## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 3 o'clock p. m., on Friday, July 2, 1909.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain; Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen; and Timothy P. Sullivan, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, requesting that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property between the foot of South Sixth street and Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

July 2, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I would respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the following described property:

Beginning at the intersection of the northerly side of the northerly waiting room with the limiting line of City property at the foot of Broadway; running thence westerly along the northerly side of said northerly waiting room 118 feet, more or less, to the northwest corner of said waiting room;

Running thence northerly along the northerly prolongation of the westerly side of said northerly waiting room 6 feet, more or less, to the northerly side of the crib pier between the northerly ferry slip to East Forty-second street and the southerly ferry slip to East Twenty-third street, Manhattan;

Running thence westerly in a meandering line along the northerly side of the said crib pier 247 feet, more or less, to the pierhead line established 1857 and approved by the Secretary of War, February 8, 1890;

Running thence northerly along said pierhead line 446 feet, more or less, to the southerly line of City property under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges;

Running thence easterly along the southerly side of said property to its intersection with the westerly prolongation of the northerly line of South Sixth street, and thence still easterly and along said northerly line of South Sixth street and its prolongation to the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War, February 8, 1890;

Running thence southerly along said bulkhead line 61 feet, more or less, to the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of South Sixth street;

Running thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the southerly line of South Sixth street and along the southerly line of South Sixth street 118 feet, more or less, to a line 100 feet more or less from and parallel with the westerly line of Kent avenue;

Running thence southerly along said line 233 feet, more or less, to the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of the two-story brick building on the westerly side of Kent avenue, about 127 feet, more or less, northerly from the westerly prolongation of the northerly line of Broadway;

Running thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the northerly side of said two-story brick building 36 feet, more or less, to the westerly side of said building;

Running thence southerly along the westerly side of said two-story brick building 25 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of said two-story brick building;

Running thence easterly along the southerly side of said two-story brick building 69 feet, more or less, to the westerly line of Kent avenue;

Running thence southerly along the westerly line of Kent avenue 74 feet, more or less, to the northerly side of the three-story brick building at the corner of Broadway;

Running thence westerly along said three-story brick building 71 feet, more or less, to the westerly side of said three-story brick building;

Running thence southerly along the westerly side of said three-story brick building 20 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of said three-story brick building;

Running thence westerly along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of said three-story brick building 13 feet, more or less, to the northerly prolongation of the limiting line of City property at the foot of Broadway;

Running thence southerly along said limiting line of City property 28 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning.

July 2, 1909.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Your Committee, to whom was referred at meeting held June 30, 1909, all future proceedings with reference to the Brooklyn ferry, respectfully report in favor of consenting to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the property between the foot of South Sixth street, and the foot of Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, known as Parcel 3, a technical description of which is contained in the communication of the Commissioner of Docks, dated July 1, 1909, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the said property.

The following resolution was then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon on Monday, July 26, 1909, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated July 2, 1909, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and assent to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of property between South Sixth street and Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The following resolution was then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks be and is hereby requested to submit to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at its next meeting a plan for the operation of the ferries between the foot of Broadway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the Borough of Manhattan.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, recommending an amendment to the resolution adopted June 9, 1909, authorizing a lease of the franchise for a ferry to the Interborough Ferry Company, from the foot of East Tenth street and East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

June 26, 1909.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Referring in the matter of the lease of the franchise to the Interborough Ferry Company of the ferry from the foot of East Tenth and East Twenty-third streets, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, which was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 9, 1909, I beg to state that since the passage of said resolution a representative of the Ferry Company called at this office and stated that it is impracticable to give good service on the ferry from the foot of East Twenty-third street to Greenpoint avenue with only one slip on the Manhattan side. I therefore beg to recommend that the resolution of June 9, 1909, approving said lease, be amended in accordance with the following:

The word "slip," when used, shall intend and mean the ferry racks, bridges, floats, ferry houses, structures or portions of same appurtenant to and used in connection with each slip respectively; Slip No. 1 shall intend and mean the slip immediately adjoining the north side of the pier foot of East Twenty-second street; Slip No. 2 the slip immediately north of slip No. 1; Slip No. 3 the slip immediately north of Slip No. 2; as they are at the present time.

