Dear Sir-In conformity with the requirements of section 119 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, and chapter 466, Laws of 1901, we transmit herewith the results of our examination of the receipts and disbursements of the office of the Chamberlain for the second quarter of 1902.

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts on June 30, 1902, was \$8,420,330 74, which agrees with the balances as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date.

Section 95 of the Building Code of The City of New York, requiring the elevator in this class of building to be inclosed in brick walls, is hereby asked in this particular building to be repealed by your Honorable Board of Examiners, and that you allow the elevator to be placed in the building with an open shaft, properly protected with a slat guard rail and self-closing gate (slat) of wood construction, and trap doors of wood at each floor to be opened and closed at the beginning and ending of each day's business or whenever requiring the same.

The above appeal is made to your Honorable Board for the following reasons:
