NEW YORK CITY ASYLUM FOR INSANE,  
July 21, 1880.

Hon. TOWNSEND COX, President of Board of Public Charities and Correction :

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to make the following report of labor performed by inmates of this institution during the quarter ending June 30, 1880 :

#### OUT-DOOR IMPROVEMENT.

Plowing ; planting and cultivating farm ; digging and carting vegetables to kitchen ; collecting and turning over manure ; unloading coal from barges ; weighing and carting same to both institutions ; screening coal and removing ashes ; loading and unloading lumber for the new wing ; keeping yards, roads, and walks in good repair.

#### CARPENTERS' DEPARTMENT.

New partitions in Assistant Physician's room in main hall ; making table for linen room ; three coffins ; towel racks ; clothes poles for laundry, and meat-block for kitchen ; new boiler platform, and new floor under platform in wash-house ; repairing and hanging emigration gate ; general repairs to locks, doors, and windows throughout the institution.

#### PAINTERS' DEPARTMENT.

Painting and varnishing in Wards H, I, D, K, and Assistant Physician's room ; painting and varnishing furniture ; painted 40 iron bedsteads and 25 bath-tubs ; putting in 495 panes of glass.

#### MASONS' DEPARTMENT.

Repairing and scraping walls in main hall, Assistant Physician's rooms, and Wards H and K ; repairing ceilings in Wards H, I, D ; white-washing rooms and water closets in Wards D and H.

#### ENGINEERS' DEPARTMENT.

General repairs to hot and cold water and gas pipes throughout the building.

#### SEWING ROOM.

Repairs and alterations to 4,320 linen and cotton and 3,085 woolen goods and articles of clothing.

HOMEOPATHIC HOSPITAL, WARD'S ISLAND,  
JULY 6, 1880.

Hon. TOWNSEND COX, President of Board of Public Charities and Correction :

SIR—I have the honor to submit the following report of labor accomplished at this hospital during the quarter ending June 30, 1880 :

Fitted up one large room with three (3) new bath-tubs, etc., for patients' bathing room.  
Iron guards put on windows in erysipelas ward.  
Made 1 16-foot bench, 1 closet, 3 bath-tub platforms, 2 pair crutches, 4 towel racks, 8 window pulls, 2 clothes racks, 3 door saddles.  
Repaired 2 tables, 4 bedsteads, 8 head rests, 7 doors, 2 wash-stands, 8 benches, 2 water-closets, 14 stools, 13 chairs, 3 towel racks, 2 meat boxes, 2 stretchers, portion of floor in Wards F and D, 38 windows (30 with new cord), 23 lights glass put in.



Painted 2 bedrooms, 1 pantry, 5 doors, 7 benches, portions of wall in Wards A and C.  
Kalsomined 3 washrooms, 1 pantry, 22 bedrooms, 3 large rooms, Staff office.  
Repaired in Linen Room—263 sheets, 60 pillow-cases, 167 cotton shirts, 36 white spreads, 14 colored spreads, 176 bed ticks, 31 roller towels, 10 hand towels, 350 cotton chemises, 224 flannel chemises, 125 flannel drawers, 47 dresses, 56 jackets, 141 pairs pants, 36 petticoats, 48 night gowns, 14 undershirts, 10 table cloths, 80 pairs stockings.  
At Gas-house 533,300 feet gas was manufactured for use of Insane Asylum and this hospital.  
At Bone Mill 225 barrels bone dust was manufactured for fertilizing purposes.

Report of mechanical and other labor performed by inmates of Alms-house, Blackwell's Island, in the quarter ending June 30, 1880:

Carpenters, etc.—44 days' work by wheel-wright at Penitentiary, 364 days' work by carpenters at new bath-house, 24 days' work at Central Office, 22 days' work at Warden's, 3 days' work at wards, 3 days' work at steamboat gang-planks, 2 days' work at General Store-keeper's, 1½ days' work at Steward's house, 1½ at sundries.

Made—1 wooden leg, 3 meat blocks, 1 bread barrel and 1 pump handle.

Repaired—17 bed springs, 46 chairs, 2 medicine stands, 1 baby carriage, 2 scrapers, 12 wheel-barrows, 1 door, 2 tables, 2 settees, 1 clock case, 1 wash stand, 3 stools, 1 bed stand, 1 mowing machine.