The Interborough Ferry Company shall, during the term of the lease, have the use of Slip No. 2, the City, however, reserving the right to enter upon and take possession of said slip in case of its inability to use Slip No. 1 on account of repairs, rebuilding or dredging required to same, the time of such possession to continue while such repairing, rebuilding or dredging is in progress.

The lessee shall further covenant and agree that if at any time during the term of the lease the Commissioner of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within a section or district of the water-front which shall include the premises referred to



in said lease, according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, and if the Commissioner of Docks shall determine that for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the lessee in the said wharf property or any part thereof, then upon service upon the lessee of written notice from the Commissioner of Docks to that effect, describing the premises or the part thereof affected thereby, the interest of the lessee in said wharf property or part thereof under this lease, shall be thereby terminated, and no claim for damages or compensation in favor of the lessee by reason of the termination of such interest in said wharf property, or to or on account of any structures or improvements that may have been erected or made by the lessee, shall at any time be made by the lessee or by any person or persons whomsoever. And in the event that the interest of the lessee in the whole or any part of the demised premises shall be terminated, as herein provided, then the Commissioner of Docks shall lease, demise and to farm let to the said lessee, sufficient wharf property for the accommodation of two slips at a locality to be designated by the Commissioner of Docks between the northerly side of East Twenty-second street and the centre line of East Twenty-third street, and any alterations to existing structures made necessary by such designation or any dredging necessary to fit the premises for ferry purposes, shall be done by and at the sole cost and expense of the lessee, in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks, and which, in his opinion, shall be the most economical layout for such two slips.

The lessee shall have the right to use the City property, under the jurisdiction of this Department, at or near the foot of East Tenth street, which was formerly included in lease to the Tenth and Twenty-third Street Ferry Company and the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, which, however, does not include the northerly side of the pier at the foot of East Tenth street, formerly leased to and now occupied under permit by the estate of George Law.

The lessee shall also covenant and agree that if at any time during the term of the lease the Commissioner of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding piers at or near the foot of East Tenth and East Twenty-third streets, East River, according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, then the City of New York or the Commissioner of Docks shall have the right to enter upon the premises hereby leased for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, and the lessee will not at any time make any claim for or by way of reduction from rent or otherwise or for any damage arising from or consequent upon any building or rebuilding that the City may do or cause to be done or in consequence of the occupation of the said premises by the City or its agents and contractors for the purpose of such building or rebuilding.

This amendment to be of no force or effect unless approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the term of the lease to be approved by the Corporation Counsel.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those embodied in the communication from this Department, dated June 8, 1909, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 9, 1909.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks recommending a lease in the Estate of George Law, of the right to erect and maintain ferry racks and ferry structures along the northerly side of the present pier at the foot of East Tenth street, Borough of Manhattan:

June 23, 1909.

Hon. George B. McCrory, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Sir:—After due consideration I am of the opinion that the interests of the City would be best served by the granting of a lease to the estate of George Law of the right to erect and maintain ferry racks and ferry structures along the northerly side of the present pier at the foot of East Tenth street or along the northerly side of a new pier to be built by and at the expense of the City at New York at the foot of East Tenth street, and the northerly side and entire surface of the pier at the foot of East Eleventh street, East River, Borough of Manhattan, subject, however, and without prejudice to each and all of the rights and obligations of the respective parties by and under the grant or indenture bearing date on or about the 25th day of February, A. D. 1825, made and delivered by the Mayor, etc., of the City of New York unto Charles Henry Hall from whom the title of George Law, deceased, to certain portions of the premises described in the said grant or indenture was derived.

The lease to be for a term of ten years, from August 1, 1909, at a rental of \$4,000 per annum.

