

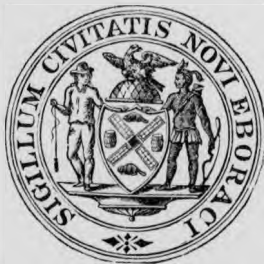

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Report for the Quarter ending June 30, 1884.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS, }

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor :

Sir:—In accordance with section 49 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Department of Public Parks hereby submits the following statement of its proceedings for the three months ending June 30, 1884 :

The equestrian statue of Simon Bolivar, presented to the City by the President of the Venezuela Republic, having received the necessary technical approbation, was formally accepted and unveiled on the Central Park.

A site on the Riverside Park, opposite Eighty-ninth street, having been designated for Handon's statue of Washington, the same was erected on a base paid for by the adjoining property-owners ; the statue was unveiled with appropriate ceremonies.

The following resolution has been adopted :

Whereas, By resolution of this Board, adopted April 25, 1883, space in the park situate at the intersection of Broadway with Sixth avenue and Thirty-second street, was set apart for the installation of the proposed statue of the late William E. Dodge ; and

Whereas, The committee having the matter in charge have requested that the park situate at the intersection of Broadway with Sixth avenue and Thirty-fifth street be designated as the site for the erection of said statue ; therefore

Resolved, That whenever the design for the proposed bronze statue shall have been approved and the finished work accepted in accordance with the by-laws governing this Department, space in the park situate at the intersection of Broadway with Sixth avenue and Thirty-fifth street be and the same is hereby set apart as a site for said statue, in lieu of the site heretofore designated, subject to such regulations as may from time to time be prescribed by this Department.

Chapter 447 of the Laws of 1884 authorized the Department to enlarge the Museum of Art building on the Central Park. The Trustees of the Museum requested that action be taken on the part of the Department, to carry into effect the provisions of said act, by application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for an appropriation to be applied thereto, and presented plans for the proposed enlargement. The plans were approved and adopted and the following resolution passed :

Whereas, By chapter 447 of the Laws of 1884, the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art are authorized to prepare plans for the enlargement of the building now erected upon that portion of the Central Park east of the old receiving reservoir, and now in the possession and occupation of the Metropolitan Museum of Art ; and

Whereas, Ground plans have been prepared by said Trustees and submitted to and approved of by the Department of Public Parks ; and

Whereas, The Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art have, by its President and Secretary, in a communication to the Department of Public Parks, of June 6, 1884, made a request to join in a formal request to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be transmitted with that of this Department, asking an immediate appropriation for the purposes of carrying out the provisions of said act ; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds or stock, for the purpose of providing the money for the prosecution of the work hereinbefore mentioned as authorized and called for in chapter 447 of the Laws of 1884.

An act of the Legislature having authorized and directed the improvement of the park in Mission place, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment having, upon request, made a transfer for that purpose, the architect of the Department furnished, by direction of the Board, plans and suggestions for such improvements, which have been approved and executed. Trees have been planted upon the park, the old urinal removed, settees made and placed in position, and the park generally maintained in order.

Assessment lists for the following works, together with statements of the amounts and costs of the respective works, have been approved and signed by the Commissioners, and transmitted to the Board of Assessors :

Resolved, That the following-named assessment lists for

"Flagging the sidewalk four feet wide, and setting curb and gutter stones, and laying crosswalk on the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-first street, from Courtland to Morris avenue ;" "regulating and grading One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, and also setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging the sidewalks four feet wide therein, from Third avenue to Alexander avenue ;" and "regulating and grading One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and also setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging the sidewalks, from Third avenue to Alexander avenue ;" and also statements of the amounts and costs of the work therein mentioned, be approved and signed by the Commissioners of the Department, and transmitted to the Board of Assessors.

