and to Piers 1 and 4 by the force of the Department.

Noble St., Brooklyn.

Repairs have been made to the pier at this street by the force of the Department.

Greenpoint Ave., Brooklyn.

The work of removing and reconstructing pier and ferry bridges at this locality is in progress by the Interborough Ferry Company under permit from this Department.

South 2d-South 3d Sts., Brooklyn.

Boiler house is being built and bulkhead reconstructed at this locality by the American Sugar Refining Company under permit from this Department.

Pier 5, Wallabout, Brooklyn.

A one-story freight shed is being constructed at this locality by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company under permit from this Department.

Rodney St., Wallabout, Brooklyn.

A two-story building is being erected at this locality by the Corporation of F. Scholes under permit from this Department.

DeBruyns Lane to 20th St., Brooklyn.

Sheet pile bulkhead is being built at this locality by Mrs. Mary T. Warren under permit from this Department.

Manhattan Beach, Oceanside, Brooklyn.

A sea wall is being constructed at this locality by the Manhattan Beach Estates under permit from this Department.

Mill Island, Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn.

Dredging and filling are in progress at this locality by the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific Company under permit from this Department.

E. 61st-E. 66th Sts., Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn.

Dredging and filling are in progress at this locality by the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific Company under permit from this Department.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Brooklyn has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

North 10th St., College Point, Queens.

Ferry terminal is being constructed at this locality by the Twin City Ferry Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun September 20, 1911, and is still in progress.

Astoria, East River, Queens.

Tunnel shaft is being sunk at this locality by the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun September 2, 1910, and is in progress.

East River and Newtown Creek, Queens.

A one-story steel frame building is being constructed at this locality by the National Sugar Refining Company under permit from this Department.

Berrian Island, East River.

Filling is being placed at this locality by the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company under permit from this Department.

Barbadoes Creek, Morris to Kate and Adah Aves., Queens.

Bulkhead is being constructed and filling placed in the vicinity of Morris, Adah and Kate aves, Barbadoes Creek, by the Somerville Realty Company under permit from this Department.

Bayside Place, Queens.

Platform and houses have been built at this locality by Mrs. Matilda Calsing under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 19, 1911, and finished October 20, 1911.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Queens has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

A number of permits have been granted to occupy land and to erect structures thereon at Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens.

Jamaica Bay Improvement.

Surveys of the westerly portion of Jamaica Bay between Fresh Creek and Barren Island have been completed and plotted to a scale of 200 feet to the inch, forming the enlarged sectional maps. The plotting to a scale of 100 feet to the inch on the regular sheets showing minute detail is in progress. These maps extend from the head of Sheepshead Bay to the eastward as far as and including Fresh Creek. Since the establishing of bulkhead and pierhead lines for the entire Jamaica Bay system by the Federal Government in May new plan maps have been prepared which the Commissioner intends to submit to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval. These maps show the bulkhead and pierhead lines and marginal way. They have been submitted and are now before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Contracts have been prepared, but cannot be advertised until the question of title to property in the bed of Jamaica Bay in the vicinity of Canarsie as between the City and certain alleged individual owners is settled. This matter is now being adjudicated by the proper authorities. The proposed contract work comprises dredging the main channel and basin, dredging with filling in of the marginal way behind cheaply constructed bulkheads at the mouth of Fresh Creek, Paerdegat Creek and in the immediate vicinity of Canarsie.

Borough of Richmond.

A description of the work being done for the ferry terminals in this Borough will be found later on under the heading of "Ferries."

Work Supervised.

At St. George a shed is being erected on Pier 6 by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company under permit from this Department.

At West New Brighton structure has been rebuilt and filling placed in the vicinity of Columbia st. by Wm. S. Van Clief under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 1, 1908, and finished November 21, 1911.

At Elm Park launching ways are being constructed and dock repaired at Newark avenue by Edward Carver under permit from this Department.

At Port Ivory, Howland Hook, filling is being placed by the Proctor & Gamble Manufacturing Company under permit from this Department.

