Resolved, That a copy of the report of Assistant Sanitary Inspector Comfort upon the condition of public drain known as Melrose sewer, at north side of One Hundred and Sixty-first street, fourth house east of Courtland avenue, be forwarded to the Department of Public Parks for the necessary action.

Whereas, This Board is frequently unable to secure a proper sanitary condition of premises which are in possession of a receiver; and therefore

Resolved, That the Attorney be and is hereby directed, when any receiver refuses or neglects to comply with the rules and regulations of this Board, and with the Sanitary Code, to apply to the proper Court for an order upon such receiver to abate any nuisance upon premises in his charge.

Resolved, That the following be and is hereby adopted as an additional ordinance, viz.:
From and after the 15th day of August, 1878, the business of manufacturing soap shall not be conducted in the city of New York without a written permit from the Health Department. Laid on the table.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to invite the prominent soap manufacturers of the city to be present at the next meeting, to be held August 13, at 1 o'clock P. M., and show cause why the above ordinance should not be adopted.

Reports from Sanitary Committee.

Second—On complaint against Marshall & Co., meat packers, Nos. 10, 12 and 14 Second avenue.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 3, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,707, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 691 tenement houses, 171 private dwellings, 63 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 54 stables, 16 slaughter-houses, 1 garbage dump, 3 manure dumps, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 4 public sewers, 1 lime kiln, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 23 sunken and vacant lots, 71 yards, courts, and areas, 66 cellars and basements, 95 waste pipes and drains, 238 privies and water closets, 52 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 3 cesspools, 4 dangerous chimneys, 31 other nuisances, together with 71 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 832.

During the past week 222 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 73 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

127 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 26 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 24 houses, 24 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,204 privies and water closets, 257 yards, courts, and areas, 353 cellars and basements, 280 garbage boxes, and 110 3/4 miles of street gutters.

586 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending August 3; this is a decrease of 146 compared with the mortality of the preceding week and 64 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of last year. The actual mortality for the week ending July 27 was 669, which is 163.4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 32.08 per 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,084,381.

The decrease in the mortality for the past week included 104 in tenement-houses, and 132 children under five years of age, of whom 101 were from diarrhoeal diseases. The following is a comparison of the deaths for the two weeks:

The deaths from phthisis pulmonalis (103), however, increased 20, and was the highest weekly number of deaths from this disease since March 23; the deaths in institutions were also higher than any week since the latter date. The deaths of children under five numbered 314, of whom 192 were in tenement-houses, showing that 61.1 per cent. of all the deaths for the week were in this class of dwellings. The nativity of the parents of the children under 5 years of age who died during the week is as follows:

An increase of deaths took place in the First of 1; Third, 1; Fourth, 4; Fifth, 2; Sixth, 3; Tenth, 1; Thirteenth, 4; and Twenty-third, 2.

The total number of deaths reported during the month of July was 3,094; still-births, 206; births, 2,332; and marriages, 555; showing a decrease of deaths of 186; of still-births, 8; and an increase of 159 births and 45 marriages compared with the number reported during the corresponding month of 1877.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 110 were in institutions, 327 in tenement-houses, 140 in houses containing 3 families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 144 on the first, 153 on the second, 103 on the third, 54 on the fourth, 10 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. All the deaths reported for the week were residents of New York City. 52 were stated to be single, 122 married, 60 widowed, and the condition of 352 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 577 deaths and still-births, or 92.47 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 8; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 219; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 93; Greenwood (undenominational), 40; Lutheran (undenominational), 109; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 39; Woodlawn (undenominational), 13; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 6; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 9; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 3, was 73.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.803, the mean humidity was 78, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 768, and the amount of rain-fall was 4.01 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the N. Y. Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia, was 25.91, Brooklyn 34.01, St. Louis 16.43, Chicago 25.53, Baltimore 22.12, Boston 25.70, Cincinnati 21.22, New Orleans 38.62, Richmond 25.01, Charleston 31.86, Dayton 12.64, Erie 13.23, Lowell 35.42, Worcester 20.06, Cambridge 29.64, Fall River 24.93, Lawrence 46.34, Lynn 15.80, Springfield 18.21—monthly reports—Lynchburg 28.24, Chattanooga 28, Minneapolis 8.70, Plattsburgh, N. During the week ending August 3, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 586 burial permits for city deaths, 43 for bodies in transitu, and 38 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 586 deaths, 112 marriages, 520 births, 38 still-births, 43 applications for transit permits, and 49 returns from coroners. There were 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage, and 17 of death were issued from this Bureau.

Report of Assistant Sanitary Superintendent on Visiting Corps.

SANITARY BUREAU, August 6, 1878.

To DR. W. DE F. DAY, Sanitary Superintendent:

SIR—I have to report that during the past week the physicians composing the Special Visiting Corps, have visited 4,688 tenement-houses, including 29,676 families, have prescribed for 830 sick children, and distributed 796 tickets for excursions on the Floating Hospital of St. John's Guild. One highly gratifying feature of this work is the fact that many cases of sickness found in their incipency meet with prompt attention followed by speedy recovery, many serious and dangerous symptoms being prevented by this early treatment.

A good deal of importance is attached to the Floating Hospital excursions, as contributing much towards relieving and preventing infant suffering; and could they take place daily instead of semi-weekly, I have no doubt the beneficial results would be proportionally increased.

SIR.—There were 586 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 3, 1878, which is a decrease of 146, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 64 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending July 27, 1878, was 669, which is 163.4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 32.08 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,084,381.