Resolved, That the following-named assessment lists : "For constructing a sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Brook avenue and Mill Brook, and between Millbrook and Courtland avenues, with a branch in Bergen avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-eighth and One Hundred and Forty-ninth streets ;" for "regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging the sidewalk four feet wide in One Hundred and Forty-third street, from the westerly curb-line of Third avenue to the easterly curb-line of Fourth avenue ;" "flagging the sidewalks a space four feet wide, and setting curb and gutter stones in One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, between Willis and St. Ann's avenues ;" for "setting curb and laying flagging and gutter-stones on and along the western sidewalk of St. Ann's avenue, from seventy-five feet northerly from One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street to One Hundred and Forty-first street ;" and "laying crosswalks in Lincoln avenue, at the southerly intersection of the Southern Boulevard, and at the intersection of each street, from the Southern Boulevard to and including One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, also across each street, within the aforesaid limits, at the intersection of Lincoln avenue ;" and also the statements of the amounts and costs of the work therein mentioned, be approved and signed by the Commissioners of the Department, and transmitted to the Board of Assessors.

The grades of One Hundred and Seventy-third street, between Vanderbilt avenue, East, and Weeks street ; of Barnside avenue, between Seelywick avenue and Webster avenue, and of the avenues and streets between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Division avenue, and between Trinity avenue and the Southern Boulevard, have been established, and maps thereof prepared and filed according to law.

The Counsel to the Corporation has been authorized and directed to commence proceedings to acquire title, wherever the same has not been already acquired, to that part of North Third avenue, commencing at the Twenty-third Ward line and running northerly to Pelham avenue, and to Courtland avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-sixth and One Hundred and Sixty-first streets.

Contracts for the following works were awarded, at public letting, to the lowest bidders, respectively :

1. For constructing a sewer with appurtenances and branches in Webster avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth and One Hundred and Eighty-fourth streets. To Charles Jones, \$172,758.90.

2. For constructing a sewer and appurtenances in Washington avenue, between Brook avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street. To Thomas J. Allen, James W. O'Grady and Thomas O'Malley, \$25,839.40.

3. For regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, flagging the sidewalk four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in One Hundred and Forty-first street, between the westerly curb-line of North Third avenue and the easterly curb-line of Rider avenue. To Robert Hall and F. V. Morrison, \$2,909.

4. For regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, flagging the sidewalk four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in One Hundred and Forty-second street, between the westerly curb-line of North Third avenue and the easterly curb-line of Rider avenue. To Robert Hall and F. V. Morrison, \$3,485.65.

5. For regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, flagging the sidewalk four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in One Hundred and Forty-third street, between the easterly curb-line of Brook avenue and the westerly curb-line of St. Ann's avenue. To J. D. Moore, \$3,001.20.

6. For regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, flagging the sidewalks four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, from the westerly line of North Third avenue to the easterly curb-line of Railroad avenue, East. To B. C. Murray, \$7,958.70.

Contracts for the following works have been made during the quarter upon estimates procured by the order of the Board :

Regulating, grading, curbing, guttering, and flagging One Hundred and Forty-seventh street. To D. W. Moran, \$664.55.

Furnishing back-gearing for working the machinery of the Third Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river. To Delamater Iron Works, \$345.

Furnishing and placing water-closets and urinals in the cottage at Tompkins Square. To James McLaughlin, \$735.

Fitting up a police sub-station in the basement of the new Refreshment building in Central Park. To James Brady, \$967.

Repairing the rustic work of the Kinderberg in Central Park. To F. E. McAllister, \$996.

Filling, grading and draining Riverdale avenue. To Thomas Murray, \$667.

Furnishing and putting in sashes, doors, etc., in the building at Claremont, on Riverside Park. To James Brady, \$980.

Furnishing and putting up three flights of stairs in the building at Claremont, on Riverside Park. To Patrick Corr, \$485.

Placing hood over the north entrance to the new Refreshment building in Central Park, and altering the steps at the east entrance to said building. To James Brady, \$277.

Plans for the proposed new bridge over the Harlem river, above High Bridge, have been solicited and received from engineers of high standing. Upon the reception of the plans, and after discussion thereupon, notice was inserted in the CITY RECORD inviting parties interested to examine the same.

At the request of the board, the Comptroller has been authorized to issue bonds to the amount of \$5,000, to defray the expense of preliminary surveys and plans of the said bridge.

Plans and specifications for the following works have been approved and ordered printed, in order to advertise for proposals for the doing of such works :

Sewer in Walton avenue, from One Hundred and Fiftieth street to point five hundred feet northerly therefrom.