The lessee shall have the privilege of erecting and maintaining, during the term of the lease, along the northerly side of the pier foot of East Tenth street, ferry racks. The lease to contain a covenant that if at any time during the term thereof, the Commissioner of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding the pier at the foot of East Tenth street, according to any plan or plan now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, then the City of New York or the Commissioner of Docks shall have the right to enter upon the premises hereby leased for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, and the lessee will not at any time make any claim for or by way of reduction from rent or otherwise or for any damage arising from or consequent upon any building or rebuilding that the City may do or cause to be done or in consequence of the occupation of the said premises by the City or its agents or contractors for the purpose of such building or rebuilding.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease, including the covenant relative to the prevention of work under the "New Plan" shall be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

The Select Committee of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to whom those matters were referred at meeting held June 30, 1909, presented the following report:

July 1, 1909.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN:—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held June 30, 1909, the following matters were referred to the Committee on Ferries, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller and the Chamberlain:

1. A communication dated June 26, 1909, from the Commissioner of Docks authorizing an amendment to the resolution authorizing a lease of the franchise for ferries, between the foot of East Tenth street, Borough of Manhattan, and the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn; and between the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, and the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

2. A communication dated June 23, 1909, from the Commissioner of Docks recommending a lease in the estate of George Law of the right to erect and maintain ferry racks, etc., at the foot of East Tenth street, Borough of Manhattan.

On June 9, 1909, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution authorized a lease of the franchise for the above mentioned ferries to the Interborough Ferry Company "together with all the wharf property and structures belonging to the City which have heretofore been used for the purposes of said ferries."

Under the above clause, the ferry company is granted the use of the most northerly of the three ferry slips at the foot of East Twenty-third street, and the ferry slip along the north side of the pier at the foot of East Tenth street.

The Commissioner of Docks now recommends an amendment to the resolution of June 9, 1909, so that the ferry company may have the use of two slips at the foot of East Twenty-third street, in order that the ferry service may be more satisfactory. He also recommends that the amendment shall state that the City property included in the lease to the ferry company "does not include the northerly side of the pier at the foot of East Tenth street, formerly leased to and now occupied under permit by the estate of George Law," this being necessary in order that the lease recommended in his communication of June 23, may be made.

Your Committee, after consideration of the matter submitted, recommends:

First—That the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted June 9, be amended as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries in his communication dated June 26, 1909, except that the amendment shall provide that in case the City decides to operate another ferry from the foot of East Twenty-third street it shall have the use of Slip No. 2 jointly with the Interborough Ferry Company to as great an extent as it may find necessary.

Second—That the lease in the estate of George Law, as proposed in the communication of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, dated June 23, 1909, be authorized after the amendment to the resolution of June 9, 1909, is made as recommended above.

The following resolutions were then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held June 9, 1909, authorizing a lease of a ferry franchise to the Interborough Ferry Company, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Whereas, Section 826 of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Commissioner of Docks shall have power and is authorized to lease in the name of and for the benefit of The City of New York, in the manner provided by law, the franchise of any ferry or ferries belonging to said City, for the highest marketable price or rental, at public auction or by sealed bids, and always after public advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of said Commissioner, but not for a term longer than ten years; and

Whereas, It is further provided in said section that whenever it may be determined by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of a ferry in the manner in said section thereinbefore directed, it shall be lawful for said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by resolution adopted by such unanimous vote, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, to lease such franchise by private agreement for terms not exceeding twenty-five years, and under such conditions as, in their judgment, will best protect and further the interests of the City and the travelling public; and

Whereas, Under date of June 8, 1909, the Commissioner of Docks has recommended that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the ferries from and to the foot of East Tenth street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and from and to the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, at public auction, or by sealed bids and after public advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of the Commissioner of Docks; now therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, determine that the interests of The City of New York will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the hereinbefore mentioned ferries at public auction, as provided in section 826 of the Greater New York Charter; and be it further

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, hereby approve of and authorize a lease to the Interborough Ferry Company, of a franchise to operate ferries from and to the foot of East Tenth street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and from and to the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, together with the wharf property and structures belonging to the City, which have heretofore been used for the purposes of said ferries, except as hereinafter provided, for a term of twenty-five years from May 1, 1909, at a rental of 2 per cent. of the gross receipts of said company annually, but in no case shall said rental be less than seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) per annum, and said lessee shall furnish a bond of a surety company to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks, in the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), for the faithful performance of all the terms and conditions of the lease.

