In order that this work may be done, will your Honorable Board rescind its action of May 1, 1900, allowing \$26,500 for a staircase at the City Prison, which work has been set aside until resolution (as per inclosure) offered in the Municipal Assembly shall have been approved and passed and the amount therein specified granted by your Board.

Please make the appropriations read as follows:

SIR—Hon. Francis J. Lantry, Commissioner of Correction, by communication dated October 25, 1900, requests that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment rescind its action of May 1, 1900, making applicable \$26,500 for a staircase at City Prison, which work has been deferred until resolution offered in Municipal Assembly for \$350,000, for enlargement and alterations to the New City Prison (Tombs) shall have been approved and passed, and the amount herein specified granted by your Board.

The Commissioner in his communication states that he is desirous of erecting and completing a building to be known as the Administration Building, being part of the Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at meeting of February 1, 1900, approved the plans and specifications and made \$163,000 applicable for this work. Bids have been opened by the Commissioner as follows:

In order to do this work under chapter 626, Laws of 1896, as amended by chapter 642, Laws of 1897, the difference between the amount allowed, \$163,000, and say \$180,000 (estimated cost) must be taken from amounts made applicable for other improvements, and the Commissioner requests that they be made as follows:

In relation to the transfers requested, would submit the following statement as an explanation of the separate accounts:

1. From temporary quarters, City Prison, \$2,221.75 by the original apportionment of the \$1,300,000; \$113,000 was set aside for temporary quarters, City Prison. The contract liability is only \$10,778.25, leaving the above balance which can be made applicable to the rebuilding of the Administration Building, Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island.

2. From Buildings on Riker's Island, \$1,499.75. The original amount made applicable for this work was \$64,000. Contract liabilities, \$42,500.25, leaving a balance of \$21,499.75 on June 29, 1899; \$20,000 of this balance was transferred to the rebuilding of the Administration Building, and as the remaining \$1,499.75 is not needed at Riker's Island, I see no reason for not making it applicable to the Administration Building.

3. From City Prison (Tombs), \$20,000. The amount allowed for this work was \$973,000. The contract liabilities, architect's fees, etc., are about \$945,000, leaving a balance of \$28,000. The transferring of \$20,000 of this amount to Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island, will leave \$8,000, which is ample for any extra work there may be in connection with the present contracts, but not enough to erect the staircase. This new staircase is not absolutely necessary at the present time, inasmuch as the old staircase can be used in connection with the New City Prison.

Therefore, I see no reason why the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should not rescind its action of May 1, 1900, making \$26,500 applicable for a staircase at City Prison, and making the following applicable for the erection and completion of the Administration Building of the Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication bearing date 16th October, from your Honorable Board, transmitting a letter from Thomas J. Dunn, late Sheriff, requesting an appropriation for counsel fees, etc., incurred in defending actions against him as Sheriff, which communication was presented to you at a meeting of the Board October 16, and referred by you to me for an opinion.

The bill in question covers services rendered by Mr. Philip J. Britt from January 1, 1900, to June 30, 1900, as attorney for the late Sheriff, and is in the amount of \$3,175 counsel fees and 99.04 cents.

The claim is presented under chapter 669 of the Laws of 1899, and not under chapter 699 of the laws of that year, as stated in the claim.

The act in question is "An act to authorize the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York to audit and allow the present sheriff of the county of New York such legal expenses as he may be put to, not exceeding five thousand dollars per annum for three years at the expiration of his term of office."

Annexed to the claim of Mr. Dunn is a detailed statement of the services rendered to him by his attorney, already mentioned.

Upon an examination of this bill of items I find that most of the charges are on their face very reasonable.

In two cases, however, I think the amount claimed should be reduced.

In the case of Cassani against Dunn a charge of \$400 is made for what is practically a reargument in the Appellate Division and a motion to place the case on the calendar of the Trial Term.

For this case \$400 is charged, which is, on the face of the claim, excessive, and I think that \$250 would be ample for this case.