Laying crosswalks and repaving, etc., at the intersections of North Third avenue with Morris and Willis avenues.

Paving with trap-block Transverse road No. 2, in the Central Park.

Sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from the summit between Willis and Alexander avenues to Brook avenue, and for regulating, grading, etc., One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, from North Third avenue to Willis avenue.

Sewer from the present sewer on the easterly side of Riverside avenue, at One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, across the avenue and westerly into Riverside Park.

For furnishing and delivering broken trap-rock stone and broken trap-rock screenings along certain roads, streets, etc., in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Regulating, etc., Brook avenue, from the Bronx Kills to the New York and Harlem Railroad.

For paving Willis avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to North Third avenue.

For erecting ladies' cottage on the Central Park.

Plans and specifications prepared and submitted by Mr. William E. Worthen, for back-gearing, for working the machinery for the draw on the Third Avenue Bridge, over the Harlem river, were approved by the Board, estimates therefor obtained, and the work done in accordance therewith.

Plans for the following works have been prepared and approved by the Board :

Entrance to the Central Park and One Hundred and Tenth street and Eighth avenue.

Improving the grounds of the Central Park, immediately east of the Eighth avenue, and between the new entrances at Seventy-ninth and Eighty-first streets.

Railing to be erected on the southerly side of the park on Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-ninth and One Hundred and Seventieth streets.

Plans have been ordered prepared for the following-named works :

Sewer and appurtenances in Fulton avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-ninth to One Hundred and Seventieth street, and in One Hundred and Seventieth street, from Fulton avenue to Third avenue.

Sewer and appurtenances in Westchester avenue, from Brook avenue to St. Ann's avenue, with branches in St. Ann's avenue, from the Port Morris branch of the Harlem Railroad to Carr street.

During the quarter an order was obtained from a Judge of the Supreme Court, by John Noble Stearns and four others, petitioners, authorizing an investigation into the affairs of the Department.

Upon service of the order, the widest facilities were afforded the applicants for inquiry, and information furnished them without reserve. Special counsel were retained on behalf of the Department, and recognized by the Corporation Counsel.

Upon the close of the presentation of the applicants' testimony, the Commissioners, conceiving any reply to be palpably unnecessary, requested that the proceedings be concluded at that point. An order to that effect was accordingly entered, reserving to the Commissioners the right to move hereafter for costs upon the applicants, and upon such motion to introduce such evidence as they might be advised.

In pursuance of the authority therefor, conferred by an act of the Legislature, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That under the provisions of section 1, chapter 282 of the Laws of 1884, the public park situated between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, and Fifth and Sixth avenues, shall hereafter be known and described as Bryant Park.

Maps showing the streets, avenues, roads, public squares and places, in that portion of the Twelfth Ward, north of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, in the Port Morris District and in the High Bridge District, have received the consideration of the Board, and the map or plan showing the Port Morris District has been filed according to law.

CENTRAL PARK.

The usual care for drives, bridle roads, walks, lawns, gutters, basins, etc., has been attended to, also the planting of flower beds in all the parks.

Several of the squares of Fourth Avenue Parks above Seventy-second street have been planted and seeded, and are being cared for. There are at present only two or three of these squares, opposite which there are no buildings, that have not been planted, but all are under cultivation from Sixty-seventh street to Ninety-sixth street.

All the work of the propagating houses and the nurseries has been done according to the requirements of the season.

The two fountains on the Mall not having a supply of water, have been filled, with mould and planted with tropical plants.

A study for an intended cottage in the Park has been prepared, and a site therefor designated west of Conservatory Lake, east of the walk running from the Trefoil Arch.

Various designs of iron railing, as well as dwarf wall and iron railing combined have been prepared for the Eighth avenue boundary of the Park, between Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first streets.

In May the work connected with the entrances at these streets was commenced ; the large amount of stone, rubbish, etc., and the easterly sidewalk and interior slopes of the Park was removed. Surveys and plans for the walls, bridle roads, shaping of the ground, etc., were prepared and adopted by the Board May 21, 1884, and the excavation for and the construction of the Park enclosing walls were commenced and are now in progress. The principal items of work done are :

100 cubic yards earth excavation for foundation of walls.

