**Board of Education—Request for Authority to Purchase an Automobile for Use of the President Without Public Letting.**

Board of Education, Park Avenue and 59th Street, New York, February 17, 1915.

To the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to advise you that at a meeting of the Committee on Supplies, held on the 10th instant, it was decided to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize the purchase of an automobile for the use of the President of the Board of Education, at a cost not to exceed \$4,500, without advertising.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Corporation Counsel:

**Law Department—Opinion Rendered to Alderman Dowling with Respect to the Powers of the Board in the Matter of Fixing the Heights of Buildings.**

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, Municipal Building, February 17, 1915.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, Alderman, Seventh District, Room 114, City Hall:

Sir—I have received your communication of February 4, 1915, which reads as follows:

"Will you kindly advise me at your earliest convenience in what manner, if any, Chapter 470 of the Laws of 1914, conflicts with Section 407 of the Greater New York Charter."

Section 407, so far as here material, provides:

"The Board of Aldermen is authorized by ordinance to regulate and restrict the height of buildings to be hereafter erected in the City. When any ordinance on that subject is introduced, the Board of Aldermen shall provide for public hearings in reference thereto before it or before appropriate committees; and no ordinance restricting the height of buildings shall be passed unless it is approved beforehand by the board of estimate and apportionment by a resolution or vote of a majority of the members of such board entered on its minutes or record, and unless it shall be passed by a majority of all of the members elected to the board of aldermen, the vote being taken by ayes and noes. \* \* \*

Chapter 470 of the Laws of 1914 is entitled "An Act to amend the Greater New York Charter in relation to the powers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment." The amendment consists of "two new sections, to be known as Sections 242a and 242b, respectively," which read as follows:

"§242-a. The board of estimate and apportionment shall have power to regulate and limit the height and bulk of buildings hereinafter erected, and to regulate and determine the area of yards, courts and other open spaces. The board may divide the city into districts of such number, shape and area as it may deem best suited to carry out the purposes of this section. The regulations as to the height and bulk of buildings and the area of yards, courts and other open spaces shall be uniform for each class of buildings throughout each district. The regulations in one or more districts may differ from those in other districts. Such regulations shall be designed to secure safety from fire and other dangers and to promote the public health and welfare, including, so far as conditions may permit, provision for adequate light, air and convenience of access. The board shall pay reasonable regard to the character of buildings erected in each district, the value of the land and the use to which it may be put to the end that such regulations may promote public health, safety and welfare and the most desirable use for which the land of each district may be adapted and may tend to conserve the value of buildings and enhance the value of land throughout the city. The board shall appoint a commission to recommend the boundaries of districts and appropriate regulations to be enforced therein. Such commission shall make a tentative report and hold public hearings thereon at such times and places as said board shall require before submitting its final report. Said board shall not determine the boundaries of any district nor impose any regulation until after the final report of a commission so appointed. After such final report said board shall afford persons interested an opportunity to be heard at a time and place to be specified in a notice of hearing to be published for ten consecutive days in the City Record.

"§242-b. The board of estimate and apportionment may regulate and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specified uses, and may divide the city into districts of such number, shape and area as it may deem best suited to carry out the purposes of this section. For each such district

regulations may be imposed designating the trades and industries that shall be excluded or subjected to special regulations and designating the uses for which buildings may not be erected or altered. Such regulations shall be designed to promote the public health, safety and general welfare. The board shall give reasonable consideration, among other things, to the character of the district, its peculiar suitability for particular uses, the conservation of property values, and the direction of building development in accord with a well considered plan. The board shall appoint a commission to recommend the boundaries of districts and appropriate regulations and restrictions to be imposed therein. Such commission shall make a tentative report and hold public hearings thereon before submitting its final report at such time as said board shall require. Said board shall not determine the boundaries of any district nor impose any regulations or restrictions until after the final report of a commission so appointed. After such final report said board shall afford persons interested an opportunity to be heard at a time and place to be specified in a notice of hearing to be published for ten consecutive days in the City Record."

It is my opinion that so much of Section 407 as relates to the height of buildings, as above indicated, must be deemed to have been repealed by Section 242-a. Section 242-b, as will be seen, authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to regulate and restrict the location of trades and industries and of buildings designed for specified uses; as section 407 does not refer to those subjects, there would seem to be no conflict between these two sections. **Department of Public Charities—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$99,080.08, to Meet Deficiencies in 1914 Appropriations.**

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, Municipal Building, Tenth Floor, February 20th, 1915.

