## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their offices, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, Tuesday, December 27, 1904, at 2 P. M.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, Chief Engineer Smith, I. J. Beaudrias, Esq., Special Counsel, Kellogg & Slosson, Esqs., and H. R. Barrett, Esq.

Minutes of December 20 and 22, 1904, were laid over.

The Committee of Finance and Audit submitted the following report on the tax bills of school districts in various towns, with the recommendation that the President be directed to transmit a copy to the Corporation Counsel with a request for an opinion as to which, if any, should be now paid.

The Chairman of the Committee of Finance and Audit submits the following report on the school tax bills on property under the jurisdiction of the Aqueduct Commissioners for the years 1904-5:

There are no particular variations in the rates, except in School District No. 9, Town of Somers, where a new school house has been built.

School District No. 3, Town of Cortlandt, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$5,058.43. The land in this town is assessed at \$75 an acre. The decrease is owing to buildings removed and slight errors in the acreage.

School District No. 5, Town of Cortlandt, shows an increase in assessed value of \$5.25, owing to an error in acreage.

School District No. 12, Towns of Cortlandt and Yorktown, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$386.60, owing principally to errors in acreage. This is a joint district. The Cortlandt property is valued at \$75 an acre and the Yorktown valuation varies.

School District No. 5, Town of Yorktown, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$1,940, owing to reduction in valuation of several parcels.

School District No. 6, Town of Yorktown, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$2,338.75, owing to reduction in valuation of several parcels.

School District No. 7, Town of Yorktown, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$2,340, owing to reduction in valuation of several parcels.

School District No. 8, Town of Yorktown, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$200, owing to reduction in valuation of one parcel. This district takes in property in New Castle, Somers and Bedford. The assessment varies in the different towns.

School District No. 9, Town of Yorktown, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$300, owing to reduction in valuation of one parcel.

School District No. 6, Town of Bedford, shows an increase in assessed value of \$2,054, owing to stipulation between Special Counsel and the Town Board to assess the land of The City of New York in this town at \$100 an acre.

School District No. 7, Town of Bedford, shows an increase in assessed value of \$11,761.40, owing to same stipulation.

School District No. 9, Town of Bedford, shows an increase of \$8,973.60, owing to same stipulation.

School District No. 10, Towns of Bedford and Lewisboro. The property in Bedford shows a decrease in assessed value of \$32,060, owing to same stipulation. The property in Lewisboro shows a decrease in assessed value of \$1,800, owing to reduction in valuation of several parcels. The valuation in this town varies.

School District No. 13, Town of Bedford, shows an increase in assessed value of \$195, owing to stipulation stated above.

School District No. 1, Town of Somers, shows an increase in assessed value of \$1,000, owing to Catholic Church being removed from City property. This school district takes in property in North Salem and Somers, in which towns valuations vary.

School District No. 4, Town of Somers, shows assessment the same as last year. Land valued at \$80 per acre.

School District No. 9, Town of Somers, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$31.28, owing to error in acreage. The assessed valuation in this district is \$80 per acre.



School District No. 5, Town of North Salem, shows assessment the same as last year on the various parcels. The assessment varies in this town and is extraordinarily high.

School District No. 6, Town of North Salem, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$900, owing to reduction in valuation of one parcel.

School District No. 8, Towns of North Salem and Lewisboro, shows a decrease in assessed value of \$900, owing to reduction in valuation of one parcel. The valuation varies in both towns.

The Committee recommend that this report be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel, with a request for information as to which, if any, of these bills should be paid, in view of the certiorari proceedings now pending against the towns and his communication of October 19, 1904.

The report of the Committee was approved and the President directed to transmit same to Corporation Counsel, with request for his opinion as recommended in report.

The President reported that on December 26, 1904, he received a communication from the Municipal Civil Service Commission regarding a complaint of the Civil Service Reform Association against the alleged assignment of certain laborers to the work of inspecting concrete, and that he referred it to the Chief Engineer for a report, which action was approved.

Weekly report of the Chief Engineer for the week ending December 15, 1904, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Communication from McDonald & Onderdonk, dated December 22, 1904, regarding communication of Commissioners of December 3, in relation to extension of time on contract for Jerome Park Reservoir, was received and referred to the Construction Committee.

