

The Hons. Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; William H. Clark, Counsel to the Corporation, and Thomas F. Gilroy, Commissioner of Public Works, the officers designated by section 66 of the New York City Consolidation Act, met this day.

The minutes of the meeting s of May 25 and June 4 were read and approved.

The Supervisor of the City Record presented the following report:

OFFICE OF THE CITY RECORD, No. 2 CITY HALL,

NEW YORK, June 11, 1891. the Commissioner of Public V

GENTLEMEN—The Superior Court makes a requisition for the binding of its foreclosure, partition and divorce records. They will not, I am told, make more than twenty-five volumes, and to bind them will insure their preservation. It will be necessary to send a bookbinder to the Court to do the work, as the records cannot be taken away. There are also some records of the Court of Common Pleas to be bound. I suggest that you submit it to my discretion, either to give the work out by order or to purchase material and have the work done by one of the bookbinders now in the service of the City.

The County Clerk asks for 12 registers or indexes to proceedings in the Supreme Court. He says that the rules of practice direct him to keep such records, which, it seems, were not fully kept by any of his predecessors.

The other requisitions are of a minor character. I recommend that all of them be allowed.