Put in 68 window sash cords, handled 3 hammers, headed 27 scrubs, handled 1 scraper.

Blacksmiths—Made 4 braces, 175 bolts, 112 nuts, 1 clincher bar, 1 wrench, 9 soldering irons, 2 feet of chain, 8 "S" hooks, 3 awning slides, 4 saucepan handles, 2 pipe hooks, 8 pairs bath-tub legs, 3 fire rakes, 1 scraper, 6 shovels, 680 hoop nails and 1 restraining plate, 418 spikes, 60 straps, 8 boiler handles, 2 slide bars, 100 bucket ears, 7 staples and rings, 12 pail handles, 28 staples, 46 washers, 7 lock screw bolts, 5 fire hoes, 2 picks, 8 cramps, 7 beam irons, 2 shovels, 1 pair hinges, 10 oven shovels.

Tailors—Made 22 winter pants, 212 caps, 100 blouses, 200 summer pants, and 2 boys' suits.

Repaired—673 pairs winter pants, 386 winter jackets, 141 vests, 57 coats, 375 jackets.

Altered—2 pairs pants, 1 jacket and 1 coat.

Tinsmiths—Made 27 pails, 1 tea kettle, 40 bake pans, 6 pudding pans, 20 six-gallon cans, 2 twenty-gallon boilers, 12 water coolers, 2 joints stove-pipe and 1 elbow, 3 coffee pots, 24 coffee kettles, 1 tea pot, 106 dippers, 6 dredging boxes, 60 card racks, 10 cups and saucers, and 200 pint cups.

Repaired—12 water cans, 16 dish pans, 61 kettles, 4 covers, 16 coffee cans, 15 milk cans, 2 dippers, 2 stew pans, 1 ice box, lined 1 pump.

Plasterers—Employed at general repairs, plastering, white-washing, kalsomining, etc., etc.

Painters—Employed at general repairs, painting, glazing, puttying, etc., etc.

Sewing Room—Knitted 84 pairs socks, 376 pairs stockings.

Made—120 shirts, 300 chemises, 200 petticoats, 350 aprons, 25 pillow ticks, 145 pillow cases,

397 sheets, 250 women's dresses, 11 bed ticks, 25 women's caps.

Repaired—951 dresses, 485 petticoats, 638 chemises, 823 shirts, 889 sheets, 256 bed ticks, 36

spreads, 511 undershirts, 30 pillow cases, 19 blankets, 1139 pairs socks, and 4 towels.

Wash-house—84,774 pieces clothing and bedding washed.

## HART'S ISLAND HOSPITAL, July, 1880.

Hon. TOWNSEND COX, President Department Public Charities and Correction:

SIR—I have the honor to transmit the labor report of this institution for the quarter ending June 30, 1880:

Carpenters—Have made 1 fancy table for nurse; Ward B, 1 corner closet; new base and supports for raising office building; piazza to front door of Dr. Mott's residence; 3 mosquito frames; 500 feet strips for beds in Wards A, B, and C; new steps to boat landing; removed all storm-doors, fancy corner closet, and 1 fork and knife case.

Repaired—Chairs and stools in Wards A, B, and C; floor in Ward B; ventilator in privy; railing of office building; doors, windows, etc.; seats of arm chairs; covers for wash-house barrels and general repairing.

Coopers—Rehooped all the water tanks.

Painters—Painted doors, water-pails, 100 pairs blinds; tarred water tanks, and bases of the wards and office building; whitewashed and plastered Wards A, B, and C, church, dining-room, kitchen, and laundry, and yellow-washed all the outside buildings.

Plumber—Put in grate in ironing stove; 13 stove pipe coverings.

Repaired—10 ventilators; put on new caps; repaired pumps in Ward C and kitchen; tank and pipes in Ward A; roof on office building, and general repairing of tin ware.

Tailor—Kept corporation clothing in good repair.

Laundry—Done washing for 300 inmates and 20 employees.

Gas-house—Made 35,000 feet of gas.