In the case of Levy against Dunn a charge of \$1,000 is made.

While the services rendered cover practically quite a period of time, the case has not been tried, and upon the face of the papers I think an allowance of \$750 would be ample.

I recommend, therefore, that the claim presented by Mr. Dunn be reduced by the sum of \$400, and be allowed at the sum of \$2,874.04.

DEAR SIR—In July of 1899 I wrote to you, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting an appropriation of \$20,000 to repair a damage, caused by fire, and to do other necessary work, in the building known as the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

On September 15, 1899, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated \$20,000 for said work, and on September 20, 1899, upon my recommendation, the Board of Public Improvements authorized this Department to advertise and let a contract for the amount stated, to repair the said damage and do the other necessary work in the said Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School. The said resolution was transmitted to the Municipal Assembly, for the concurrence of that body, but no action was taken thereon, so, consequently, the appropriation above mentioned was unavailable and the money reverted to the General Fund, by neglect of the Municipal Assembly to take action on the resolution.

The condition of the building of the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School is such that the Board of Health has condemned it as unfit for occupancy, and if it is the intention of the City to make the said building habitable I have to request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to repair the building and \$10,000 for improvements to the property outside of the building.

A detailed estimate of the expenses is hereto attached, showing how it is proposed to spend the above amount.

BIRD S. COLER, Esq., Comptroller, Finance Department, New York, N. Y.:

DEAR SIR—Following our conversation of Thursday last, when I showed you from my personal accounts the items of expenditure, in detail, on which I made up my bill, I hand you my bill for my own services and the services of associate experts and assistants on the recent investigation of the water supply.

I have, as you will note, made some concession from the total by the detailed statement, which may be regarded as taken from the charge for my own services.

I frankly admit that my bill is larger than I had expected it would be, for neither you nor I had any idea at the beginning of the broad scope that it would be necessary to give this investigation in order to cover the points raised or the scant data already on file. Nevertheless, the total is, I am well assured, smaller than that for which any similar investigation has been made in other cities.

From very trustworthy sources I am informed that the cost of the most noteworthy recent investigations of a similar character have been as follows:

Philadelphia, 1899, about.....	\$30,000 00
Louisville, 1897, about.....	100,000 00

—of which half was expended by the City, and about half paid for by the makers of filters submitted for test;  
Cincinnati, about..... \$50,000 00

—of which about \$40,000 was for their recent filtration experiments, although these followed close on the Louisville filter tests;  
Massachusetts Metropolitan (Boston), 1895..... \$47,300 00  
Pittsburgh, 1898, about..... 40,000 00



There were in some of these cases circumstances which tended to reduce the cost as compared with the recent New York investigation. For example, the Boston investigations, as a starting point, had data that had been quietly collected for years and had the benefit of the expert advice and direction of Mr. Hiram F. Mills, who gave his services free of charge, as a matter of public spirit, he being at that time chairman of the Water Supply Committee of the State Board of Health and a very unusual kind of man. The Philadelphia investigation followed years of patient collecting of data, and had also, under special authority, much assistance from City departments which did not enter into the above estimate of expense.

I shall be glad to have you compare each and all of the reports of the investigations mentioned above with my report as recently printed, that the scope and necessary amount of labor involved in collecting data for the several reports may be more clearly seen. I suggest also that you have the cost of the preliminary investigations for New Croton Aqueduct, or New Croton Dam, or Bimoklyn Report of 1896, looked up for comparison.

In fairness to myself, because of the total of time and expenditures having exceeded what was foreseen in the beginning, I desire to go on record with the statement that, to the best of my judgment and belief, this extent of investigation was necessary to a clear and correct understanding of the situation as regards water supply in the several boroughs, and that the investigation could not have been brought within a smaller compass or shortened without very materially impairing its utility.