In re Deficiency in 1914 Appropriations.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I hereby respectfully request an issue of Special Revenue Bonds amounting to \$99,080.08, as provided in subdivision 8 of Section 188 of the Greater New York Charter. This issue of Special Revenue Bonds is required to replenish the following appropriations for the Department of Public Charities for the year 1914, which have proven insufficient to meet the heavy demands on the resources of this department due to the fact that the City has housed, clothed and fed a daily average of over 2,000 more poor people than were contemplated by the Budget Committee in making the 1914 budget:

This request is in addition to the request of September 3rd, 1914, for \$94,100, passed by your Honorable Board on November 10th, 1914, and in lieu of my request of December 2nd, 1914, amounting to \$80,663, which issue was apparently deemed unnecessary by your Committee on Finance and was accordingly placed on file at a meeting held on December 22nd, 1914, the reason for such action by your Honorable Board being that "within ten days the Department (of Public Charities) would be able to touch the Budget allowances for 1915."

The appropriations allowed to this Department for the year 1915 are in many respects wholly inadequate, and it would therefore seem to me not to be feasible to pay any of the expenses of 1914 therefrom. Moreover, the Mayor has expressly directed that the 1914 expenses must not be paid out of the 1915 Budget, which I believe is in accordance with the established accounting methods.

In my request of September 3rd, for \$94,100 mentioned above, I pointed out that the estimated amounts included therein had been cut to the lowest possible point pursuant to the policy of the City to keep the issue of Special Revenue Bonds down to an absolute minimum. I stated, however, that I feared I might have to ask for an additional issue. With a constantly growing pressure of population in the City's institutions during the late fall and early winter it became absolutely essential to provide additional clothing, medical and surgical supplies, bedding, household equipment and a variety of other supplies and equipment necessary to the operation of the institutions. Accordingly, on December 2nd, 1914, I requested the further issue of the \$80,663 Special Revenue Bonds above mentioned, and it became necessary to purchase the items represented in these codes in anticipation of favorable action on the part of your Board, without which there would have been serious and I may say untoward suffering among the poor, who, under the Poor Law, the City is obliged to care for.

Permit me to reiterate and emphasize to your Honorable Body the striking fact that the Department of Public Charities has housed, clothed and fed a daily average of 2,000 more dependents in its public institutions during the past year than had been anticipated in the 1914 Budget. In fact, during January of this year the Department cared for almost 5,000 more people than it provided for during the corresponding month of 1913. At the time when the fiscal authorities of the City made their 1914 appropriations for this Department, there was, of course, not the remotest suspicion of an impending European war or of its train of demands upon the good will of this municipality. Neither your Honorable Body nor the Board of Estimate and Apportionment could have foreseen the greatly augmented census of poor requiring the City's care.

In pressing the request for Special Revenue Bonds to replenish the accounts for clothing, household equipment and other supplies, permit me to call your attention to a striking achievement of this Department, which represents a substantial economy. We have actually fed a daily average of 2,532 more people than were contemplated by the Budget of 1914 without the necessity of requesting a single additional dollar to replenish our food account. When the 1914 Budget was prepared, the allowance for food was very carefully worked out on an assumed average daily census of 14,152 for all persons in the institutions of the Department of Public Charities. The average census was 16,684. Therefore, if the Budget Committee had been able to accurately estimate the census of this Department, it would have been obliged to add over \$125,000 to the food account. I desire to call attention to the fact, however, that we have made no request for Special Revenue Bonds for food except the request of \$58,217 passed by your Honorable Body on December 22nd, 1914, which was granted to replace transfers which were made from this account during the year. This substantial economy was brought about through better methods of handling, pur-



chasing and distribution of food and through the elimination of waste. It was accomplished without any reduction in quantity or deterioration in quality of food provided to the poor. Indeed, the Department has actually improved the quality, extended the variety and increased the quantity of the food provided the poor in the institutions.

Unfortunately, the Department must operate under certain very definite limitations with respect to household equipment, clothing and other equipment and materials which it is obliged under the law to purchase from the State's prisons. Not only is the price paid higher than the article can be obtained for on open market or contract order, but the quality of material and workmanship is generally much inferior. This is particularly true of shoes, socks, stockings and other clothing. We have, therefore, not been able to effect the same economies throughout the Department as we have shown in the food account. Moreover, it has not been possible to give the same critical study and attention to the minor items as it seemed important to give to so large an account as that for food supplies, which amounted in the 1914 Budget to \$1,198,000. Therefore, we have been obliged to renew our request to your Honorable Body for additional Revenue Bonds to meet the excess expenditures which it was necessary to incur in order to care for the poor in the institutions of the Department of Charities during the year 1914.

**Budget in Detail for the Year 1915; Estimated Receipts of the General Fund for the Year 1915; County Charges and Expenses Paid from the Proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds During the Year 1914.**

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, February 23, 1915.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Sec. 900. For the purpose of enabling the board of aldermen to impose the annual taxes it shall be the duty of the comptroller of said city to prepare and submit to said board, at least one week before the first day of March in each and every year, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, or for city purposes within said city as created by this act, and purposes for which said city is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Bronx, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the city treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the sinking funds of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such sinking funds for the payment of interest on the city debt of the municipal corporation known as the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, it is required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax such sum as shall be as nearly as possible but not less than the balances of such aggregate amount after making such deductions, by fixing a tax rate in cents and hundredths of a cent upon each dollar of assessed valuation."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the comptroller to the board of aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Bronx, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the board of aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of Law I have the honor to submit to your honorable body statements as follows:

First—The budget in detail for the year 1915.