At Tompkinsville shed is being constructed over extension to Piers 4 and 5 by the American Dock and Trust Company under permit from this Department. Piers 4 and 5 at Tompkinsville are also being widened and extended by the American Dock and Trust Company.

At Stapleton City property is being filled in by the President of the Borough of Richmond under permit from this Department.

Near Rossville a small pier has been constructed by the Arthur Kill Land and Waterfront Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun October 19, 1911, and finished October 30, 1911.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Richmond has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

St. George, Borough of Richmond.

Repairs have been made to pier southerly of ferry premises at St. George by the force of the Department under B. O. 9919.

Mariners Harbor, Richmond.

Repairs have been made to the pier at Summerfield ave., Mariners Harbor, by the force of the Department under B. O. 9642. Work was begun November 6, 1911, and finished November 25, 1911.

Pavement on Marginal Street, North, East and Harlem Rivers.

The granite pavement along the North, East and Harlem rivers has been repaired from time to time, and the asphalt pavement where taken up to repair gas pipe by the Consolidated Gas Company has been relaid. Repairs have been made to the asphalt pavement during the quarters on the East River under contract No. 1261, class 2, and on the North River under contract No. 1282.

Old Material Storage Basin, Nott Ave., Queens.

Old material has been rafted and cared for.

Pile Basin, Shermans Creek.

The pile basin at Shermans Creek, Harlem River, has been maintained and cared for.

Timber Basin, 75th St., North River.

At the timber basin, timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required.

Department Yards at W. 57th and E. 24th sts.

At the Department yards the force of the Department has been engaged in construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. At the W. 57th st. yard a concrete building has been in course of construction since April 26, 1907, for use as a blacksmith shop, power house, etc. This structure is provided with a reinforced concrete coal pocket. The Department stores removed from the old building to suitable places were subsequently stored in the new storehouse. A new concrete oil house is also being constructed at the W. 57th st. yard.

Floating Property.

All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary.

Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer and weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the water-fronts of Brooklyn, Queens, The Bronx and Richmond is in progress.

Recreation Structures.

The recreation structures have been maintained and cared for during the quarter, and the work of furnishing and installing additional fire appliances on the recreation structures has been in progress under contract No. 1288.

Staten Island Ferry—St. George Terminal.

A contract, No. 1290, has been prepared and let for removing the present wooden trolley platform and building a new platform in steel and concrete and furnishing and installing electroliers, railings and electric cables at the St. George ferry terminal, and work will shortly be begun thereunder.

A new pump house has been built for the high pressure fire service, and the 8-inch service pipe has been extended to the same. An extension has been built to the platform at the ferry approach. All this work was completed on the 14th of December, 1911. The floor in the loading platform over portion of the newly built stairway is being restored.

Stapleton Terminal.

The proposition for establishing a municipal ferry to Stapleton was consummated on the 27th of May, 1909, by preparations made for the running of ferry boats from that point to Whitehall st., Manhattan. Plans and contract No. 1181 have been prepared for the construction of new ferry boats for service on this ferry. A contract has also been in course of preparation for constructing a new ferry terminal at this locality.

Port Richmond Terminal.

The proposition for extending the municipal ferry from Manhattan by an additional terminal at Port Richmond has been under consideration during the quarter.

South Brooklyn Ferry—39th St. Ferry, South Brooklyn.

On November 1, 1906, the City came into possession of the property of the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Company, operating a ferry between Whitehall st., Manhattan, and 39th st., South Brooklyn, and since that time the City has been operating the ferry as a municipal ferry. The concrete column pedestals and retaining wall are being pointed, and new temporary electric lighting system is being installed on the passenger walk. A contract, No. 1294, has been submitted for building a new ferry house and coal pocket, with appurtenances, at the 39th st. ferry terminal and is awaiting approval.

West Side Freight Terminal and Elevated Distributing Railroad.

