### COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Fire Department, transmitting resolution:

No. 2372.

Headquarters, Fire Department, City of New York,  
Nos. 157 and 159 East Sixty-seventh Street,  
Borough of Manhattan, October 23, 1905.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—There is pressing need for an automobile for the use of Chief of Department in responding to alarms of fire, and in view of the fact that the formalities attendant upon the procurement of the same by contract at public letting would necessarily require a considerable period of time, and the machine being desired at the earliest practicable moment, I have the honor to request that the Board of Aldermen adopt a resolution authorizing the expenditure of a sum not exceeding six thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$6,250) for the obtaining in the open market and without contract at public letting of such automobile.

I inclose draft of resolution designed to accomplish the object in view, the prompt adoption of which is earnestly requested.

### REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Report of Aldermen Morris and Grifenhagen.

No. 2356.

The undersigned, to whom was referred on October 17, 1905 (see Minutes, page 136), the annexed resolution, Int. No. 2356, in favor of authorizing and requesting the Union Railway Company to erect and maintain a waiting room or house on the viaduct at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, at or near the terminus of their road, near the entrance to the station of the Sixth Avenue Elevated Railroad, respectfully

### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the said authorization should be granted and the request made. They find that the public, because of existing conditions, is inconvenienced and made to suffer the effects of inclement weather unnecessarily. This applies not alone to adults, but to many children whose only means of transit from school is by way of the said viaduct. It is found upon investigation that the shelter sought can be erected and maintained without any hindrance to pedestrian or vehicular traffic, because of the indented nature of the viaduct at the point at which it is deemed most advisable said shelter should be placed.

They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Whereas, The terminus of the Jerome avenue division of the Union Railway is at the entrance of the Sixth Avenue Elevated Railroad on the viaduct at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York; and

Whereas, Residents of the Borough of The Bronx en route to their homes via the Sixth Avenue Elevated Railroad, are at present compelled to wait for cars of said Union Railway on said viaduct, frequently exposed to inclement weather, thereby endangering their health; and

Whereas, The demands of the public, and particularly the residents of the Borough of The Bronx, require the immediate erection of a waiting room or house at said point; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Union Railway Company be and it is hereby authorized and requested to erect and maintain during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen a waiting room or house on the said viaduct at or near the terminus of their road and near the entrance to the Sixth Avenue elevated station, similar to the one now located at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Third avenue, said waiting room or house to be erected at the expense of said railroad company, under the supervision of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Sir—Under date of June 28, 1905, a communication was forwarded from this office to your Honorable Board, reading as follows:

Hon. TIMOTHY P. SULLIVAN, Vice-Chairman and Acting President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—This office is to-day in receipt, through the Bureau of Chief of Department, of a report from the Chief of the Nineteenth Battalion, in command of the fireboat fleet, reading as follows:

Borough of Manhattan, June 27, 1905.

EDWARD F. CROKER, Chief of Department:

Sir—I have the honor to report that some time ago investigation showed that fireboat "The New Yorker" was in very bad condition. Accordingly, specifications were drawn up and bids for the necessary repair work advertised for and opened at public letting held in this Department on November 21, 1904. The lowest bidder for doing the work being John F. Walsh, Jr., of No. 136 Charlton street, Manhattan, the contract was awarded to him for the sum of \$8,437.

When "The New Yorker" was placed on the drydock and the work under way, the United States Government inspectors declared the boat to be unfit in other respects, to wit:

That frame 21 on the port side should be renewed and, if found necessary, any other defective frames in wake of new truss-bearing to be made good. The reverse frames 44, 68 and 69 on starboard side, and 67, 68 and 69 on port sides to be renewed and, if necessary, any other reverse frames that may be found defective, especially in wake of new truss-bearing, to be made good. The amidship butts of plates at stern to be carefully chipped and space filled and caulked watertight. The fitting-in post to be as long as possible, and secured firmly in place. The bow plates at water line for a distance aft of about 18 feet, and where they are of single thickness and worn to 5-16 inch thick or less, to be renewed or set out to fair surface. Then this length of about 18 feet on each side of bow to be covered with a reinforced plate of steel, not less than 7-16 inch thick, and to be fitted accurately between the edges or upper and lower strakes, the reinforced plates to be riveted through frames at top and bottom, edge to edge under plate, and the reinforced plates thus fitted, riveted and caulked watertight. The stern-bearing bush to be removed and relined with end grain lignum vitae, and bored to fit ship sleeve. The manhole in collision bulkhead to be reinforced to make good; iron angle brace or brackets to be fitted if necessary. The angle iron on floors under new truss to be renewed where necessary to make good and sufficient fastening to truss bed; also lower part of bulkhead for same to be renewed. The waist aft, where damaged by collision to be made good and fair with balance of waist; all stanchions bent to be straightened.

My personal investigation disclosed also, after the boat was on the drydock, the necessity for other repairs beside those covered by the original specifications and required by the Federal Government.

In justification of myself in not reporting the condition discovered later, I have to say that while the boat was in the water the items covered by the additional specifications could not have been seen. It was necessary to get the boat on drydock in order to inspect the plates, and it was necessary that the machinery and boiler equipment be opened up in order to see the defects that are covered by the additional specifications.

I have been advised that the United States Government requirement will entail an expenditure of about \$4,000, and that the requirements suggested by me for the betterment of the boat, under the last specifications, will cost about \$5,000, making in all, approximately, \$9,000, that ought to be expended on the boat, in addition to the sum covered by the contract awarded as hereinbefore stated.

To go through the forms necessary, according to the usual custom, to wit, advertisement, and so on, with the possible necessity of selecting another man than the one now doing the work, would simply mean that the boat would be out of commission

until about next December; whereas, if it were found practicable to give the additional work to the contractor now repairing the boat, she would be in the water ready for duty in six weeks, and I am of the opinion will be better fitted for fire service than at any time since first launched. Furthermore, it would seem impracticable to have another man do the work. The additional specifications are so dovetailed with the old specifications that it requires unity of effort, unity of work, as the work under the additional specifications would require the removal of all the work done under the original specifications, as to the fitting of truss block and lining of shaft, as the frames condemned by the United States Inspectors come directly in front of such truss block.

I cannot see how the work on the original specifications could be done by one contractor and the job completed, and the work on the additional specifications be done by another contractor and that job completed without waste of time, effort and money, and a poorer job at the end. I cannot too strongly recommend that the ordinary procedure of public letting for the additional work be dispensed with.

Gentlemen—The Williamsburg Bridge has for more than a year been lighted under contract by the Edison Electric Illuminating Companies, these companies furnishing the electric wiring and fixtures on the bridge necessary for lighting the same.

This Department is now building a lighting plant on Delancey street, under the bridge, and will be ready in a few weeks to cancel the contract with the illuminating companies, and light the bridge itself.

When the contract is canceled the illuminating companies will naturally remove their wiring and fixtures, and this Department will be obliged to replace these items. This change would require considerable time, and would involve considerable cost. I have secured from the companies prices at which they will sell to the Department the wiring and fixtures which they have installed on the bridge, and these prices are as follows:

The New York Edison Company, wiring, fixtures, etc., at the Manhattan terminal of Williamsburg Bridge.....	\$600 00
The Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Brooklyn, wiring, fixtures, etc., at the Brooklyn terminal.....	3,066 52

The amounts charged by the Edison companies represent the cost to them of this wiring etc., and are much less than the Department could duplicate them for at the present time; and this purchase will obviate entirely the inconvenience to the traveling public of the tearing up of pavement, removing of conduits, etc., and the relaying of similar material in its place.

The price of the Brooklyn Edison Company is naturally greater because it includes the conduits, poles, wires, etc., requisite for the lighting of the Brooklyn plaza of the bridge. In order to replace this material a large portion of the asphalt pavement on the plaza would have to be removed and relaid, involving the inconvenience above referred to.