Second—The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Bronx, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of county charges and expenses paid during the year 1914 from the proceeds of special revenue bonds, which amounts together are to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each one of said counties.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund of the City of New York applicable to the reduction of taxation.

With respect to the receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, the following statement shows the elements and amounts comprising my estimate:

## BUDGET FOR 1915.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this, the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fifteen, the total amount appropriated being:

One hundred and ninety-nine million two hundred and thirty-three thousand two hundred and eighty-six dollars and fifty-two cents (\$199,233,280.52), divided as follows:

First—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business, and to meet the debt charges of said City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fifteen:

One hundred eighty-six million, eighty-seven thousand, four hundred seventy-seven dollars and twenty-six cents (\$186,087,477.26).

Second—The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1914, in the product of taxes heretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, being section 248 of the Greater New York Charter:

Six million, one hundred and twelve thousand, ninety-two dollars and forty-four cents (\$6,112,092.44).

Third—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the year one thousand nine hundred and fifteen:

Seven million, thirty-three thousand, seven hundred sixteen dollars and eighty-two cents (\$7,033,716.82).

Resolved, That this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

## First—

- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Regular Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Regular Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from or to appropriations classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles," except to or from an appropriation classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles," except where the work to be done and paid for from the account to which the transfer is made, is a substitute for work or service intended to have been done and paid for from the account from which the transfer is made.
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees and Commissions," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Fees and Commissions."
- That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service," except in cases where the title of



appropriation specifically provides for transfers herein forbidden, or in cases where appropriations were made under the classification of "General Repairs," if, upon the written statement of the Department Head, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment finds that the repair work can be done more economically by departmental labor.

(h) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification where the appropriation is made under conditions which prohibit such transfer or when the appropriation is made for the purchase of some stated article or articles or for the payment of taxes, although otherwise the transfer might be proper under the budget resolutions in the budget for 1915.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages Regular Employees"; "Wages Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

(a) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for "Salaries Regular Employees."

(b) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages Regular Employees" where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than the pro rata of the number of working days in such week to the total number of working days provided for such schedule line for the whole year.

(c) That vacancies occurring after January 31, 1915, in schedules supporting appropriations in this budget for "Salaries Regular Employees," or "Salaries Temporary Employees," shall be filled only after certificate by the duly authorized representatives of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that the title and compensation for such vacant position conform to the standard title, work specifications and compensation grades fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This provision shall not apply to vacancies occurring in positions for which the title and compensation shall have previously been standardized by this Board. In making appointments to vacant positions for which standard titles and compensation have been fixed by this Board, such appointments shall be made at the lowest rate within the grade for such position unless this requirement is specifically waived by resolution of the Board.

The procedure under this section is subject to revision by a majority vote of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(d) That no modification of any schedule supporting an appropriation for "Salaries Regular Employees" or "Salaries Temporary Employees" in the budget of The City of New York for the year 1915 which affects the compensation of any position included in the budget as passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, shall be made except when authorized by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in conformity with standard titles, work specifications and compensation grades which may be or have been approved by said Board.

The procedure under this section is subject to revision by a majority vote of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy Part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1915 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

Fourth—

(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages Regular Employees"; "Wages Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual compensation shall not exceed but may be less than such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, provided the lesser salary or wage grade has been approved pursuant to Section 56 of the Charter.

(b) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.

(c) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled, "Salaries Regular Employees," and "Wages Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.

(d) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of the service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons, except heads of departments, and excepting bureau and division heads relieved by the head of their department from the duty of keeping such record on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, all expenditures against such appropriation shall be made in accordance with such schedule and no voucher shall be passed by the Department of Finance for a sum exceeding the amount shown in said schedule, except when such schedule shall have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for purchases to be charged against such appropriation shall be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage already approved or hereafter to be approved by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which such contracts are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials, fuel or forage or other articles for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies and materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform to such standard specifications.

—Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Depart-

ments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fifteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedule, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Wages Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees" and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fifteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Regular Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees," and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fifteen.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all departments of City and County Governments, for which appropriations for food supplies have been made in the Budget for 1915, shall make an inventory on January 1, 1915, to determine the number of units of each article of food in stock, either in stores or in the institutions and the cost value thereof, and shall thereafter keep an accurate record showing the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total cost of all articles of food purchased in each month; that such departments shall keep an accurate record of the quantities of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates, such record to be entirely separate and distinct from the consumption of food supplies by employees or persons other than patients and inmates; and such departments shall keep an accurate record of the number of units of food supplies and the cost thereof consumed by the employees, such record to be entirely distinct from the record of food consumption by patients and inmates and such departments are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the first of each quarter, a statement on budget accounting forms to be submitted by the Comptroller showing the stock on hand at the beginning of the preceding quarter, the number of units and price per unit and cost amount of the supplies delivered to the department within the preceding quarter, the number of units and cost amount of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates within the preceding quarter, the number of units and cost amount of food supplies consumed by employees within the preceding quarter, the aggregate number of patients or inmate days within the preceding quarter, the aggregate number of employee days within the preceding quarter, the daily per capita consumption of food supplies in pounds and the cost amount thereof by patients or inmates in the preceding quarter, the daily, per capita, consumption of food supplies in pounds and the cost thereof by employees in the preceding quarter, and the total number of units consumed and the cost thereof within the preceding quarter, the stock on hand at the end of the quarter and such other information as may be required upon the budget accounting forms, provided, however, that this resolution shall not apply to administrative departments to which food supply appropriations have been made to be used in payment for meals of employees properly entitled to such meals by reason of overtime work.

Resolved, That all departments receiving appropriations for wearing apparel in the 1915 Budget shall make an inventory on January 1, 1915, to determine the number of units of each article of wearing apparel in stock or available for use in the institutions and shall keep a record thereafter of all wearing apparel purchased and delivered to the department; and shall keep a record showing the name of each patient, inmate and employee receiving wearing apparel, the character and cost of the wearing apparel issued to each employee, patient or inmate and a record showing in each case whether the wearing apparel issued was taken away from the institution or was returned to be reissued to other patients, inmates or employees; that such information shall be submitted to the Comptroller at the end of each quarter upon budget accounting forms furnished by the Comptroller.

Resolved, That the several boards, departments, offices and bureaus of the City and County Governments are hereby directed to keep records showing the number of units and the cost amount of stock on hand at the beginning of each quarter, the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total cost of the number of units, the price per unit and the cost amount of all articles of equipment, supplies and materials purchased in 1915 and charged against appropriations made in this budget and such boards, departments, offices and bureaus are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the end of each quarter a statement of stock on hand, purchases, deliveries and consumption, with the number of units, cost price per unit and the cost amount of all articles of equipment, supplies and materials purchased, delivered and consumed within the quarter, provided, however, that this resolution shall not apply to appropriations for food supplies and wearing apparel.

—Be it further

Resolved, That nothing in the foregoing resolutions shall be construed as nullifying the resolutions preceding the so-called "cost data appropriation" for the Bureau of Highways, the Bureau of Sewers and the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the Department of the President of the Borough of Richmond.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board is hereby directed to send certified copies of the preceding resolution to each department, board, office and bureau of the City and County Governments.

**Allowances Made on Cost Data Basis—**

Resolved, That the following terms and conditions shall govern the administration of the cost data budget and supporting schedules for the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Street Cleaning, Office of the President, Borough of Richmond, for the year 1915.

(1) The nature of all expenditures shall fall within the scope of the work classifications specified in the supporting schedules.

(2) The total cost allowances shown therein for any quarter shall not be exceeded within that quarter except by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(3) The total allowance for capital investment shall not be exceeded during the year.

At the end of each quarter of the year there shall be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a detailed statement of all the operations of the above mentioned bureaus and the cost thereof, together with a reconciliation schedule showing the relation between total costs of work and total expenditures, in such form as may be prescribed by the Board. Such reports, when made, shall show separately for each item cost the several elements that make up the item cost, including labor, vehicular transportation (hired and departmental), foreman supervision, inspection, administrative supervision, materials, supplies, equipment and plant charges. At the same time requests for modifications of the remaining schedules may be presented for consideration and action of the Board, but no change shall be made in the work programme until first approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The quarterly reports of the Bureau of Highways shall show in detail the character and the quantities of the work done and shall, when requested, include the names of the streets and the quantities of work performed on each street.

The quarterly reports of the Bureau of Sewers shall give the location of basins and sewers cleaned and the character and quantities of work performed for each location.

The quarterly reports for the Bureau of Street Cleaning shall contain the character and quantities of work done and shall, when requested, include the names of the streets and the quantities of work done.

At the beginning of each quarter the Bureau of Highways, the Bureau of Sewers and the Bureau of Street Cleaning shall furnish to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment schedules of work planned for the succeeding quarter.

The Board shall be notified in advance of the commencement and cessation for all regular work covered by the supporting schedules.

Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with Section 56 of the Greater New York Charter:

That the positions and grades of positions and rates of compensation therefore appearing in the following schedules be established respectively in the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers and Bureau of Street Cleaning, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, for the number of incumbents specified therein.

In the discretion of the Board, and at any time during the year, transfers may be made between any of the codified appropriation accounts of these bureaus upon presentation by the Borough President of satisfactory evidence of the need therefor.

