The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

REPORTS.

The Committee on Streets, to whom was referred the annexed ordinance in relation to scalpers and coal freights, in the City of New York, respectfully

REPORT:

That, from an investigation, your Committee are fully convinced that it will be to the interest both of the dealer and consumer of coal, that the ordinance so referred, should be adopted. At present, it is in the power of "coal scalpers" to retard or advance the supply of coal, to be delivered to dealers in this city, and in consequence to increase or diminish the cost of coal to consumers; and as this power is frequently secured by false representations, made by persons who are totally irresponsible, and not one of whom resides in this city or State, the ordinance herewith accompanying is intended to remedy these evils and irregularities.

Your Committee therefore respectfully recommend for your adoption the said ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to scalpers in coal freight in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. The Mayor shall license and appoint as many and such persons as he may think expedient, to be scalpers of coal freight in the City of New York, and may issue, suspend or revoke any or all of such licenses at his pleasure, but such licenses shall be issued only to citizens of the United States, and residents of the State of New York.

Sec. 2. Every person receiving a license to be a scaler in coal freight shall pay to the Mayor, for the use of the city, and to be applied to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, the sum of five hundred dollars, and shall also file a bond, with two or more good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Mayor, in the sum of five thousand dollars, conditioned for a faithful compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. Every licensed scaler in coal freight shall wear, when exercising his calling, in a conspicuous place about his person, so as to be easily seen, a plate or badge, of a size and style to be designated by the Mayor, on which shall appear his name and the words "Scaler in Coal Freight," and the number of his license.

Sec. 4. All licenses to scalpers in coal freight granted as aforesaid, shall run one year from the date thereof, and may be renewed by the Mayor at any time within the said year, for a succeeding year.

Sec. 5. Every such licensed scaler in coal freight who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall, in addition to a forfeiture of the bond mentioned in section 2 of this ordinance, thereby incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, to be recovered by the Corporation Attorney, as in the case of other penalties.

Sec. 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Law Department, to whom was referred the accompanying message from his Honor the Mayor, transmitting a communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, dated February 2, 1889, with the draft of an ordinance to facilitate the collection of fees established by law for the Inspection of Weights and Measures, respectfully

REPORT:

That additional legislation appears to be necessary to enable the City to collect payment of fees imposed for the inspection of weights and measures. In numerous instances these fees amount to only a few cents; seldom in excess of five dollars, and when the dealer refuses to pay the inspector, as is frequently the case, the City loses the sum, as it would cost more in such cases to collect the fees than the amount of the bills. The City Treasury, in this way, loses, in the aggregate, quite a respectable sum of money annually. To obviate this evil, and to insure prompt payment of these items of City revenue, the counsel suggested that a penalty be imposed for refusal to pay, which, with the amount of fees due, would be sufficient to cover the expenses of enforcing their payment, and for that purpose has prepared an ordinance which is herewith respectfully submitted for your adoption:

AN ORDINANCE to amend section three hundred and ninety-four, article forty of chapter eight of the Revised Ordinances, approved the 31st of December, 1880.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

That section three hundred and ninety-four, article forty of chapter eight of the Revised Ordinances be amended so that the same shall read as follows:

"Section 394. No person shall refuse to exhibit any weights or measures, scale-beams, patent

balance steelyards or other instruments to either of said inspectors for the purpose of being so inspected and examined, or to pay the fees established by law for such inspection and examination, under the penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense."

Alderman Carlin moved that the above vote be reconsidered.

The Committee on Law Department, to whom was referred the annexed messages from his Honor the Mayor transmitting a letter from the President of the Musical Mutual Protective Association, requesting that action be taken by the Common Council to regulate the playing of musical instruments in the public streets, respectfully

REPORT:

That it is clear action should be taken at once to prevent a continuance of the annoyance to which all classes of our citizens are subjected during all hours of the day and night from strolling bands of itinerant musicians that infest our streets and highways, whose importunities and solicitations for money from passers-by, and even by the invasion of the residences of our citizens, particularly in the suburbs of the city, has become an intolerable evil, which, combined with the abominable discords and hideous noises they produce from their instruments, has almost become unbearable.

