## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Tuesday, June 25, 1907, at 2 o'clock p.m.

Present—Commissioners Cowan (President), Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph, and Chief Engineer Sears.

Minutes of June 11, 1907, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 15463 to 15469, both inclusive, amounting to \$5,925.96, which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Cowan, Ten Eyck, Ryan and Windolph—4.

The President reported the receipt of circular letter from F. A. Spencer, Secretary of the Commission on Salaries and Grades, dated June 20, 1907, transmitting draft of Schedule "K," "Special Positions," and stated that he had replied thereto.

The action of the President was approved and the communication ordered filed.

The Vice-President reported the receipt of application from Greenberg & Bartlett, dated June 17, 1907, for the consent of the Commissioners to the assignment of payments due upon contract for flashboard equipment on the spillway of the new Croton Dam, for months of April and May, and stated that he had consented thereto.

The action of the Vice-President was approved and the application ordered filed.

Report No. 1596 of the Chief Engineer, dated June 18, 1907, in regard to bill of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, dated December 1, 1904, for pointing or re-pointing joints in masonry on upstream face of new Croton Dam, amounting to \$1,170.19, was received and ordered filed and payment thereof disallowed.

Report No. 1597 of the Chief Engineer, dated June 21, 1907, recommending payment of bill of Alice J. Gowen for use of stable, amounting to \$25, was received and ordered filed and the Secretary directed to prepare voucher therefor.

Report No. 1598 of the Chief Engineer, dated June 21, 1907, in regard to sale of grass on the Croton River Division, was received and referred to the President to take the necessary steps for the sale thereof.

Communication from I. J. Beaudriat, dated June 17, 1907, requesting a statement in regard to the amount of water that it is the intention of the City to divert from the east branch of the Croton river, for use in connection with a claim filed by Messrs. Juengst Sons with the Commissioners of Appraisal in the First Croton Falls Proceeding, was received, together with Report No. 1599 of the Chief Engineer thereon.

The President was directed to reply to said communication in accordance with the report of the Chief Engineer, and the communication and report were ordered filed.

#### Reports and resolutions were adopted as follows:

Appropriating the sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied to the purchase, for school purposes, of lands at Coney Island avenue and East Twelfth street, adjoining Public School 99, Borough of Brooklyn.

Appropriating the sum of sixteen hundred and forty-eight and 53-100 dollars (\$1,648.53) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller, pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied (in addition to the sum of \$4,000 here-tofore appropriated) to the payment of the awards and interest thereon for parcel No. 7, as confirmed by the Court, in the proceeding for the acquisition of lands and premises situated on Evergreen avenue and Grove street, adjoining Public School 75, Borough of Brooklyn, as a site for school purposes; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

Authorizing the Committee on Athletic Fields to employ for each of the athletic fields, to take effect as soon as the same is ready for use, a foreman at a salary of \$100 per month, and an assistant at \$2.50 per day; that, as soon as a grandstand in any field shall be completed, the Committee shall be authorized to employ an additional assistant for such field at the same rates, these employees to be taken from the certified list of the Civil Service Commission, and the assistants to be only employed during the months when the fields are in use, under such regulations as the Committee may from time to time prescribe, and employing on afternoons and Saturdays, during such period as the Committee may prescribe, a physical training teacher to direct the exercises of the children in each field when completed, with an assistant, the instructor to be paid \$3 a day for school days and \$5 a day for Saturdays, and the assistant \$2 per day for school days and \$3.50 for Saturdays. These are to be on duty after school hours, respectfully reports that, so far as relates to the first resolution, it is suggested that the cost of employment of foremen at monthly salaries of \$100 and assistants at \$2.50 per day would seem to be chargeable to the fund for Salaries of Janitors in All Schools, which is under the control of the Committee on Care of Buildings, as the nature of the services to be rendered appears to be janitorial or care-taking, and the fund indicated is the only one available or appropriate for the purpose. While the expenditures contemplated cannot be large, the resolution is not sufficiently specific as to time to enable the Committee to state the exact amount of the expense. The fund for Salaries of Janitors in All Schools at this time appears to be sufficient for its original purposes and also for the proposed additional uses, provided the Committee on Care of Buildings is willing to undertake the appointments and defray the cost thereof.

So far as relates to the second resolution, while no funds have been set aside specifically for the purpose of employing instructors for assignment to athletic field work, the proposition appears to fall naturally within the scope of that portion of the General School Fund applicable to the appointment of new teachers, that is, for enlargement of the system, and the present financial indications are that it is permissible to make such appointments as are necessary.

Authorizing the Secretary to execute a renewal of the lease of the parlor floor of the premises No. 52 Sands street, Brooklyn, occupied as an annex to Public School 1, for a period of one year from May 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$300, the Board of Education to have the use of the premises on school days from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m., otherwise on the same terms and conditions as contained in the lease heretofore existing; subject to the approval of the Departments of Health and Buildings as to sanitary and structural conditions. Owners, the Asacog Club, No. 52 Sands street, Brooklyn.

Authorizing the Secretary to execute a renewal of the lease of the premises on the southwest corner of New York and Atlantic avenues, Borough of Brooklyn,

consisting of the two three-story brick buildings, Nos. 63-65 New York avenue, and the lands adjoining, having a frontage of one hundred and six feet, more or less, on Atlantic avenue, and one hundred and twenty feet on New York avenue, said premises being occupied as an annex to Public School 41, for a period of one year from July 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$2,200, and for an additional period of two years from July 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$2,500, otherwise on the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; the Departments of Health and Buildings having certified that the sanitary and structural conditions thereat are satisfactory. Owner, George Rodemann, No. 640 Nostrand avenue, Brooklyn.