All expenditures made out of these appropriations for the Bureaus of Highways, Sewers and Street Cleaning shall be in accordance with the supporting schedules, divided into quarterly allowances, to be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

## CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

## Fixed Charges and Contributions—

## Care of Dependents in Private Institutions—

## Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

## Preamble.

All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:

1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following classifications:

## A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution as follows:

- Food stuffs.
- Clothing.
- Linen and bedding.
- Fuel.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
- Other supplies.
- Salaries and wages.
- Professional services.
- Light.
- Forage and care of animals.
- Telephone.
- Printing, stationery and advertising.
- Postage and telegrams.
- Hospital and sanitarium charges.
- Funerals.
- Recreation expense.
- Miscellaneous expenses.

## B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:

- Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
- Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
- Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate, used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable such accounts shall be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges, but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities, by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation.



4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous fiscal year upon forms prescribed and furnished for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriation made to any charitable institutions, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment from any such appropriations shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and maintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities of any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which  
pays any salary to,  
gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by,  
has any business dealing with, or  
secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from  
any officer or trustee or member of its board of managers, or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction except that for abnormal or atypical children, a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, provided in Section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children and being under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and which has been placed in this budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. The Department of Health shall maintain in all child-caring institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York for each inmate accepted as a public charge under the rules of the State Board of Charities, and as herein provided, a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth, or any organic defect in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools in The City of New York. It shall also record the dietary actually employed in such institutions for the feeding of its inmates. Such statistics and records shall be made and revised by the Board of Health once in each six months.

12. Each institution shall give to the Comptroller on forms prescribed by him notice of the reception or discharge of any person for whose care city or county funds are to be received within twenty-four hours after his arrival at or discharge from the institution.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specifically provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter stated is too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

**Department of Bridges—Communication in Regard to Resolution Passed by Board of Aldermen, Requesting that Interlocking Device or Devices be Placed on Elevators in Municipal Building.**

Department of Bridges, City of New York, Municipal Building, Manhattan, N. Y., February 19, 1915.

Hon. GEORGE MCANENY, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York, City Hall: Sir—Referring to a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen February 9, 1915, I quote:

"Resolved—That the Commissioner of Bridges be and he is hereby requested to apply a device or devices, as contemplated in the ordinance (No. 1071), submitted by the Committee on Buildings, and entitled "An Ordinance regulating the construction, operation and maintenance of elevators in The City of New York," on the several elevators in the new Municipal Building, to the end that this Board in its final action on this proposition may be informed, after report made by the Commissioner of Bridges, based upon a reasonable test, how practical is the idea embraced in said ordinance."

—please be advised that, at my suggestion, a committee of three Engineers, designated respectively by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Architects of the Municipal Building and myself, has considered the question of, interlocking the elevator cars and the enclosure doors in the Municipal Building, and examined a number of test interlocking devices which had been placed on these elevators prior to July, 1914. It is quite possible that this committee already has covered the ground outlined in the resolution.

The said committee will be reconvened on February 26, 1915, at 2.30 P. M., in room 1810 of the Municipal Building, to consider the resolution, and I suggest that the representatives of the Board of Aldermen having this matter in charge be present at the meeting, to determine whether further tests are necessary.

**Report of the Committee on Salaries and Offices, in Favor of Returning to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment Certain Resolutions Affecting Grades.**

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to which was referred on February 2, 9 and 16, 1915 (Minutes, pages 720, 796, 797, 798 and 1058), certain resolutions known as Introductory Nos. 1363, 1399, 1400, 1401, 1402, 1403 and 1423, respectfully

REPORTS:

That it has gone into the matter of the standing of the Board of Aldermen as a co-ordinate body with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and is of firm opinion that the framers of the city charter designed in their drawing of Section 56 that this Board should at all times act as a check on the heads of all departments, even after their requests as to salaries paid from city funds had been acted upon by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This view is sustained by the fact that since 1897 no one has had the temerity to attempt a revision of this section in this respect. This being the case, the action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in submitting to this Board the resolutions herein referred to, without including in the same, as has been the practice heretofore, the number of incumbents in each grade, notwithstanding that the requests made for these changes by the several departments distinctly set forth such number of incumbents, is in direct contravention of the intent of Section 56, as the unlimited grades, if established, would obviate the necessity of ever again appearing before this Board for action before making any number of changes under these grades for which funds might be obtained.

This system, if continued, as it seems to be the intention of the newly created advisers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, would in a short period eliminate the Board of Aldermen entirely as a factor in the consideration of salary grades, with the exception of the slightly negative power possessed in connection with the annual approval of the Budget, which has a decided string to it in the power of a veto by the Mayor.

Under these circumstances, your committee, feeling assured that this Board wishes to retain the function of safeguarding the public funds in this matter of salaries, recommends that these resolutions be returned to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the request that the number of incumbents be inserted in these and all future resolutions, with the exception of such as relate to the per diem compensation of all employees receiving the prevailing rate of wages.