The abatement of the nuisance is asked for by the Musical Mutual Protective Association, by the Balfie Musical Club, and District Assembly No. 49, Knights of Labor, has addressed a communication to this Board, on behalf of organized labor in this municipality, earnestly urging the adoption of an ordinance to prohibit those bands of so-called musicians from performing in the streets of this metropolis. It is claimed, and with justice, that by reason of the character of the instruments used by these "musicians" and the qualifications of the performers, they are injurious to the musical profession, as well as an annoyance to the public.

Numerous letters and petitions have been received by his Honor the Mayor, favoring the views of the Musical Associations to abate the practice and indorsing the application of District Assembly No. 49, Knights of Labor; the latter of itself should be sufficient to warrant your honorable Body in adopting an ordinance as requested by that influential organization.

Three different ordinances for the purpose have been referred to your Committee—one offered by Alderman Oakley, one by Alderman Rapp, and one received from his Honor the Mayor, accompanied by a communication dated July 23, 1889, and on the 8th inst., a second message was received from his Honor the Mayor, calling attention to the subject, and requesting that action be taken by your honorable Body at an early day.

In recommending the adoption of the following ordinance, your Committee have been careful that its provisions shall not apply to, or affect, any band of music or organized musical society engaged in any military or civic parade, or in serenading, who shall comply with the laws of the State relating to parades in the City of New York or to any musical performance conducted under a license from the proper municipal authority. The ordinance is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 245, article XXIV, of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 31, 1880.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That chapter 8, article XXIV., section 245, of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 31, 1880, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 245. No person shall beat any drum or instrument for the purpose of attracting the attention of passengers, in any street in the City of New York, to any show of beasts or birds, or other things in said city, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offense; nor shall any person use or perform with, or hire, procure or abet any other person to use or perform with any hand-organ or other musical or other instrument, in any of the streets or public places in the City of New York, under a penalty of ten dollars for each offense. The provisions of this section shall apply only to itinerant musicians and side shows, and shall not be construed so as to affect any band of music or organized musical society engaged in any military or civic parade, or in serenading, who shall comply with the laws of the State relating to parades in the City of New York, or to any musical performance conducted under a license from the proper municipal authority.

Sec. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Alderman Oakley moved to recommit to the Committee on Law Department, with instructions to report favorably, the ordinance introduced by him.

But he subsequently withdrew the motion.

And moved that the ordinance introduced by him and referred to the Committee on Law Department, be substituted for the one reported by the Committee.

Which is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend section 55 of chapter XLV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled 'of nuisances and noxious things and practices,' passed July 27, 1877, and the re-resolution amendatory thereof, passed September 17, 1877, and the ordinance amendatory thereof, adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879, and approved by the Mayor, June 9, 1879.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 55 of chapter 17 of the Ordinances of 1866, as amended by the ordinance of July 27, 1877, the resolution of September 17, 1877, and the ordinance of June 3, 1879, is hereby further amended and shall read as follows:

§ 55. No person shall beat any drum or other instrument, or blow any horn or other instrument, or ring any bell or bells or other like instruments for the purpose of attracting the attention of passengers in any street, avenue or public place in the City of New York, to any show of birds or beasts or other things in said city, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offense; nor shall any person use or perform with any hand-organ or other instrument for pay or in expectation of payment in any of the streets, avenues or public places in the City of New York, before nine o'clock A. M. or after nine o'clock P. M. of each day, nor within a distance of five hundred feet of any school-house or house of public worship, during school hours, or hours of public worship, nor within a like distance of any dwelling-house or other premises when requested or directed by any householder not to do so, under penalty of ten dollars for each offense; nor shall any person or persons be permitted to perform on any musical instrument or instruments in any street, avenue or public place in the City of New York in contravention of the laws or ordinances of the United States, the State of New York or the City of New York, enacted or to be enacted against the importation and employment of so-called contract or pauper labor or against men-

dicancy under the garb of labor, and that with a view of a proper enforcement of such laws or ordinances, all persons shall hereafter be restrained from performing on musical instruments in the manner and places as above stated, without having first been duly examined and properly licensed at the office of the Mayor of the City of New York, as persons not falling under any of the prohibitory clauses of the laws above referred to. The provisions of this section shall apply only to itinerant musicians and side-shows, and shall not be construed so as to affect any band of music or organized local or visiting musical society engaged in any military or civic parade, or in serenading, that shall comply with the laws of this State relating to parades in the City of New York."