I would respectfully request from your Honorable Board the approval of the purchase, without advertisement and public letting, of the above-mentioned material from the two Edison companies at a cost not exceeding the amount named, \$3,666.52, under the authority vested in your Honorable Board by chapter 419 of the City Charter.

If this approval is granted the Department can begin the lighting of the Williamsburg Bridge on its own account as soon as the electrical plant is completed, on or before the 1st of November, thereby avoiding inconvenience to the public and saving several thousand dollars which it would be necessary to expend if the old work is removed and new work is put in its place.

#### REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on October 17, 1905 (Minutes, page 96), the annexed resolution in favor of an issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$50,000, for defending certain actions brought against the City, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed issue to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—On the 6th day of October, 1905, I addressed a communication to his Honor the Mayor, reading as follows:

"Since the last provisional estimate of this Department was acted upon by the Board of Estimate a situation has arisen to meet which the City will have to incur an additional expense not otherwise provided for, and I therefore submit the facts to you for appropriate action.

The claims against the City for the service of gas and electric light for 1903, 1904 and 1905, exclusive of interest thereon, aggregate \$8,123,460.75. The City has refused payment of these claims, and suits have been brought to enforce it, and these suits the City has resisted.

Some of the cases will soon be reached for trial, and because of the nature of the City's defense it will be necessary for me to engage competent engineers, thoroughly familiar with this special business, for expert witnesses. As the chief source of employment of such men would naturally be the gas and electric lighting companies, no small difficulty confronts us.

The position taken by the City will mark a departure from the attitude heretofore generally assumed by municipalities in dealing with public service corporations, and it is therefore of the greatest importance that it should, if possible, be sustained from the outset. To do so will involve long and determined struggle in the courts.

The cases will be conducted by this office without any additional expense, and Mr. Burr, my assistant, is now preparing them for trial, but the City has no engineering force available as experts, and will, as explained, have to employ this indispensable assistance.

The questions raised by the answers which I have interposed will show the necessity of the course I propose.

We claim:

1. That the companies have formed a combination for the purpose of controlling and regulating, and did control and regulate as a monopoly the price of gas and electricity, commodities of common use for lighting and other purposes, and that such combination or consolidation is against public policy, illegal and void.

2. That because of such monopoly there is no standard or market price or value for either gas or electricity in The City of New York, and that the only manner in which such market value can be ascertained is to determine the cost of production and distribution, adding thereto a sum sufficient to return a fair profit upon the money actually invested in the business with due regard to the hazard involved.

3. That during the years named and for several years prior thereto there has been no competition for City lighting by gas and electricity, and that the prices bid or charged thereafter have been in all cases the same for similar service, and that no two companies have bidden for the same service in the same district.

4. That the prices charged by the companies for gas and electric lighting are excessive and above the fair and reasonable value of such commodity and service.

5. That no contract existed between the companies and the City during the year 1903 as to the fair value of the services to be rendered by the said companies; that the proposals issued to all bidders for such year contained the following paragraph:

"20. The Commissioner reserved the right to reject any and all bids and estimates if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall determine it for the best interest of the City so to do."

That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the recommendation of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated March 12, 1903, did determine that all bids for public lighting should be so rejected, and so resolved on or about December 4, 1903, and that the said Commissioner did thereupon reject the companies' bids on or about December 8, 1903, on the ground that the prices charged by the companies were unreasonable and excessive.

6. That the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity had and has no power to execute a contract on behalf of The City of New York to pay unfair and unreasonable prices for such commodity and service rendered during the year 1904 or at any other time; that because of the unfairness and unreasonableness of the prices charged and the combination which existed to control and monopolize the price of gas and electricity, by direction of the Mayor all bids for gas and electric lighting for the year 1905 were rejected.

7. That the companies as public utility corporations were and are bound to furnish light and lighting service to the City and are entitled to recover only the fair value of the same, and that the City has at all times been able, ready and willing to settle claims duly filed for services rendered and commodities supplied at the reasonable and fair value thereof.

