Brooklyn Bridge.		
Through six-car elevated train service to and from Park row, during the rush hours, was inaugurated on the Brooklyn Bridge January 27, 1908. Through service over all of the divisions of the Brooklyn elevated railroad system, radiating from the Brooklyn Bridge, is now in operation at all hours of the day and night.		
A count was made February 17, 1908, after the tube from the Battery to Borough Hall, Brooklyn, was opened, of passengers using the through train service on the Bridge during the rush hours from 4 to 7 p.m. This count was compared with that made October 17, 1907, the last previous to the opening of the Brooklyn tube.

This increase does not indicate capacity, as all passengers awaiting trains at the Manhattan station were carried away.

None of the gates controlling the stairway entrances to the elevated loading platforms have been closed against passengers during rush hours since March 19, 1908.

A schedule of a train a minute will be maintained during the rush hour periods.

The change of cars at the Brooklyn end of the Bridge at the periods of greatest inconvenience, morning and evening rush hours, is no longer necessary. The duplication of the Manhattan evening rush hour congestion on the Brooklyn elevated railroad platforms has ceased. Stair climbing to and from the Bridge local trains and the Brooklyn elevated platforms has been eliminated. The five-car Bridge locals have been retired from service. Electricity has taken the place of cable power. The speed of trains has been safely increased across the Bridge from eleven to fifteen miles an hour. The local passengers, formerly carried on the elevated railroad cars and shuttle trains, have been provided with a separate local trolley car service between the Manhattan and Brooklyn stations. The rate of fare, 3 cents for a single trip and two tickets for 5 cents, is maintained on the local car service.

Through rush hour operation was begun under adverse conditions. In order not to interfere with train service, it was necessary to retire the shuttle trains and introduce the elevated trains before all the railroad equipment and paraphernalia were fully installed.

The through rush hour service is being constantly improved, and the completion of the work of installing railings to expedite train loading, electric switches, signals, and other modern railroad devices, will make it possible to more nearly attain the transportation capacity of the Bridge.

The use of the temporary extension across Park row for through elevated railroad service has made possible a rearrangement and improvement of the transportation facilities of the elevated railroad systems running to the Brooklyn Bridge. The elevated railroad terminals in Brooklyn being relieved of the service which is now operated from Park row, are devoted to the operation of additional Brooklyn local service over all the divisions with which they have physical connections. It has also made possible additional facilities for carrying passengers to and from the Battery-Brooklyn tube.

The completion of the overhead trolley approach across Sands street, Brooklyn, which is now well along in construction, will make it possible to add considerably to the facilities for Brooklyn elevated travelers. This approach will run along both sides of the second floor of the Brooklyn station of the Bridge. The Brooklyn railroad companies have signified their intention and willingness to carry passengers during the rush hours from Park row, Manhattan, on trolley cars to the Brooklyn station, and transfer them to the local elevated railroad service overhead, without extra fare. The Brooklyn local elevated service, starting with empty trains from the Brooklyn terminals, will furnish such passengers with an elevated railroad service in addition to that operated from Park row. This increased capacity is measured by the number of trains that are operated from the Brooklyn terminals of the elevated railroads. Passengers using the Brooklyn local elevated service during the morning rush hours will be transferred in the same way at the Brooklyn station to trolley cars running overhead across Sands street to Manhattan.

The trolley car schedule across the Bridge was increased on January 27, 1908, from 300 cars an hour during rush hours to 320 cars. A maximum of 347 cars during the evening rush hour has since been attained.

On February 17, 1908, as compared with October 17, 1907, trolley passenger traffic across the Bridge had fallen off 12,600 passengers during the evening rush period from 4 to 7 p.m. These passengers were probably attracted to the through elevated railroad service, which showed an increase of 7,305 passengers on this evening, and to the tube to Brooklyn.

Seats can now be had in the trolley cars during the morning and evening rush periods. Making allowances for normal increase, there is available for passengers desiring to take trolley cars from Park row to the second floor of the Bridge station in Brooklyn, comfortable and ample facilities.

Williamsburg Bridge.

At the Manhattan end of the bridge the subway station, extending for three blocks under Delancey street, is nearing completion. The elevated railroad and surface car systems of Brooklyn will be accommodated in this station. Track and platform facilities for eight-car elevated railroad trains have been provided. Eight loops for use by the trolley cars have been built. The connection between the Brooklyn end of the bridge and the elevated structure on Broadway, Brooklyn, is completed. This connection marks an innovation in elevated railroad construction. It is a sightly structure, with stone ballasted tracks which will introduce noiseless train operation.