75 cubic yards masonry in foundation.

30 cubic yards masonry in Park enclosing walls.

500 cubic yards filling furnished.

In the latter part of April a small force was placed to drain the area between the Conservatory Lake and Fifth avenue. About 1,180 lineal feet of stone drains have been laid. The most of the stone for the drains, and all of the filling (some 11,400 cubic yards) were procured without cost to the Department, except the necessary shaping after delivery; and for the removal of the building stone from the area drained teams and trucks were also furnished without cost to the Department.

The works on Mount St. Vincent building are completed with the exception of outside steps on the east side, and carriage porch over main entrance, which is now being completed.

The contract for fitting up a police sub-station in the basement story of the building in accordance with plans approved and accepted as above stated, has proceeded almost to completion.

The plans for approaches, change of walk, wall, yard, location of sheds, etc., was prepared and adopted May 21, and the work has since been in progress, and is rapidly approaching completion.

Trees have been planted in the several city parks, as well as on Fifty-ninth street, from Fifth to Eighth avenue.

Broken stones have been hauled on the plaza at Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, and the circle at Eighth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, preparatory to being laid, and the work of laying and rolling will be commenced as soon as the street railroad company have completed the grading of their road.

Fresh gravel has been laid on the bridge-roads, and the old saturated gravel removed.

The lakes have been carefully attended to, the entrance of any filth, as well as the stagnation of the water having been guarded against, the borders being kept clean and in a healthy condition.

The rolling stock has been generally repaired; buildings, fences, etc., overhauled; a new octagon rustic seat has been put around a tree on the east green, opposite Seventieth street; a new rustic building put in the Ramble, with repairs to the "umbrella" and rustic fences. The Fifth and Sixth avenue and Fifty-ninth street summer-houses are being repaired by contract; the Bow bridge over the lake is being floored with entirely new flooring. The stables at One Hundred and Fifth street have been repaired, and a new stable with four stalls built for additional accommodation of Department horses working in the Third Division. Repairs have been made to the Zoological Department buildings, with new paddocks made west of buildings with oak posts and iron railings. The propagating-houses have been repaired with new boxes and frames for propagating purposes. Telephone boxes have been made for service, and signs for Central and City Parks for different purposes.

A new entrance has been made at Eighth avenue and Ninety-second street, with wooden steps and railing, and a walk opened to join the walk west of the Reservoir.

Stakes have been made for wire fences, and strips for laying tar walks on Mount Morris Park.

The screen and glass partition on the upper floor of the Arsenal building has been put up and completed, and work upon the new offices completed.

The walk around the Conservatory Lake has been laid with new planks on new bearers; the ladies' cottages, throughout, have had repairs and alterations made.

The boat landing at Bow Bridge and the bridge over the lake west of the Cave, have been put in good order.

A general attendance has been given also to other works of blacksmiths, masons and painters, together with the repair of a great number of park benches. The painters' work has consisted in painting rolling-stock, and the painting and varnishing of light wagons, together with the following: Painting of animal buildings, outset arch near Arsenal and Bank Rock bridge, the Pergola near Casino, graining and painting new offices on third floor of Arsenal building, also telephone office and boxes, painting and gilding pedestals for the Mall and priming brackets and posts for the same, painting of East River Park railing of platform fascias, frame-work of roof and ladies' cottage, the painting of posts and settees on Battery Park, and all benches repaired in Central and City Parks. Painting iron urinals on Battery and City Hall Parks, and lettering 451 signs. The benches painted numbered 478, with 800 slats for settees, and setting 120 squares of glass in windows, painting and lacquering all the tools in the tool-room. The force of blacksmiths and mechanical engineers has been employed principally in repairing tools for the whole force of mechanics of the Department, repairing rolling-stock, including water-barrels, trucks, carts, mowing-machines, lawn-mowers, etc., repairing light wagons and doing all the horseshoeing for 54 horses, attending to Third Avenue and Central Bridges with all repairs to the same, repairing water-gate at Fifty-ninth street lake, iron work for all signs, repairing stonecutters' tools, attending, repairing and keeping in order engine and apparatus for tar walks, machinery of workshops, gas tank for Third Avenue Bridge, boring wheels for Central Bridge, iron work for propagating houses, repairs of railing of Fourth Avenue Parks and urinals of City Parks, repairs to fountain on Madison Square and all settees on Central and City Parks, repairing buffalo cage and cages of animal buildings, also smith-work of stables and all other necessary smith or mechanical work for the Department.

