HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, February 12, 1892.

The Board met, pursuant to notice.

Present—Commissioners Charles G. Wilson, Joseph D. Bryant, M. D., the Health Officer of the Port, the President of the Board of Police.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That suitable measures be taken to prevent and avert the dangers of infection from the immigrants who have been exposed to, or who have been sick with typhus fever, from the steamship Massilia, and the sick persons who were in No. 5 Essex street, No. 85 Monroe street, No. 31 Monroe street, No. 46 Delancey street, No. 85 Norfolk street, No. 166 Division street, No. 42 East Twelfth street, No. 49 Pike street, No. 102 Orchard street, and No. 210 Madison street, and that public safety requires that no more immigrants be received in the houses above mentioned in this City.

Resolved, That the Chief Inspector of Contagious Diseases is hereby directed to forbid and prevent all unnecessary communication with the houses, No. 5 Essex street, No. 85 Monroe street, No. 31 Monroe street, No. 46 Delancey street, No. 85 Norfolk street, No. 166 Division street, No. 42 East Twelfth street, No. 49 Pike street, No. 102 Orchard street, and No. 210 Madison street, and the families infected by contagious disease who have been in the said houses, and further to adopt the necessary means to prevent all unnecessary communication between other parts of the City, the houses above mentioned, and houses in which typhus cases occur. To this end he is authorized and directed to use all the officers and means now under his direction, and such other means as shall be provided for this purpose, under the direction of the President and Chairman of the Sanitary Committee.

Resolved, That notice be sent to all hospitals, dispensaries and lodging-houses, requiring immediate reports of any cases of typhus fever or suspicious cases, and requesting that this Department be immediately telegraphed on the occurrence of any suspicious illness.

Resolved, That the Chief Inspector of Contagious Diseases obtain and report information of the name, residence, age and destination of all persons who have been brought in contact with the recent cases of typhus fever, in lodging-houses and tenement-houses in the City, and as far as possible keep such persons under constant observation.

Resolved, That the bunks and beds in lodging-houses which have been occupied by persons sick with typhus fever and removed, and the furnishings of the rooms, and all clothing from every immigrant from the ship Massilia, be disinfected or destroyed, and all the rooms used for such persons be cleared, fumigated twice and properly disinfected.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent request physicians in the City to immediately notify this Department of any suspicious disease in any person who landed from the Massilia, or who has in any way been in contact with any such passenger.

Resolved, That as far as possible the passengers from the Massilia be separated from the passengers of any other steamships, and that the Hebrew Charities Association, at No. 128 Second avenue, be notified of the measures for the protection of immigrants in their charge, which this Department has determined to be necessary.

Resolved, That the removal of the immigrants received in this City from the ship Massilia to the houses at No. 42 East Twelfth street, No. 109 Clinton place and No. 49 Pike street, be authorized. The Chief Inspector of Contagious Diseases is directed to keep these houses under observation, and take the necessary precautions therefor, and also to have the necessary inspections made among the other immigrants recently landed.

Resolved, That provision be made at once for thirty hospital tents and a temporary pavilion and furnishings therefor, and heating, and bedding, and help, for typhus cases, and such cases be removed as far as possible to such tents.

A report from the Health Officer of the Port in respect to the condition of passengers on S. S. Massilia, from Naples, January 7, was received and ordered on file.

The resignation of Assistant Resident Physician Word at Willard Parker Hospital was received, and on motion, accepted.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

A SEPARATE BID must be made for each of the sprinkling routes hereinafter described.

The bidder must state the amount which he proposes and agrees to pay for the license, over and above the amount which will be charged for the water consumed in sprinkling. The amount of each bid must be paid in advance at the time when the license is issued, and the charges for water, as established by the Commissioner of Public Works, must be paid monthly in advance.

The season for sprinkling the streets shall begin not earlier than March 25, 1892, and terminate not later than November 15, 1892, and the Commissioner of Public Works reserves the right to diminish the length of the season and to suspend sprinkling during the season whenever he deems it in the interest of the City so to do.

The Commissioner of Public Works also reserves the right to reject any or all of the bids or proposals.

In the sprinkling of the streets the following rules and regulations must be observed:

1st. The tin sprinkler attached to each cart shall conform in every respect to a pattern approved by the Department of Public Works, the holes to be in parallel rows, at least one-half inch apart, and of a size not to exceed No. 14 wire. The pattern can be seen at the office of the Water Register, No. 31 Chambers street, Room 2.

2d. THE NAME AND RESIDENCE OF EACH PERSON LICENSED TO SPRINKLE THE STREETS SHALL BE PAINTED ON BOTH SIDES OF THE CART IN BLACK LETTERS OF NOT LESS THAN TWO INCHES IN LENGTH ON A WHITE GROUND, and no advertisement will be allowed on the sprinklers, under penalty of revocation of license.

3d. Permits for sprinkling carts, IF DRIVEN BY BOYS, will be immediately revoked.

4th. No license will be granted to any person not a resident of the City and County of New York.

5th. Each sprinkling cart shall be provided with a sound and proper piece of hose to conduct the water from the fire-hydrant to the cart, and such hose shall always be kept in order and free from leaks.

6th. Each person obtaining a permit for sprinkling shall keep the hydrants allotted to his use closed, except when obtaining water for use, and shall be responsible for any damage that may result from the use or abuse of them while in their charge; provided such damage shall not have been occasioned by others than those in the employ of said persons.

7th. Any person who shall thus obtain a permit shall pay to the Department of Public Works such sum or price as may be fixed by the Department for the water used during the season for sprinkling; the payments to be made monthly in advance and within the first week of each month.

8th. Each person obtaining a permit will be required to sprinkle the streets with SUFFICIENT WATER

ONLY TO LAY THE DUST; DRENCHING THE STREETS WITH AN EXCESSIVE QUANTITY OF WATER WILL BE SUFFICIENT CAUSE TO REVOKE ANY PERMIT OR LICENSE.

9th. Every person who shall obtain a sprinkling permit will be required to confine himself strictly to his route; encroaching on other routes will not be permitted.

10th. No double-nozzle hydrants and no hydrant on any street paved with asphalt pavement shall be used.

11th. Any licensee violating any of the above rules and regulations will, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works, have his license revoked, and will forfeit all moneys paid by him on account of the same.

No bid will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Commissioner of Public Works, or money, to the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100), as security for compliance with the conditions of the license. Such check or money must not be included in the sealed envelope containing the bid, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box, and no bid can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thereupon be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