The word "slip" when used, shall intend and mean the ferry racks, bridges, floats, ferry houses, structures or portions of same appurtenant to and used in connection with each slip respectively; Slip No. 1 shall intend and mean the slip immediately adjoining the north side of the pier foot of East Twenty-second street; Slip No. 2, the slip immediately north of Slip No. 1; Slip No. 3, the slip immediately north of Slip No. 2; as they are at the present time.

The Interborough Ferry Company shall, during the term of the lease, have the use of Slip No. 2, the City, however, reserving the right to enter upon and take possession of said slip in case of its inability to use Slip No. 1 on account of repairs, rebuilding or dredging required to same, the time of such possession to continue while such repairing, rebuilding or dredging is in progress.

The lessee shall have the right to use the City property under the jurisdiction of this Department, at or near the foot of East Tenth street, which was formerly included in lease to the Tenth and Twenty-third Street Ferry Company and the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, which, however, does not include the north-



erly side of the pier at the foot of East Tenth street, formerly leased to and now occupied under permit by the estate of George Law.

The lessee shall also covenant and agree that if at any time during the term of the lease the Commissioner of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding piers at or near the foot of East Tenth and Twenty-third streets, East River, according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, then The City of New York or the Commissioner of Docks shall have the right to enter upon the premises hereby leased for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, and the lessee will not at any time make any claim for or by way of reduction from rent or otherwise or for any damage arising from or consequent upon any building or rebuilding that the City may do or cause to be done or in consequence of the occupation of the said premises by the City or its agents and contractors for the purpose of such building or rebuilding.

The lease to contain a clause that if at any time during the term of the lease the City should decide to operate another ferry from the foot of East Twenty-third street the City reserves the right to use Slip No. 2, generally with the Interborough Ferry Company, to such extent as the Commissioner of Docks may deem necessary.

The lessee shall furnish a statement of the receipts and expenditures of said ferry, duly verified by the proper officer of said company, to the Commissioner of Docks whenever so requested by him and The City of New York, its officers, agents or employees shall at all times have access to and power to examine the books and accounts of said lessee relating to the affairs of said ferry. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of ferry franchises and wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, otherwise to be of no force or effect, and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when approved by the Corporation Counsel.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the estate of George Law, of the right to erect and maintain ferry racks and ferry structures along the northerly side of the present pier at the foot of East Tenth street or along the northerly side of a new pier to be built by and at the expense of The City of New York at the foot of East Tenth street, and the southerly side and entire surface of the pier at the foot of East Eleventh street, East River, Borough of Manhattan, subject, however, and without prejudice to each and all the rights and obligations of the respective parties by and under the grant or indenture bearing date on or about the 28th day of February, A. D. 1825, made and delivered by the Mayor, etc., of The City of New York unto Charles Henry Hall from whom the title of George Law, deceased, to certain portions of the premises described in the said grant or indenture was derived.

The lease to be for a term of ten years from August 1, 1909, at a rental of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) per annum. The lessee to have the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the term of the lease, along the northerly side of the pier foot of East Tenth street, ferry racks. The lease to contain a covenant that if at any time during the term thereof, the Commissioner of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding the pier at the foot of East Tenth street, according to any plan or plan now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, then The City of New York or the Commissioner of Docks shall have the right to enter upon the premises hereby leased for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, and the lessee will not at any time make any claim for or by way of reduction from rent or otherwise or for any damage arising from or consequent upon any building or rebuilding that the City may do or cause to be done or in consequence of the occupation of the said premises by the City or its agents or contractors for the purpose of such building or rebuilding.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease, including the covenant relative to the prosecution of work under the "New Plan" shall be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated June 23, 1909.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a lease of premises in a building to be built on the southerly side of Anable street, 150 feet east of Jackson avenue, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, for use of the Department of Taxes and Assessments and the Department of Finance:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

July 1, 1909.