The use of the Manhattan subway station will permit the operation of elevated railroad trains across the Williamsburg Bridge for the first time since it was open to the public.

In the new station the present surface car capacity of the bridge, now limited by terminal facilities, will be doubled. The station is equipped with modern railroad appliances, and is of durable and artistic construction. Passengers entering and leaving trains and cars will use separate stairways and platforms, and congestion at loading and unloading points will be eliminated.

The station is designed to form part of the subway loop connecting the Williamsburg, Manhattan and Brooklyn Bridges. With the completion of the subway loop being built by the Public Service Commission, a City Hall station and intermediate stations will be provided for the Williamsburg Bridge. This will divert thousands of passengers from the Brooklyn Bridge to the Williamsburg Bridge. People living

convenient to the elevated roads that will run across the Williamsburg Bridge must now use the Brooklyn Bridge in order to reach, by a direct route, destinations south of and contiguous to City Hall.

Quick completion of the subway loop, with arrangements for its operation, which is a matter to be determined by the Public Service Commission, will furnish a potent source of relief to the Brooklyn Bridge and usefulness to the other bridges which it will connect.

Manhattan Bridge.

The anchorages are ready for cable making operations. The framing of the temporary foot bridges, from which the cables will be strung, has been started.

The steel towers are very nearly completed. The saddles for the cables are now being placed upon them.

The manufacture of the wire required for the cables, and the manufacture of the structural steel required for the suspended span, is progressing at Trenton, N. J., and Phoenixville, Pa. The plant required at the bridge site for the erection of the cables is being installed.

The approaches to the bridge are being cleared of buildings. Arrangements have been made to immediately begin the manufacture of steel required for both the Manhattan and Brooklyn approaches.

Blackwells Island Bridge.

On March 18, 1908, a section of steel work, which closed the last gap in the all-steel connection from Manhattan to Queens, was swung into place.

The work of finishing the steel superstructure from the Manhattan shore to the Queens shore is nearly completed.

The Department has made preparation for beginning the roadway paving, footwalk flooring, installation of railroad tracks and the erection of railings and ornamental tower tops.

The construction of approaches is being hurried.

Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge.

The designing of the main span arch has gone ahead satisfactorily. The preparation of general and detail contract drawings is proceeding.

University Heights Bridge.

This bridge, connecting East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, in The Bronx, with Two Hundred and Seventh street, in Manhattan, was opened for public use January 8, 1908.

The New Madison Avenue Bridge.

The manufacture of steel in the shops has been going ahead during the winter. Preparations have been made to begin work on the site.

Borough Bridges.

The Borough bridges have been operated, cleaned and repaired by the usual forces in the employ of the Department with very little outside assistance.

The construction of the new bridge over Pelham Bay Narrows, in the Borough of The Bronx, is progressing.

The construction of the new bridge across Dutch Kills, at Borden avenue, in the Borough of Queens, continues.

PROPOSALS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF RAPID TRANSIT LINES IN BROOKLYN.

INVITATION TO CONTRACTORS.

(FLATBUSH AVENUE EXTENSION, NASSAU STREET TO WILLOUGHBY STREET, MANHATTAN BRIDGE, NO. 1.)

THE City of New York, acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District, by this advertisement invites proposals to construct that part of the proposed Fourth Avenue Subway in the Borough of Brooklyn which begins at the northerly side of Nassau Street and runs thence under said Flatbush Avenue Extension to a point about 20 feet north of the centre line of Willoughby Street.

The general plan of construction calls for a four-track subsurface Railroad, but the Contractor will not be required under the contract proposed to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast. A station between Tillary Street and Johnson Street will be constructed; and suitable cross-overs, turn-outs and sidings are also to be provided, all as indicated on the detailed plans of construction. The tunnels are to have a height of not less than thirteen (13) feet in the clear, and a maximum width of fifteen (15) feet for each track, except at curves, etc., where the width may be increased. The roof of the tunnels is generally to be as near the surface of the street as street conditions and grades will permit. The roof and sides of the tunnels will be of iron or steel and masonry. Entrances to the station are intended to be placed within private property, rights in which will be acquired for the purpose, or on the streets, or on the sidewalks adjacent to private property, as indicated on the plans.

The manner of construction shall be by open excavation unless otherwise provided in the contract or directed by the Commission; such portions of the street, however, where the work may not be completed and the backfill is not placed at the expiration of fifteen months from the time of executing the contract, must be substantially boarded over to permit freedom of traffic, if so ordered by the Commission.

In the detailed plans for construction, provisions for pipe galleries along the line of the tunnel are included. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration
