Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

During the two weeks ending August 4, 62 operations were performed at Bellevue, 13 at Gouverneur, 22 at Harlem, and 9 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

In compliance with authority bids were received from four firms to change the refrigerating pipe from the boiler house to the morgue, necessitated by the excavation for pavilions A and B, of the new Bellevue Hospital. William Ostendoff agreed to do the work for \$900; this being the lowest bid, it was accepted.

Your approval is requested for advertisement in CITY RECORD for vacuum sweeping system in the hospitals, for the laying out of the grounds of Harlem Hospital, for fittings for new drug room in Harlem Hospital, and for milk for the Department.

Authority is requested to obtain estimates to strengthen the floor in the basement of Bellevue Hospital so as to hold the safe in the Property Clerk's office. It is believed this work will not cost more than \$100.

The present arrangement for the chimney from the Doctor's kitchen, which provides for a direct and constant escape of steam into the chimney of the old boiler house, is extravagant as well as troublesome because of the constant return flow of condensed water from the old boiler chimney into the hospital cellar. It is requested that authority be granted to have the chimney erected direct from the Doctor's kitchen, in Bellevue Hospital, at an expense of about \$300.

The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has directed that the motor current used in the hospital be on a separate circuit from the light current. It is estimated that it will cost about \$500 to put in the motor circuits. As this work has been ordered by that Department we must do it, and authority is requested to obtain estimates and act thereon.

Two new washers are badly needed in the laundry for efficient work. It is impossible with the present plant to do the work satisfactorily. About 50,000 pieces a week are washed there, and approval is requested to obtain estimates and act thereon.

New bath tubs are badly needed in dormitories 42, 46 and 48. The tubs in these dormitories now are old iron tubs which have been frequently painted and they cannot be kept clean. Authority is requested to obtain bids and have put in place new tubs at a cost of about \$320, so that the employees of the hospital will have proper bathing facilities.

It is necessary to change the vapor pipe in the boiler house in order to secure use of exhaust steam. This will entail an expenditure of \$250, and authority is requested to incur it.



Authority is requested to purchase one new ambulance for use in the Department at a cost of \$700.

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to write to each visiting Physician or Surgeon of the hospitals of the Department who had not visited daily during the month of July, to ask an explanation for his absence.

The Board approved the action of the General Medical Superintendent in awarding the bid for the changing of the refrigerating pipe from the boiler house to the morgue to William Ostendoff.

The advertisement for a vacuum sweeping system, for the laying out of the grounds of Harlem Hospital, for fittings for drug room of Harlem Hospital, and for milk for the Department was approved.

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to obtain estimates to strengthen the floor in the basement of Bellevue Hospital, and to award the work to the lowest bidder; also to obtain estimates for a new chimney from the Doctor's kitchen, and award the work to the lowest bidder; also to obtain estimates to change the motor current in Bellevue Hospital, and award the work to the lowest bidder.

The General Medical Superintendent is directed to obtain estimates for two new washers for the laundry; to obtain estimates for shower baths for dormitories 42, 46 and 48, and award the work to the lowest bidder; to obtain estimates to change the vapor pipe in the boiler house, and award the work to the lowest bidder; and to purchase a new ambulance for use in the Department.

The following rule was adopted:

Leave of absence with pay for a period of one month each year may be granted Superintendents, Assistant Superintendents, Supervising Nurses, Alienists, Pathologists, and those in supervisory executive duties in the nursing department; all other employees may be granted two weeks in a year, with one day additional for each two years' service in the Department, provided such leave should not exceed thirty days in each year. Leave is to be granted only after one year's service, and only when the absence of the officer or employee will not embarrass the administration of the hospitals.

The Board carefully considered the departmental estimates for the year 1907 and directed they be printed as approved.

It was moved and adopted that, if the appropriation permitted, the minimum wages for women should be \$15, and \$20 for men, for the first year of service; the second year of service, the women \$20, and the men \$25; for the third year of service, the women \$25, and the men \$30.

The President of the Board of Trustees reported that on August 1 he opened bids for vegetables and uniforms. No bids were received for refrigerating plant.

The lowest bid for vegetables was that of Jacob Boss, \$7,110.20, to whom the contract was awarded.

The lowest bid for uniforms was that of J. H. Geigerman, \$468.75, to whom the contract was awarded.

#### Communications.

The letter from the Finance Department approving the renewal of the lease of No. 422 Water street was placed on file.

The letters from the Corporation Counsel giving opinion on the purchase of milk in the open market, and the statistics of the milk contract, were read and placed on file.

#### Report of Committees.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Bellevue for August 1, 1906, and the Executive Committee of that Board for July, were read and placed on file.

The minutes of the special meeting of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board for July 27, and the regular meeting of July 31 were read and placed on file.

Letter from McKim, Mead & White, submitting an estimate of \$200 for a tank under the elevator in Pavilion A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, was read and the estimate approved.

Dr. Brannan announced that he was to be absent from the City from August 9 to September 8, and Mr. Tierney was elected to serve as President pro tem. during the absence of the President of the Board.

The Board adjourned to meet Friday, August 17, 1906.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