We compel these companies to continue to serve the City with gas and electric lighting and refuse to pay them the bills rendered for such service, forcing them to invoke the aid of the courts where the question will be finally determined as to what are the powers and duties of these public utility corporations in their relation to the City, and what is fair and reasonable compensation for their public service to the City. We contend that a public utility corporation is a creature of law and has no rights except those conferred upon it by the people, and that the people have the right to so control it as to make it subserve the public interest.

Before these questions are finally determined in the courts the amount claimed by these companies will probably amount, with interest, to about fifteen millions of dollars. So that this whole situation is of the utmost concern to the people of the City.

There are pending at the present writing more than twenty actions brought by these companies against the City, in each of which expert testimony will be required.

This Department will therefore need an appropriation of \$50,000 to properly defend these actions and secure the best and highest character of expert testimony on all the



subjects involved in order to sustain the position taken by the City in this most important litigation."

I have just received the Mayor's answer to this communication, reading as follows: "I beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 7th inst."

"I approve of the appropriation asked for, and suggest that you apply at once to the Board of Aldermen for the necessary authority under the Charter."

"I am quite certain that the Board of Estimate will pass favorably on the question, and immediately on the passage of the resolution of the Board of Aldermen I shall present the matter to the Board of Estimate for action."

Accordingly I forward herewith form of resolution which, in view of the great importance of the matter and the imperative necessity imposed upon the City to vigorously defend the actions brought against it by the gas and electric light companies and now about to be reached for trial, I respectfully ask may be taken up and acted upon at your meeting on Tuesday, October 17, 1905.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, Chairman, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—Chapter 225, Laws of 1896, amended by chapter 96, Laws of 1903, provides as follows:

"The board of supervisors in each of the counties shall designate some proper person or authority, other than that designated for the care of poor persons, or the custody of criminals, who shall cause to be interred the body of any honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine who has served in the military or naval service of the United States, or the body of the wife or widow of any soldier, sailor or marine married to him previous to eighteen hundred and ninety, who shall die such widow, and who shall hereafter die without leaving sufficient means to defray his or her funeral expenses, but such expenses shall in no case exceed thirty-five dollars. If the deceased has relatives or friends who desire to conduct the burial, but are unable or unwilling to pay the charge therefor, such sum shall be paid by the county treasurer, upon due proof of the claim and of the death and burial of the soldier, sailor or marine, or of the wife or widow of such soldier, sailor or marine to the person so conducting such burial. Such interment shall not be made in a cemetery or cemetery plot used exclusively for the burial of poor persons deceased."

It appears that the different laws bearing on this subject have become so inextricably confused that it is difficult to determine just what person or authority should have jurisdiction over the burials of veterans.

The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated June 26, 1905, a copy of which I inclose for your information, has advised this office that the Department of Health has jurisdiction over the burial of veterans in the Borough of Manhattan, but that no proper authority has been designated in the other boroughs.

I therefore beg you to present the following resolution for adoption by the Board of Aldermen so that the Department of Health may be properly authorized to act for the entire City:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 225, Laws of 1896, as amended by chapter 96, Laws of 1903, the Board of Health is hereby designated as the proper authority who shall cause to be interred the body of any honorably discharged soldier, sailor or marine who has served in the military or naval service of the United States, or the body of the wife or widow of any soldier, sailor or marine married to him previous to the year eighteen hundred and ninety, who shall die such widow, and who shall hereafter die without leaving sufficient means to defray his or her funeral expenses.

In order that no delay may be experienced by the relatives of deceased veterans in obtaining the moneys due them under the mandatory provisions of the above act, I would ask that you cause this matter to be given special consideration.

That he is the pastor of the Roman Catholic Church of St. Mary, in Clifton, a religious corporation, located at Rosebank, in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Richmond, City and State of New York, and as such is in charge of the property of such corporation.

That said religious corporation owns and maintains a burying ground for the burial of the dead of the church parish, which burying ground is located on Parkinson avenue, Grasmere, in the said Fourth Ward of the Borough of Richmond, City and State aforesaid.

That such burying ground contains about eight acres of land, and has been owned, maintained and used by the said the Roman Catholic Church of St. Mary, in Clifton, for many years.

