These Police Officers have been for some time assigned to detective duty in the lower portion of the city, where were the largest financial interests. Their duties have been not difficult to perform, nor multifarious. The results of their labor have been most discreditable. If the arrest of a few thieves for petty offenses be excepted, the services of some of them to the public have been worthless. Large robberies have been committed, and forgeries perpetrated, and in almost every instance either the real offender has not been brought to justice, or when he has been, the evidence as presented would not be sufficient for conviction, and there is scarcely an instance on record at these Headquarters, where, if there was a large amount of money stolen, it was recovered or the thieves convicted.

Not only have these officers failed generally in these respects, but since December 12, 1876, this Department finds that \$206,000 cash and securities have been stolen by sneak thieves from banks and bankers (the avails of four robberies only) and the offenses not even properly reported at Headquarters, and not one dollar recovered or the criminals arrested—a state of affairs which need no comment.

Especially may be added the fact, that the men who perpetrate this class of offenses are not numerous, and are well known by sight and reputation to all of these officers transferred, and their interviews with them on the eve of and previous to a robbery, and their immediate and subsequent association with them after the offense, if it does not furnish evidence of complicity, at least is grounds for severe criticism.

They should have been driven from the city by detection, instead of being permitted to remain for plunder; it is also clear that the attitude of the thieves and their associates since these robberies has shown a confidence resulting from satisfactory arrangement with some one.

The daily reports of the detectives show them to have been constantly on duty, but months sometimes pass without their having seen, according to their own showing, more than one or two suspicious characters.

This Board has information however, that during such times they have seen many of them and conversed with them under circumstances which they will in time be called upon to explain; they are now transferred to post duty to prevent more mischief, whether resulting from incapacity, willful negligence, or collusion.

No. 2. Both sides of Avenue A, between Fifty-fourth
and Fifty-seventh streets, and to the extent of half the block
at the intersecting of Fifty-fourth, Fifty-fifth, and Fifty-
sixth streets.

No. 3. Both sides of Forty-third street, from First ave-
nue to the East river, and to the extent of half the block at
the intersection of First avenue.

No. 4. Both sides of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth
street, from Eighth avenue to Avenue St. Nicholas.

No. 5. Both sides of One Hundred and Twenty-sixth
street, from Second to Seventh avenue, and to the extent of
half the block at the intersecting avenues.

No. 6. Both sides of Fifty-ninth street, from First
avenue to Avenue A, and to the extent of half the block at
the intersecting avenues.

No. 7. Both sides of Sixtieth street, from Tenth to
Eleventh avenue, and to the extent of half the block at the
intersecting avenues.

No. 8. Both sides of Fifty-eighth street, from Tenth to
Eleventh avenue, and to the extent of half the block at the
intersecting avenues.

No. 9. Both sides of Fifty-eighth street, from Tenth to
Eleventh avenue, and to the extent of half the block at the
intersecting avenues.

No. 10. Both sides of Bogart street, from West street to
Thirteenth avenue, and to the extent of half the block at
the intersection of West street and Thirteenth avenue.

No. 11. Both sides of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh
street, from Third to Sixth avenue, and to the extent of
half the block at the intersecting avenues.

No. 12. Both sides of Fifty-sixth street, from Second to
Third avenue, and to the extent of half the block at the
intersecting avenues.

No. 13. Both sides of Tenth avenue, from Seventy-fifth
to Seventy-seventh street, and blocks bounded by Seventy-
fifth and Seventy-seventh streets, Ninth avenue and the
Boulevard.
