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## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, June 12, 1903.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Friday, June 12, 1903, at 3 p. m.

There were present President Ogden and Commissioners Dykman, Banta, Perrine and Spencer.

The public hearing in reference to the classification of positions in the Board of Elections in the exempt class was continued. There were present President Voorhis and Commissioners Maguire and Page of the Board of Elections, Messrs. Samuel H. Ordway and Henry G. Chapman of the Civil Service Reform Association. The Board of Elections was requested to submit a statement of the duties of each Clerk whose position would be affected by the adoption of the resolution.

At the conclusion of the public hearing the Commission went into regular session.

The President reported that in view of the fact that the questions to be used in the examination for promotion to the position of Inspector of Pier Building in the Department of Docks and Ferries were not received from the Examiner assigned to prepare them on the morning of Monday, June 8, the date set for the examination, it was necessary to dismiss the candidates who appeared.

On motion, duly seconded, the matter was referred to the President with power.

Commissioner Spencer reported that the President and he had conferred with City Superintendent of Schools William H. Maxwell and Mr. Albert G. McDonald, of the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation, representing the Board of Education, with reference to the status of persons employed by the latter department in the positions of Laboratory Assistant, Clerical Assistant and Library Assistant. He gave a statement of the duties performed by these employees, and on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That as a result of the conference between the Civil Service Commission and City Superintendent of Schools William H. Maxwell and Mr. Albert G. McDonald, of the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation of the Board of Education, the employees of the Board of Education known as Library, Clerical and Laboratory Assistants, may properly be deemed teachers within the meaning of the Civil Service Law, and, as such, in the unclassified service.

The President and Commissioner Spencer also reported an informal conference with the City Superintendent of Schools as to the case of Mrs. Helen Spurdle, employed as Matron in the Brooklyn Truant School, and that in their opinion and the opinion of the City Superintendent, Mrs. Spurdle was improperly and illegally employed.

On motion, duly seconded, the request of the Secretary for authority to employ a person to index the minutes of the Commission was granted.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby authorized to accept applications for the position of Mechanical Draughtsman, third grade, from persons who have not reached the age of twenty-one years, and also from persons who are not residents of the State of New York, in view of the fact that it is desirable to secure as large a number of applications as possible for this examination.

The Secretary reported that he had been advised by Assistant Corporation Counsel Connolly, that under Rule 63 a person whose name appeared on an eligible list for a position in the Labor Class, could compel the Commission, at the end of one year, to examine him for continued eligibility for appointment. He stated in this connection, that Thomas G. Coyne, whose name appeared on the eligible list for Bridge Tender, had secured a peremptory writ of mandamus directing the Commission to replace his name on the eligible list at the end of one year if, after examination, he was found to be qualified to perform the duties of that position.

Additional teachers who hold substitute licenses shall receive a salary of \$3 per day. If they hold license No. 1 or a higher license they shall be paid in accordance with Schedule III.

Regularly appointed teachers assigned as additional teachers shall be paid in accordance with Schedule III. Other persons assigned as additional teachers shall be paid at the rate of \$3 per day of actual service.

Amending subdivision 24 of section 108 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by inserting in the fifth line thereof, after the word "necessary," the following "Blackboards shall be washed and thoroughly cleaned whenever required by the principal."

Amending subdivision 2 of section 54 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

2. Evening elementary schools shall be established in such school buildings and other places as the Committee on Special Schools, upon the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents, shall determine. Boys and girls shall not be permitted to attend school in the same building; in special cases, however, the Committee on Special Schools, upon the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents, may authorize the organization of boys' classes and girls' classes in the same building.

Amending subdivision 2 of section 56 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

2. Vacation schools and playgrounds shall be opened on the Monday following July 4, in each year, or on such date prior thereto as shall be determined by the Committee on Special Schools, and shall continue for such period as may be determined by said Committee.

Amending subdivision 9 of section 64 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by striking out the last paragraph thereof, reading as follows:

In schools of less than five classes the teacher of the highest grade shall receive, in addition to the regular salary of a teacher, one hundred dollars per annum as compensation for acting as senior teacher in charge of the school, —and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

In a school of the fifth order the teacher acting as senior teacher in charge of the school shall receive, in addition to the regular salary, \$100 per annum.

Amending subdivision 2 of section 107 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

2. Every Janitor, Janitor-Engineer and Cleaner shall, on appointment, file with the Supervisor of Janitors a certificate from the Board of Health or a duly qualified practicing physician that he or she has been properly vaccinated. On the first day of October and on the first day of April in each year every Janitor, Janitor-Engineer and Cleaner in charge of a school building shall file with the Supervisor of Janitors a complete list of all persons employed by him or her in caring for said building, and a list of the members of his or her family, if any, who reside in said building, with a certificate of vaccination of each person so employed or so residing. Such certificates shall be renewed at least once in five years. In the case of persons engaged for service in a school building between the dates above named certificates of vaccination shall be filed with the Supervisor of Janitors within ten days.

Reading—Appreciative reading of at least one masterpiece of prose and one of poetry of at least 500 lines. Ethical lessons. Use of library books.

Spelling—Selected words; synonyms; use of dictionary.

Memorizing—Prose and poetry, including extracts from the literature used for appreciative reading.

#### Geography.

Commercial Geography—The United States and its colonial possessions compared with other great commercial countries; location, surface, climate; resources; industries and occupations; products; commerce; chief cities; status of the peoples.