That by reason of such long and continued use of such burying ground for burial purposes by said religious corporation as aforesaid the said burying ground has become filled up or spaces therein sold to different persons and families for the exclusive use, so that there is no longer sufficient or adequate room for the further burial of the dead of such parish, and more particularly for the allotting and setting apart of single graves in said burying ground, by reason of all of which it has become and is necessary to provide other and additional ground for burial purposes, to the end that the parishioners of said church may be properly interred according to the precepts of the Roman Catholic Church.

That the said the Roman Catholic Church of St. Mary is the owner of and in possession of the following described property:

All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land, situate in the Town of Southfield, County of Richmond, in the State of New York, known and designated on a certain map entitled "Supreme Court Sale in Partition of the Estate of Leonard Parkinson on Staten Island," and filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of Richmond as Lot No. 15, containing three and seven hundred and ninety-eight one-thousandths (3,798-1,000) acres of land, be the same more or less, and bounded northerly by Lot No. 14, easterly by Parkinson avenue as laid down on said map, and southerly and westerly by the Old Town road.

That said plot is approximately adjacent to the burying ground aforesaid.

That the burying ground aforesaid is situated on an elevation which slopes gradually southward to the waters of the Lower Bay of New York.

That almost all the land to the south of said plot as far as to said bay consists of salt marsh.

Request of the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, dated August 21, to reinstate William A. Hagan as Laborer. Never employed.

Request of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, dated August 17, to reinstate Andrew W. McCann as Laborer. Never employed.

The report of the President was adopted.

The President recommended that a public hearing be called on the request of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, that the classification of positions in the Exempt Class in his Department be amended by adding thereto the title "Consulting Engineer," which request had been referred to him at a previous meeting for consideration.

The recommendation of the President was adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to fix a date for the hearing.

The President called the attention of the Commission to the communication, under date of September 14, addressed by him to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning in answer to his communication of August 31, complaining against the quality of the labor furnished by the Municipal Civil Service Commission to that Department. The action of the President was approved.

The Commission again considered a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated July 20, 1905, requesting that the eligible list for promotion to the position of Assistant Engineer in his Department be divided into bureau lists, which communication had been laid over at a previous meeting, pending the receipt of advice from the Corporation Counsel as to whether the Commission had the authority to take such action.

It appearing from an opinion rendered by the Corporation Counsel, under date of August 29, that it was within the power of the Commission to take such action if, in its opinion, the same was proper, the request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to divide said list for promotion to Assistant Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn into bureau lists and to certify from same accordingly.

The Commission then considered the question which had been raised by the Clerk in charge of the receipt of applications, as to whether or not applications should be accepted from persons who were members of the volunteer fire companies to be disbanded in the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens, when such persons were not residents of the localities in which the volunteer system was to be abolished and the paid system adopted. The matter was laid over.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the twelfth paragraph of Civil Service Rule VII, providing that "No person who has entered any examination for appointment to a competitive position and failed therein or who has withdrawn therefrom shall be admitted within nine months from the date of such examination to a new examination for the same position," be and the same is hereby waived so far as it applies to the coming examination for the position of Junior Assistant Librarian.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated September 7, with reference to the communication from the Chief Clerk of the Police Department, asking whether any points would be allowed for the Rhinelander, Bell or Meyer medals in promotion examinations in that Department, which communication was referred to him for a report. The Chief Examiner stated that heretofore, in rating records in promotion examinations in the Police Department, the Examining Board had excluded from consideration all medals except those given by the Police Department itself, and that, in his opinion, that should still be the rule. After a careful consideration of the matter, the Commission ruled that no credit shall be given for the Rhinelander, Bell and Meyer medals in promotion examinations in the Police Department, for the reason that the recipients of these medals must have received, prior to the awarding of same, "honorable mention" and a medal for some service, which counts seven points in such examinations.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated September 9, with reference to the communication from Richard O'Connor, a candidate for Sergeant of Police, requesting that he be given credit for a "commendation" awarded him for services rendered in connection with the recent "Slocum" disaster. The Chief Examiner stated that, in his opinion, Mr. O'Connor's case did not seem to present any ground for special action on the part of the Commission; that if the commendation of which he spoke was granted for personal bravery, it would appear on his record and he would receive due credit for it; that if it did not appear on his record, his remedy would be to appeal to the Police Commissioner and not to the Civil Service Commission. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. O'Connor and inform him of the foregoing facts, and to state further that, if the "commendation" spoken of by him was not given for an act of personal bravery, his case was covered by the following resolution of the Commission adopted June 14, 1905:

"Resolved, That, in fixing the relative ratings on the records of candidates in promotion examinations in the Police and Fire Departments, only such 'commendations' and 'honorable mentions' shall be considered as shall have been awarded as a result of individual acts of personal bravery."

The same was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from Examiner Byrne, dated September 16, with reference to the anonymous communication alleging that "James Cooney," a Watchman in the employ of the Fire Department, was a substitute for the James Cooney who qualified under the Civil Service rules, which communication had been referred to him for investigation. Mr. Byrne stated in his report that during the progress of his investigation the person who was employed under the name of James Cooney in the Fire Department resigned the position, and his resignation had been accepted. The papers were ordered filed.

A report was presented from the examiners who rated the papers of John J. Corkill, No. 591 Lafayette avenue, Brooklyn, candidate for Inspector of Licenses, recommending that the marks on arithmetic originally awarded by them be increased from 65 to 85, thus giving the candidate a rating of 88.30 per cent. The report of the examiners was adopted on the recommendation of the President.

The appeal of Lanston F. Eldred, No. 60 Pleasant avenue, Rockaway Beach, that he be permitted to change the date of birth set forth on his application for Patrolman, was denied, the proof submitted by him being insufficient to convince the Commission that an error was made in setting forth the first date.

A report was presented from the examiners who rated the papers of Kenneth C. Gosling, No. 478 Fourteenth street, Brooklyn, candidate for Chainman and Rodman, recommending that the candidate's mark on experience be increased from 58 to 65, giving him a rating of 71 per cent. The revised marks of the examiners were adopted on the recommendation of the President.

The request of Joseph Koubsky, No. 434 East Fifty-eighth street, that he be permitted to change the place of birth set forth on his application for Patrolman from "New York City" to "Bohemia" was granted, he having furnished his father's citizenship papers and passport from Bohemia to New York. The Commission being of the opinion that the proof submitted was sufficient, the request was granted.

The appeal of Andrew J. Smith, No. 227 West One Hundred and Twenty-first street, for a rerating of his experience paper in the examination for Inspector of Light and Ventilation was denied, it appearing that the same did not come within the provisions of Civil Service Rule IX.

A report was presented from Drs. Altshul and Schultz, the experts who rated the examination papers of the candidates for Medical Officer, Fire Department, stating that, after a careful consideration of the appeals of Messrs. John S. Richardson, John E. Herrity and Binsford Throne, and a most thorough re-examination of the papers of those gentlemen, they found that no error had been made in their original ratings. In view of the statements of Drs. Altshul and Schultz the appeals of the aforesaid candidates were denied.

The appeal of John Revell, candidate for promotion to Assistant Engineer, was denied, it appearing from a report of the Chief Examiner that the same did not come within the provisions of Civil Service Rule IX.

A report was presented from Examiner Murray, dated September 13, with reference to the appeal of Edward Loneragan, No. 339 East Fifty-eighth street, candidate for the position of Measurer, for a rerating of his examination papers. It



appearing from Mr. Murray's report that, after a careful examination of the papers, he could find no error in the marks given Mr. Lonergan, the appeal was denied.

A communication was presented from the Secretary to the Fire Commissioner, dated August 31, requesting that the pay-rolls of Israel Benjamin, covering services rendered as a Mechanical Draughtsman from July 15 to the present time, be approved. The Secretary stated that Mr. Benjamin was appointed for a temporary period, which expired on July 15, 1905, and that he had declined to certify his pay-roll subsequent to that date. The request was denied for lack of power.

A communication was presented from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, dated September 12, requesting approval of a leave of absence, without pay, for six months from September 15 granted James P. Whiskeman, Assistant Engineer in that Bureau. It appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the leave of absence was granted because of illness the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated August 30, informing the Commission of the appointment of Frank J. Steele to the position of Engineer in that Department under the authority of chapter 533 of the Laws of 1905, and pursuant to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel dated August 24, 1905. The papers were ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the Department of Health, dated August 14, requesting approval of leave of absence, without pay, from August 1 to September 9, granted Joseph Baum, M. D., Medical Inspector. It appearing from the certificate that the leave of absence was granted because of illness the same was approved.

The requests of the Receiver of Taxes, under dates of September 7 and 14, that the names of Emil E. Fischer and Patrick J. O'Sullivan be recertified to his Department for appointment as Temporary Clerk were granted.

The President stated that he had granted the request of the Secretary of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, under date of September 1, that the name of George F. Schumacher be restored to the eligible list for Temporary Clerk and certified to that Department for appointment. It appeared that Mr. Schumacher had been suspended on June 20, 1905, for absence without leave, but that the notice of his suspension never reached him on account of a change in address, and that he was prevented by sickness from reporting for duty. A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Park Board, dated September 15, again requesting the Commission to certify the pay-roll of Peter McGrath, Gardener, for services rendered in the Department of Parks, Manhattan, from January 2 to February 7, 1905, which request had previously been denied. The Secretary stated that Mr. McGrath was employed as a Gardener in the Department of Parks, Brooklyn, but that he was transferred to the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, on January 2, 1905; that the approval of the Civil Service Commission was not requested until February 7, 1905, when its certificate was issued, and for that reason he had declined to attach the certificate of the Commission to Mr. McGrath's pay-roll in the Borough of Manhattan prior to that date. On the recommendation of the President the request of Secretary Holly was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the pay-roll in question.

A communication was presented from Deputy and Acting Comptroller Phillips, dated September 12, requesting the Commission to reconsider its action in declining to place the position of Medical Examiner in the Department of Finance in the Exempt Class. The matter was laid over.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated September 13, requesting approval of the reassignment to duty of Louise Voegel, Recreation Pier Attendant, who had been absent since August 15, 1905. It appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the absence from duty was caused by illness, the reassignment was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, dated September 11, requesting the Commission to recertify the name of William S. Rockwell, No. 143 West One Hundred and Fourth street, for appointment to the position of Rodman. It appeared from the records that Mr. Rockwell's name had been certified three times to the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission for appointment, and passed over each time. The request was granted.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, requesting approval of the supplementary pay-roll of John Kessler, Park Laborer, for services rendered on May 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10, 1905. It appeared that Mr. Kessler was transferred to the Department of Docks and Ferries from the Department of Parks, The Bronx, on May 4, but that he did not report for duty in the Department of Docks and Ferries until May 11, his services being rendered in the interim in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx. The request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the pay-roll and forward the same to the Department of Finance for audit.

A communication was presented from the Superintendent of Buildings, Borough of Brooklyn, dated September 7, stating that Michael Taylor, an Inspector in that Bureau, had been found guilty of making a false report and fined one month's pay in punishment therefor. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Superintendent of Buildings and state that there is no provision in the law authorizing him to fine Inspector Taylor a month's pay for making the false report; that he had the power to lay him off for thirty days if he saw fit to do so and then to reassign him to duty at the end of that time; but that, in the opinion of the Commission, any Inspector found guilty of making a false report should be dismissed from the service.

The following reports of Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class were approved on the recommendation of the Chief Examiner:

After a careful consideration of the matter, it was

Resolved, That in order to meet the demands of various city departments for persons who will serve as Topographical Draughtsmen at a compensation of \$1,200 per annum, the Secretary is hereby directed to proceed with an open competitive examination for that position, and to advertise the fact that no persons obtaining a place upon such eligible list will be certified for a compensation higher than \$1,200 per annum.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the nature and extent of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