GENTLEMEN—The subcommittee of this Board, to whom was referred the matter of the selection of proper rooms for the housing of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Collector of Taxes and Assessments and the Collector of Assessments and Arrears in the Borough of Queens, had a number of hearings on the subject matter, and have finally accepted the proposition of Stuard Hirschman of No. 200 Broadway, New York, who, in a communication dated June 14, 1909, proposes to erect a modern fireproof office building upon a plot of ground owned by him, situated on the southerly side of Anable street, 150 feet east of Jackson avenue, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, the building when erected to be 75 feet in width front and rear by 100 feet in depth, and to be erected four or more stories in height, according to the space required by the said City, and equipped with elevator service, each floor to be provided with a fireproof book vault 10 feet wide and 18 feet long, and to extend the entire height of each floor, said vault to be furnished with a fireproof steel door with combination lock. The first floor of the building to contain 6,800 square feet, the floors above to contain 6,000 square feet each.

He agrees that the building will be surrounded by vacant property on the south, on the east and on the west and by an open street on the north, furnishing light and air from four sides. When said building is completed, he agrees to lease such part thereof as may be required by The City of New York, but not less than 18,000 square feet, for a term of five years, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years, said renewal, however, to contain a cancellation clause giving the right to the City to cancel the same in the event of the erection of a Borough Hall in Queens Borough, said cancellation clause in state that if the Borough Hall to be erected in Queens is ready for occupancy at any time during the renewal period of said lease, then, upon ninety days' notice, after said Borough Hall is ready for occupancy, said lease shall be cancelled and become void.

The price to be charged the City for the space occupied by it shall be 75 cents per square foot per annum, and the rate shall be the same for the renewal clause. The owner of the premises to furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service, and agrees to have the building ready for occupancy within six months from the date of signing the contract for said lease, and proposes to furnish any bond which may be required for the faithful performance of these proposed agreements, and he further agrees that if at any time during the term of the lease or renewal thereof, he should lease to outside parties other than The City of New York, any part of said building at a rate lower per annum than 75 cents per square foot, then and in that event, the price charged the City shall be reduced to the lowest price charged other people in the building, irrespective of anything contained in the lease to the contrary notwithstanding, which said lease is to be entered into by the City prior to the erection of this building, and we further recommend that Mr. Hirschman shall file with the Engineers of the Department of Finance detailed plans and specifications of his building, which are to be attached to the lease, the lease to go into effect upon the completion of the building, and when the Engineers of the Finance Department shall verify that the building is completed and ready for occupancy, in accordance with said plans and specifications.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from Stuard Hirschman, of the ground or street floor, first floor above, and second floor above, containing not less than 18,000 square feet in the building to be erected upon a strip of land situated on the southerly side of Anable street, 150 feet east of Jackson avenue, in the First Ward, Borough of Queens, for use of the Department of Taxes and Assessments and the Department of Finance (Collector of Assessments and Arrears), the said building to be 75 feet in width front and rear by 100 feet in depth; it is to be equipped with elevator service, each floor is to be provided with a fire proof vault 10 feet wide and 18 feet long and to extend to the entire height of each floor, and to be furnished with fire proof steel doors with combination lock; the building to be properly surrounded on the south, east and west by vacant property, so as to permit plenty of light, air and ventilation on all three floors during the term of the lease or its renewal.

The lease is to furnish plans and specifications to the Comptroller and which are to be attached to the lease prior to the erection of the building and before occupation of the premises by the City or before the rent shall begin, and the Engineers of the Department of Finance shall furnish a certificate verifying that the building is completed and ready for occupancy, in accordance with said plans and specifications.

The lease is to be for a period of five years from the date of occupation, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of five years, upon the same terms and conditions, with the exception that there is to be a clause in the lease giving the City the right to cancel the same at any time during the renewal period, upon ninety days' notice, in the event that the new Borough Hall in the Borough of Queens is erected, finished and ready for occupancy at any time within the renewal period, and cancellation clause to be in full force and effect, anything contained in the original lease or the renewal thereof to the contrary notwithstanding.

The rental to be at the rate of seventy-five (75) cents per square foot per annum; the owner to furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service. The lease to contain a clause that in the event of the owner erecting a building greater in height than the three stories mentioned herein to be under lease and any portion of the upper stories be rented at a rate less than seventy-five (75) cents per square foot, then and in that event the rate which the City shall pay is to be the same as that charged for the upper floors, anything in said lease or renewal thereof to the contrary notwithstanding; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions, relative to a renewal of the lease of premises at Nos. 102 and 104 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, and a lease of premises at No. 100 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Children's Court, Second Division, Borough of Brooklyn:

July 1, 1909.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held May 16, 1906, adopted a resolution authorizing a lease of the second and third floors in premises Nos. 102 and 104 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of three years from July 1, 1906, at an annual rental of \$1,200, payable quarterly, for the use of the Children's Court, Second Division, Borough of Brooklyn, the owner to make all repairs and alterations and to pay the taxes, and for the water used on the premises.

The presiding Justice of the Court, in a communication dated June 24, 1906, states that it is absolutely necessary that additional facilities be provided for this court; that there are at present no proper toilet arrangements, nor is there any proper place where the complaints and records of the court can be kept; that experience in the last six or seven years has shown that these improvements are absolutely necessary in the City, and he has asked the Board to consider the circumstances herein named for the improving of the condition as it now exists. He therefore recommends that the second, third and fourth floors of the building, No. 100



Court street, be leased for the use of the Children's Court, Second Division, and in a conversation with the owner, the owner has agreed to connect the rooms on the second floor in the building, No. 100 Court street, with the rooms in the building now occupied, and make such alterations and repairs, and removal of bath rooms, and the rearrangement of the toilet facilities as will best suit the conditions that now prevail in the court.

The owner, in a communication dated June 23, 1909, states he will renew the lease of the present court room, Nos. 102 and 104 Court street, and lease the three floors above the store in the adjoining building, No. 100 Court street, to offer additional room and accommodations for the Children's Court, by connecting with an open archway between the places mentioned, and give a lease covering premises mentioned, from July 1, 1909, to February 15, 1913, a period of three years, seven and one-half months, at an annual rental of \$3,500, payable quarterly, in advance. He is to make all alterations and repairs, as agreed upon by Judge Wilkin, the City to supply light, heat and furniture for court room purposes, the owner to pay the taxes, and for the water used on the premises.

The following are the necessary things to be done in the building, No. 100 Court street:

Cut an arched doorway between Nos. 100 and 102 Court street, on floor one flight up.

Arrange some way, either by a door or in some other manner, to close up the stairway entrance to No. 100 Court street, to the floor one flight up. This must be in accordance with the requirements of the Fire Department.

Take plumbing out of present location and remove it to back of building, so it will have light.

Put in necessary animals for men's toilet in the back.

Cut arch between back room and middle room, so as to give light and air.

Remove and erect partition so as to make the back of the house as one room, except where it is used for toilet.

On floor two flights up take down present partition in back room and carry it over so as to make toilet over toilet on floor one flight up; this is to be for women.

On floor three flights up also arrange so that all of back of house shall be one room, except toilet, and rearrange toilets in sanitary condition.

Remove shutters from front part of building.

In addition to this he is required, under his old lease, to repair the roof and make same tight, and to repaint and redecorate the present court rooms, Nos. 102 and 104 Court street. The reason why this lease is made for a period to expire on February 15, 1913, is that the City is now occupying the store floor of the premises No. 104 Court street for the use of the Municipal Court, this court room being directly under the present court rooms occupied by the Children's Court; so that the leases will be made contemporaneous.

The rental as now obtained in the building, No. 100 Court street, is \$1,080 a year in its present condition. To make the alterations as required, and repairs and repainting for the use of the Children's Court, would, at the time of the expiration of the lease, if the City did not renew the same, compel the landlord to go to an additional expense of remodeling the rooms for living purposes as they now are. Therefore, under the circumstances, the City paying \$1,800 for the present court room, being the second and third floors of the building, Nos. 102 and 104 Court street, and estimating the present rental of the rooms as they now are in the building, No. 100 Court street, would make a rental, taken as they are, of \$2,900, without figuring upon any increase in rental value which is steadily going on in this neighborhood. The rent the owner asks to make these repairs is \$3,500, which would make an increased rental for the two premises of \$600, and out of this increased rental the owner is to make all the repairs and alterations in the building suitable to the requirements of the Children's Court and keep the building in repair during the term of the lease.