I may also venture to remind you that the Merchants' Association was spared any expense on several of the lines of inquiry which cost me the most, because I, with about five assistants, had been at work nearly four months on the problem before they got fairly started, and I gave them blue-prints and the results of my computations as far as completed, without reserve. For example, the very expensive investigation of the yield of the Croton watershed, experiments on discharge of models of Croton Dam (on account of which I gave my personal check to Cornell University for \$806 in reimbursement for its expenditure, in addition to my own time and that of several of my assistants in the subsequent computations), and also the expensive observations relative to use and waste of water by a corps of observers at Central Park and Ridgewood.

So far as I can learn, the present report covers the broadest and most thorough inquiry of the kind that has ever been made in so short a time, and the only way that it was completed in such a short time was that in response to your urgent letters, personal requests and frequent telegrams, most of my assistants and myself worked most of the time for twelve hours per day and devoted our Sundays and holidays also to pushing the work to early completion.

This all tended to increase the expense, in comparison with work done at a leisurely rate. Although the report bears the date of March 24, you will recall that it was handed to you subject to correction in going through the press, because many of the computations had not then been checked and certain of the investigations not completed. So until June 15 we were kept working under almost as high pressure as in the earlier months.

This bill covers the services and traveling expenses of all associate experts and assistants whose work goes to make up my report as published. The "per diems" at which my own time and that of these assistants is reckoned, is precisely the same as has been paid me for the services of myself and the same men on other recent work, and is, I am well assured, in several instances materially smaller than the Merchants' Association has paid for similar talent in its similar recent work in investigating the water supply. We were very fortunate in securing the assistance of exceptionally good special men who had had large experience in similar work.

Finally, I can only suggest that if you look through the volume you will find ample evidence of a vast amount of work. You will find that we made personal field reconnaissance of several hundreds of miles of aqueduct line, with estimates of cost in detail; that ten or a dozen reservoir sites were carefully studied; a large number of dam sites surveyed; long lines of levels run across country; studies made in detail of about ten different watersheds; the Croton records analyzed and recomputed day by day for 32 years, as per the computation book of 500 quarto pages which I placed on file in your office, after a laborious and puzzling search for the former sources of error, etc., etc.

I may add that it would have been impossible to complete all these computations in the given time had I not imported from Germany a Burkhardt computing machine. I was also under expense for a number of other special expensive instruments, for the use and wear of which no charge has been made.

DEAR SIR—In the Final Estimate for 1900, the sum of \$10,400 was appropriated to this Department for "Water Supply for the Twenty-fourth Ward," to pay for water furnished under the contract with the Water Commissioners of the City of Yonkers, in pursuance of section 474 of the City Charter, to supply high grounds which are beyond the reach of the Croton water service and the Bronx and Byram river service. The appropriation is sufficient to pay for the supply of about 22,000 cubic feet per day; but, partly in consequence of increase of population

and buildings in the districts supplied from the Yonkers service, and partly in consequence of the deficiency of supply from the Bronx and Byram river systems, the demands on the service have so increased that it is necessary to supplement the appropriation for 1900 by a transfer of \$1,900. This sum can be spared from the appropriation for "Public Drinking Hydrants, for 1900."

There is also a deficiency in the appropriation of \$25,000 for "Additional Fire Hydrants, 1900," the Departmental Estimate for which was \$50,000, and it should be supplemented by a transfer of \$25,000, to enable the Department to complete by the close of this year work undertaken and in contemplation. This amount can also be spared from the appropriation for "Public Drinking Hydrants, for 1900."

The only reason that these two amounts of \$1,900 and \$25,000 can be spared from the appropriation for "Additional Fire Hydrants" is that, much to my regret, a number of resolutions which have been introduced in the Municipal Assembly for placing additional drinking hydrants, thirteen in number, have so far failed of passage, and this Department is therefore without authority to apply a large portion of the appropriation to the placing of new hydrants or fountains. I therefore respectfully ask the authorization of your Board for these transfers.