Sec. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances or resolutions inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative, on a division called by Alderman Oakley, as follows:

Affirmative—Aldermen Carlin, Cowie, Goetz, Oakley, Rapp, and Tait—6.

Negative—The President, Vice-President Fitzsimons, Aldermen K. J. Barry, Dowd, Gregory, Hammond, Lynch, Morris, Noonan, Kinckhoff, Storm, and Walker—11.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Vice-President Fitzsimons—
AN ORDINANCE to regulate the sale of vegetables and fruits within the corporate limits of the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty do ordain as follows:

Section 1. No person shall sell, offer or expose for sale any vegetables or fruits in barrels, baskets, boxes, crates or trays within the corporate limits of the City of New York, except the weight of the contents of such barrel, basket, box, crate or bag shall be as follows:

Sec. 2. Every barrel of spinach shall contain not less than forty pounds; every barrel of sprouts shall contain not less than fifty pounds; every bushel of potatoes shall contain sixty pounds; every bushel of turnips, carrot, parsnips or beets shall contain fifty pounds; every bushel of sweet potatoes or onions shall contain fifty-five pounds; every bushel of tomatoes shall contain sixty pounds; every bag of string or wax beans shall contain not less than forty pounds; every bag of cranberry or lima beans, or green peas shall contain not less than fifty pounds; every barrel of apples and pears shall contain not less than one hundred and thirty-five pounds, and every basket of peaches not less than twenty-five pounds.

Sec. 3. And that every barrel, bag, box, basket and crate of vegetables and fruit offered or exposed for sale, or sold within the corporate limits of the City of New York, not otherwise provided for in the previous section, shall be labeled, stamped or marked outside thereof in plain letters and numerals of at least one inch in size, with the actual and correct measurement or weight of the contents thereof.

Sec. 4. No person shall offer for sale any vegetables or fruits, except fruits and vegetables which are bought by count, in any store or business place in the City of New York or within the corporate limits thereof, except by weight, or if sold in baskets, bags, boxes, crates or barrels the actual weight, measurement or contents thereof to be marked on each basket, bag, box, crate or barrel in letters or numerals of at least one inch in size.

Sec. 5. No person shall sell, offer or expose for sale within the corporate limits of the City of New York any vegetables or fruits in any other way than provided for in the previous sections, except such vegetables and fruits as are now by custom sold by count and not by weight or measure.

Sec. 6. Any one violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall forfeit and pay a fine of ten dollars for each and every such offense.

Sec. 7. The Clerk of the Public Market of the City of New York is hereby directed to post in conspicuous places in the markets of this city copies of this ordinance.

Sec. 8. This ordinance to take effect on

Resolved, That the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company be and is hereby authorized and permitted to reconstruct the bridges over One Hundred and Twelfth and One Hundred and Thirteenth streets and Fourth avenue, and for that purpose, and in order to increase the height of said bridges from the street level, the said company is hereby authorized and permitted to put iron columns on the line of the curb on each side of both streets, as shown on the accompanying diagram; the work on the surface of the said streets, and the erection of the columns to be under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works.

By Alderman Dwyer—

Whereas, It has been made apparent to all, by the appalling loss of life in this city, caused by contact with the electric conductors of the various electrical lighting companies, that heroic measures are necessary to be adopted by the local authorities of this city, in order to prevent the recurrence of any more of the so called accidents which have resulted in the death of several of our citizens; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Common Council has viewed, with much satisfaction, the efforts made by the Hon. Hugh J. Grant, Mayor, to compel a removal of such conductors from the streets of this city, above ground, and hereby pledge him the support and aid of this Common Council in every measure he may devise looking to the desirable end of compelling the several electric-light companies to lay their conductors underground even to the extent of preventing the use of electric lights in this city, until such time as the said conductors are placed beneath the surface of the streets.