Report No. 1133 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 21, supplementing Report No. 1014, dated July 11, 1904, and Report No. 1018, dated July 18, 1904, recommending, with the concurrence of Prof. William H. Burr, Expert Engineer, the modification of plans for the easterly half of the Jerome Park Reservoir, was received, approved, ordered filed and the following preambles and resolution offered:

Whereas, The Chief Engineer has submitted Reports Nos. 1014, dated July 11, 1904; 1018, dated July 18, 1904, and 1133, dated December 21, 1904, recommending that the Aqueduct Commissioners consent to the modification of the plans for the construction of Jerome Park Reservoir to the extent that masonry boundary walls be built on the easterly half of the reservoir similar in construction to those now built and being built on the westerly half of said reservoir, and that these walls be constructed of rubble masonry or cyclopean masonry, as may appear most practicable during the progress of the work; and

Whereas, The recommendation of the Chief Engineer contained in said reports has been fully concurred in by Prof. William H. Burr, Expert Engineer; and

Whereas, It appearing that the interests of The City of New York will be best served by the approval and adoption of such change in the plans of the Jerome Park Reservoir as recommended by the Chief Engineer; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do hereby approve and adopt the above recommendations of the Chief Engineer that the plans of the Jerome Park Reservoir be modified to the extent that masonry boundary walls be built on the easterly half of said reservoir, similar in construction to those now built or being built on the westerly half of said reservoir, and that these walls be constructed of rubble masonry or cyclopean masonry, as may appear most practicable when the work is actually started.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

Report No. 1134 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 21, 1904, regarding renewal of contract for telephone service for the year 1905, was received, approved, ordered filed and the President authorized to sign new contract accordingly.

Report No. 1136 of the Chief Engineer and Secretary, dated December 22, 1904, recommending that Louis H. Piser, Rodman, be promoted to the position of Leveler, was received, ordered filed and the following resolution offered:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer contained in his Report No. 1136, dated December 22, 1904, Louis H. Piser, Rodman, be and hereby is promoted to the position of Leveler, with salary at the rate of twelve hundred dollars per annum, to take effect January 1, 1905, he having been certified as eligible for such promotion by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, December 20, 1904.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

Communication from the Chief Engineer, dated December 27, 1904, regarding complaint against the alleged assignment of John J. Murphy, Allen Banker, Tony Mount and Abraham Tuttle, Laborers, to the work of inspecting concrete, was received and the President directed to transmit a copy to the Municipal Civil Service Commission as the reply of the Commissioners to its communication of December 22, 1904.

Communication from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated December 23, 1904, transmitting with its approval supplementary payroll of certain axemen and transimen, for services rendered in excess of the sixty-day provisional term allowed by Rule 12, was received and referred to the Secretary.

Request from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated December 22, 1904, approved by the Chief Engineer, for transfer of Herbert C. Alden, Assistant Engineer, was received and the President directed to sign the consent.

Communication from the Corporation Counsel, dated December 27, 1904, transmitting with his approval as to execution agreement with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company for removal of its lines from within the New Croton Reservoir, was received and the attention of Mr. Beaudrias called to the affidavit submitted by the company as to the title to its rights of way. He stated that he would send the Commissioners a communication approving of its sufficiency, and the Secretary was directed to distribute the original agreement in accordance with the resolution of the Commissioners adopted December 20, 1904.

Report No. 1139 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 27, 1904, recommending that James J. Kelly, Axeman, be dropped from the payroll on account of lack of work, was received and ordered filed and the following resolution offered:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer contained in his report No. 1139, dated December 27, 1904, the name of James J. Kelly, Axeman, be and hereby is dropped from the payroll, on account of lack of work, to take effect December 31, 1904.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

Report No. 1138 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 22, 1904, asking that the Commissioners approve of the construction of Road No. 8½, and transmitting communication from I. J. Beaudrias, Special Counsel, dated December 7, 1904, with stipulation and four releases from Riley Tompkins, Armenia Losee, Charles Conklin and Aaron Losee, was received, approved, ordered filed and the following preamble and resolutions offered:

Whereas, The Chief Engineer has submitted in his Report No. 1138, dated December 22, 1904, his reasons for the construction of Road No. 8½; therefore

Resolved, That the construction of said road be and the same hereby is approved, and it is further

Resolved, That the President be directed to notify Mr. I. J. Beaudrias, Special Counsel, that the Aqueduct Commissioners have approved and ordered the construction of said road, and also to transmit to him the four releases mentioned in the report of the Chief Engineer, with instructions to have the same recorded and to ascertain whether or not such releases completely vest the necessary title for the construction of Road No. 8½ in The City of New York.

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

Messrs. Kellogg, Slosson and Barrett were heard further on the questions relating to the acceptance of new highways in the New Croton Division. The recommendations of the Construction Committee on Report No. 1129 of the Chief Engineer, dated December 20, 1904, as to changes in the highways, which recommendations were approved by the Commissioners on December 22, 1904, were read, approved and accepted by counsel in behalf of the county and the towns.

