

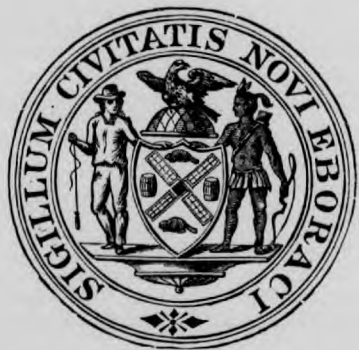

LAWS OF NEW YORK—BY AUTHORITY.

(Every law, unless a different time shall be prescribed therein, shall commence and take effect throughout the State on and not before the twentieth day after the day of its final passage, as certified by the Secretary of State. Section 12, title 4, chapter 7, part I., Revised Statutes.)

CHAPTER 490.

AN ACT to amend chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the city of New York," with reference to the appointment of inspectors of election and their duties.

Passed June 1, 1887; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:
Section 1. Section 1850 of chapter 410 of the laws of 1882, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the city of New York," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1850. All inspectors of election and poll-clerks in the city and county of New York shall

hereafter be selected and appointed by the board of police, who shall also have power to make all necessary removals and transfers, and fill all vacancies which may, from any cause, . . . It shall be the duty of the said board of police annually, in the months of August and September in each succeeding year, for each election district in said city and county to select to serve as inspectors of election four persons, two of whom, on state issues, shall be of different political faith and opinion from their associates, and those appointed to represent the party in political minority on state issues, in the said city and county, to be named solely by such commissioner or such of the commissioners of police in said board as are the representatives of such political minority. And if, at the next preceding municipal election, any political party or organization shall have cast for its candidate for any office as many as 50,000 votes or upwards, and the said board of police shall determine that said political party or organization is not entitled to the appointment of at least one of such inspectors in each election district to represent it, then it shall be the duty of said board of police to appoint for each election district in said city and county one further and additional inspector of election of the political faith or opinion of said political party, and an enrolled member of the organization thereof; and the inspectors of election appointed to represent said political party or organization shall be appointed solely by such commissioner or such commissioners of police in said board as the chairman and secretary of the organization of said political party in said city shall designate. All persons so appointed shall be citizens of the United States and of the state of New York, of good character, and able to read and write and speak the English understandingly, qualified voters in said city and county, and not candidates for any office to be voted for by the electors of the district for which they shall be selected. But no person shall be required to be a resident or voter in the election district for which he shall be appointed an inspector. The persons so selected shall be notified, examined as to their qualifications, and, if approved, shall each take and subscribe before the chief of the bureau of elections, or the chief clerk thereof, within 20 days from the date of the notice of appointment, the following oath of office:

"I, . . ., residing at number . . . in the city of New York, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support the Constitution of the United States and of the state of New York; and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of the office of inspector of elections for the election district of the . . . assembly district of the city of New York, according to the best of my ability; and that I am a citizen of the United States and of the state of New York, a qualified voter in the city and county of New York, and not a candidate for any office to be voted for by the electors of the district, for which I am appointed an inspector."

Whoever shall be nominated, approved and sworn into office as an inspector of election shall receive a certificate of appointment from the board of police, said certificate to be in such form as shall be prescribed by the said board, and to specify the assembly and election districts in and for which the person to whom the same is issued is appointed to serve, and the date of expiration of his term of office. The inspectors of election, appointed under the provisions of this chapter, shall hold office for one year, unless sooner removed for want of the requisite qualifications, or for cause, in either of which cases removal, unless made while the inspector is actually on duty on a day of registration, revision of registration or election, and for improper conduct as an election officer, shall only be made after notice in writing to the officer sought to be removed, which notice shall set forth clearly and distinctly the reasons for his removal. Provided, that any inspector of election who shall at any time be appointed to fill a vacancy, which fact shall be stated in his certificate of appointment, shall hold office only during the unexpired term of his predecessor; and that no inspector of election or poll clerk shall be transferred from one election district to another after he has entered upon the performance of his duties.

§ 2. Section 1861 of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1861. The inspectors of election in each election shall, on each day of any general registration, before adjourning, enter in each of two books prepared for that purpose, one of which shall be known as a public copy of the registers, and the other of which shall be known as the election bureau copy of the registers, all such names and residences, and all such data, information and statements as during the day have been entered by the inspectors of election in the registers provided in this chapter. And the whole of said books, including those kept one by each of the said inspectors, and the two copies above named, shall, on each of such days, after the completion of such copies of the registers, be carefully compared throughout, so that each of the registers and copies thereof shall, in every respect, agree with each other and contain the name and residence of each person who shall have applied for registration, and the facts respecting him, as the same shall have been stated by him and entered in the registers, as provided in this chapter. The said inspectors shall, on the last day of any general registration, certify each of said copies in the manner as if it were an original, and within forty-eight hours after their adjournment on said last day of any such general registration shall file the election bureau copy of the registers with the chief of the bureau of elections at his office, where the same shall be carefully preserved. And the said inspectors shall, on the last day of any revision before adjourning, make a copy of the registers as they shall be made up for the election next ensuing, which copy shall be marked and known as a public copy, and shall be certified as a copy of the original registers as then existing for the election next ensuing; and they shall also make, fill and certify, in blanks to be prepared and furnished for that purpose, the name and all such other particulars as shall be entered against or opposite to the name of any person, having been once entered upon their registers, shall have been, on the days of any such revision of registration, for any reason stricken therefrom, as provided in this chapter, together with the name and all such other particulars as shall be entered against or opposite to the name of any person who shall, on any such day of revision, have been added by them to the said registers; and said blanks so filled up and certified shall, within forty-eight hours after the close of any revision of registration, be left by one of said inspectors at the bureau of elections; and it shall be the duty of the chief of the bureau of elections to immediately enter, cause to be entered, in the election bureau copy of the registers of each election district, on file in his office, all the proper and necessary entries requisite to make such copy conform to said registers, and be always a copy thereof.