The mason work has consisted in building and repairing basins of walks, drives and transverse roads, the relaying of bridge road and walk gutters, the taking down and rebuilding of the upper part of wall under the platform at Eighty-fourth street and East River Park, the resetting of curbing around walks and roads, the relaying of gutters of bridges and painting stonework, the draining of bridge over Transverse road No. 3 on East Drive to keep the arch from deteriorating, the repairing of drains, repairing and joint painting propagating houses, repairing of steps and walks in gardens leading to Mount St. Vincent, the building of drains for new stable at One Hundred and Fifth street and Fifth avenue, the concreting of the large fountain between the Terrace and the Lake, and painting and relaying of the coping of the same, together with the general repairs of the stonework of the Department.

The plumbing work consisted in the general repair of the plumbing of the different cottages, urinals, hydrants and drains, the repairs of fountains, and attending to all gas-fitting, valleys and leaders of buildings.

RIVERSIDE DRIVE AND PARK.

The Drive and Park have been kept in a proper state of maintenance, flowers and shrubs have been planted on the latter. The work upon the improvement of the Park was not resumed until about the 15th of April, on account of the hindrances imposed by the state of the weather; a small force has been employed in completing the walks, shaping, etc., between Seventy-second and Seventy-ninth streets, and also in receiving materials from Seventy-ninth to Eighty-fourth street.

The work done is—

13,500 cubic yards of filling from sources exterior to the Park.

2,100 square feet of walk finished.

3½ acres of ground shaped and finished.

On the northerly side of Ninety-sixth street, about 3,800 cubic yards of filling has been received from sources exterior to the Park, and without cost except the necessary men in charge of the dump.

Between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-eighth Streets.

The work done is—

6,000 cubic yards earth excavation.

1,300 cubic yards mould rehandled.

1,750 square yards of rubble stone.

Foundation for drive laid.

280 lineal feet of drain pipe laid.

1 acre of ground surfaced and finished.

A small force of carpenters and painters has been employed in completing the veranda of the old Clairmont Mansion; the various works on this building are nearly completed.

Riverdale Avenue, at One Hundred and Fifteenth street.

The repairs of the wall which were suspended on account of the weather in December last, were resumed in April, and have been completed.

The work done is—

50 cubic yards of wall.

72 lineal feet parapet wall built.

84 lineal feet coping set.

48 lineal feet 18-inch culvert laid.

The force employed on April 1, 1884, on all the work of construction was 36 men and teams. The number placed upon the roll by appointment was 151 men and teams, and the number who have been suspended and left the work is 22 men and teams.

The following table shows the average force per day:

The building of the fountain basin in the westerly park on Stuyvesant Square, reducing the size of the old basin from 80 feet diameter to 29 feet diameter in order to increase the area of the surrounding walk was commenced in May. The work is being done by contract, and is still in progress.

The work done is—

80 cubic yards of earth excavation.

64 " rubble masonry.

34 " concrete masonry.

The condition of Tompkins Square has been improved. Several plots to which the street sweepings were hauled have all been cultivated and grass seed sown thereon, and the whole square is under proper treatment. The contractor is now engaged in putting up water-closets, partitions, etc., for the use of the public, in the basement story of the cottage in the square.

The work of constructing bays and entrances upon the drive at Morningside Park has progressed rapidly. The contractor has finished the stone work for the same at One Hundred and Twelfth, One Hundred and Thirteenth, One Hundred and Fifteenth, One Hundred and Sixteenth and One Hundred and Seventeenth streets, and for part of the entrances at One Hundred and Tenth, One Hundred and Eleventh and One Hundred and Eighteenth streets.

The tar walks on Mount Morris Park have continued to be laid, and the whole of the walks on that park are intended to be completed by the last week of July.

