##### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

(G. O. 311.)

By Alderman Pinckney—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Francis B. Spinola and his associates to lay mains and pipes in the streets, avenues, and public places in this city, with such connections as may be necessary for the purpose of supplying steam under "the Holly Combination System" to the city and its inhabitants for heating, cooking, and all other domestic purposes, as well as for any and all uses for which steam can be employed.

But before laying any such mains and pipes, said Francis B. Spinola shall give a bond, with good and sufficient security, to be approved by the Comptroller, in the sum of (\$50,000) fifty thousand dollars, to indemnify the City of New York for any loss or damage for which it may be mulcted in any suit against the city arising out of any explosion or other accident incident to the use of any apparatus or appliance for the purposes herein mentioned ; also, to secure the relaying and restoring to good order and condition any streets and pavements removed in laying said mains and pipes, to be approved by the Commissioner of Public Works. Said bond shall also contain a stipulation as a consideration for the permission and privileges herein conferred ; that said Francis B. Spinola and his associates shall furnish the necessary steam required by the city authorities along the streets, avenues, and public places wherein such mains and pipes may be laid.

1st. For heating all buildings owned or leased by the City and County of New York and used by the city and county authorities for public purposes.

2d. For clearing snow from the streets, avenues, and public places when required so to do by the Commissioners of Police or the Department of Public Parks.

3d. For the use of the city fire engines, according to methods under the Holly system.

The charges to the city for use of said steam, so furnished for all purposes herein mentioned, to be at least (33 1/2 pr. c.) thirty-three and one-third per cent. less than it now costs the city for said purposes, or has cost during either of the years 1874-5-6-7 or 1878.

Also, a further stipulation that said mains and pipes when so laid in the streets, avenues, and public places shall only be used for the transmission of steam and water, and not for petroleum or other oils.

Should any of the conditions hereinbefore mentioned be, in the opinion of the Mayor, Commissioners of Police, and the Department of Public Works, violated, then the permission herein granted shall be null and void.

Which was laid over.

The President announced it was now in order for the Board of Aldermen, acting as a Board of Supervisors, to proceed to consider G. O. 298 of the Board of Aldermen, as provided in the call for the meeting.

Whereupon Alderman Sauer moved to suspend the regular order of business in order to consider G. O. 298.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Whereupon Alderman Keenan called up G. O. 298, being a report of the Committee on Finance, with an ordinance to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York, the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State tax for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, as follows :

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of the City of New York, the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State tax for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight.

The Board of Aldermen, as Supervisors of the County of New York, do ordain as follows :

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, to be raised, collected, and paid according to law, for the support of the city government and the Board of Education, and for the purpose of paying the quota of the State tax imposed upon the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the sum of twenty-seven million five hundred and seventy-nine thousand and seventy-seven dollars and twelve cents, which is the amount certified by the Comptroller of the City of New York to the Board of Supervisors, in pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, as the sum to be raised and collected in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York, which will more fully appear by the communication from the Comptroller transmitting his certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, of which said communication, certificate, and Final Estimate the following are copies :

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York :

In pursuance of the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, I herewith transmit to you the Comptroller's certificate of the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 29th day of December, 1877, for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, to wit : the sum of twenty-seven million five hundred and seventy-nine thousand and seventy-seven dollars and twelve cents ; which amount, so estimated and certified as aforesaid, the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York is "empowered and directed to cause to be raised, according to law, and collected by tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, within the said City and County of New York."

Made pursuant to section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, on December 29, 1877, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1877, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight (1878) ; in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year ; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 14, 1877, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 20th day of November, 1877 ; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

#### FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, viz., the year 1878, in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows :

Sec. 2. In addition to the sum imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, and to be raised, collected, and paid according to law, the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, being the amount of an additional appropriation for the year 1878 made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment pursuant to the provisions of chapter 417, Laws of 1878, as appears by the following certificate of the Comptroller of the City of New York:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, August 30, 1878.