AN ORDINANCE amending Sections 129 and 130 of Article III. of Chapter 5 of Part I. of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, relating to "flagging, curbing and repairing sidewalks."  
*Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:*  
Section 1. Sections 129 and 130 of Article III. of Chapter 5 of Part I. of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to the flagging, curbing and repairing of sidewalks, are hereby amended so as to read, respectively, as follows:

Sec. 129. The owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants, of any house or other building or vacant lot fronting on any street or avenue, shall, at his, her or their charge and expense, well and sufficiently pave, according to the ordinances, the sidewalks and curb and gutter of such street or avenue in front of any such house or other building or vacant lot; *provided, however, that whenever any sidewalk, curb or gutter, in any of the boroughs of the city, has been at any time flagged or paved at the expense of the property owner, either by assessment or otherwise, said sidewalk, curb or gutter shall thereafter be kept in repair at the public expense under the jurisdiction of the borough president having control and cognizance thereof.*

Sec. 130. Upon complaint being made to the borough president having jurisdiction thereof, to his satisfaction, that any sidewalk, or curb and gutter, or either, are not paved or repaired according to this ordinance, *where such pavement or repairs are to be made at the expense of the property owners*, it shall be lawful for the said borough president to cause a notice to be served upon the owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants, of any such house or other building or vacant lot of ground fronting on any street or avenue to repair or relay, as the case may require, the sidewalk and curb and gutter, or either, in front of the same within ten days after the service of such notice.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen—On November 24, 1914, you referred to the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, dated November 19, 1914, requesting among other matters \$1,200 in corporate stock for the improvement of the Public Place at the intersection of Bergen Avenue and East 149th Street.

The Public Place referred to is small in area, and at present the majority of it is elevated, forming a roof for the portal of the subway. The southerly edge of this elevated portion, on which there is a coping some two feet in height, is practically at the north curb line of East 149th Street, making it necessary for pedestrians passing this point to use the roadway. The traffic in 149th Street, being heavy, walking in the roadway is very dangerous. It is proposed to move the wall at this point several feet in a northerly direction to allow the construction of a sidewalk between the wall and the north curb of 149th Street. It is also proposed to remove a short section of unnecessary coping on the easterly end of the north wall of this elevated portion of the Public Place to provide better sidewalk facilities on the east side of Bergen Avenue. It is also proposed to straighten the curb line on 149th Street at this point, and in doing so, construct a concrete sidewalk to replace a piece of sheet asphalt which is at present connected with the roadway of 149th Street, but is north of the north line of said street and of little benefit to traffic. This improvement is very urgent and the estimate of cost is reasonable.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

Gentlemen—On January 18, 1915, the Committee on the City Plan requested authority to expend a total of \$2,885, during 1915, out of the Board's contingency account for the temporary services of Topographical Draftsmen. The request was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades on January 22. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon, under date of February 5, as follows:

"The original request, which contemplates employments not established in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, has been revised. It is now requested that provision be made for the employment of two Draftsmen, for a total of 20 months, at \$100 per month, and for one Draftsman, at \$112.50 per month, for 7½ months.

"The Secretary of the Committee states that he included in his 1915 budget estimate a request for funds for temporary Draftsmen, which was disallowed with the understanding that the Committee could receive authority to charge temporary services, as the necessity arose, to the contingency account of the Board. The additional Draftsmen are needed to prepare the maps and charts which are being designed to visualize the data which the Committee's staff is collecting. No need is shown, however, for the employment of a Draftsman at \$112.50. The needs of the Committee could be better served by provision for per diem employment. It is suggested that a position of Draftsman, at \$4 per day, be established for this purpose."

Gentlemen—On February 2, 1915, the Municipal Civil Service Commission requested the establishment, pursuant to section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the grade of position of Stenotypist, at \$840. The request was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades on February 5. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon, under date of February 9, as follows:

"Heretofore the Commission has been obliged to employ public Stenographers to record the minutes of oral examinations. The number of oral examinations is increasing, which will increase the fees for public Stenographers unless other provision is made. The Commission is also engaged in installing a new method of efficiency ratings which provides for final fixation of ratings by a Board of Review, consisting of the President of the Commission, an Examiner and a representative of the department in which ratings are to be made. A great number of meetings will be held, at all of which the recording of the proceedings will be necessary. The employment of a Stenotypist to perform this work will prove to be a distinct economy.

"The stenotype machine requires an operator of only ordinary ability, and does away with the necessity for highly trained Stenographers to take verbatim minutes.



It records on a strip of paper by means of a vowel and contraction system, which may be mastered after a little practice, so that any Typist may transcribe the notes. The machine is not in general use, and no prevailing rates of pay can be fixed. The proposed salary of \$840 appears reasonable for the work to be performed. If the position is established, funds will be provided by eliminating two vacant positions."

#### An Ordinance Providing for the Proper Inspection of Meat in the City of New York.

By Alderman Boschen—  
AN ORDINANCE to Provide for the Proper Inspection of Meat in The City of New York.

*Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:*

Section 1. No carcasses or parts of the carcasses of cattle, sheep, or swine, shall be offered for sale, sold, or given away in the City of New York until they shall, respectively, have been inspected and passed as fit for human food by a duly authorized inspector of the United States Government or a duly authorized inspector of the Health Department of the City of New York, or, in the case of parts of a carcass, unless such part shall have been cut from a carcass or part of a carcass which had previously been inspected and passed as hereinbefore provided.

Section 2. Such inspector of the Department of Health, upon finding such carcass or part of a carcass, as the case may be, fit for human food, shall, upon receipt of the sum of five cents, to be collected by such inspector for each carcass or part of a carcass thus inspected and found fit for human food, proceed to mark such carcass or part of a carcass by branding or stamping thereon a number and the words "Department of Health" and "Inspected and Passed," together with the date of inspection and the name of the inspector, all set forth in conspicuous type in the following form:

and such inspector shall also, upon branding or stamping such carcass or part of a carcass, deliver to the person paying the aforesaid sum a certificate, which shall be substantially in the following form:

(Brief description of carcass or part of carcass).....  
(Place of Inspection).....  
(Name of Dealer).....  
Inspected and Passed.....  
(Date) .....  
(Name of Inspector).....

Such brand or stamp marks, as well as such certificates, shall be consecutively numbered, and the number of the brand or stamp mark shall, in every instance, correspond with the number of the certificate.

Section 3. Every such certificate shall be made in triplicate form, and the inspector shall deliver the original to the person paying the aforesaid sum, and file a copy thereof, respectively, in the Department of Health and in the office of the Comptroller.

Section 4. For the purposes of this ordinance, no such carcass or part of a carcass shall be deemed to have been inspected and passed as fit for human food by an inspector of the Department of Health unless such carcass or part of a carcass shall have been branded or stamped and a certificate shall have been issued, as hereinbefore provided.

Section 5. The provisions of this ordinance shall not, however, apply to carcasses or parts of the carcasses of cattle, sheep or swine killed in any slaughter-house in the City of New York conducted under a permit issued by the Board of Health.

Section 6. Any person who shall violate or neglect to comply with any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than One hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

**An Ordinance to Further Amend Section 97 of the Building Code, as Amended May 29, 1914, Relative to Dumbwaiter Shafts.**

By Alderman Kochendorfer—

AN ORDINANCE to further amend Section 97 of the Building Code as amended May 29, 1914, relative to Dumbwaiter Shafts.

*Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:*

Section 1. Section 97 of the Building Code is hereby amended to read as follows:  
Section 97. Dumbwaiter Shafts. All dumbwaiter shafts hereafter created in any building, except such as do not extend more than three stories above the cellar or basement in dwelling houses, shall be enclosed in suitable walls of brick or with burnt clay blocks, set in iron frames of proper strength, or fireproof blocks, strengthened with metal dowels or such other fireproof material and form of construction as may be approved by the Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction. Said walls or construction shall extend at least three feet above the roof and be covered with a skylight at least three-fourths the area of the shaft, made with metal frames and glazed. All openings in the enclosure walls or constructions shall be provided with self closing fireproof doors. When the shaft does not extend to the floor level of the lowest story, the bottom of the shaft shall be constructed of fireproof material.

In [all existing] buildings coming under the provisions of this section [where the] any such dumb waiter shaft which has been heretofore erected and which extends into the cellar or lowest story [it] shall be enclosed in that story with walls of brick eight inches thick [;], unless already enclosed in some form of construction conforming to the requirements hereinbefore prescribed for new dumb-waiter shafts. [a] All openings in said walls shall be provided with self closing fireproof doors.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

"Resolved, That the Clerk of this Board appoint two persons to be in charge, without salary, of said so-called "Marriage Bureau," upon the understanding and direction that they may be allowed to demand from the contracting parties no fee whatever, but to state to them that any payment made by them for their marriage certificate is wholly voluntary.

"Resolved, That printed notices, in the English, French, Italian and Hebrew languages be posted conspicuously in said Room No. 3 to the effect that no person is authorized a fee for the marriage ceremony or certificate."

**An Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, Relating to Motorcycles.**

By Alderman Trau—

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to "Motorcycles."

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:*

Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by the addition of an article to be known as Article 16, as follows:

## ARTICLE 16.

## Motorcycles.

- Section 190. Licenses.  
191. License plates.  
192. Fee.  
193. Equipment.  
194. Lamps.  
195. Age Limit.  
196. Violations.  
197. Ordinances repealed.  
198. Date of taking effect.

Section 190, Licenses.—No motor cycle or motor tricycle, either private or commercial, with or without body attachment, shall be operated on any public highway or place in The City of New York unless the owner shall have first registered the same with the Department of Licenses and received from the Department a certificate or license to operate the same for a period of one year, and containing the name, age and address of the owner, the number of the vehicle and the name of the manufacturer; said certificate shall be in the possession of the operator at all times when the vehicle is in use and shall be produced when required by any member of the police force.