In connection with plans submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Commissioner of Docks for the consolidation of the traffic requirements of the various trunk line railroads for the reception of freight and merchandise directly from car floats and piers into factories and warehouses, and the reverse movement of freight and merchandise from the warehouses to car floats, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company has submitted to the Board of Estimate plans for extensive alterations and additions covering its installation from Spuyten Duyvil Creek along the North River to the W. 30th st. yard, and from the W. 30th st. yard to the St. Johns Park terminal and thence to Cortlandt st., with the ultimate object of removing all its tracks south of the 80th st. yard from the street surface. These plans have been referred to the Commissioner of Docks and are now being looked into and studied by this Bureau, with the object of determining the necessary modifications in order to meet the requirements of The City of New York.

Drafting Room.

Plans and studies pertaining to the proposed West Side terminal, together with tunnel connection with the New Jersey railroads and with an elevated distributing railroad, have been made.

Work has been done in the preparation of plans and specifications for contract work and otherwise, and of studies, as follows:

Longshoremen's shelter between W. 16th and W. 17th sts.

Thirty-ninth st. ferry house, Brooklyn.

Extension to Pier 42, North River, to pierhead line.

Blueprint room for Ferry Bureau.

Extension to pier W. 45th st., North River, to pierhead line.

New pier at W. 135th st., North River.

New pier at 103d st., Harlem River.

Pier and boathouse, Ocean ave., Sheepshead Bay (studies), Brooklyn.

Recreation shed, W. 23d st., North River.

One thousand-foot piers, New West Washington Market.

Checking up the shop drawings for the 33d st. pier shed, Brooklyn, and for the trolley platform at St. George, Staten Island.

Examination of plans submitted with applications for permits to build by private parties, with reports thereon.

of Docks of September 21, 1909, B. O. 6647. This section extends from the northerly side of 28th st. to the southerly side of 36th st., South Brooklyn, a distance of 2,422.82 feet, more or less. There have been completed up to date 2,022.824 linear feet of bulkhead wall on the top course of granite under the coping, leaving a balance of about 120 linear feet to be completed. During the quarter work has been in progress on the bulkhead wall proper, and 406 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made available.

Test piles and wash borings have been taken between 28th and 61st sts. Old wrecks have been removed from rear of the bulkhead wall between 28th and 36th sts. Backing log, cleats and mooring posts have been placed along the bulkhead wall between 33d and 36th sts. The approach to the pier at 35th st. is being graded and paved. The roadway along the bulkhead wall between 35th and 36th sts. is also being graded and paved. Filling is being placed between 28th and 31st sts. by the E. E. Smith Contracting Company, under B. O. 8724, and between 32d and 36th sts. by the same parties under B. O. 8284.

30th St., Brooklyn.

A contract, No. 1209, was prepared during a prior quarter for building a new pier at the foot of 30th st., South Brooklyn, to be known as the 30th Street Pier, but the contract has not yet been let.

33d St., South Brooklyn.

A contract, No. 1279, has been awarded for building a new steel freight shed with appurtenances on the pier at this street, and the work was begun on the 20th of June, 1911, and is still in progress.

39th St., South Brooklyn.

The pavement on the approach to the ferry at this street is being taken up and relaid under B. O. 6918. Ashes are being deposited under the trolley platform. 39th st. westerly of 2d ave. is being repaved and temporary drainage system placed thereat.

51st St., South Brooklyn.

The work of extending bulkhead platform, reinforcing bulkhead, pier, etc., is in progress under B. O. 8711.

54th St., South Brooklyn.

A sheet pile bulkhead has been constructed at this locality by the Kings County Lighting Company under B. O. 9495. Work was begun June 1, 1911, and finished October 20, 1911.

Bay Ridge Avenue Pier, Brooklyn.

Repairs have been made to this pier by the force of the Department under B. O. 9098.

South 5th St., Brooklyn.

The pier at this street has been repaired by the force of the Department under B. O. 9894.

Wallabout Basin, Brooklyn.

Repairs have been made to bulkhead along Clinton ave. extension and to Piers 1 and 4 by the force of the Department.

Noble St., Brooklyn.

Repairs have been made to the pier at this street by the force of the Department.