Resolved, That the Clerk transmit a copy of this preamble and resolution to his Honor the Mayor.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Oakley—

Whereas, The recent deaths by electric shock of linemen in the city show that some action should be taken to protect the lives of men employed by the various electric companies of this city and of citizens in general; and

Whereas, Many eminent electrical experts have declared that the only remedy for this state of affairs is police or other municipal regulation of the tension of currents on the electric-light wires; be it

Resolved, That the President of this Board be requested to appoint a Special Committee of the Board, at once, to investigate and report on the best method of police or other municipal regulation of currents on electric-light wires with the view to the passage of an ordinance; such Committee to have power to summon persons and papers and to employ experts to aid them in their investigations, and with instructions to such Committee to report at the earliest practical moment.

Which was laid over.

By Alderman Dwyer—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Sweetser, Pembroke & Co. to construct a bridge over Cortlandt alley, to connect premises No. 378 Broadway and premises No. 77 White street, in this city, as shown on the annexed diagram; the adjoining householders consenting thereto, as appears by the consents hereto annexed, and the applicants for such permission agreeing to hold the City of New York harmless from any accident or injury to person or property which may be caused by the construction of said bridge, or by maintaining or operating it, as appears by the proposed bond, also annexed, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

(G. O. 696.)

By Alderman Carlin—

Resolved, That the road or public drive from its southerly intersection with One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street to its intersection with Kingsbridge road and Dyckman street, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

By the same—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles Faas to place and keep an ornamental lamp-post and lamp on the sidewalk, near the curb-line in front of his premises No. 226 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, provided the lamp be lighted every night and for the full time that the public lamps maintained by the city are kept lighted, the work to be done and gas supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That a lamp-post be erected and a boulevard lamp be placed thereon and lighted in front of the entrance to the Riverside Baptist Church, on the south side of Ninety-second street, about thirty-two feet east of Tenth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

(G. O. 698.)

By the same—

Resolved, That the roadway of Hamilton place, from the easterly side of the Boulevard to the westerly side of Tenth avenue, be paved with Macadam pavement with Telford foundation, except that the gutters be paved a space four feet wide with granite-block pavement and that the space included between the lines of the gutters nearest the centre of the roadway and the crosswalks at the intersecting streets be also paved with granite-block pavement, and that crosswalks of bridge-stone of North river blue stone, be laid on the north and south sides thereof at the intersecting streets, and at the terminating avenues, where not already laid under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the officers of the church, corner of Stanton and Pitt streets, to place a transparency on the public lamp, southeast corner of Grand and Pitt streets, for advertising the church fair, the work to be done at own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue until December 1, 1889.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Bernard Dyckman to place and keep a stand at No. 174 West street, within the stoop line, to be seven feet high six feet long and four feet wide, for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, etc., the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

any complication or difficulty in levying and collecting assessments for such works, the ordinances of your Board for each work or improvement should provide that the ordinance is applicable only to such portions of the street therein named as are within the limits of grants of land under water.

This general description and limitation as to the work to be done and assessments to be levied are necessary for the reason that in many, or in most, cases the boundaries of grants of land under water do not coincide with the boundaries of streets by street blocks, and, at the time of the introduction and consideration in your Board of an ordinance for such work, the necessary information, giving the exact boundaries of the grants, may not be at hand or available.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Broadway, Rector street, and Greenwich street.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Liberty street, Maiden lane, East river, Old Slip, Hanover square, William street, Beaver street, and Broadway, including Franklin Market.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Ferry street, Peck slip, East river, Maiden lane, and Gold street.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Spruce street, Gold street, Liberty street, Broadway, and Park row.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Dey street, Broadway, Liberty street, and Hudson or North river.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Barclay street, Broadway, Dey street, Greenwich street, Vesey street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Reade street, Broadway, Barclay street, and Hudson or North river.
