

Sec. 2. Each of the Sealers of Weights and Measures in the City of New York shall, imme diately upon receiving any such report as is in the foregoing section mentioned, adjust and make true, correct and conformable to the standard of the State, each and every weight, scale and measure in such report mentioned, or cause the same to be done, under his supervision, and marked upon each such weight, scale and measure the initials of his name and the year in which the same

is so adjusted and made true, correct and conformable.

Sec. 3. Each of the said Inspectors shall, on the last day of each and every week, make a report in writing to the Comptroller of the City of New York, which shall contain a list or account of all weights, scales, measures and other instruments used for weighing or measuring goods, wares or merchandise purchased or sold, inspected by him during the week, together with the names of

of all weights, scales, measures and other instruments used for weighing or measuring goods, wares or merchandise purchased or sold, inspected by him during the week, together with the names of the owners, possessors or users of such weights, scales, measures and other instruments, respectively, the places where the same, respectively, were inspected and whether the same, respectively, were or were not true, correct and conformable to the standard of the State, and which of the same not being sealed or not being conformable to the standard of the State, or both, were reported by him to the Sealer of his district, and when the same, respectively, were so reported.

Sec. 4. Each of the said Sealers shall, on the last day of each and every week, make a report in writing to the Comptroller of the City of New York, which shall contain a list or account of all weights, scales, measures and other instruments used for weighing or measuring goods, wares or merchandise purchased or sold, which, during the week, have been reported to him by an Inspector of Weights and Measures, to be unsealed, unmarked, incorrect, out of order or not conformable to the standard of the State, together with the names of the persons or firms owning, using or possessing the same, respectively, and the places were the same were found, as the same were reported to him by said inspector; and also of all weights, scales, measures and other instruments for weighing or measuring, which, during the week, have been by him, or under his supervision, amended, corrected, made true, put in order or made conformable to the standard of the State, and by him sealed or marked as above provided.

Sec. 5. Each of the said Inspectors and Sealers shall pay over weekly, on the last day of the week, to the Chamberlain, all the fees which, during the week, he has received or collected, taking the Chamberlain, all the fees which, during the week, he has received or collected, taking the Chamberlain streep therefor in duplicate, and shall immediately thereafter, and

same day, deliver to the Comptroller of the City of New York one of said duplicates, and an account in writing stating from whom each and every part and parcel of said fees was received and for what particular service and on what day; and stating also in detail for what services performed or rendered by him in the course of his duty during the same time, the fees have not been paid, and the name of the person or persons liable for such fees.

Atter a protracted trial the testimony taken proves conclusively that Second Assistant Chief of Department John McCabe is guilty of the charge of incapacity in having unnecessarily sent out the signal 6-6-6-12-518-767 on the night of the 5th of July during the celebration of Independence Day, for the fire in the neighborhood of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Third avenue, Harlem, the effect of said signal, taken in connection with the other signals previously sent out, being to leave unprotected by fire-extinguishing apparatus (with the exception of Engines 14 and 16 and the second section of Engine Company 26) for a considerable period on that dangerous night, all the lives and property on Manhattan Island, above Fourteenth street, and in a large portion of the annexed district. The charge of incapacity against Second Assistant Chief of Department McCabe, is one of the most serious that has ever been presented by the Chief of Department against a subordinate for the action of this Board, affecting, as it does, the officer who stands second in the direct line of succession to the highest command in the uniformed force of the New York Fire Department. The testimony being such as to shut out any reasonable doubt of the guilt of the accused, the question arises as to how the offense proven should be punished. The alternative before this Board is either to reprimand or fine McCabe, and so permit him to remain in an important position of command (with testimony from his own lips before the Board, that under exactly similar conditions he would repeat the act upon which the Chief of Department has founded the charges against him) or else to remove him from office; because his defense had been an attempt to justify his action on the ground that he was right and his superior officers wrong, and to array his opinion against the correctness of the Department records and the efficiency of the Department fire-extinguishing force. The Commissioners must now act without hesitation because, in their opinion, the maint

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the resolution of your Honorable Board, adopted July 22, 1886, that the Chief and Assistant Chief of Department should forward for the consideration of the Board of Fire Commissioners the name of the Chief of Battalion who, in their deliberate opinion, by reason of his experience, skill, coolness and good judgment as a fireman, is best qualified to fill the position of Second Assistant Chief of Department, we have the honor to report that, after considering the qualifications of all the Chiefs of Battalion, we would respectfully suggest the name of Chief of Battalion Francis J. Reilly for your consideration, he being, in our opinion, best qualified to fill the position of Second Assistant Chief of Department, for the following reasons: He has served in the different grades of the Department for nearly twenty-one years (having been appointed September, 1865), and as a company officer from October, 1870, to February, 1880, and during the greater part of that time he was in command of one of the most important companies, viz.: Hook and Ladder Company No. 1, located in a mercantile section of the city, where fires are very frequent and where good judgment, skill and coolness are requisite qualifications for a successful officer. In February, 1880, he was advanced to the grade of Chief of Battalion, which position he has, in our opinion, filled with great credit to himself and the service, and in the performance of his duty he has demonstrated that he possesses the qualities of a thorough fireman and good and attentive subordinate, and a firm superior and executive officer. ordinate, and a firm superior and executive officer.

There was an important vacancy existing in the uniformed force, and it was the plain duty of the Board to properly fill the same without delay.

The original motion to adopt the report of the Chief and Assistant Chief of Department and to transmit to the Civil Service Board the name therein recommended (which had been seconded by Commissioner Smith), was thereupon put and adopted, by the following vote:

Negative—Commissioner Croker.

Commissioner Croker declined to make such nomination, and stated that he objected to filling the position made vacant by the dismissal of McCabe pending the decision of the matter in the courts, and asked that the vacancy in the position of Chief of Battalion be allowed to remain unfilled. After consultation with Commissioner Smith, the President stated that such a course would be entirely inconsistent with the deliberate conviction of the Board, that its action in the matter referred to was altogether just and proper, and that it was the plain duty of the Board to place the uniformed force of this Department in proper working condition by filling all the vacancies existing in its ranks. Thereupon it was moved and seconded that the name of Acting Chief of Battalion John J. Cashman be transmitted to the Civil Service Board for examination for promotion to the office of Chief of Battalion, and the motion was adopted without division.

The President then stated that it was the plain duty of the Board to present to the Civil Service Board the name of the fittest person for examination for promotion to the office of Chief of Battalion to be made vacant by the promotion of Chief Reilly, and that he would call a meeting for that purpose at the earliest moment, and just as soon as it had been impartially determined who was the fittest candidate.