Section 191, License Plates.—At the time of issuing the license the Department shall deliver to the applicant two metallic plates seven inches in length by two and one-half inches in width on which shall be placed a distinctive number consisting of numerals one and three-fourth inches in length by three-eighths of an inch in width; such plates shall be placed in a conspicuous rigid position one on the front and the other on the rear of the vehicle.

Section 192, Fee.—On receiving such certificate and metallic plates the owner shall pay to the Department a fee of Two dollars.

Section 193, Equipment.—Every such vehicle operated in any public place or highway in The City of New York shall be equipped with an adequate brake, kept in good order, and with an adequate bell, horn or similar device for signaling, and, if propelled by an internal combustion engine, with an adequate muffler or silencer through which all exhaust gases from the engine will pass into the atmosphere.

Section 194, Lamps.—No such vehicle shall be operated or permitted to stand in any public place or highway of The City of New York between sunset and sunrise unless it shall carry a lamp in front showing a white light visible two hundred feet ahead, and a lamp in the rear showing a red light visible fifty feet behind, the rear lamp to show also a white light on the said metallic plate carried on the rear of such vehicle, in such manner as to render the numerals thereon visible for a distance of fifty feet in the rear.

Section 195, Age Limit.—No person under the age of eighteen years shall be permitted to operate any such vehicle in any public place or highway of The City of New York; nor shall any person under the age of ten years be permitted to ride on the rear seat of any such vehicle unless the seat is equipped with an adequate back rest and foot supports; nor shall any person under the age of six years be permitted to ride on any such vehicle, except in a body attachment and accompanied by parent or guardian.

Section 196, Violations.—Any person operating such a vehicle in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction by any city magistrate, be fined a sum not exceeding Ten dollars, and, in default of payment, committed to prison until paid, not exceeding ten days.

Section 197, Ordinances Repealed.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances of The City of New York, inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 198, Date of Taking Effect.—This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and fifteen.

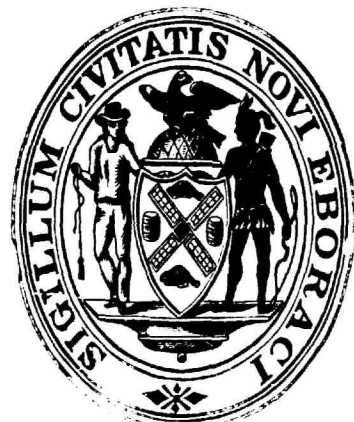

SECOND:—The railroad of your said petitioner is laid out to serve a territory which at the present time is undeveloped and unoccupied with the exception of one small building, and with the exception of two blocks which are occupied by the Loose-Wiles Biscuit Company. The said Loose-Wiles Biscuit Company is the only occupant of the territory served by your petitioner, which requires regular freight service of your petitioner. Two other buildings are in course of erection, one immediately adjacent to the Loose-Wiles Biscuit building and the other a building near the Western terminus of your petitioner.

In the said contract or franchise from the City of New York to your petitioner dated the 12th day of June, 1914 there is contained the following provision:

"Fourteenth:—During the period prior to 'January 1, 1916, cars may be operated upon 'said tracks by steam locomotives which shall 'be housed or boxed so as to conform with 'the type commonly known as the 'dummy 'engine'. On or before January 1, 1916, the 'Company shall discontinue the use of said 'dummy steam locomotives and operate said 'tracks by electric power or any other motive 'power which may be approved by the Board 'and consented to by the abutting property 'owners in accordance with the provisions of 'law and by the Public Service Commission 'for the First District of the State of New 'York. It is understood, however, that no 'overhead wires except trolley wires shall be 'permitted for the operation of said tracks by 'the electric power.'"

At the time this franchise was accepted with this provision it was expected that the development of this tract would be so rapid as would justify and require the introduction of electric motive power by the year 1916, but due to the European War and general financial depression the development of this section has been greatly retarded and there will be no need or demand for the introduction of electric motive power within several years, nor will the traffic conditions justify the installation of such power. The operation of the railroad for the next several years will in no wise pay expenses; the estimated returns being insufficient even to pay the franchise charges of the City of New York, irrespective of any fixed charges for right of way or capital invested. The installation of electric equipment including trolley wires and feed wires across the streets covered by the route of your petitioner would, in the opinion of your petitioner, constitute a considerable encumbrance to the building operations now in course of progress and the further building operations that will be necessary before there will be any considerable volume of traffic to be served by your petitioner.

It is necessary for your petitioner now to make its plans for its motive power for the next three years.

Your petitioner therefore requests that an extension of time be given to your petitioner for the operation of said tracks by steam locomotives as provided in the said paragraph "Fourteenth"

of its said franchise from the City of New York, to the first day of January, 1916.

Your petitioner presents herewith the consents of all the property owners abutting on the lines of your petitioner now operated or that will in any event be operated prior to January 1st, 1918 joining in the request of your petitioner for this extension of time.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