Sewing—Made 51 sheets, 24 shirts, 50 chemises, 56 pillow cases, 24 shrouds, 6 towels, 7

spreads. Repaired—305 sheets, 245 shirts, 206 chemises, 71 pillow cases, 21 petticoats, 69 night-gowns, 93 dresses.

Knitted—92 pairs stockings.

Farming and Gardening—Repaired and planted 2½ acres with corn and vegetables. Grass-plots, walks, and roads in general were kept in order by male convalescents.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at First, Second and Third District Prisons, from April 1 to June 30, 1880, by prison labor and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material:

FIRST DISTRICT PRISON.

Repaired Magdalen by removing two partitions, plastering walls and ceiling, built a doorway and casing, etc., and repaired four sky-lights.  
Painted 12 doors and all the woodwork on stairs leading to Magdalen.  
Reset pavement in prison yard, flagged floor of ten-day house, and plastered walls.  
Repaired water-closet, placed two sinks and Croton water in ten-day house for females.  
Painted front of boys' prison and fenced around the same and gates at Franklin street.  
Placed iron bars in five sky-lights, male prison, and built 40 new window sashes for sky-lights (each 4½ feet high by 2 feet wide).

SECOND DISTRICT PRISON.

Fitted up a padded cell for insane cases.

THIRD DISTRICT PRISON.

Painted roof of office and kitchen, repaired water-closet and repaired floor.

Blacksmiths—Made 144 window-guards, 3 pairs ice tongs, 2 pairs pipe tongs, 8 stove fenders, 8 cot frames, 25 leader hooks, 84 cast-steel plugs, 96 drills, 30 chisels, 19 pitching tools, 42 points, 3 hand hammers, 36 spikes, 395 bucket ears, 154 standards, 149 bucket straps, 164 bucket handles, 300 feathers, 90 tire bolts, 1 large gate, 1 lock and 3 keys for same, 1 boat hook, 1 cesspool grating, 1 scalping hammer, 2 butcher knives, 63 buckles for straps, 10 cross bars and 108 upright bars for windows of new cook and boiler house.

Repaired and altered 7 iron bedsteads; also carts, wagons, wheelbarrows, wheels, etc., etc., belonging to the Department.

Tinsmiths—Made 133 feet galvanized iron pipe, 14 caps, 43 galvanized iron coal hods, 12 dip-pers, 1 coffee pot, 107 quart cups, 100 mess pans, 6 wash basins, 1 four-gallon can, and 1 ice box lined. All tinware belonging to the institution repaired and kept in order, and all necessary repairs to prison and adjacent roofs.

Carpenters—Made 1 dead wagon, 1 bread wagon, 2 stone trucks, 11 handbarrows, 13 wheelbarrows, 3 fire ladders, 73 water-pails, 100 buckets, 36 stools, 6 maple rollers, 11 tables, 19 benches, 3 sets shelving, 2 pairs shafts, 48 wheelbarrow legs, 2 step-ladders, 54 wisp-broom handles, 1 wardrobe, 89 dozen clothes-pins, 2 pairs oars, 37 wash kids, 4 telegraph cable boxes, 8 washing-machine dashers, 6 bedstands, 584 bed-blocks, 7 soup-tubs, 1,091 coffins, 35 window and 2 door frames, 128 hammer handles, 35 straight-edges, 300 tallies.

Repaired—461 cell buckets, 42 wheelbarrows, 72 soup-tubs, 16 wash kids, 15 stools; repairs and painting done on all vehicles belonging to the Department.

Tailors and Cot Makers—Made 254 pairs woolen pants, 308 pairs summer pants, 67 cot bottoms, 3 citizens' suits for boys at Bellevue Hospital, and repaired 618 woolen jackets, 1,142 pairs woolen pants, 570 woolen vests, 95 caps, and 718 cot bottoms.

Broom and Brush Makers—Made 209 dozen brooms, 215 dozen scrubs, 3 dozen wisp-brooms.

Shoemakers—Made 2,455 pairs men's shoes and 1,000 pairs women's shoes.

Repaired—1,732 pairs men's shoes and 81 pairs women's shoes.