Greenpoint Ave., Brooklyn.

The work of removing and reconstructing pier and ferry bridges at this locality is in progress by the Interborough Ferry Company under permit from this Department.

South 2d-South 3d Sts., Brooklyn.

Boiler house is being built and bulkhead reconstructed at this locality by the American Sugar Refining Company under permit from this Department.

Pier 5, Wallabout, Brooklyn.

A one-story freight shed is being constructed at this locality by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company under permit from this Department.

Rodney St., Wallabout, Brooklyn.

A two-story building is being erected at this locality by the Corporation of F. Scholes under permit from this Department.

DeBruyns Lane to 20th St., Brooklyn.

Sheet pile bulkhead is being built at this locality by Mrs. Mary T. Warren under permit from this Department.

Manhattan Beach, Oceanside, Brooklyn.

A sea wall is being constructed at this locality by the Manhattan Beach Estates under permit from this Department.

Mill Island, Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn.

Dredging and filling are in progress at this locality by the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific Company under permit from this Department.

E. 61st-E. 66th Sts., Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn.

Dredging and filling are in progress at this locality by the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific Company under permit from this Department.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Brooklyn has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

North 10th St., College Point, Queens.

Ferry terminal is being constructed at this locality by the Twin City Ferry Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun September 20, 1911, and is still in progress.

Astoria, East River, Queens.

Tunnel shaft is being sunk at this locality by the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun September 2, 1910, and is in progress.

East River and Newtown Creek, Queens.

A one-story steel frame building is being constructed at this locality by the National Sugar Refining Company under permit from this Department.

Berrian Island, East River.

Filling is being placed at this locality by the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company under permit from this Department.

Barbadoes Creek, Morris to Kate and Adah Aves., Queens.

Bulkhead is being constructed and filling placed in the vicinity of Morris, Adah and Kate aves., Barbadoes Creek, by the Somerville Realty Company under permit from this Department.

Bayside Place, Queens.

Platform and houses have been built at this locality by Mrs. Matilda Calsing under permit from this Department. Work was begun August 19, 1911, and finished October 20, 1911.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Queens has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

A number of permits have been granted to occupy land and to erect structures thereon at Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens.

Jamaica Bay Improvement.

Surveys of the westerly portion of Jamaica Bay between Fresh Creek and Barren Island have been completed and plotted to a scale of 200 feet to the inch, forming the enlarged sectional maps. The plotting to a scale of 100 feet to the inch on the regular sheets showing minute detail is in progress. These maps extend from the head of Sheepshead Bay to the eastward as far as including Fresh Creek. Since the establishing of bulkhead and pierhead lines for the entire Jamaica Bay system by the Federal Government in May new plan maps have been prepared which the Commissioner intends to submit to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval. These maps show the bulkhead and pierhead lines and marginal way. They have been submitted and are now before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Contracts have been prepared, but cannot be advertised until the question of title to property in the bed of Jamaica Bay in the vicinity of Canarsie as between the City and certain alleged individual owners is settled. This matter is now being adjudicated by the proper authorities. The proposed contract work comprises dredging the main channel and basin, dredging with filling in of the marginal way behind cheaply constructed bulkheads at the mouth of Fresh Creek, Paerdegat Creek and in the immediate vicinity of Canarsie.

Borough of Richmond.

A description of the work being done for the ferry terminals in this Borough will be found later on under the heading of "Ferries."

Work Supervised.

At St. George a shed is being erected on Pier 6 by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company under permit from this Department.

At West New Brighton structure has been rebuilt and filling placed in the vicinity of Columbia st. by Wm. S. Van Clief under permit from this Department. Work was begun June 1, 1908, and finished November 21, 1911.

At Elm Park launching ways are being constructed and dock repaired at Newark avenue by Edward Carver under permit from this Department.

At Port Ivory, Howland Hook, filling is being placed by the Proctor & Gamble Manufacturing Company under permit from this Department.

At Tompkinsville shed is being constructed over extension to Piers 4 and 5 by the American Dock and Trust Company under permit from this Department. Piers 4 and 5 at Tompkinsville are also being widened and extended by the American Dock and Trust Company.