I consider, under the circumstances, the rent reasonable and just, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution renewing the present lease of the second and third floors of building known as Nos. 102 and 104 Court street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Children's Court, Second Division, in said Borough, for a term of three years, seven months and fifteen days, from July 1, 1909, the owner to repair the roof and make the same tight, and keep it in good condition through the term of the lease, and redecorate and repaint the same where necessary to be done, at the direction of the presiding Justice, the owner to make all repairs to the premises during the term of the lease, to pay the taxes, and for the water used on the premises during the term of the lease; and I further recommend that the Sinking Fund Commissioners adopt a resolution authorizing the leasing of the second, third and fourth floors in the premises No. 100 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Children's Court, Second Division, the owner to cut an arch doorway between Nos. 100 and 102 Court street on the floor one flight up, arranged either by door or some other manner, to close up the stair entrance to No. 100 Court street to the floor one flight up, to be done in accordance with the requirements of the Fire Department; the plumbing to be removed from its present location to the back of the building, in accordance with the requirements of the Building Department; and to install the necessary toilet facilities for men in the back of the building; cut archway between the back room and the middle room, so as to give light and air on the first flight up; to remove and rearrange partition so as to make the back of the house as one room, except where it is used for toilet facilities; on the third floor, or on floor two flights up, to take down present partition in the back room and rearrange it so as to provide toilet facilities for women; on the fourth floor, or three flights up, to arrange the rooms in the back of the house so that it shall be one room, except where toilet room is, to rearrange toilets on that floor in accordance with the requirements of the Building Department; all of the rooms to be papered and painted, and the window shutters from the front part of the building to be removed; all of the work to be done in accordance with the requirements of the Building Department and in accordance with the ordinances of the City; and anything to be done, not herein specifically mentioned, that the ordinances or departments require, must and shall be done by the owner of the property at his cost and expense; and in addition, he shall pay the taxes, to make the repairs in the building during the term of the lease, and shall pay for the water used on the premises. That the lease of this building run for a period of three years seven months and fifteen days, from July 1, 1909, the rental charged for both premises, \$3,500, being reasonable and just, and I so recommend.

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from the estate of J. D. Willis, by Theo. R. Willis, executor, of the second, third and fourth floors of the premises No. 100 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Children's Court, Second Division, for a period of three years seven months and fifteen days from July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of seventeen hundred dollars (\$1,700), payable quarterly; the owner to cut an arch doorway between No. 100 and No. 102 Court street on the floor one flight up, arranged either by door or some other manner, to close up the stair entrance to No. 100 Court street to the

GENTLEMEN—The Police Commissioner this day

Ordered, That, in pursuance of the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Police Commissioner to establish, provide and furnish as a police station house the new Headquarters Building on the block bounded by Broome, Grand and Centre streets and Centre Market place, in The City of New York, for the accommodation thereof of members of the police force and as a place of temporary detention for persons arrested and property taken within The City of New York, and also to provide and furnish such business accommodations, apparatus and articles and provide for the care thereof as shall be necessary for the Department of Police and the transaction of the business of the Department.

The above request of the Commissioner of the Police Department is in accordance with the provisions of section 320 of the amended Greater New York Charter, which empowers the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the Police Commissioner to establish, provide and furnish stations and station houses, or substations and substation houses for the accommodation thereof of members of the police force and as a place for temporary detention of persons arrested and property taken within the precinct, and shall also provide and furnish such business accommodations, apparatus and articles, and provide for the care thereof, as shall be necessary for the Department of Police in the transaction of the business of the Department.

There has, however, been some trouble in the erection of this building through the failure of some of the contractors to properly carry out their contracts, and if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund act affirmatively on the request of the Police Commissioner as above expressed there should be such a reservation that would not release the contractor under the contract or consider that the City in taking possession of the building had in any wise accepted the building as being finished.

I therefore respectfully recommend that if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Police Commissioner that a reservation be inserted in the resolution in the effect that the Police Commissioner shall file with the Secretary of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a stipulation on the part of the contractor or contractors that he or they will not consider that possession of the building has been taken by the City or that his or their contract or contracts have been in any way abrogated, or that he or they have been in any way released by the City from the proper carrying out of the contracts.