Authorizing the Secretary to execute a lease of the premises on the rear of the lot designated as No. 724 Myrtle avenue, Brooklyn, to be used as an annex to Public School 54, for a period of two years and one month from June 1, 1907, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$360; the lessor, Walter Ryan, of No. 188 Spencer street, Brooklyn, to remove the interior partitions and two waterclosets, to keep the roof in repair and to comply with all requirements of the Departments of Health and Buildings; the Board of Education to furnish light, heat and janitor's service; the Departments of Health and Buildings having certified that the sanitary and structural conditions are satisfactory.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Buildings in deciding to discontinue occupancy after July 1, 1907, of the premises at Morris Park avenue and Lincoln street, The Bronx, occupied as an annex to Public School 34, and on and after July 1, 1907, turning over the premises at Morris Park avenue and Lincoln street, The Bronx, the lease of which will expire on July 1, 1908, to the Comptroller for such action as he may deem advisable, and that his attention be respectfully called to the covenants of said lease, so that, in case it is decided to use the premises for other than school purposes, the Department of Education may not be held liable for any failure to comply with the same.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Thomas Armstrong, of No. 55 East One Hundred and Twenty-third street, Manhattan, as Office Boy in the Bureau of Supplies, at a salary of \$300 per annum, the appointment taking effect May 6, 1907, subject to the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Valentine J. Spillman, of No. 355 Pleasant avenue, Manhattan, as Clerk in the Bureau of Audit and Accounts, at a salary of \$300 per annum, the appointment taking effect April 30, 1907, subject to the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Awarding the contract for one gasoline motor four-ton truck for the use of the Bureau of Supplies, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the Mack Bros. Motor Car Company, in the sum of \$4,700; and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the action of the Board of Education in awarding the above-mentioned contract to other than the lowest bidder.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in rejecting all bids received for the one gasoline or steam touring five-passenger car and one gasoline or steam touring seven-passenger car.

Rescinding the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on October 24, 1906 (see Journal, pages 1746-1747), selecting and determining as a site for school purposes certain lands and premises on the northerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, Borough of Brooklyn, and selecting and determining as a site for school purposes lands and premises on the southerly side of Lott avenue, running from Hopkinson avenue to Amboy street, in Local School Board District No. 39, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$9,700, and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

Selecting and determining as a site for school purposes the following lands and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the same:

Lands and premises on Union Hall street, south of Pacific street, at Jamaica, in Local School Board District No. 43, Borough of Queens, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$250.

Lands and premises on Hamburg avenue and Cornelia street, in Local School Board District No. 36, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$14,000.

Lands and premises on Irving avenue, Woodbine and Madison streets, in Local School Board District No. 36, Borough of Brooklyn, which lands and premises are assessed for the year 1907, with other property, at \$121,500.

Lands and premises, on Fourteenth avenue, Forty-second and Forty-third streets, in Local School Board District No. 37, Borough of Brooklyn, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$7,700.

The lamented death of Miss Sarah F. Buckelew, identified for nearly half a century with Public School 49, Borough of Manhattan, occurred April 23, 1907.

Miss Buckelew, who was educated in the public schools of Brooklyn and at the Packer Institute, and was graduated from the Albany State Normal School and from the Brooklyn Saturday Normal School, devoted her life to the work of teaching. While a natural teacher and deeply interested in the training of the young, she was a woman of broad culture and active in many departments of life. Whereas, The said lands and premises are urgently required for school purposes, and title thereto should be acquired as soon as possible; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to adopt a resolution, in accordance with the provisions of section 1439 of the revised Charter, as amended, directing that title to said lands and premises and all interest therein vest in The City of New York ten days after the passage of such resolution.

Resolved, That the action of the Committee on Buildings, taken May 6, 1907, in increasing from \$30 per week to \$32.50 per week, each, the salaries of Charles F. Ackerman and R. H. F. Halsey, Draughtsmen in the Bureau of School Buildings, be and it is hereby approved and ratified.

Whereas, The Committee on Buildings is in receipt of sundry estimates from contractors for additional work under their contracts, as follows: Estimate of Frank Dobson, contractor for heating and ventilating apparatus at the Eastern District High School, Brooklyn, \$200 (for making alterations in connection with risers Nos. 52, 53, 54 and 55); estimate of William M. Sheehan & Co., contractors for electric work at Erasmus Hall High School, Brooklyn, \$170 (for changing position of outside lanterns, shortening conduit, etc.); and

Whereas, The Superintendent of School Buildings reports that these estimates are reasonable and that the work is necessary; therefore be it

Resolved, That the sum of three hundred and seventy dollars (\$370) be and the same is hereby appropriated from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said amount to be applied in full payment for extra cost to Frank Dobson and William M. Sheehan & Co., contractors for additional work in connection with their contracts, as hereinbefore stated; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

Whereas, The principal of Public School 29, The Bronx, requests that, while Cypress avenue is being paved, that part of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street contiguous to said school building be asphalted, as at present the noise of passing vehicles seriously interferes with the work of the teachers whose classrooms are located on that side of the structure; therefore be it

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx be requested to authorize the laying of asphalt pavement on the One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street side of Public School 29, in said borough.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