At Stapleton City property is being filled in by the President of the Borough of Richmond under permit from this Department.

Near Rossville a small pier has been constructed by the Arthur Kill Land and Waterfront Company under permit from this Department. Work was begun October 19, 1911, and finished October 30, 1911.

Other work done by private parties in the Borough of Richmond has been supervised and a general supervision of the water-front made.

St. George, Borough of Richmond.

Repairs have been made to pier southerly of ferry premises at St. George by the force of the Department under B. O. 9919.

Mariners Harbor, Richmond.

Repairs have been made to the pier at Summerfield ave., Mariners Harbor, by the force of the Department under B. O. 9642. Work was begun November 6, 1911, and finished November 25, 1911.

Pavement on Marginal Street, North, East and Harlem Rivers.

The granite pavement along the North, East and Harlem rivers has been repaired from time to time, and the asphalt pavement where taken up to repair gas pipe by the Consolidated Gas Company has been relaid. Repairs have been made to the asphalt pavement during the quarters on the East River under contract No. 1261, class 2, and on the North River under contract No. 1282.

Old Material Storage Basin, Nott Ave., Queens.

Old material has been rafted and cared for.

Pile Basin, Shermans Creek.

The pile basin at Shermans Creek, Harlem River, has been maintained and cared for.

Timber Basin, 75th St., North River.

At the timber basin, timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required.

Department Yards at W. 57th and E. 24th sts.

At the Department yards the force of the Department has been engaged in construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. At the W. 57th st. yard a concrete building has been in course of construction since April 26, 1907, for use as a blacksmith shop, power house, etc. This structure is provided with a reinforced concrete coal pocket. The Department stores removed from the old building to suitable places were subsequently stored in the new storehouse. A new concrete oil house is also being constructed at the W. 57th st. yard.

Floating Property.

All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary.

Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer and weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the water-fronts of Brooklyn, Queens, The Bronx and Richmond is in progress.

Recreation Structures.

The recreation structures have been maintained and cared for during the quarter, and the work of furnishing and installing additional fire appliances on the recreation structures has been in progress under contract No. 1288.

Staten Island Ferry—St. George Terminal.

A contract, No. 1290, has been prepared and let for removing the present wooden trolley platform and building a new platform in steel and concrete and furnishing and installing electroliers, railings and electric cables at the St. George ferry terminal, and work will shortly be begun thereunder.

A new pump house has been built for the high pressure fire service, and the 8-inch service pipe has been extended to the same. An extension has been built to the platform at the ferry approach. All this work was completed on the 14th of December, 1911. The floor in the loading platform over portion of the newly built stairway is being restored.

Stapleton Terminal.

The proposition for establishing a municipal ferry to Stapleton was consummated on the 27th of May, 1909, by preparations made for the running of ferry boats from that point to Whitehall st., Manhattan. Plans and contract No. 1181 have been prepared for the construction of new ferry boats for service on this ferry. A contract has also been in course of preparation for constructing a new ferry terminal at this locality.

Port Richmond Terminal.

The proposition for extending the municipal ferry from Manhattan by an additional terminal at Port Richmond has been under consideration during the quarter.

South Brooklyn Ferry—39th St. Ferry, South Brooklyn.

On November 1, 1906, the City came into possession of the property of the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Company, operating a ferry between Whitehall st., Manhattan, and 39th st., South Brooklyn, and since that time the City has been operating the ferry as a municipal ferry. The concrete column pedestals and retaining wall are being pointed, and new temporary electric lighting system is being installed on the passenger walk. A contract, No. 1294, has been submitted for building a new ferry house and coal pocket, with appurtenances, at the 39th st. ferry terminal and is awaiting approval.

West Side Freight Terminal and Elevated Distributing Railroad.

