Wilson to erect a fence in front of the Equitable Building, in Broadway, between Cedar and Pine streets, to project outwardly not more than six feet, in order to give protection to persons passing in front of the said building, during the alterations and repair of said building, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.
