A communication was presented by the President from Mr. Ralph Pulitzer requesting that the Art Commission sanction a site on the plaza at 59th street and 5th avenue for a fountain provided for in his father's will. The President appointed the following Committee on this matter: Commissioner

Bitter, Chairman; Commissioner Jones and Commissioner Stokes. Submission 1504—Lenox Library Removal. Communications addressed to the Art Commission pertaining to this subject

were read from the following: The American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society, signed E. H. Hall, Secretary.

Parks and Playgrounds Association, signed Eugene A. Philbin, President.

W. B. Van Ingen, John H. Stoddart, Mrs. D. M. Levett and John D. Crimmins. Commissioner Stover came direct from Mayor Gaynor, who begged to be excused from attending the meeting, but sent word that the matter received his vote and that he was strongly of the opinion that the Lenox Library Building should be accepted for Central Park as proposed by the Commissioner of Parks.

The Chairman of the Committee then reported that the Committee had examined the four sites submitted, and assuming that it was not the desire of the Commission that he should go over in detail all of the reasons for and against each of the sites, stated briefly that the unanimous conclusion of the Committee was that all things considered the site having the greatest number of advantages and the fewest disadvantages was the site now occupied by the old Arsenal. He stated that the Committee was assured that the building will take no more Park space than that now occupied by the Arsenal, the restaurant and the comfort station near by, which the Committee is assured are to be removed when the Lenox Library is ready for occupancy by the Park Department. He further explained that the Committee understands that if this matter is not decided at once, Mr. Frick is likely to withdraw his offer. The Committee, therefore, recommends the preliminary approval of the Arsenal site, which leaves the matter open for the future consideration of any other site which may be submitted by the proper City authorities.

The report of the Committee was adopted (Mr. Russell voting against it) and

the following resolutions passed:

Certificate 1461. Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby disapproves the erection of the Lenox Library Building on the north side of the 65th Street transverse road at the point where the path into the menagerie passes under said road, or on the site of the sheep fold west of the West Drive and just north of the 65th street transverse road, or on Central Park West on the axis of 68th street, represented by Exhibits "667-A," "667-B" and "667-C," of record in this matter.

Certificate 1462. Resolved, That the Art Commission hereby approves, but preliminary only, the erection of the Lenox Library Building on the site of the Arsenal in Central Park at 64th street and 5th course with the transfer of the Arsenal

in Central Park, at 64th street and 5th avenue, with the distinct understanding that the Arsenal, the restaurant and the public comfort station near by will be removed when the Lenox Library Building is ready for occupancy by the Park Department, represented by Exhibit "667-A," of record in this matter.

Commissioner Russell requested to be recorded as voting in the negative upon the latter resolution.

In approving the old Arsenal site for the Lenox Library Building as future headquarters of the Park Department, the Art Commission made the following state-

"Mr. Henry C. Frick has generously offered the Lenox Library building to The City of New York, and to bear himself the entire expense of removing this building and re-erecting it at whatever site the City may designate for that purpose. His offer has been accepted by the Mayor, and the City, through the Park Commissioner with the approval of the Mayor, has applied to the Art Commission for its approval of the erection of the building on one of four sites in Central Park. viz., either on the north side of the 65th street transverse road at the point where the path into the menagerie passes under said road, or on the site of the sheep fold west of the West Drive and just north of the 65th street transverse road, or on Central Park West on the axis of 68th street, or on the site of the Arsenal.

The Park Commissioner states that the building is required to meet the needs of the Park Department for its general offices and to make possible the removal from the Park of the old Arsenal building now used for this purpose, which occupies, as he states, substantially the same area as the Lenox Library building would occupy. He also states that if the Arsenal site is selected, it will accomplish the removal of not only the old Arsenal but of the adjacent restaurant and of the

nearby public comfort station.

The function of the Art Commission in this matter is purely negative. It is not within its official duties to choose a site for Mr. Frick's gift. It is only within its function to approve or disapprove any particular site proposed by the City authorities. The only alternatives now presented to the Art Commission are therefore these: It can disapprove all locations on the ground that the building should not be placed within the confines of Central Park. In such case the City would lose the opportunity of providing headquarters for its Park Department without expense to itself; the old Arsenal would remain in the Park and continue to be used as the Park Department headquarters, and one of the most important products of the genius of Richard M. Hunt, one of America's most distinguished architects, would presumably be destroyed. For Mr. Frick states that he intends to build himself on its present site, and the opportunity to preserve this product of Mr. Hunt's genius, which is so generously offered by Mr. Frick, must, as we understand, be availed of promptly to be availed of at all.

"If, on the other hand, the Art Commission approves the Arsenal site the City headquarters for its Park Department without expense three structures which altogether occupy Park space no less—as we are informed by the Park Commissioner—than that which will be occupied by the Lenox Library build-

ing will be removed and Mr. Hunt's most important building will be preserved.

"Choosing between these alternatives the Art Commission deems it its duty to

approve the Arsenal location. "The members of the Art Commission realize that there is a strong public opinion in New York in favor of preserving Central Park for the original purposes for which it was established and to which it has been devoted. They are in sympathy with this view, and if the present project involved any greater occupation of park space for utilitarian purposes than now exists, they might easily reach a different conclusion. The Park Commissioner insists strongly that the Park Department requires headquarters and that these should continue to be, for practical reasons, in Central Park, where they have been for many generations past. He also calls attention to the fact that by locating the Lenox Library building where the Arsenal is situated, and quite aside from any reason for preserving a building so important in the development of American architecture, its erection there will only be superseding one utilitarian building by another.

"The Art Commission concurs with him in distinguishing the present application from other plans for park occupancy that have been suggested in recent years. "It should be noted that approval by the Art Commission of this site in no

way precludes the City authorities from suggesting any other and better site, if

such can be found and utilized in time to avail of Mr. Frick's gift." The Committee on the pedimental group for the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences reported that it had inspected the working model and that it was satisfactory.

In the cases in which preliminary approval was given, the Assistant Secretary was directed to notify the proper City officers that when working drawings have been completed, they should be submitted to the Commission for final action; also to transmit copies of the reports of the Committees to the proper authorities.

lobar pneumonia, broncho-pneumonia, infectious diseases of the gastro-intestinal canal (dysentery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, summer diarrhoeas of infants).

B-Parasitic diseases of the skin: Scabies Note—In this list of diseases reporting is required by the Department of Health in order that data may be obtained for general and special investigation of the modes and sources of infection and as to the prevalence and distribu-tion of these diseases. The Department of Health does not purpose to exercise a sanitary surveillance in these cases, but desires informa-tion with a view to the ultimate removal or improvement in the conditions which now foster them. Notification is required in certain of these diseases because of the liability to their extension among the children in schools.