In connection with plans submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Commissioner of Docks for the consolidation of the traffic requirements of the various trunk line railroads for the reception of freight and merchandise directly from car floats and piers into factories and warehouses, and the reverse movement of freight and merchandise from the warehouses to car floats, the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company has submitted to the Board of Estimate plans for extensive alterations and additions covering its installation from Spuyten Duyvil Creek along the North River to the W. 30th st. yard, and from the W. 30th st. yard to the St. Johns Park terminal and thence to Cortlandt st., with the ultimate object of removing all its tracks south of the 80th st. yard from the street surface. These plans have been referred to the Commissioner of Docks and are now being looked into and studied by this Bureau, with the object of determining the necessary modifications in order to meet the requirements of The City of New York.

Drafting Room.

Plans and studies pertaining to the proposed West Side terminal, together with tunnel connection with the New Jersey railroads and with an elevated distributing railroad, have been made.

Work has been done in the preparation of plans and specifications for contract work and otherwise, and of studies, as follows:

Longshoremen's shelter between W. 16th and W. 17th sts.

Thirty-ninth st. ferry house, Brooklyn.

Extension to Pier 42, North River, to pierhead line.

Blueprint room for Ferry Bureau.

Extension to pier W. 45th st., North River, to pierhead line.

New pier at W. 135th st., North River.

New pier at 103d st., Harlem River.

Pier and boathouse, Ocean ave., Sheepshead Bay (studies), Brooklyn.

Recreation shed, W. 23d st., North River.

One thousand-foot piers, New West Washington Market.

Checking up the shop drawings for the 33d st. pier shed, Brooklyn, and for the trolley platform at St. George, Staten Island.

Map plans for development from Oak Point to Throgg's Neck, The Bronx.

Map of the port of New York.

Examination of plans submitted with applications for permits to build by private parties, with reports thereon.

The routine office work and blue printing of plans and maps as required.

Wharfage Room.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounts to 1,682 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements amounts to 2,789 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 35,837 square feet. New wharfage room made by private parties under permit from this Department amounts to 5,540 linear feet, and the wharfage room destroyed by private parties amounts to 11,028 linear feet. 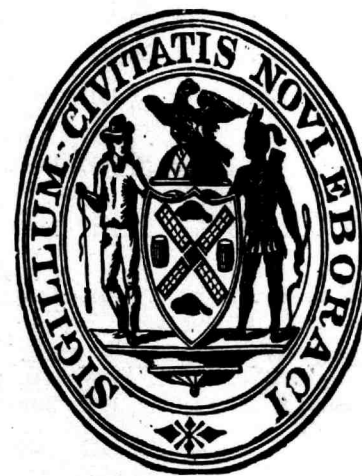

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company the consent of The City of New York as more fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made and entered into this day of , 191 , by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, a corporation formed under and pursuant to the Laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The Company on or about the 10th day of August, 1883, filed a certificate of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State as the New England Telegraph Company; and

Whereas, The said New England Telegraph Company on or about July 26, 1884, filed with the Postmaster-General of the United States of America a certificate of acceptance of the restrictions and obligations imposed on telegraph companies by an Act of Congress of the United States, passed July 24, 1866, entitled, "An Act to aid in the construction of telegraph lines and to secure to the government the use of the same for postal, military and other purposes," and by title 65 of the Revised Statutes of the United States; and

Whereas, The said New England Telegraph Company on or about April 20, 1910, assumed the name of Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, by which it is now known, pursuant to an order of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, authorizing it so to do; and

Whereas, The Company has now applied for the consent of the City to the laying of certain underground conduits between the Borough of Manhattan and Far Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, which consent, the Board is advised, is required under the provisions of section 102 of the Transportation Corporations Law (chapter 219 of the Laws of 1909); now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions herein contained, the City and the Company covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby consents to the construction, erection, maintenance and operation by the Company of the following:

- Two (2) conduits, each not more than three (3) inches inside diameter with the necessary junction boxes, manholes and appurtenances therein from a point at the intersection of Dover and Water sts., Borough of Manhattan; through and along Dover st. to South st.; thence through and along South st. to a point situated near the northerly boundary of the property belonging to the City at the foot of Roosevelt st., now leased to the Clyde Steamship Company, and known as Pier (new) 22; thence underneath said property to the easterly extremity of the pier occupied by the Clyde Steamship Company; thence under the East River to a point near the northwestern extremity of the wharf belonging to the City at the tower of the Brooklyn end of the Brooklyn Bridge; thence beneath said wharf to a point in Water st., Borough of Brooklyn, near the northeastern corner of the aforesaid property; thence through and along Water st. to Dock st.; thence through and along Dock st. to Front st.; thence through and along Front st. to a point where they will join the route of the present conduits of The Commercial Cable Company; thence through and along Front st. to Hudson ave.; thence through and along Hudson ave. to Park ave.; thence through and along Park ave. to Vanderbilt ave.; thence through and along Vanderbilt ave. to Plaza st.; thence along Plaza st. to St. Johns place.

Together with the privilege of constructing and maintaining one (1) small cable house on the wharf or pier on each side of the East River for the purpose of connecting the underground land cables with the two cables to be laid under the East River.

- Four (4) conduits, each not more than three (3) inches inside diameter, with the necessary junction boxes, manholes and appurtenances therein, from a point at the intersection of Plaza st. and St. Johns place, Borough of Brooklyn; thence through and along St. Johns place to East New York ave.; thence through and along East New York ave. to Liberty ave.; thence through and along Liberty ave. to Linwood st.; thence through and along Linwood st. to Belmont ave.; thence through and along Belmont ave. to Railroad ave.; thence through and along Railroad ave. to Pitkin ave.; thence through and along Pitkin ave. to the property, formerly of the Brooklyn City Water Works, now known as the conduit lands (Conduit ave.); thence through and along the said conduit lands (Conduit ave.) to the boundary line between the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; thence continuing along the conduit lands (about 4½ miles) to the point of intersection of the said conduit lands with the Rockaway turnpike; thence through and along the Rockaway turnpike to the boundary line between The City of New York and the County of Nassau.

Also beginning at the intersection of Central ave. and McNeil ave., Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens; thence through and along McNeil

ave. to Broadway; thence through and along Broadway to its intersection with Oak st., Rockaway turnpike and Jarvis lane; thence through and along Jarvis lane to a point where it joins or intersects Grand View ave.; thence through and along Grand View ave. and in a line therewith to the beach at Far Rockaway, there to connect with the ocean cables of The Commercial Cable Company, which are to be brought to a land connection at this point.

All as shown on a map or plan entitled: "Map or plan to accompany the petition of the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, dated February 4, 1911, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for permission to construct conduits and draw cables therein from a point at the intersection of Dover and Water sts., Borough of Manhattan, through the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to the beach at Far Rockaway, as more specifically set forth in the petition of the Company," and signed by C. C. Adams, as Vice-President, a copy of which is attached hereto, and is to be deemed a part of this contract.

Sec. 2. The consent hereby given is in consideration of and subject to the following provisions and conditions:

First—This contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto that the Company will not use the said conduits or conductors for which consent is hereby granted for any other purpose than as a telegraph line in connection with the cable lines of the Postal Telegraph-Commercial Cable system, so-called.

Second—The said consent to construct, maintain and operate said conduits and their appurtenances shall continue and extend for the period of the duration of the Company and any renewals of its chartered existence in accordance with the laws of the State of New York.

Third—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over or through the same route, hereinbefore described, or any portion thereof.

Fourth—The consent hereby granted shall not be assigned, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—The Company shall commence construction of the conduits herein consented to within six (6) months from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and complete the construction of the same, and have the necessary cables and conductors drawn into the same and commence operation within two (2) years thereafter, otherwise this consent shall cease and determine; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion, here specified, may be extended by the Board; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvements, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction shall be considered extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Sixth—Said conduits shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said conduits shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Upon completion of the work the grantee shall furnish to the Presidents of the Boroughs plans of such character as they may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structure installed; also the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work. The depth below the street surface of the new structures and substructures encountered must be shown; also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb line intersection.