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York:

Chapter 417 of the Laws of 1878 authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment "to appropriate and raise by tax, in the year 1878, twenty-five thousand dollars, to be expended by the Department of Public Parks in improving and regulating the several public squares or places laid out and established within the lines of Fourth avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Ninety-sixth streets."

In accordance with the provisions of said act, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held on July 12, 1878, adopted a resolution appropriating the sum of \$25,000, "for the

purpose of improving and regulating the public squares and places on Fourth avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Ninety-sixth streets," and directed that the said amount be added to and included in the Final Estimate for the year 1878, and authorized and directed the Comptroller to certify the said appropriation to the Board of Supervisors.

I therefore certify to your Honorable Board that, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 417 of the Laws of 1878, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has appropriated the sum of \$25,000 for the purposes named in said act, and that the aggregate amount of the Final Estimate for the year 1878, after adding and including the said appropriation, is twenty-seven million six hundred and four thousand and seventy-seven dollars and twelve cents (\$27,604,077.12).

In addition to the sums imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, in and by the first and second sections of this ordinance, for the support of the government of the City of New York for the year 1878, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within the City and County of New York, and to be raised, collected, and paid according to law, the sum of four hundred and four thousand eight hundred and eleven dollars and fourteen cents, said amount being deemed necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the amounts imposed and levied for the support of the government of the City of New York for the year 1878, and not exceeding three per cent. of the aggregate amounts imposed for that purpose by the first and second sections of this ordinance, in pursuance of the provision of section 4 of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873.

Sec. 4. The assessment rolls of the real and personal estates of the City and County of New York for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight are hereby approved and confirmed, and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations thereof is hereby fixed at the sum of one thousand and ninety-eight million three hundred and eighty-seven thousand seven hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,098,387,775), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments for the year 1878, as follows:

Ward & Co., lessees, to build and maintain on Pier 17, East river, an extension to the present shed, about eighty feet in length, towards the inner end of the pier, for the protection of property received and discharged thereat by steam transportation, the said extension to be constructed subject to the regulations of the Superintendent of Buildings, as required by chapter 249 of the Laws of 1875, and in accordance with plans to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and to be removed when so ordered by this Board, or its successor, free of all claim of any kind whatsoever against the Corporation consequent upon such removal.

A communication was received from the Knickerbocker Ice Company, owners of easterly side of pier at Seventh street, East river, stating their willingness to repair the portion of the pier owned by them, and that they had requested Wm. H. Webb, owner of westerly side of said pier, to join with them in making said repairs, and also that the easterly side of Pier 59, East river, was in an unsafe condition and needed repairs, they being the lessees from the city of the westerly side of said pier; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Wm. H. Webb, owner of the lower half of pier at Seventh street, East river, be and is hereby notified to repair without delay, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, the southerly side and outer end of said pier, it being reported to this Department that the same is in an unsafe and dangerous condition.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to address a communication to the Counsel to the Corporation, stating that several of the piers on the water front of the city are owned one-half by the Corporation and one-half by private parties; that while this Department keeps in repair the half of the pier owned by the city, the owner of the other half in some instances neglects and refuses to make the necessary repairs thereto, although notified by this Board in writing so to do, and that there are some cases where the half of the pier not owned by the Corporation is in such a dilapidated condition that the entire rebuilding of it is necessary in order to render the same safe for commercial use, and to respectfully request said Counsel to advise this Board in writing as to what course it shall adopt to compel the private owners of wharf property to repair or rebuild their premises in order to place them in serviceable condition, and whether this Department has the right to rebuild and repair private wharf property when owned conjointly by the city, at the expense of the owners thereof, upon their neglect and refusal to so rebuild or repair, and in what manner this Department shall secure and reimburse itself for the cost incurred, and whether the cost of such rebuilding and repairing would constitute a lien upon said private wharf property until paid for.

If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