#### History and Civics.

History—English history from 1603, with related European and American history. Ethical lessons.

Civics—Comparison of the powers and duties of the King, Cabinet and Parliament of Great Britain with those of the President, Cabinet and Congress of the United States.

#### Physical Training and Hygiene.

Physical Training—Gymnastic exercises and games, and correct hygienic habits. Hygiene—Nervous system; brain, spinal cord, nerves and sympathetic nervous systems; special senses, organs and functions and their care; formation of habits. Effects of alcohol and narcotics.

#### Mathematics.

Integers, common and decimal fractions; underlying principles considered; short methods.

Denominate numbers. Measurements and comparisons.

Percentage and interest. Ratio and simple proportion. Application of algebra and geometry to the solution of problems.

#### Drawing, Constructive Work and Shop Work.

Freehand representation of objects; memory or imaginative drawings; simple composition. Construction drawing; constructive design. Ornament; decorative design and its application. Color. Study of pictures and other works of art.

Shop Work (Boys)—Advanced exercises in chiseling and joinery. Use of hand-screws. Causes of checking and warping. Qualities of hard woods—oak, ash, etc. Making useful articles from individual plans. Application of appropriate decoration.

Or, in schools in which shops are not provided, constructive work from patterns, working drawings or designs.

#### Sewing.\*

Drafting and making garments; applied design.

#### Cooking.\*

Cooking of beef, mutton, poultry, fish and shell-fish. Jellies, cakes and ices. Salads. Canning fruit and vegetables. Cooking for infants and invalids. Table service and dining room customs. Fittings and care of the sick room.

#### Music.

Study and writing of tonic, dominant and subdominant triads in minor keys, and of the diminished triad on the leading tone in major and minor, with its resolution; sight-singing continued; special attention to changed voices.

## General Provisions.

1. A period shall not exceed fifty minutes.
2. Drawing and art study, physical training and vocal music shall not be considered as subjects requiring preparation.
3. Of subjects requiring preparation, no student shall be required to take more than twenty-one periods per week.
4. No new class in an elective subject need be formed in the second year for less than 25 pupils; in the third year for less than 20 pupils; in the fourth year for less than 15 pupils.
5. Exercises in voice training and declamation shall be given at least once a week during the first year, and they may be continued throughout the course.
6. In order to graduate from the High School of Commerce a student must have studied at least one foreign language for at least three years, have accomplished satisfactorily all the other required work, and have taken a sufficient number

of elective studies so that the total amount of required and elective studies shall equal 3,000 periods of work requiring preparation, and shall extend over not less than three years and not more than six years. Due credit shall be given by the principal for work done by a pupil in other high schools.

7. A certificate of graduation shall be awarded at the close of the fourth year to each student who satisfactorily completes the work up to that point. The fifth year shall be regarded as supplementary to the regular course, and shall be open to all students who have graduated from a high school course of four years.

Appropriating, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the sum of one hundred and six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$106.25) from premiums derived from the sale of Corporate Stock, heretofore issued by the Comptroller, pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the revised Charter, said sum to be applied in payment of the bill of the Lawyers' Engineering and Surveying Company for survey and description of the proposed school site at Nos. 410 to 418 (inclusive) East Seventeenth street, Borough of Manhattan; and making requisition for said sum upon the Comptroller.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) from the Special School Fund of the Department of Education for the current year, and from the item contained therein entitled "Transportation," Borough of Brooklyn, which item is in excess of its requirements to the item also contained within the Special School Fund for the current year entitled "Transportation," Borough of Queens, which item is insufficient for its purposes.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) from the Special School Fund for the current year, and from the item contained therein entitled "Rents," Borough of Manhattan, which item is in excess of its requirements, to the item also contained within the Special School Fund for the current year entitled "Rents," Borough of Queens, which item is insufficient for its purposes.

Seventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall cause to be laid, under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, upon and along the public highway known as the Boulevard, as hereinbefore described, a good and sufficient macadamized pavement of a depth of not less than eight inches, to extend from either side of the present macadamized pavement to the curb line on the north and south sides of the said Boulevard.

The grantee shall pay the entire cost thereof, together with the cost of the necessary inspection, and no cars shall be operated under this franchise over any part of the route hereby granted, until the said pavement is fully and completely laid.

Eighth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Ocean Electric Railway Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

all of the routes hereby granted, whether on streets, highways and bridges or upon any private property or right-of-way included in any of such routes so as to make a double-track railway.

Section 5. Said grant shall commence construction within three months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments, and shall complete the construction of a single track railway upon all of the route hereby granted on or before July 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. If upon the route above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1904, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertain to such route or portion thereof, not then constructed from and after July 1, 1904, shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. Provided that such time may be extended upon the same conditions as to forfeiture under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, as it now exists, and by a properly executed instrument in writing; and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may similarly extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year, if, in their discretion, it seems best so to do, and that the city officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said streets and highways and bridges, may similarly extend, by properly executed instrument in writing, such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Section 6. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, highways and bridges above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, highways and bridges shall not be operated as provided for in this ordinance, the Comptroller of The City of New York may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, highways and bridges within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and The City of New York may recover the cost and expense of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as required in section 7 hereof, or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successors or assigns, in such portions of the streets, highways and bridges, in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

Section 7. This grant is upon the express condition that the Ocean Electric Railway Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of two thousand dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railway, and, in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of the streets, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of two thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Section 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