§ 3. Section 1891 of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 1891. The board shall then proceed to canvass and estimate the votes in the following manner: The said inspectors shall open the ballots and place those which contain the same names together, so that the several kinds shall be in separate piles or on separate files. One of the said inspectors shall then take the kind of ballot which appears to be the greatest in number and count them by tens, carefully examining each name on each of said ballots. Such inspector shall then pass the ten ballots to the inspector sitting next to him, who shall count them in the same manner, and he shall then pass them to the third inspector, who shall also count them in the same manner. The third inspector shall then call the names of the persons named in the ballots, and the offices for which they are designated, and the poll clerks shall tally the votes for each of such persons. The remaining inspectors shall watch the proceedings of the other inspectors and the poll clerks, and at their option may perform the same duties in respect to the canvass as are prescribed for the third inspector, or, in case of the absence of the poll clerk, may perform his duties. When the counting of each kind of ballots shall be completed, the poll clerks shall compare their tallies together and ascertain the total number of ballots of that kind so canvassed, and when they agree upon the number, one of them shall announce it in a loud voice to the inspectors. The kind of ballots which appear to be next greatest in number, and afterwards each of the other kinds of ballots in succession shall then be canvassed in the same manner. The ballots containing names partly from one kind of ballots and partly from another, being those usually called split tickets, and those from which the name of a person proper to be voted for on such ballots has been omitted or erased, usually called scratched tickets, shall then be canvassed separately by one of the inspectors sitting between two of the other inspectors, which inspector shall call each name to the poll-clerk, and the office for which it is designated, the other inspectors looking at the ballot at the same time, and the poll-clerk making note of the same. When all the ballots found in the box have been canvassed in this manner, the poll-clerk shall compare their tallies together and ascertain the total number of votes received by each candidate; and when they agree upon the number, one of them shall announce, in a loud voice, to the inspectors the number of votes received by each candidate on each of the kinds of ballots containing his name, the number received by him on the split and scratched tickets, and the total number of votes received by him. If, after the ballots in any box have been opened or canvassed, the whole number of them shall be found to exceed the whole number of votes required by the corresponding columns of the poll-lists, the said inspectors shall return all the ballots into the box, and shall thoroughly mingle the same, and one of the inspectors to be designated by the Board, shall, without seeing the same, and with his back to the box, publicly draw out of such box so many of such ballots as shall be equal to the excess, which shall be forthwith destroyed; but if the ballots have been canvassed, the votes for the persons named therein shall first be deducted from the votes entered for such person on the tallies.

§ 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

The Chief Inspector of the Summer Corps to report daily to the Chief of the Fourth Division all cases of contagious diseases forwarded to him by the Summer Corps; also to forward to the Sanitary Superintendent all reports of unsanitary condition of premises for inspection by the First or Third Division.

3d. The Chief of the Fourth Division to cause immediate examination of all cases of contagious diseases reported to him by the Chief of the Summer Corps, to verify the diagnosis, and to determine the question of isolation or removal to hospital. Immediately after this question is determined, he shall report the result of each case to the Chief Inspector of the Summer Corps, for his further care or not, as the case may be. All measures for disinfection and supply of disinfectants for the use of patients isolated, to be promptly supplied by the Chief Inspector of the Fourth Division, and removal to hospital to be promptly done upon the decision of the Chief of the Fourth Division.

4th. The Chief of the Fifth Division to receive and care for all cases of contagious diseases removed from their domiciles to hospital.

Resolved, That the Board of Health request of the public dispensaries their co-operation in the medical attendance of the sick poor of the city in the furnishing of medicines to those too poor to buy the same, upon the prescription of and signed by the Sanitary Inspectors of the Summer Corps in their respective localities.

 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 6 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 52 permits.
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 407 visits were made, and 207 disinfections and 55 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 6.
 The number of vaccinations performed was 67, of which 20 were primary and 47 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned, 24,265 pounds of meat and 10,700 pounds of fish, 10 boxes of oranges, 56 crates of tomatoes, 19 egg plants, 19 bunches of bananas, 1,875 watermelons, 9,150 pineapples.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 66, the number of analyses of same made, was 9, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 85, and the number of arrests made was 4.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