Seventh—The Company where it has opened any street or avenue for the purpose of laying or repairing the conduits and cables herein consented to, shall properly restore said pavement and maintain the same for a period of one year, all at its own expense. If the Company shall, after five (5) days' notice from either the President of the Borough of Brooklyn or the President of the Borough of Queens, or any other proper City official, neglect to so restore or maintain said pavement, then the said Presidents, or either of them, or such other proper official, shall be authorized to do so at the expense of the Company, and the cost of such restoration and maintenance shall be a proper charge against the Company. No street or avenue which shall be opened for the purpose of this construction or for any repairs subsequent to the completion of such construction shall be kept open for a longer period than the local authorities may prescribe, or where no period is prescribed, not longer than is reasonably necessary.

Eighth—The Company shall not construct any overhead wires, conductors or cables, or erect any poles upon or along the route for which consent is herein granted, or any part of the same, and it is distinctly understood and agreed that such conduits and cables, and every portion thereof shall be placed and constructed underneath the surface of the streets and avenues and other public places and property on such route.

Ninth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken under the consent granted.

Tenth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required

on account of the construction or operation of the conduits, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the consent hereby granted to construct and operate these conduits and conductors shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits and conductors in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits, conductors and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the conduits are laid be changed at any time after the same have been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall at its own expense, change said conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues, the Company shall take care of and protect the conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The wires, cables, conductors and conduits to be laid shall be employed for no other purpose than that explicitly set forth herein, except by consent of the Board, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate the said wires, cables, conductors and conduits for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Fifteenth—If the Company shall fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, and in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, the City shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits to be laid, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

The Company shall not, without the permission and consent of the lessee, enter into or use any wharves or piers or other public property affected by this contract, but which is leased by the City to any person or corporation.

Seventeenth—This consent is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the consent hereby granted shall file with the Comptroller of the City the joint and several bond of the Company and The Commercial Cable Company in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) conditioned that the Company will perform all the terms and conditions of this contract and each and every one thereof, and comply with all orders of the Board or other local authority acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the repairs of street pavement, quality of construction of the conduits and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or upon its failure to comply with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from said Companies or either of them.

Eighteenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Nineteenth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, boulevards, concourses, driveways, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, waterways, docks, bulkheads, wharves, piers or public grounds or waters," the City Aqueduct or Conduit Lands within and belonging to the City and any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, encountered in the route hereinabove described, and through or in which this contract shall operate.

Twentieth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case, other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights, and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-first—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues affected by this consent.

Sec. 3. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to authorize the Company to use the land, formerly of the Brooklyn City Water Works, now generally known as the Conduit Lands or the City Aqueduct, without the consent of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund first had and obtained in the manner and in accordance with the procedure for such consent required by "The Greater New York Charter." And nothing contained herein shall be deemed nor is anything contained herein intended or to be construed as giving to the said Postal Telegraph-Cable Company the consent of this Board, under its authority com-

ferred by "The Greater New York Charter," to the use of the said Conduit Lands for a further or longer term than the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is authorized to grant either by permission or lease or otherwise, or to the use of any other property of the City as above for a longer period than the local authority or authorities having the control and management of the same are empowered to authorize. And the said right to use the said Conduit Lands and other City property shall be subject to such conditions and provisions as may be imposed by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Sec. 4. This contract shall not take effect nor shall the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company exercise its privilege of constructing the underground conduits for which consent is herein granted, unless and until the Commercial Cable Company shall execute and file with the Board an instrument under seal, wherein it shall agree in consideration of the grant of the consent to be given by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the use of the City Aqueduct or Conduit Lands, to transfer to the City free of all cost and expense that portion of the present conduits, belonging to the said Commercial Company between Plaza st., Borough of Brooklyn, and the cable landing at Manhattan Beach, Coney Island, which is to be abandoned and through which no further operations in connection with the Atlantic cables will be conducted when the conduits hereinbefore referred to are completed and placed in operation, such portion to be so transferred being shown on the map or plan attached hereto. TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