At the Sewing Room—Female prisoners have made 150 women's wrappers, 145 women's dresses, 110 women's petticoats, 707 girls' dresses, 250 girls' petticoats, 604 aprons, 530 chemises, 100 roller towels, 512 hand towels, 250 sheets, 100 crib pillow-cases, 430 men's shirts, 200 pillow ticks, 1,102 pairs women's shoes.

Repaired—2,625 men's shirts, 572 undershirts, 1,268 socks, 148 dresses, 284 petticoats, 367 chemises, 142 pairs stockings, 498 pairs summer pants, 317 pillow ticks, 12 bed-ticks.

At the stone shed prisoners are daily employed cutting building stone, window jambs, sills, lintels, water table, bases, newel caps, door steps, hand-rails, spandrels, light holes, etc., etc.

By prisoners employed at out door labor the roads and seawall have been kept in proper repairs. 70 barges of dirt, 115 tons of coal, 135 tons of ice have been discharged.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 622.

They have been employed as follows: An average of 52 men at Randall's Island making roads, filling in low grounds, unloading barges of dirt, ice, and coal, and quarrying; 63 men at Ward's Island unloading dirt barges and working on new wing of Insane Asylum; 52 men in Blackwell's Island quarry; 82 men as stone cutters; 30 men as stone breakers; 27 men as blacksmiths; 8 men as tinsmiths; 54 men as carpenters, painters, and coopers; 74 men as shoemakers, tailors, broom, brush, and cot makers; 27 men as gardeners; 17 men in bucket gang; 10 men as whitewashers; 24 men continually in Hospital; 17 men building new boiler and cook house; 18 in prison and locked in cells; 67 in and around prison as utility men.

## Hon. TOWNSEND COX, President Board of Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction:

SIR—I have the honor to submit my report of the labor performed at this Asylum, for the quarter ending June 30, 1880:

Carpenters—Made wooden gutter 28 feet long for carrying off night-soil from Pavilion 1; erected wooden supports for same; meat bench and delph closet for kitchen; also tea, coffee, and sugar box for same; medicine chest and mosquito frames for Assistant Physician's beds; packing box for Medical Superintendent, Blackwell's Island Asylum; 2 document boxes for office papers; 4 slat doors for Pavilions D and E; water closet and boxes for female help; two window poles 26 feet long for raising windows of Pavilions 1 and 2; cover for water pail.

Painters—Painted medicine chest, meat table, office closet and 2 boxes, 4 slat doors of Pavilions D and E, 3 meat barrels of same; also 20 water hogsheads and 38 lights of glass put in Pavilions and kitchen.

Plumbers—Made 26 tin caps for stove pipe holes of Pavilions; repaired water pumps of 4 Pavilions; roof ventilators; tin ware in kitchen; clock; put grate and bricks in kitchen caldron and repaired same; stove-pipe repaired; also repaired 36 feet in same Pavilion; roof of Pavilion D repaired.

Engineer—Took apart, cleaned, packed and boxed steam pump every two weeks; also general repairing of gas and water pipes in the several Pavilions.

In conclusion, I would state that much general and miscellaneous work has been done, both in the Pavilions and about the grounds surrounding the same.

The accompanying report will show the amount of work done by inmates of this Asylum, for the quarter ending June 30, 1880.

SIR—The following report of the labor performed by inmates of Branch Workhouse for the quarter ending June 30, is respectfully submitted for the inspection of your Honorable Board.

The average number of male help during the quarter was 123, of which 77 have been working in the various gangs, and the remainder have been employed in the different shops connected with the institution and attending to miscellaneous duties necessary to its well being.

A statement of the mechanical and other labor is herewith given in detail:

For Branch Lunatic Asylum—Made 4-feet 6 1/4 stove-pipe, 27 stove-pipe caps, put in 2 stop-cocks, 2 water gauges, kept in order pumps and connections, repaired 9 pieces kitchen ware.

For Hart's Island Hospital—Made 1 coffee pot, 23 stove-pipe caps, repaired 1 water-tank, 1 bath-tub, waste-pipe, attended to repairs for water service in general.

## CHAPTER 195.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## ARREARS OF TAXES.

## NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of Real Estate in said city, that, as provided by chapter 123 of the Laws of 1880, they may now pay any arrears of taxes and Croton water rents levied prior to the year 1877, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum. ## CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The Comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the Comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