The counsel were then requested to attend the meeting of the Commissioners to be held on January 3, 1905, when the report of the Chief Engineer as to increased mileage and questions of maintenance of highways will be considered in connection with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel on the legal questions involved.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

Kenney, Sanitary Inspectors in the employ of the Department of Health, assigned to duty in the Borough of Manhattan, showing serious defects in the plumbing, drainage, etc., of the premises, were received, and upon recommendation of the Sanitary Superintendent and the President of the Board of Health, to whom the matter was referred by the Board of Health at its meeting held January 4, 1905, the following order was directed to be served upon the owner, Edwin Packard, of No. 241 Henry street, Borough of Brooklyn, namely:

"Sir—Take notice that you are hereby ordered and required by the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of section 1176 of the Charter of The City of New York, to alter and otherwise improve and purify the premises Nos. 38 and 40 Clinton street, Borough of Brooklyn, in the City and State of New York, as herein specified, to wit: That all defective portions of the main house drain, branch house drains, soil, waste and vent pipes be replaced with new, or properly repaired; that all disused sewer-connected plumbing fixtures be removed, and the branch connections with the main pipes be closed gastight; that the side and front areas be properly paved and graded so as to discharge all surface water into properly trapped, sewer-connected drains; that the broken bowl of the wash basin in the basement hall be replaced by a new bowl; that all rain leaders be properly repaired so as not to leak, and be properly connected with the main house drain; that the roof of the main building and extension roof be each properly repaired so as not to leak; that all loose and insecure plaster be removed from the walls and ceilings of the halls and rooms throughout the building, and that said walls and ceilings be properly repaired and made secure; that all soiled walls be thoroughly cleaned and all wall paper be removed, and the whitewashed portions of walls and ceilings throughout the building be cleaned and whitewashed; that the dwarf partitions around the watercloset in the basement be extended airtight to the ceiling, and that said watercloset apartments be properly ventilated to the external air; that all loose window sashes be properly repaired and adjusted so as to prevent draughts.

"Any application to have this order or its execution stayed or modified must be made to the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, in writing, within three days after service thereof.

"Your attention is called to section 1262 of the Charter of The City of New York, which makes a failure to comply with an order of the Board of Health a misdemeanor, and subjects the party responsible therefor to arrest and penalties."

The President submitted the following proposed amendment to section 108 of the Sanitary Code, which was laid on the table for one week:

"Sec. 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or person in charge of any and every building or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York, forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant, or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

"And it shall be the duty of every person having the care, custody or control of any such building or place of business to separate or cause to be separated and put into their respective receptacles all such materials and substances, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof. And such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal, and shall then be placed in the area, or within the stoop-line only, and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance. All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scattered or blown about shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured."

A communication advising the Board of Health as to its authority to recognize an assignment of Hunter & Trimm's award to John Elsey was received from the Corporation Counsel, and ordered on file.

Copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 13, 1905, authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$98,000 for the purpose of improving, permanently bettering and equipping buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health, to wit, Riverside Hospital, Willard Parker Hospital and Kingston Avenue Hospital, was received and ordered on file.

Copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 13, 1905, authorizing the issue of Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$72,000, for the payment of the salaries of Nurses, and for the manufacture and distribution of diphtheria and other antitoxins, was received and ordered on file.

Copy of a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund January 11, 1905, authorizing the Comptroller to execute a renewal of the lease to The City of New York, from J. H. C. Johannesberg of the first and second floors of the stable on the rear of the lots known as Nos. 1034 and 1036 East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, in the Borough of The Bronx, for a period of one year from January 1, 1905, with the privilege of renewal, at an annual rental of \$950, was received and ordered on file.

On recommendation of the President, it was

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses required to be incurred for reindexing and consolidating the records of vital statistics on file in the Bureau of Records of this Department

of the old City of New York for the period from 1866 to 1888, inclusive, for paying the salaries for one year of Typewriting Copyists to the number of twenty, at the rate of six hundred dollars per annum, and for the purchase or rental during said period of the required number of typewriting machines.

Upon recommendation of the General Medical Officer, it was

Resolved, That owing to the immediate necessity of obtaining furniture and fixtures necessary for furnishing the recently completed Nurses' Home and the Scarlet Fever Pavilion at the Kingston Avenue Hospital, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the difficulty of obtaining such furniture and fixtures from the New York State Commission of Prisons, the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Board of Health, pursuant to the provisions of section 419 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, to contract for and purchase at the lowest price obtainable in the open market, without public letting, at an amount not exceeding eighty-five hundred dollars, such furniture and fixtures as are necessary or required to be used in completely furnishing the Nurses' Home and the Scarlet Fever Pavilion belonging to the Department of Health at the Kingston Avenue Hospital, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

An estimate was received from Springsted & Adamson, to whom was awarded the contract for erecting a morgue building on North Brother Island, to do additional work to said building for the sum of \$110, with the recommendation of the architects, Smith, Westervelt & Austin, who designed same, that said estimate be accepted, and, on motion, it was

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
