

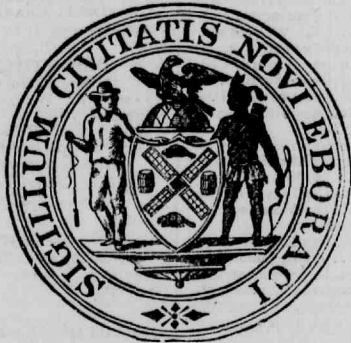

104. Thence northerly on a tangent for 157 52-100 feet to a point of curve.

105. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 57 53-100 feet radius for 108 63-100 feet to a point of compound curve.

106. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 214 96-100 feet radius for 253 4-10 feet to a point of tangency.

107. Thence southerly on a tangent for 157 63-100 feet to a point of curve.

108. Thence to the right on an arc of a circle of 433 23-100 feet radius for 377 16-100 feet to a point of reverse curve.

109. Thence to the left on an arc of a circle of 136 5-10 feet radius for 206 23-100 feet.

110. Thence deflecting 90 deg. to the right southwesterly for 10 feet to a white marble monument with the numbers VI-65 inscribed thereon.

111. Thence southwesterly without deflection for 30 feet to another white marble monument with the numbers VI-38 ins