In the East River Park at Eighty-fourth street, the old platform has been straightened with new girders, new railing put around the piazza, and the roof put in good order. The extension to the house used as a ladies' cottage has been laid with new flooring, the walls repaired and painted, and the park, which is much frequented by visitors, kept in good condition.

The ironwork for the plate girder bridge over One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, in the southern approach to the Madison Avenue Bridge was completed previous to the commencement of the quarter, with the exception of a few angle iron braces, which have been ordered to be put on since. The amount of work executed upon this bridge during the quarter is as follows:

3,474 cubic yards filling.

1,300 " wall masonry.

205 " parapet and belting course.

44 " coping.

The Third Avenue Bridge and the Central Bridge over the Harlem river have had considerable carpenters' work on walks and drives.

TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

The work of surveying, laying out and monumenting has proceeded with the usual vigor. The greater part of the quarter has been more favorable than the preceding to the prosecution of the work, and increased results have been obtained.

The following maps have been adopted:

Map establishing lines and grades of Burnside avenue, from Sedgwick avenue to Webster avenue.

Map or plan of the High Bridge District.

Map or plan of the Port Morris District.

Plan and profiles of avenues and streets lying between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Division avenue, and between Trinity avenue and the Southern Boulevard.

The following maps have been filed:

Grade and monument map of Tremont avenue, from Aqueduct avenue to Boston road.

Grade and monument map showing streets and avenues bounded by Robbins avenue, Westchester avenue, Prospect avenue, and East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street.

Plan and profiles showing grades of East One Hundred and Seventy-third street, from East Vanderbilts avenue to Wicks street.

Map or plan of the north end of the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York.

Calculations necessary to determine the position of monuments, and the dimensions of blocks, have been completed during the past quarter for about 41,342 feet, equal to 7.78 miles, in the Hunt's Point District, and for about 5,808 feet, equal to 1.10 miles, in the Central District, covering a total area of 256.65 acres.

Coordinates for 101 monuments have been calculated and instructions for 69 monument points have been sent to the field parties.

Studies and calculations for establishing grades have been made for Burnside avenue, and the streets lying between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Division avenue, and between Trinity avenue and the Southern Boulevard.

Seventy-seven maps and plans relating to surveying, laying out and monumenting, have been prepared, aggregating about 285 square feet.

The field parties engaged in surveying, laying out and monumenting have measured a total of 37,600 feet.

The same parties set 201 monument points throughout the district; 64 monuments have been tested during the quarter, necessitating the measuring of 13,064 feet of traverse lines; 174 monument stones and 3 iron bolts have been set, and 8 monument stones reset.

These monuments define on the ground 8.92 miles of streets and avenues.

The following streets and avenues are wholly or partially monumented: In the Hunt's Point District—Hunt's Point road, Barrett's street, Grinnell place, Payne street, Porter street, Farragut street, Admiral street, Barlow street, Caswell street, Probie street, Kane street, Sacrahaug street; in the Central District—Sheridan avenue, Crestoven place, Highwood avenue, Sherman avenue, Elliott street, Bender street, Findlay avenue, Mott avenue, Overlook avenue, Cresline avenue, One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, Morris avenue, Fleetwood avenue, Webster avenue, Jerome avenue, Anthony avenue, Van Cortlandt avenue, Middlebrook Parkway, Ernestcliff place, Potter place and St. George's Crescent.

TAX MAPS.

Final calculations, examinations, searches and comparisons of surveys have been completed to end of quarter on 811 blocks. Of these 699 blocks had been completed prior to this quarter, leaving 112 blocks completed during this quarter, covering 876 separate parcels on properties. Searches of 851 conveyances have been made at the Register's Office at White Plains of properties situated in East Tremont, South Belmont, West Farms Village, Springhurst, the Crowther property, the Walker property and farm lands. The record books of current conveyances recorded in the Register's Office of New York County, have been kept up to date. Duplicate copies of 14 tax map pages, or 28 maps in all, have been completed during this quarter, and 20 additional pages and their copies lack only the fine lettering to complete them. In addition, 4 copies of property maps have been made at White Plains, making an aggregate of 32 separate maps covering about 87 square feet.
